FOOD FOR FRIENDS EXTRA BUSY THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

Rahway Food For Friends currently serves over 600 families per month. With the closing of schools, increase in unemployment, and unemployment benefits being exhausted, we have experienced an influx of new clients. The numbers of families we serve monthly have more than doubled due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Our clientele has expressed dire needs for food, clothing, financial and housing support.

With the increase in clients, and new safety protocols, we immediately revised the programs under the direction of our CEO, Candance Ashe.

Our staff and volunteers welcomed this challenge as we maintained high safety standards for combating Covid-19 while serving clients, and keeping our volunteers and staff safe. We have implemented health protocols with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the New Jersey Department of Health. When implemented with fidelity, the protocols work to limit possible exposure and spread of COVID-19.

Pantry Directors, Nadine Burns and Denise Jones lead their team of volunteers in providing monthly food supplement packages, and enforcing the guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID. To decrease long lines and maintain social distancing, clients were given additional days to pick up food.

The soup kitchen teams implemented the changes and prepared "to go meals" along with mobile meal deliveries. The Vice President, Pat Carter headed the teams as they prepared to serve over 180 meals weekly. The mobile pantry was extended to 4 vehicles to deliver food to seniors and disabled persons.

Rahway Food For Friends remains open to serve the public 4 days a week, with staff working 6 days a week to service them. Staff duties include preparing food packages, collecting food orders, locating new food distributors, placing food orders, delivering food and meals, picking up donations, and other administrative duties.

The team at Rahway Food For Friends works tirelessly and diligently to perform Covid-19 cleaning to serve at the highest levels of sanitation, safety and dignity. Our guests are provided with masks if needed, and prayers always.

Rahway Food For Friends lost two staff members and many clients during this pandemic. This year has thrown us its worst, but in the face of these difficult times, our community and staff have proven to fight back with our very best!

THE GIFT OF SIGHT: SAYING YES! CAN CHANGE SOMEONE'S LIFE

"I am passionate about spreading the important lifesaving and enhancing message of organ and tissue donation because I know the powerful impact it can have," said Peter DeSarno, member of the New Providence Lions and double cornea transplant recipient. "It is an honor to bring together two organizations (The Lions Club and Eversight) that do so much good and have personally impacted my life".

That was the way the presentation at the November 4 New Providence Lions Club meeting began as members heard the personal story of one of its own members receiving the gift of sight and discussed the 50-year history of Eye Banking in New Jersey with Jennifer Rosenblatt, Director of Philanthropy at Eversight.

Peter went on to share that when he was in high school, he was diagnosed with a condition called Keratoconus that affected both of his eyes and at the age of 24. He then received two cornea transplants that restored his vision and forever changed his life.

The gift of his first donor cornea in his left eye came to him with the assistance of the Lions Eye Bank of Texas. The second transplant in his right eye was procured with the assistance of the Lions Eye Bank of New Jersey (now Eversight) working in conjunction with the New Providence based, NJ Sharing Network.

Peter put his experience into perspective by

saying that today he looks out of the eyes of two other individuals. Peter explained that unfortunately he has not been able to make contact with and thank his donor families. He said what he does know is that they were two heroic human beings who came from two loving, caring and generous families who in their darkest hour displayed an incredible amount of love and compassion in providing him with the gift of sight. He said that he doesn't think humanity gets any more beautiful than that.

The Lions Club's work in fighting blindness goes back many years. In 1925, as an ambassador for the newly formed American Foundation for the Blind, Helen Keller addressed the Lions Club International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio hoping that the Lions would partner with the American Foundation for the Blind and lend their support as an organization to those who had lost their sight.

It was at that convention where she appealed to the Lions and challenged them to become "knights of the blind in this crusade against darkness."

She had no idea just how far the association would take her challenge. Before the convention was over, the association dedicated itself to making Keller's dream a reality and the Lions would become Keller's Knights of the Blind.

