GIRL SCOUTS GO GREEN WITH GARDEN COLLABORATION

Walnut Avenue School in Cranford was full of rakes, trowels, pitched forks and lots of Girl Scouts hard at work clearing the space for a new beginning. Girl Scout Cadettes from two Cranford Troops have teamed with the Cranford Green Team to give the garden at Walnut Avenue School a refresh. On recent Sundays the Girl Scouts have weeded, trimmed, raked and prepped the raised garden beds with a plan to plant vegetables there in the future.

Green Team member Ms. Donna Bacich is coordinating the refresh with Troop 40881. In addition Troop 40688, another troop from Hillside Avenue School, is lending their support. The hope is for these two older troops to spearhead the project and eventually involve the Brownie troops based at Walnut Avenue School, a pre-school to Grade 2 elementary school.

"If we can work with the troops and show them the benefits of engaging with the earth, that is important," said Ms. Bacich, a Cranford Green Team volunteer. "It has been very fulfilling. Right now there is so much going on that we can't control, but if we can be together with young people who are full of energy and light and life...is there anything better?"

The Green Team is a group of volunteers associated with On a recent Sunday morning the garden space behind Cranford Township that seeks to help the community be greener and cleaner. In the past, the Green Team has partnered with Girl Scout of Cranford on plastic collection and recycling initiatives.


> Ms. Sara Gutierrez, leader of Troop 40881, explained that the efforts in the garden will be tied to a Girl Scout Journey, an area of exploration that precedes their pursuit of the Silver Award. "It's important to pass this type of knowledge onto the girls and teach them about partnering with the community to achieve shared goals," Ms. Gutierrez said. "This garden has historically been a great space with lots of good sun for growing vegetables. We'd love to see it like that again."



ORGAN DONOR ENROLLMENT DAY

On October 8, NJ Sharing Network and its many healthcare partners and volunteers throughout the state worked together to register organ and tissue donors in celebration of Organ Donor Enrollment Day. The non-profit, federally designated organ procurement organization set a goal of amassing at least 2,020 new donor registrations on 2020 Organ Donor Enrollment Day. The 2,020 goal helps create a positive spin on the number '2020' as opposed to the negative '2020' references seen virtually everywhere due to the challenges faced this year.

Currently, there are nearly 110,000 Americans – nearly 4,000 of whom live in New Jersey – waiting for a life-saving transplant. You can register to be a donor at any time by visiting njsharingnetwork.org/register.

"Organ Donor Enrollment Day is about taking action and inspiring others to learn more about how they can save lives through organ and tissue donation," said Joseph S. Roth, president and chief executive officer of NJ Sharing Network. "One organ and tissue donor can save eight lives and restore health to over 75 people."

HOLOCAUST SURVIVOR MEETS LMA STUDENTS

Holocaust survivor Peter Stein recently met with the students and faculty of Westfield's Lamberts Mill Academy (LMA) to share his experiences about living through the Holocaust. Mr. Stein spoke of his struggles and loss of family growing up as a young boy in German occupied Czechoslovakia. As he told his story students were captivated by his the recollections. He was born to parents of a mixed marriage – his father Jewish and his mother Catholic. As the terror grew, he identified with his mother to find some level of protection. Frequently his father was taken to do hard labor at Terezin without any notice. Most of his father's family were murdered there during the war.

He shared his fear on the days that Germany moved in to occupy – how their country and his life went from carefree to fearful. His childhood images were filled with the sight of soldiers and equipment constantly moving around the city. He told of the affirmations he was meant to give every day at school to Adolph Hitler and the propaganda rallies they had to attend on a weekly basis to boost German morale. He spoke of the class bully who targeted him by calling him a dirty Jew and his fear that this might reveal his true background.

Mr. Stein also spoke of hope as he talked about the spirit of his people and their

aspirations for a better future. He also highlighted other parts of his childhood – his meals with his Catholic grandparents where food was plentiful while at home there was rationing and a struggle to have enough to eat. He also told of the times that they secretly listened to the BBC on Sunday nights despite the German's radio jamming. He said this always gave them hope as the Allies moved closer.

After his presentation, several students and faculty asked questions. These ranged from his levels of fear, what it was like to survive a bombing, and if he still believed in God. He noted that he was among the lucky as he and his mother were able to immigrate to the US after the war and establish a life in a free country. He emphasized several times how lucky we are to live in the US where we are free. Two students told Mr. Stein he was a hero for living through the terror and sharing his feelings with young people.

The assembly was part of the school's history program that brings history to life for its students. Lamberts Mill Academy is one of five special needs schools sponsored by the Union County Educational Services Commission, a public-school district headquartered in Westfield, NJ, to serve the needs of students in Union County and nearby towns. The Cranford Preservation Award for 2020 was presented to the owners of 37 Algonquin Drive and the Cranford Theater. The award, sponsored jointly by the Cranford Historical Society and the Cranford Historic Preservation Advisory Board (HPAB), is given annually to owners of a residence and a business who have helped preserve and maintain the history and character of Cranford.

Because of COVID restrictions, the award wasn't presented at an in-person ceremony this year, and a certificate that cited both properties for their restoration efforts was delivered to the recipients.

Kate Carlson and Lorrie Bove received the award for their sympathetic expansion of their house at 37 Algonquin Drive in Sunny Acres, working to preserve and maintain their house's original design to continue the Sunny Acres' legacy. Every year additions and modifications to the houses in Sunny Acres make the original designs undistinguishable. Needing more room, rather than add a floor or totally remodel the house, the awardees chose to add an extension to

virtually identical to the way it looked in 1942 when it was built.

Sunny Acres, a community of 172 residences which was developed between 1940 and 1943 by the Sears Modern Homes Division, was designated in 2018 as Cranford's first Local Historic District. It consists of Cape Cod and Colonial Revival style houses in a variety of predesigned layouts.

or styles offered, but by placing the main body of the house lengthwise or endwise to the street, moving the placement of the garage to either side of the house, set forward or back, and adding a breezeway to detached garages, the houses were made to look different. 37 Algonquin is one of the 19 homes built in Style #6.

The Cranford Theater was honored for its place in the community as well as for the recent physical renovation that was done by owners Jesse and Doreen Sayegh. The theater unexpectedly closed in September, 2019, and during the time it was closed the citizens of Cranford realized what they had lost. But then,

the back of the Cape Cod house, making it look after undergoing a full renovation including new seats, drapes, floors, digital projectors, sound system, and an upgraded concession stand, the Cranford Theater reopened on November 8, 2019.

Cranford had a movie theater as early as 1909 at North Avenue and Eastman Street. On November 29, 1926, on the site of the old Township building at 25 North Avenue West, the Branford Theater opened, showing Noah Berry There were 12 standardized, numbered designs in "Padlocked". Two months later, in January, 1927, the "B" in the theater name was swapped out for a "C", and the Cranford Theater was born. The 1,300 seat theater had both a stage and a Wurlitzer pipe organ, as most theaters of the time did, but it functioned primarily as a movie theater. It closed but then reopened several times over the years, and ownership and operators changed several times. All the while the theater was a center of local activity and a good neighbor. In 1998, it was divided into five screens. With its recent renovation and rescue as an independent movie theater, the Cranford Theater will remain an important and valued resource to the Cranford community.

The Cranford Historical Society and the Cranford Historic Preservation Advisory Board celebrate and congratulate the owners of 37 Algonquin and the Cranford Theater.
