CIVIL AIR PATROL SQUADRON WINS NJ WING AWARDS

At 7:50 p.m. on Friday, March 27, 2020, cadets and senior members of the New Jersey Civil Air Patrol (C.A.P.) were anxiously waiting for the announcement of the Cadet of the Year and the Squadron of Merit awards. By 8:10 p.m., the members of the NJ-102 Captain "Bud" Jackson Composite Squadron, located in Edison, New Jersey, were elated after winning three out of five awards announced. The squadron was awarded the 2019 NJ Wing Squadron of Merit, as well as the NJ Wing Cadet of the Year Phase 1, awarded to Cadet Staff Sergeant Dhyeyi Kakkad of Watchung, and the NJ Wing Cadet of the Year Phase 3, awarded to Cadet 1st Lieutenant Manali Shah of Scotch Plains.

Out of 24 squadrons in New Jersey, the NJ-102 squadron's achievement is a huge accomplishment. The Captain "Bud" Jackson squadron is the largest squadron in New Jersey with over 140 cadets and senior members. The squadron is very active in every aspect of the Civil Air Patrol, including Cadet Programs, Aerospace Education, and Emergency Services. The StellarXplorers team, competing in a national space competition, placed 3rd in the Northeast Region, making it to the Semi Final stages. The squadron has three CyberPatriot teams, both middle school and high school. The middle school team placed 3rd in their Division, while the high school team placed 3rd in the Platinum tier. Cadets continually train in Emergency Services for support on C.A.P. Search and Rescue and Disaster Relief missions. The squadron received the 2018 and 2019 Quality Cadet Unit Awards, along with the AEX Aerospace Excellence award.

Out of the 855 New Jersey Wing cadets, Cadet Staff Sergeant Kakkad was awarded Cadet of the Year Phase 1 and Cadet 1st Lieutenant Shah was awarded Cadet of the Year Phase 3.

Sergeant Kakkad is a current sophomore at Watchung Hills Regional High School. She has been a keen participant in the squadron's StellarXplorer team in 2019 and 2020. Through this, she is Level 1 certified for STK software.

She has taken two Orientation Flights and earned the General Emergency Services certification. She has achieved her first milestone award and is an active leader of the Aerospace Support Staff department.

Cadet 1st Lieutenant Manali Shah is currently the cadet Executive Officer of the squadron, overseeing 14 Support Staff departments working towards achieving the goals of the squadron. She is a member of the Cadet Advisory Council, both Group and Wing levels. She is certified in several different aspects of emergency services, including Ground Team and Mission Base Staff. Lieutenant Shah attends the Union County Academy for Allied Health Sciences and is a current senior in high school. She is a certified NJ EMT and serves as a cadet volunteer with the Scotch Plains Rescue Squad. In February 2020, Lieutenant Shah was part of a group of cadets selected to travel to Washington D.C. for Civil Air Patrol's annual Legislative Day, as a state representative speaking on behalf of the squadron and wing in meetings with Congressional leaders.

The Captain "Bud" Jackson squadron is very proud of its achievements and its cadets. The squadron will continue to work hard to achieve future successes.

The Civil Air Patrol (C.A.P.) Cadet Program is open to all Middle School and High School students from ages 12 to 18.

WARRIOR DISTANCE LEARNING TECH SQUAD

If there is ever a dominant common characteristic enabling the students, faculty, administration, even parents to get the most educational value out of the experience of living during the time of the 2020 Covid-19 Pandemic, it is a newfound appreciation for all the essential workers, who are far too often taken for granted.

Introducing the Watchung Hills Regional High School (WHRHS) Distance Learning Tech Squad – The WHRHS IT Department. Since well before, but certainly doubly so since the start of the 2019-2020 School Year distance learning experience on March 16, they have been on-thejob, supporting students and teachers as the IT facilitators during the whole process.

The Warrior Distance Learning Tech Squad includes: IT Director Anthony Meluso, IT Manager Andy Bohl, Technicians Luis Nazario, Luis Kourany and Kevin Teeter, and Student Information Systems Manager Chris Beckert.

Meluso laid out the broad responsibilities for Tech Support during the distance learning experience.

"Planning started two weeks before the governor made the announcement to close school," Meluso said. "IT was tasked with assessing available hardware and software for immediate use during the health-related closure."

Meluso continued, "9th, 10th and 11th graders have 1:1 Chromebooks. For 12th grade, the students used their own devices. Surveys were conducted identifying students without a device and students without internet at home. On the Friday before closing, IT distributed over 50 loaner Chromebooks to seniors. We also have seven students without the Internet at home. We provided those students with Verizon Hotspots."

He continued, "Any technology hardware repairs or requests for staff and students are processed weekly. Drop off and pick up windows are between 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. each day through the Building and Grounds offices."

Meluso said, "The role of Google Classroom during distance learning is tremendously

important. Announcements, discussion, assessments, and grading are processed here. It's the hub that is needed to make communication flow without physically being in a classroom. Both teachers and students are already very familiar with all the possibilities of Google Classroom from prior professional development and the school's focus to make it part of the daily learning stream."

When asked how the transition to online learning was, Meluso responded "The staff at Watchung Hills are professional educators and quickly handled the transition from in-class learning to distance learning. They prepared several weeks of lessons ahead of the school closure. Initially, there were some issues with recording their lessons, sharing their screens, and access to files and other resources. The IT team quickly addressed these and worked on building tutorials to share with the faculty and staff."

Somerset ARC has 34 group homes and supervised apartments, 95 residents and 65-75 staff members. The residents of these group homes are adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Most residents attend Adult-Day Care facilities but are unable to since the COVID-19 pandemic lock down began.

The Somerset ARC Direct Support Professionals are front line workers who are currently dealing with medically fragile patients at the group homes and apartments. The homemade meals would be one less thing they need to do for that day and would be very much appreciated.

The Elks members stepped up! For the next four weeks they provided one home-cooked meal for the two homes located in Warren and two homes located in North Plainfield. This equates to approximately 25 meals. Each week we have one Chairperson who will coordinate the meal cooking and delivery. Our first delivery was picked up by Lisa Marie's husband and Arc volunteer Jamie Weinschenk.

Many people join the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks to participate in our patriotic events or help us provide volunteer services to veterans and special children's groups, or simply to make new friends in the local community.

CARING CONTACT CONTINUES TO ANSWER CALLS DURING COVID-19 CRISIS

With residents of New Jersey being asked to stay home to fight the spread of Covid-19, many people find themselves feeling isolated and experiencing high levels of anxiety. Caring Contact, a local listening and crisis hotline, continues to help individuals during this difficult time. As a member agency of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, Caring Contact cares for those who are in crisis in central and northern New Jersey and acts as a backup to other Lifeline agencies throughout the country. Additionally, they operate a local "warm" line to assist individuals who may not be in crisis but are experiencing stress themselves, with a family member, friend or co-worker.

Approximately 90 volunteers answer the phone lines at Caring Contact. "It has been a challenge during this time to ensure that volunteers are kept safe", stated Executive Director Janet Sarkos. "All business operations were moved remotely in early March. We've altered our hotline operations so that only one listener at any a time is in each of our phone rooms. We are working together as an organization to ensure each phone station and other "common touch areas" are cleaned thoroughly between listeners, to further protect against contamination. It is vital that we continue to answer calls during this time of heightened anxiety".



During the past 20 years, over 2000 of Rahway's street trees have died or were removed and never replaced. Resident Bob Markey is producing a three-episode video which provides viewers with a sobering look into this serious crisis affecting Rahway's trees.
