Keeping connections during Flexible Instruction Days can come in many forms. Mount Horeb paraprofessional Helen Moore initiated a creative way for students in grade 2 to learn about the United States of America with a special postcard project.

A postcard from one of the 50 states with three interesting facts and a colorful illustration was mailed to each student, their teachers, and Principal Scott Cook. Educators Kathleen Haydu, Stacey Lederman-Kroll, and Lindsay Rosenberg designed a unique social studies lesson to pair with the postcards.


"The students were so excited as they anxiously waited for their postcards, checking their mailboxes each day," according to Haydu.

Once the postcards from each appointed state arrived, the research and reporting began. The assignment required each recipient to uncover two additional fun facts about their state and record a video to the joint-class FlipGrid, an online platform for sharing short videos.

Some interesting facts shared with their classmates were: Alabama was once the Sock Capital of the World; the ice cream cone was invented in New York; and Kentucky was the home of Abraham Lincoln.

"All of the students kept their state a secret until they posted their Flipgrid. Then the teachers and students listened to all of the presentations

while learning some super cool facts! Students are now asking their parents to visit places they never would have thought of before! A fun, interactive, distance-learning experience for all," stated Lederman-Kroll.

The Warren Township Board of Education approved a list of supplemental virtual after school activities during its meeting on Monday, April 27.

Dr. Matthew Mingle stated, "I am pleased to announce 23 new after school activity options for students in grades PreK through 8! Beginning Monday, May 4 students will have opportunities to explore a variety of enrichment activities that extend learning and fun peer engagement beyond the typical Flexible Instruction Day. For the first time, these experiences will also create cross-school interactions as the distance learning environment allows us to break through traditional logistical challenges."

Staff members including substitute teachers were invited to submit club proposals which will be offered to all students. Clubs vary in topics from Creative Writing, Creative Building &

Architecture, DIY, Countries and Cultures Around the World, Warren's Got Talent, Yoga and so much more.

Students will participate with their peers and club advisors during these activities through synchronous and asynchronous videos, online games, and other digital platforms. Parents were provided a list of activities and a short description of each club along with a registration form to sign up.

Mingle is thankful to the staff members who with very little time developed an extensive list of virtual activities. "On behalf of all of us at the Warren Township Schools, I hope these new opportunities provide hours of engagement and enjoyment for your children," added Mingle.

As of May 12 over 200 students are enrolled and participating in one or more virtual supplemental after school activity.

POETRY INSPIRATION CHALLENGE DURING DISTANCE LEARNING



Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) English Teacher Jana Battiloro and her students discovered the use of a different kind of chalk board and a "Poetry Inspiration Challenge" during the Covid-19 Pandemic. The exercise helped students explore one way to harness the power of their own inner poet while reaching out with words of inspiration for their neighbors and themselves.

Prior to their Spring Break, Battioro gave her students a light assignment to complete during their one-week off from Distance Learning.

"The Tuesday before Spring Break, I left a 'challenge' for them on Google Classroom," Battiloro explained. Her challenge coincided with National Poetry Month.

"My challenge for you is to not only begin our celebration of National Poetry Month," she instructed her students, "but also to spread some love. So here is the challenge: Find a poem - any poem (even a verse of a poem) and write it on your sidewalk, driveway, window, front door, anywhere you can to show it to the rest of the world. The poem should somehow spread a message of positivity, optimism, hope, encouragement, or love. Then post a picture here so we can see what you did!"

Battiloro explained, "I found myself turning to poems each day when I started my day, trying to find some inspiration and some peace. Then, my daughter started to leave messages on our sidewalk and walkway each day, encouraging our neighbors. That's how the idea was born: That I could merge these two forms of encouragement and that this is needed, but especially for my precious students who are feeling lost and unmotivated and missing their own lives. So, I offered them a poem of encouragement by Mary Oliver, and told them to take the ideas out to others in the form of sidewalk chalk or even post on paper on a tree!

Battiloro said the student reaction was overwhelming, but she added, also, it was in line with what she and others have come to expect from WHRHS students.

"So, as Watchung Hills students always do,' she said, "they rose to the challenge and have been leaving messages on roads and driveways and sidewalks everywhere, since that day."

Some of the selections the students shared included some written by other poets, and some written by them.

ALT STUDENTS SUPPORT PENNIES FOR PATIENTS

For many years Angelo L.Tomaso (ALT) School has been recognized as a top supporter of the Pennies For Patients program through the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society (LLS). Although the COVID-19 pandemic prevents the students from fundraising in person it won't stop their efforts to help make a difference.

As a science-based service-learning program, Pennies for Patients connects schools with local blood cancer patients, provides tangible life skills to participants, and allows students to see the impact they're making in the lives of others.

Through a coordinated effort between Ms. Christine Smith, ALT principal, Mrs. Nancy Andrews, grade 5 teacher, and the LLS foundation, students will be participating in a series of fun activities throughout this experience. For example, students were provided with instructions on how to create their very own superhero costume.

Collectively, the school has raised thousands of dollars over the years and their goal is to



Each weekday evening at 7:30 p.m. the Warren Township Schools' librarians are taking turns hosting a virtual storytime session called, "Late Night @ The Library." All interested Warren students and their siblings are encouraged to listen along each evening.

Late Night @ The Library was thoughtfully created by the Warren Township Schools' librarians, Ms. Christine Burkhardt, Ms. Cynthia Cassidy, Mrs. Susan Jackson, Mrs. Lindsay LaNeve, and Mrs. Amanda McGrath. Just like Warren Township teachers, the librarians understand the need for students to feel connected to their school community while learning from home. The hope is that this program brings some comfort, joy, and relaxation to the children.

Students are able to submit comments or questions about the books that are read and the librarians will review and respond back. If a student is late to the program or misses a story they have the ability to view a recording of each story that is read.

According to the feedback that the librarians have received, students are grateful for the experience, happy with the book choices, and very entertained by the different voices the librarians are using while reading.

On the flip side, the librarians are enjoying the experience just as much as the students. "I had no idea how much I've missed reading picture books aloud, and hearing from my students about how much they enjoyed seeing me again has meant the world," added LaNeve.
