PATRONS OF PLAINFIELD FOOD SECURITY PROJECT EXPRESS APPRECIATION TO ROTARY CLUB OF PLAINFIELDS

Submitted by Michael Townley In recent months, members of the Rotary Club of the Plainfields have donated time to the Plainfield Food Security Project, a joint effort with the duCret School of Art, Star Fish Food Pantry, and the YMCA of Plainfield to help feed the hungry during the Covid-19 pandemic.

With the cooperation of Lt. Dontay Gibson of the Salvation Army, the club members brought fresh fruit and vegetables and sometimes regular grocery items to the parking lot of the Salvation Army every Saturday. There they set up a distribution system with families and individuals lining up, socially distant, to receive a box of food. Three hundred or more boxes were given out each week, helping fill a desperate need in the community.

On August 22, the Rotarians distributed over three hundred \$50.00 ShopRite gift cards to those waiting in line. Another three hundred cards were given out to families in a pop-up drive-through at Cedarbrook School, across from duCret everything. This was very important) School. "There was no food available that week," Michael Townley, Rotary Club said representative. "The duCret School needed the space that the project was using so they could resume classes, and all of the food was given out the week before."

The gift cards were purchased using a \$30,000.00 grant from the Plainfield Foundation to the Star Fish Food Pantry. "The purpose of the grant was to purchase food or gift cards for distribution to help off-set hunger in Plainfield that was caused by Covid-19," said Mr. Townley. "We knew that there would be no food on August 22, so purchasing the gift cards really filled the need."

The surprise of the day at the Salvation Army was the presentation of "thank you" cards from one of the volunteer helpers who worked every week signing in the families. Three cards were circulated among the waiting families who expressed their heartfelt appreciation.

"Thank you for all the help you have provided to the Plainfield community, my family and many

Many of the same sentiments were expressed verbally as the families received their gift cards and realized the value of the gift. "We didn't need to speak or understand Spanish to know that the people were sincere in their appreciation," said Mr. Townley. "As Rotarians, we are guided by our motto of "Service Above Self." This project helped us put that motto into action to benefit people who needed our help. We consider the opportunity to have been a blessing for us, too."

The Plainfield YMCA branch hopes to continue some form of food distribution going forward, most likely a series of one-day events where food is dropped off by the donors and distributed to families in need on same day. 

NORTH PLAINFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES NEW RESCUE PUMPER

The North Plainfield Fire Department has recently taken delivery of a 2019 Ferrara Rescue Pumper. This purchase replaces a 21 year old, 1999 KME pumper that was currently out of service due to major mechanical issues. The new apparatus is equipped with a 1500 gallon per minute pump and an onboard water tank that holds 750 gallons. This vehicle also contains a hose, ladders, extrication tools, a thermal imaging camera, SCBA air packs and various other equipment for firefighting and rescue capabilities.

The Department would like to thank the Mayor and council for their support and funding of this purchase, and for continuing to place the life safety of the residents as a top priority.

NORTH PLAINFIELD HOLDS ANNUAL 9/11 TRIBUTE

On the morning of Friday, September 11, the Borough of North Plainfield held its annual 9/11 Silent Procession ceremony at 8:45 a.m. The procession and short service have been an annual tribute/reflection on the events of 9/11 since the first anniversary of this tragedy 19 years ago. It is our way, as a community, of remembering all of the thousands of American citizens who lost their lives that day; especially the emergency services personnel who gave their lives trying to save those civilians.

This commemorative event was coordinated by the North Plainfield Police and Fire departments, whose members marched down Somerset Street and then gathered at Somerset and Lincoln for a brief service. This year we elected to forgo the service portion of the tribute, in an effort to respect social distancing guidelines and minimize the crowd size. Instead, we held a brief moment of silence to reflect on the people who lost their life that day and to also keep their family members in our thoughts.



IMAGINE LAUNCHES SUPPORT FOR NURSES

Imagine, A Center for Coping with Loss announced the expansion of its virtual group support programs with one designed to help nurses dealing with the stressors of healthcare work during Covid-19. Imagine, which serves more than 2,000 individuals annually and is nationally recognized for its work helping bereaved children and their families, offers its Peer Support Group for Nurses at no cost. Interested nurses can join the weekly support group at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesdays beginning September 30.

When asked about the decision to launch this program, Imagine's Founder and Executive Director Mary Robinson said, "Through the pandemic, we recognized a gap in support for some of the people we rely on most: our nurses. Supporting nurses who are themselves supporting grieving families felt like a perfect fit for our mission."

Robinson, who was named a 2019 CNN Hero, went on to say, "Nurses continue to selflessly care for others despite their own fears about their potential exposure to Covid-19. We need to ensure they have a place to turn to for support."

For many, the anxiety they feel going to work in a healthcare environment comes on top of grief they were feeling before the pandemic even hit.

Talia Sion, a newly minted nurse, had attended Imagine's Young Adult Group for support following the death of her mother in January, and then joined the organization's pilot support program for First Responders when the pandemic hit.

Of her experience, Sion said, "I was quickly overwhelmed with the weight of so many sick and unstable patients, not knowing if and when

things would ever get back to 'normal.' Once again, Imagine created a program for me to turn to with people who understood how I feel; people who understood what I was facing on a daily basis at work."

The nature of the program's virtual environment breaks down geographic boundaries for those seeking support. Nurses from New Jersey and throughout the country are welcome to attend.

"New Jersey is no longer a hotspot for Covid-19, but many of the nurses here are processing what they went through and bracing for a possible resurgence," Robinson said. "Meanwhile, there are nurses in other states in similar positions to where we were a few months ago. Sharing these stories, fears, and challenges at all different stages in a peer support model is proven to be an effective way to learn coping strategies."

As with all of Imagine's offerings, this free Peer Group Support for Nurses program will be available year-round for as long as is needed. Those who are interested can register at imaginenj.org/nurses.

Imagine, A Center for Coping with Loss is a New Jersey-based grief support center for children, young adults and families dealing with the death or life-altering illness of a parent, sibling or child. In addition to its peer grief support programs, Imagine provides training through education and outreach programs across the state to a variety of organizations including schools, houses of worship and corporations. Its goal is to create communities where grief and loss are transformed into resilience, empathy and compassion; and where no child grieves alone.




