RAHWAY HIGH SCHOOL VOWS TO FURTHER **SOCIAL JUSTICE FOR COMMUNITY'S CHILDREN**

On Tuesday, June 9, current and former Rahway High School students organized and lead a candlelit march.

"It is our duty to speak out and peacefully stand in unity to make certain that none of our children continue to experience racism in their lifetime." As she reflects upon "the needless death of Mr. George Floyd at the hands of the police and those who have died before him," Superintendent of Schools Dr. Patricia Camp vehemently affirms, "The Rahway School District can and does denounce this and ALL violence towards people."

Citing the School District's Mission Statement: "With diversity as our strength, the Rahway School Community shall...prepare all students...to become independent and selfsufficient adults who will succeed and contribute responsibly in the global community," Dr. Camp affirms, "We all have an obligation to our children to work together to ensure that we create change."

Also steadfastly resigned to being the drivers of change and speaking out in the voice of unity, are the students of Rahway High School (RHS). Arranging a candlelight march from the

high school parking lot to Rahway City Hall the evening of Tuesday, June 9, current and former students Story Young, Cenera Moore, Amir Lembrick, Emery Myers, and Tymek Jones aver, "One candle can only do so much, but united we can light up a town." Through their passionate efforts, the community of Rahway was peacefully aglow that evening with the heartfelt spirit of solidarity against the evils of racism.

"I always observed the terrible things that happened around me," attests co-organizer and RHS senior Story Young. "I had been silent for too long," she admits. "With the murder of George Floyd, seeing not only the nation come together to demand justice for the man's stolen life but also the world as well, it was time to be the change you want to see in the world.

"I believe the responsibility of youth consists of when to put down your phone and join the world around you!" She continues, "There is only so much we can do as the youth of America sitting behind a screen; I encourage them to feel compelled to educate themselves, their friends, their families to join a protest, to form a youth council in their community, to make their voices heard because we, as youth, are going to be the change this world sees." "Amir, Enera, Emery, Tymek, and I began planning this event June 3; this gave us enough time to advertise, accept donations, coordinate with volunteers, prepare statements, and mentally prepare," offers Ms. Young. After their initial expectation of having at least 300 attendees, the student organizers realized that their expectations were about to be surpassed due to the numerous flyers shared, myriad questions received, and the many offers to volunteer. "At around 7:15 p.m., crowds of people came rolling in to the RHS parking lot; it seemed never ending," she explains.

As the marchers made their way through the town on route to Rahway's City Hall, the organizers watched their numbers increase as community members rapidly began joining the march line. Upon arrival at City Hall, they were greeted by nearly 100 additional Rahway citizens. "The organizers and I were so overcome with emotion seeing so many people coming out in support; it made the night even more powerful," shares Ms. Young. "My heart was glowing and I was so proud of our community, of my community!"

When asked from where her sense of responsibility had come to have her voice heard, Ms. Young was swift in offering credit. "My parents have always been incredibly supportive; they help me to share my voice with the people

around me. My education helped me grow my vocabulary and form sentences, while theatre gave me freedom to be myself without fear of judgement, to stand up in front of crowds and sing my heart out and express my emotions."

Thanks to their moral courage and strength to speak out, the student organizers realized an especially poignant success. Although lit by the candles of many, the evening shone with only one light...that of a community united in spirit.

Lauding the efforts and accomplishments of her district's students in creating this remarkably unifying and meaningful march for change, Superintendent Camp takes a moment to consider some serious issues. "As educators who stand against racism and inequity, the question for the Rahway School District becomes, 'Are we successfully teaching our children kindness, empathy, and acceptance of others? Are we successfully teaching our children to stand up for their constitutional rights?" She offers sincerely that, "Considering the efforts of Story, Amir, Cenera, Tymek, and Emery who organized and delivered an impactful BLM demonstration – the answer to those questions is an emphatic YES! I personally experienced the demonstration and I am so proud of their actions to bring about real change in our community. Their depth of character is truly reassuring that the future is in good hands with our RHS graduates."



THREE RESIDENTS GRADUATE THE TRINITAS SCHOOL OF NURSING





UNION COUNTY POSTMASTERS SHARE TIPS FOR RESPONSIBLE PET OWNERSHIP

Last year 169 letter carriers were victimized by dogs in New Jersey, including 16 in Union County. The 15 postmasters serving the 21 municipalities in Union County are therefore raising public awareness of the importance of responsible pet ownership in helping prevent dog bites.

