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FANWOOD OBSERVES MEMORIAL DAY VIRTUALLY

This year the public was asked to respect social distancing due to the Covid-19 pandemic restrictions and participate in Memorial Day observances by watching at home on Fanwood TV and on the Fanwood, NJ Facebook page. A Memorial Day Remembrance Ceremony was held at the Library at 9 a.m. It included a wreath laying ceremony. At 3 p.m. residents were asked to join to pay tribute through a nation-wide moment of silence while the Fanwood and Scotch Plains churches tolled their bells in recognition of the sacrifice of all of our fallen heroes.

Memorial Day weekend activities included Hometown Hero Banners of current and veteran members of the military being hung on Martine and South Avenues.

There is a Gold Star tribute to the 14 Fanwoodians who have made the ultimate sacrifice. Twelve of these 14 soldiers have streets in Fanwood named in their honor. A Gold Star Tribute video, and a virtual concert with performances by Fanwood residents was played on Fanwood TV and can be found on Fanwood, NJ Facebook page. The Memorial Day Committee has developed a map for the Gold Star Tribute. The map traces the route among all of the twelve streets in Fanwood that are named after fallen service members. Each street sign now has a gold star. The Committee also placed a placard with a history of the fallen at the base of the street sign.

- If you receive a call like one of these, say that you have to go to the store or bank to secure the money and have them call you back; during that time contact Fanwood Police Department at (908) 322-5000.








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

There is something remarkable happening in Scotch Plains and Fanwood right now. These two communities have come together like never before to help feed the over 100 veterans at Valley Brook Village. What started off as a onetime request for food has turned into a recurring outpouring of love and respect.

The residents and business owners of these two towns have consistently been extremely supportive of Friends of Valley Brook, an organization that assists previously homeless veterans living at Valley Brook on the VA campus at Lyons. Containers can often be seen in delis, pizzerias, butcher shops, barber shops, pet food stores and other establishments in these towns, and donations have always been generous. Business owners who collect this money give back 100% of these donations in the form of food, products or services. Every cent donated is used to help our veterans, and many of these business owners give back even more than collected. Money is never handled by FOVB volunteers; all donations go directly to the small businesses that support its causes.

Now, however, due to Covid 19, patrons are no longer allowed into the stores and therefore do not have the ability to donate in this way. Unfortunately, this is also the time when the veterans are in greatest need. Since many don't have transportation, they have always relied on weekly van excursions to supermarkets. These trips have been temporarily discontinued due to the virus. To make things even more dire, many of these veterans are also now out of work. These combined events created a scarcity of food for these brave men and women.

When the founder of Friends of Valley Brook, Steve Hackenberg, approached a local Realtor, Maria Ackerman (whose entire family was already actively involved with the organization) for help with feeding the veterans, an amazing phenomenon was born.

Maria put out the word and set up a table in her driveway for people to drop off donations on Tuesdays by 4:00 p.m. Within a week, over 200

meals were picked up and distributed at Valley Brook Village.

The second week, an additional day (Friday) was designated for drop offs. Before long, there was a line of cars outside Maria's house on Mountain Avenue in Scotch Plains. Many of the meals and desserts were homemade, and some were also donated by restaurants, including one in Cranford. People also selflessly donated hardto-find items such as paper towels, toilet paper and home-made masks. Since Friends of Valley Brook also includes the Help Vets Pets program, people dropped off cat litter and dog and cat food as well.

To ensure everyone's safety, everything is done while practicing social distancing. Along with the adults taking part in this remarkable undertaking, many local teenagers are also volunteering their time. They help pack up individual meals in their homes, and then load them into the vehicles making the deliveries. Some even take part in handing out the food to the veterans. Seeing the gratitude on the veterans' faces is one of the greatest rewards for all their hard work.

The veterans at Valley Brook Village are overwhelmed with the outpouring of love and support, and appreciate everyone involved, from those who spend hours cooking, to those buying supplies, to the people and the restaurants who so generously donate. They are also thankful to the volunteers who transport it all to their facility.

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VIRTUAL FARMER'S MARKET IN WESTFIELD

The Greater Westfield Area Chamber of Commerce (GWACC) organized the first Virtual Farmer's Market at the North Avenue Train Station Parking lot in Westfield on Saturday, May 3, 2020 and will continue with deliveries every Saturday morning. The Governor's March 21, 2020 Executive Order explicitly citied Farmer's Markets as essential businesses and this new-look Farmer's Market offers a combination of online shopping and weekly pick up to keep shoppers connected with local farmers and producers.

Customers can place their online orders all week until 11:59 p.m. on Thursday night. Each vendor will prepare and package the individual orders on Friday and bring them to the market on Saturday morning. The vendors will place the purchases in your car trunk at a scheduled time slot arranged alphabetically by last name starting at 10 am and completing by 12 noon. Pick up is by car only. If you don't have a car, please ask a friend to retrieve your order. Car windows should remain closed while in the market area. Nothing is available for purchase at the market and all orders must be placed online by Thursday night. The volunteer market managers are Chris and Lisa Devine and they have worked many hours to make this Virtual Farmer's Market a reality.

At this writing the Virtual Market is averaging over 200 customer orders each week and continues to grow. All social distancing protocols are followed. The vendors and volunteers directing traffic have appropriate face coverings as the purchases are loaded into car trunks by the


