KIAN DEANE'S BOY SCOUT EAGLE PROJECT AT LIBRARY

If you're ever at the Madison Public Library and your device is running low on power, Kian Dean's Boy Scout Eagle Project will help you out. Kian Deane of Madison Boy Scout Troop 25 created a solar powered charging station at the Madison Public Library for his Eagle Project. Anyone can sit on the bench and charge their small electronic devices while getting free wifi and working or reading outside.

Kian wanted to do something different for his Eagle Project. He started planning it during the summer of 2019 with the basic idea of installing a charging station at a park. He built on that idea to make it solar powered. At first, it was simply going to be a post in the ground. He later thought it would be better to make a shelter over a bench instead.

Kian initially worked with the library and town council for their input and approval. He also reached out to Green House Solar for their help in the solar aspect. Green House Solar donated the solar panels and charging equipment. They also helped to install them. Kian had help from Troop 25 Boy Scouts on painting and construction. Kian is now working on final touches to his project.

MADISON TROOP 7 CONGRATULATES NEWEST EAGLE SCOUT THOMAS DAILEY

awarded the Boy Scouts of America's highest rank, Eagle Scout, on Monday, November 30. Dailey's Eagle Court of Honor was held at St. Vincent Martyr Church in Madison and was live streamed so that Troop members, family, and friends could attend the event.

Dailey began his scouting adventure in the 1st grade in Cub Scout Pack 7 at St. Vincent Martyr parish. During his years as a scout, Dailey has hiked, biked, backpacked, and paddled over a thousand miles on trails and rivers in eight states, and he has visited national landmarks with Troop 7 in Washington, D.C., Arlington, New York, Boston, Plymouth, Gettysburg, and Acadia National Park. In 2016, Dailey was inducted into the Order of the Arrow, scouting's honor society, and he also completed National Youth Leadership Training later that same year. Working with his family, parish, and diocese, Dailey earned the Light of Christ and Parvuli Dei religious emblems, and he received the Ad Altare Dei award from Bishop Serratelli in 2017.

Dailey has held many leadership positions in Troop 7, including two terms as patrol leader and one term as the troop's Senior Patrol Leader, and he has dedicated hundreds of hours of service to the Madison community as an individual scout and alongside his troop. For his Eagle Project, Dailey assisted the Library of Congress's Veterans History Project in building its collection of personal narrative accounts from American veterans. "The project involved collecting letters and photos and recording interviews with veterans, and then submitting those records to the Library of Congress for preservation," Dailey explained. "I'm grateful to the eight veterans who shared their experiences, the Gold Star family that contributed many original letters and photos, and to all the volunteers who helped to assemble, record, and catalog the materials."

Dailey is a senior at Madison High School where he is in a share time program with the County College of Morris for Cybersecurity and

He is also a three-season athlete, running and swimming for MHS's varsity Cross Country, Track and Field, and Swim Teams, and he was a Harvard Model Congress delegate for MHS in 2018, 2019, and 2020. This past summer, Dailey completed an internship in cybersecurity at Nokia/Bell Labs, and he hopes to attend a U.S. Service Academy after graduation.

MADISON POLICE CHIEF VINCENT "VINNY" D. CHIRICO PASSES

Madison Police Chief Vincent D. Chirico died peacefully with his wife Joanne and daughter Betty by his side after a valiant eight-month battle with a COVID-19 related illness.

The Borough of Madison released the following message:

It is with extreme regret that we announce the passing of retired Madison Police Chief Vincent "Vinny" D. Chirico after a courageous battle against COVID-19. Chief Chirico was appointed to the Madison Police Department on November 10, 1969, and served as chief from 2004 to 2009,

On Sunday, December 6, 2020, retired where he retired after 39 years of relentless service. Vinny was also a former member of the Madison Fire Department, where he formerly served as President of the Madison Hose Company. In addition to being dedicated to our community, he was mostly a dedicated husband and father to his daughter Betty-Lou. Vinny fought the impossible fight having been battling COVID-19 since early April. His true spirit showed on how he refused to guit. Our condolences are sent to the entire Chirico family during this difficult time.

She added, "To ensure the success of our community in the future we must invest in today's children now."

Preschool Advantage was founded in 1995 to fund tuition for children to attend a quality preschool, children who might not otherwise have such an opportunity. Research shows that by the age of three, children from lower income families are already developmentally behind their peers and benefit greatly from a preschool education which sets them up to succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

Preschool Advantage has provided families with financial assistance for high quality preschool education for 25 years. We have paid over 1,500 tuitions throughout the organization's history funding many of these children for two years of preschool. In September 2020, we supported 78 children who attended one of the 28 partner preschools across Morris and Somerset counties. MADISON MAIN STREET FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES SMALL BUSINESS RECOVERY GRANT PROGRAM

The Madison Main Street Foundation announced the distribution of nearly \$192,000 in funds to Madison businesses as part of its Small Business Recovery Grant Program facilitated in partnership with the Downtown Development Commission (DDC). Foundation trustees and representatives from the DDC and Madison Area Chamber of Commerce reviewed applications and decided fifty-four businesses would be awarded grants. Two payments, one in mid-June and the other in August, were sent to the recipients.

Madison resident Bob Nissen championed the original concept for the grant program. Bob also helped drive the grant fundraising. He noted, "Our residents demonstrated another reason why Madison was ranked the number 1 community in the state by New Jersey Monthly - generosity. Donations to the recovery fund supported important Madison small businesses in need and helped them to reopen and thrive once again." The original goal was to raise \$200,000 in total to support the grant program.

Grants amounts ranged from \$2,772 to \$4,372. The information included in the grant applications, financial need, and to what degree various statewide Executive Orders may have forced business closure or modified operations for a business guided the decisions on individual award amounts.

The grants were funded by community donations and by the Madison Main Street Foundation. "We were overwhelmed by the outpouring of support from the community during this uncertain time-including those from other business owners who were less impacted by the shutdown. Individual donations combined with a \$50,000 gift from the Madison Main Street Foundation allowed us to help our Madison businesses in ways very few communities have been able to do," said Suzanne Whitehorn, chair of the Madison Downtown Development Commission.

"This program was just one small way that we hope to be able to support our business community during this once-in-a-century crisis," said Carla Brady, President of the Madison Main Street Foundation and DDC Commissioner. In partnership with the Madison Downtown Development Commission, the Madison Main Street Foundation works to promote, improve, and support the Madison Commercial District. Over the years, this support has included the purchase of bike racks, water fountains, benches, signage, and planters, as well as funding the new Madison branding initiative, and this year the \$50,000 contribution to the grant program.

The pandemic has seriously affected the Madison Main Street Foundation's ability to fundraise due to the cancellation of Bottle Hill Day, Taste of Madison, etc. thus challenging the future charitable support necessary for the commercial district.