To prevent dog bites, Union County Postmasters recommend the following responsible pet ownership tips:

- Obedience training can teach dogs proper behavior and help owners control their dog in any situation.
- When the letter carrier comes to your home, keep your dog inside, away from the door, in another room, or on a leash.
- Dogs can be protective of their territory and may interpret the actions of letter carriers as a

threat. Please take precautions when accepting mail in the presence of your pet.

• Dogs that haven't been properly socialized, receive little attention or handling, or are left tied-up for long periods of time frequently turn into biters.

By following these few simple tips, pet owners can significantly improve neighborhood safety

PHILLIPS 66 DONATES \$50K TO TRINITAS FOR PANDEMIC RELIEF

Phillips 66 Bayway Refinery has been a staunch ally of Trinitas Regional Medical Center for many years. In light of the pandemic, given the fact that New Jersey has one of the highest number of COVID-19 cases in the country, the generosity of organizations like Phillips 66 is now more essential than ever.

The number of COVID-19 cases being handled at Trinitas makes up 3.5 percent of New Jersey's total cases as of Friday, April 17.

"It feels good to have an organization like Phillips 66 in our corner," said Gary S. Horan, President & CEO of Trinitas. "While this is clearly one of the greatest challenges Trinitas has faced in our long history, we are confident that we will come out the other side of it knowing we've made a difference. We'll also remember that we had great support along the way."

LITERACY NEW JERSEY CELEBRATION **HIGHLIGHTS ADULT ESL STUDENTS' SUCCESS**

On June 4 over 120 students and volunteer completing over 100 hours in the program. tutors came together via Zoom to celebrate a year of commitment and success in learning English. Literacy New Jersey's English as a Second Language (ESL) program provides free classes to adults who want to improve their language skills in order to find jobs, help their children in school, and become more involved in the community.

Thanks to the generosity of Literacy New Jersey volunteer tutors, the celebration included a raffle of \$1,700 in gift cards, with students earning raffle tickets based on the number of ESL classes they attended. The raffle was the highlight of the night for students, many of whom have faced difficult challenges due to Covid-19. Students also received award certificates for 50+ instructional hours, with some students

The majority of students attended classes at the Elizabeth Public Library until closure due to Covid-19. Not to be deterred, students and tutors quickly transitioned to online platforms such as Zoom, Skype, and Whatsapp to finish out the year and successfully complete their studies.

Literacy New Jersey generally provides daytime and evening classes at libraries throughout Union County. In addition to English

classes for immigrants, Literacy NJ offers GED prep classes and support for adults who struggle with reading and writing.



STATE ASSISTANCE FOR RENTERS

The Statewide Open Enrollment Site for the COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program (CVERAP) will be open on Monday, July 6, 2020, at 9 a.m. until Friday, July 10, 2020, at 5 p.m.

The COVID-19 Emergency Rental Assistance Program (CVERAP) will provide temporary rental assistance to low- and moderate-income households that have had a substantial reduction in income or became unemployed due the COVID-19 pandemic. Applicants may be eligible for a maximum of up to six months of emergency rental assistance. The assistance will be capped at DCA's fair market rent standard or the total of the rent, whichever is lesser. All participants will be reviewed at the three-month interval to see if they are still in need of assistance. Persons applying must meet all applicable CVERAP income and eligibility requirements. You must be eighteen years of age or older to apply or be an emancipated minor. Only one pre-application per household will be accepted. All participants will be selected through an online lottery process.

JAPANESE KNOTWEED (FALLOPIA JAPONICA)

Indigenous to Japan, knotweed was originally shipped westward by the German botanist Philipp von Siebold. When Siebold sent a variety of plant specimens to the Royal Botanical Gardens at Kew in August 1850, including Japanese Knotweed, he had no idea what he was unleashing on the world.

If you take a walk in any local town, county or state park today you are likely to stroll past fields of knotweed, especially near ponds, lakes and streams. All over Europe nations are on knotweed alert including Latvia, Germany, Hungary, Austria and Switzerland.

Knotweed presents a pleasing appearance to the eye: heart-shaped leaves, bamboo stems and pretty, little white-flower tassels in late summer and autumn. What is less obvious is what lays below the ground. The "crown" or "head" of a knotweed infestation can be the size of a bull's head, with scores of roots radiating out from it like strands of hair.

