BLOOD DONORS URGENTLY NEEDED CHRONIC SHORTAGES THREATEN HEALTHCARE

New Jersey Blood Services, a division of New York Blood Center (NYBC), wants to increase blood donations for area hospitals. The COVID-19 pandemic has created a chronic shortage across the country that shows no sign of improving. This is particularly dangerous given the looming uncertainty surrounding the pandemic's trajectory over the course of the next few months.

Blood is urgently needed. The region's healthcare system requires 1,500 donations each day to treat patients ranging from trauma victims and cancer patients to newborn babies and their mothers. Prior to the pandemic, blood drives were held at businesses, high schools, colleges and community groups. Most of those groups have had to cancel their blood drives due to COVID-19. Donations are at just 65% of prepandemic levels - well below what is needed by hospitals and patients in our area.

"This is an incredibly challenging time for our communities. We are now relying on people seeking out a place to donate. So far, that is not happening at the level we need," said Andrea H. Cefarelli, Senior Executive Director of Recruitment & Marketing for New York Blood Center.

We are asking our community to visit our donor centers or to find a convenient community blood drive to donate. "The Covid-19 pandemic has created blood shortages for all New Jersey and NY hospital systems, said Cefarelli. Donated blood is essential for trauma and surgery patients in need. We encourage healthy New Jersey residents, aged 16 to 75, to donate blood at NJBS blood drives and donation sites now. Visit

RENTAL RELIEF FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR COVID-IMPACTED TENANTS

Somerset County is using federal CARES Act funding to establish the Emergency Rental Relief Program (ERRP) to help households that lost income due to the COVID-19 pandemic make monthly rent payments. The majority of the ERRP will be paid directly to landlords, with additional funding used to help families by paying for legal representation to residents currently in Landlord/Tenant court.

"Somerset County is committed to working with renters and landlords to prevent homelessness and maintain a stable rental market during the economic crisis caused by COVID-19," said Freeholder Director Shanel Robinson. "The Emergency Rental Relief Program, in conjunction with other state and federal efforts, will help keep families in their homes and reduce the vacancies and expense of finding new tenants for landlords."

Only tenants who can demonstrate their rent was up to date for March 2020, prior to the COVID-19 disruptions to our economy, should apply. Successful applicants are eligible for the lesser of three months' rent or \$3,000 to be used to pay past months' rent and will be paid directly to landlords through a partnership with Somerset County Board of Social Services.

The program is funded by a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) allocation of \$646,398 from the March 2020 Federal C.A.R.E.S. Act for the majority of Somerset County, with separate CDBG funding allocated

to Franklin Township. As a result, Franklin commdevel@co.somerset.nj.us; Township residents are not eligible for ERRP assistance.

In order to be eligible, an applicant must:

Be a resident of any Somerset County municipality (except Franklin Township) and have a current 12-month lease or rent agreement.

Have a household income that is less than the following income limits, based on household size including children: 1 Person - \$66,900; 2 People - \$76,500; 3 People - \$86,1001; 4 People -\$95,600; 5 People - \$103,200; 6 People \$110,900.

Be able to demonstrate that rent payments were current as of March 2020.

Provide documentation of COVID-related loss of income after March 9, 2020. Examples include:

layoff or reduced work hours; unpaid leave to take care of children due to school and daycare closure; self-quarantine for 14 days resulting in a loss of income; other consequence of the virus that led to a reduction of income.

In order to receive assistance, eligible residents must complete an application and submit the required documentation. For your convenience, there are 3 different ways to apply.

VULNERABLE RESIDENTS CAN SIGN UP FOR A FREE SAFETY RESOURCE

Somerset County's Office of Emergency Management supports the New Jersey "Register Ready" system – a special needs registry for vulnerable residents to use as a safety resource during a disaster or other emergency.

Experts agree the best way of managing a crisis is to be proactive and have a plan. Residents with disabilities and others who have special needs can better prepare for an emergency by signing up for Register Ready. Through this safety resource, emergency response teams have access to each registrant's specific health and safety needs as well as their location.

Caregivers or family members can register on behalf of their loved one or patient. Each individual's personal information is kept confidential. The service is password protected and will not be shared with other entities. Personal information will only be used for wellness checks and emergency response activities.
