RESCUE SQUAD ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR CADETS

The Berkeley Heights Volunteer Rescue Squad (BHVRS) is now accepting applications for our 2021 Cadet Program. BHVRS Cadets are made up of high school sophomores, juniors and seniors who assist our adult members with patient care.

Once accepted as a Cadet member of the BHVRS, the new cadet will be provided CPR and basic first aid training, after which they may begin to join an ambulance crew. The Cadet member will then be required to take the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course and obtain National Registry EMT certification. Cadets will also have the opportunity to apply for the BHVRS scholarship, but most important, Cadets will have the opportunity to make a difference in Berkeley Heights and the surrounding community. The following were written by some of the current BHVRS Cadets who would like to share why they joined the BHVRS:

Olivia – "Joining the BHVRS Cadets is one of the best decisions I've ever, not only have I gained medical knowledge by becoming an EMT. I also gained a second family. I get a lot out of being a cadet, but knowing that I'm making a difference in people's lives is a great feeling."

Liz – "I joined the squad during the pandemic because I saw the impact healthcare professionals have, and I wanted to be a part of that positive change. I'm really honored to have the privilege of helping others in my community and see the difference that I can make!"

Roshni – "My dad is a doctor and he explained the amazing work he has seen EMTs do in prehospital care, so I decided to join the BHVRS. Being on the BHVRS Cadet Squad has fueled my passion for medicine and has done so much more, making me realize the importance of community service. BHVRS is my second home and my crew is like a second family."

membership to the BHVRS Cadet Program must:

• Be a high school sophomore, and at least 16 years of age (as of April 1, 2021)

- Have parental/guardian permission to volunteer and ride for the **BHVRS**
- Be in accordance with the objectives set forth by the BHVRS (which will be outlined as part of the Cadet interview process)
- If asked, provide a physician's note stating physical ability to perform duties as assigned
- Be able to take the National Registry EMT class during the summer of 2021

BHVRS cadet members are required to:

- Ride as part of an ambulance crew a minimum of 3.5 hours per week, along with additional 6 hours of weekend time per month
- Follow and adhere to the Cadet Expectations set by the BHVRS
- Attend monthly Cadet meetings and training, and squad supported events as they are scheduled

GIRL SCOUTS INTERVIEW BH VOLUNTEER RESCUE SQUAD

On November 28, 2020, Jaslene, Tara and the most gross thing you've touched?" Trisha of Girl Scout Troop 40944 visited the Berkeley Heights Volunteer Rescue Squad (BHVRS). The Girl Scout troop interviewed Deputy Chief Marc Schnitzer (soon to be the Chief in January 2021) and two crew members.

They wanted to interview the crew to understand how they operate, especially during the night time, as part of their Night Owl Badge. They got to see a pager or a walkie talkie go off, alerting an emergency call just received. The crew also showed the girls some of the medical equipment

The girls scouts asked questions such as "How do you stay awake during your night shifts?"; "Why do you work at night?"; "Are you scared when the patient is sick?"; "What training did you go through?"; and "What was

The girl scouts learned a lot about BHVRS through this Q&A session. They learned that BHVRS collaborates with neighboring towns when needed under a "Mutual Aid" arrangement. In addition, an "Advanced Life Support" (ALS) team will get involved in severe incidents. It takes a network of first responders to keep our community and citizens safe.

The girl scouts send thanks to the BHVRS for doing a great job protecting our community from harm. Special thanks to Deputy Chief Marc Schnitzer and crew members Dominique Salazer and Virginie Delwart for participating in the interview. They added "Thank you to our troop leaders for allowing us to interview this amazing team of compassionate helpers. We are grateful for this opportunity!"

CONTACT TRACING

Berkeley Heights and other towns cannot get their numbers under control if people do not cooperate with contact tracers. For COVID-19, the ability to scale our contact tracing capability is absolutely crucial to break the chain of transmission, slow community spread and restart the economy. Contact tracing is a long-standing process; if you're getting called, it's because you tested positive for COVID-19 or may have come into close contact with someone who has. Contact tracing goes hand in hand with testing. It is part of the process of supporting patients with suspected or confirmed infection. Here's how it works

Contact tracers will reach out via phone, text message, or letters dropped off at your door. Contact tracers will provide their name, agency, and a phone number. If you have any doubts about the legitimacy of your conversation with a contact tracer, you may hang up and call your local health department. Our Berkeley Heights Health Officer can be contacted at: (908) 518-5620. You should also feel free to request the name and ID of anyone who calls.

To ensure you have the care you need and the support to keep you and your family safe, you may be asked:

To confirm your date of birth, address, or other basic information.

Discuss any symptoms you may have had, whether you were hospitalized, or any underlying health conditions that might put you at greater risk

Details about your living situation so you can be informed on how to safely self-isolate or selfquarantine.

If you are uninsured, so we can give you additional information about free testing and care

You may also be asked about your job to determine if you are a health care worker or essential worker and therefore must comply with additional safety requirements.

If you tested positive for COVID-19:

A contact tracer will work with you to identify your close contacts - anyone you spent 15 minutes or more with over a 24-hour period and were within 6 feet of while you were infectious (2 days before onset of symptoms to 10 days after).

If you don't have symptoms, we'll ask about your activity during the two days before your diagnosis.

We will also ask for the phone numbers of anyone you tell us about, so they can be called and cared for.

What a Contact Tracer Will NOT Ask...

A contact tracer will never ask for your social

security number.

A contact tracer will never ask for confidential financial information like your bank or credit card number.

A contact tracer will never ask about your immigration status and ICE will not be notified about your location.

The information you share will not be used for the purposes of law enforcement or immigration enforcement in any way.

The information you share will not negatively affect your public charge assessment or be used to deny access to health care or any other essential service.

Your cell phone is never tracked, a GPS location is not followed, and geolocation data is not collected or used.

If someone is requesting personal information covered above, it is likely a scam. You can report these calls online to the New Jersey Division of Consumer Affairs or by calling 973-504-6240.

Your information is confidential. Neither your name or your COVID status will not be released to your contacts, or your COVID-19 status; that information will only be known to public health officials and our local health departments.

supervision and support to tutors in the form of free professional development workshops on specific topics such as Health Literacy, ESL Conversation, Small Group Instruction and Job Readiness.