Due to its tireless and unstoppable army of unseen roots, knotweed spreads outward forming clumps 65 feet wide and 7 foot high. Superficially resembling bamboo this plant has a relentless killer instinct, overwhelming native plants and forcing out wildlife. If you look through horticultural literature, and you will see knotweed described as "thuggish," "ferocious," "invasive" and an "indestructible scourge." The stems create dense thickets impossible to walk though.

Amazingly there are very few male knotweed plants in the wild. The females depend on their massive root systems to propagate new plants.

Where it once resided mainly in the wild,

today it terrorizes private gardens and homes, forcing its way up through every crack imaginable, in patios, concrete paths, and even in walls and floors.

If Japanese knotweed is spotted on your property action to control and remove it should be taken immediately. What's more, getting rid of it is a task beyond the average gardener. It can take up to five years of regular chemical blitzing before the knotweed all-clear can be sounded.

Uncontrolled knotweed infestations can negatively impact the value of homes and property.

I'm a volunteer for the American Cancer Society, writing on behalf of cancer survivors and their caregivers. I write out of concern for this sector of the population because of the effect Covid-19 has had on them. Eleven percent of New Jersey's Covid fatalities have been individuals who were already battling cancer, then later contracted the virus. This pandemic has caused a myriad of obstacles for cancer patients who've been recently diagnosed or who require continued long-term care.

87% of cancer patients are experiencing disruptions in treatment and testing regimens. This crisis has made it difficult to maintain contact with health care providers, all of whom are overwhelmed and overworked at this point in time. Regular access to treatment is difficult

COVID-19 SCAM WARNING

The New Jersey Division of Consumer Affairs is alerting consumers to be aware of a number of apparent scams related to COVID-19. To avoid this and some of the tactics being reported as possible scams, the Division recommends:

Don't let CDC imposters into your home. Representatives from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are not going door-to-door seeking information or conducting surveillance on COVID-19. Imposters should be reported to local authorities and the Division.

Don't fall for fake cures. Beware of in-store or online advertisements for products that claim to cure or prevent COVID-19 or other similar offers. No cure or preventative medicine has been approved for sale.

Look out for phishing emails. Cybercriminals may take advantage of global concern and interest in COVID-19 to try to convince email recipients to open links or attachments that may direct them to malicious websites or deliver malware. Stay away from COVID-19 related information that does not come from a trusted source, to avoid exposing your personal information.

Keep in mind not everything online may be factual. The internet is full of information, but be mindful of its accuracy. As false reports spread regarding the origination and spread of COVID-19, rely only on trusted sources for information.

Be wary of unsolicited calls. Whether they are offering health insurance, including to supplement Medicare or Medicaid benefits, or a cure or treatment for COVID-19, refrain from sharing your personal information over the phone, unless you have initiated the call.

Avoid internet adoption scams. Scammers are falsely misrepresenting themselves as CDC employees, and asking victims to send money overseas to adopt a pet being held at a quarantine station. The CDC does not quarantine pets or would not ask for payment to bring an animal into the U.S.

FIRST TO THE FIRE - A HISTORY OF THE RAHWAY FIRE DEPARTMENT

Records of local town meetings dating back to the late seventeen-hundreds mention the payment of wages to a constable who was entrusted with duties that included sounding an alarm if he spotted a fire. Upon hearing his signal, men would run to the scene hauling buckets of water. This was Rahway's only method of fighting fires until 1813 when the citizens, seeking better fire protection, acquired a hand-drawn water pump. The new piece of apparatus was little more than a tub on wheels with a hand pump that still had to be filled by the bucket brigade.

In 1815, after failures to control several fires, Washington Engine Company #1, Rahway's first volunteer squad, was established to more effectively utilize and more efficiently maintain the pump. They stored their equipment in a garage-type structure by the Monroe Street Bridge near the corner of Dock Street. In 1840 the company moved to a larger building on Main Street located on the approximate site of the present fire headquarters. In the early 1860s Washington Company erected Rahway's first firehouse, a brick building on the corner of West Milton Avenue and Augusta Street which was in use until the 1970s.

The first apparatus capable of drafting water from the river was purchased in 1826 by Franklin Engine Company #2 which had its beginnings in 1823. By 1868 Franklin Company built a modern station on Seminary Avenue that was in use until the late 1970s. The city later sold the building which still stands after having been renovated into a multi-purpose property while maintaining the façade of the old firehouse.

Along with the Washington and Franklin Companies, the Eagle Engine Company #3, organized in 1835, would build their station on Main Street in the 1860s using the same building plan that was used for the East Milton station. It

was located between the railroad tracks and Elizabeth Avenue on the site where it stands today. Independence Hook and Ladder Company # 1 (1850), Eagle Hose Company # 3 (1856), Washington Hose Company #1 (1856), and Franklin Hose Company # 2 (1856) would come into existence as new apparatus was acquired.

After the city was incorporated in 1858, these volunteer groups turned their equipment over to the city and became subject to the ordinances of the municipality. By 1859 the Rahway Fire Department consisted of three hose companies, two hook and ladder companies, and one hand engine company. Two-hundred and five volunteers made up these units. Twenty-five men were assigned to each hose company, fifty to the engine company, and forty to each hook and ladder company.

Before the end of the nineteenth century, several other companies were organized, some took on new names, and some dissolved. The Vulcan Engine Company #4, organized in 1858, was manned by the employees of a carriage spring factory. The Liberty Engine Company #5, in action from 1858 – 1874, was run by a group called "The Rangers." The Excelsior Hook and Ladder Company existed for only three years (1875 – 1878). The Eagle Hose Company reorganized in 1883 and became Protection Hose Company #3. The Washington Hook and Ladder Company, the Washington Chemical Engine, and the Lincoln Hook and Ladder Company #2 were the last of the volunteer units to organize.

By 1911 there were seven volunteer companies, each a loyal brotherhood that took great pride in their commitment to protect the citizenry by being "first to the fire." Their esprit de corps was so strong, they were known to reject the assistance of other units from both inside and outside the city limits when fighting a blaze. One

such incident occurred on May 30, 1911 when a large fire broke out at the Royal Manufacturing Company located on East Grand Avenue just east of the railroad tracks. As the Rahway boys were battling the fire, an employee of Royal, fearing combustible material stored in an adjacent outbuilding might be touched off, contacted the Elizabeth Fire Department requesting help. Before long, horse-drawn engines from Elizabeth came charging down Grand Avenue. When they reached the site, several fireman dropped their hoses, stopped the out-of-towners, and confronted them declaring, "Your services are not needed and not welcome." The Elizabeth firefighters were outraged but turned and left. At the next meeting of the Elizabeth Council the Rahway volunteers were admonished for their "ungentlemanly behavior."

After the Royal fire, nine of Rahway's largest manufacturing companies approached the Common Council requesting they institute a paid fire department. It was their position that such a change would give them better protection and savings in insurance costs. In twelve years, a paid department would become a reality and the volunteer units a part of the past.

In mid - March, 1923, Mayor James B. Thurber reintroduced discussions of revamping the fire department. The volunteers were outraged and filed a petition to recall the mayor. After much debate and political haranguing, a majority of commissioners sided with Mayor Thurber and on May 18, 1923 voted to establish a paid department as a better way to "insure the safety to lives and property." The department would consist of a chief, two assistants, six firemen, and 100 call men. This latter group would consist of former volunteers. Rahway's first chief, Walter Ritzman, would be paid a maximum salary of \$3,000.00 a year. Annual salaries for the two assistants would be \$2,300.00, the six firemen would receive \$1,500.00, and each call man \$300.00.

In the years that followed, the department has continually upgraded and expanded its equipment and improved and increased the training of its firefighters. From the 1920s and into the 1950s, three stations were in operation (Seminary, Main and E. Milton) until 1956 when the Maple Avenue station was opened to cover the large housing developments that were built in the western part of the city. In 1977 a new fire headquarters was built on Main Street at the corner of Emerson Avenue that along with the Maple Avenue station were capable of handling the needs of the entire city. The three original stations were abandoned.

Today's department is fully equipped with two modern engines, a 95' ladder truck, and an assortment of specialized rescue vehicles needed for responding to all types of fires and floods. Rahway's fifty-one firefighters protect the city 24/7 by working four shifts with twelve members covering each shift. All are EMT trained and operate as first responders for EMS. They are also trained in Haz-Mat, confined space rescue, and swift water rescue.