Since 1925, millions of lives have been

changed through the vision-related work of Lions around the world, and today the association is as dedicated as ever to hastening the day when no one should suffer unnecessarily from vision problems. Lions work to end preventable blindness and aid the visually impaired through eye centers and hospitals, medicines and surgeries, eye glasses and eye banks.

Jennifer Rosenblatt, Director of Philanthropy of Eversight, shared with the New Providence Lions Club an inspiring presentation about the Eye Bank in New Jersey and the work of her organization. Specifically, the work at Eversight to restore sight and prevent blindness through the healing power of donation, transplantation and research.

From its home in Clark, NJ, Eversight proudly partners with NJ Sharing Network, Lions Clubs, surgeons, businesses and philanthropists throughout New Jersey to advance its mission.

In 2019, Eversight worked with the families of 882 New Jersey residents who gave the gift of sight for transplantation, research and education. Through outreach and programs, Eversight provided donated tissue for 8,176 sight-restoring corneal transplants in 2019 in New Jersey and around the world.

UNITED WAY PROGRAMS

As part of its transformation to continue providing programs and services, United Way of Greater Union County (UWGUC) recently announced that it has modernized their comprehensive approach to their family strengthening model. The organization is collaborating within its community resources network and its affiliated initiatives to provide a series of virtual webinars that will provide families and individuals with continued access to services, leadership and career focused initiatives, and ways they can advocate in their communities.

Building Resiliency Empowering Parents, Families and Individuals, the themed focus, serves to provide continued support to residents who are facing educational, health and economic barriers, and ensures services are provided in both the traditional and virtual (online) setting. During the Coronavirus pandemic, UWGUC saw an increase in the number of families struggling to meet basic needs such as buying food, paying rent and utility bills, and having access to healthcare. The unemployment rate in Union County went from 4.5% in January to 16.4% in June 2020, resulting in more than 81,000 unemployed residents, 3,100 evictions filed and 9,000 food stamp applications filed in Union County.

The organization, through donations of fresh and nonperishable food from Amazon Logistics and the Community Food Bank of New Jersey, also hosts weekly food distributions, where 900 families are served on average each week, since the pandemic began. In addition, during the summer, UWGUC organized and held a virtual back-to-school drive serving more than 400 students with backpacks and school supplies.

UWGUC is also calling for volunteers who are experts in their field to host a workshop or webinar that could help those in the community.

WELLNESS, INDEPENDENCE, AND SOCIALIZATION FOR SENIORS

MISS ANN SHOTWELL - A STORY OF KINDNESS AND GOOD WILL FOR THE SEASON

If one were to think of an image of a matronly school attendance officer making her rounds on a bicycle in the early years of the 20th century, thoughts of Almira Gulch, the mean-spirited neighbor of Dorothy who transforms into the Wicked Witch of the West in the classic film, "The Wizard of Oz" might come to mind. In the case of Miss Ann Shotwell, attendance officer for the Rahway Board of Education, however, such an image would be totally misleading. In fact, Miss Shotwell lived such a full life of service to others that she was considered one of the best known and most highly respected citizens in all of Rahway.

Miss Annie, as she was familiarly known, started working for the Board in 1913 when she was already fifty-two years old. She served as attendance officer for twenty-three years and peddled around on a bicycle looking for students who were truant from school - not to punish them, however, but to help them. This was a woman who felt acts of charity and good will were a required duty and whose story is an appropriate one for the approaching season.

The Shotwell family was one connected with the founding history of Rahway. The family was one of Rahway's pioneer Quaker families, and owned farmland in East Rahway abutting the Trembley Point section of Linden. Shotwells would unite in marriage with the Wood family after whom Wood Avenue in Linden gets its name. Annie, the daughter of Abram F. and Mary Jane Wood Shotwell, was born on the farm on the fourth of July, 1861. By 1890, the family had moved to St. Georges Avenue where they built a large manor house on the north-west corner of Stone Street and became active members of the First Presbyterian Church.

Perhaps it was because of her ancestors' association with the Quakers or perhaps because of her deep Presbyterian faith that her altruistic spirit was formed. She felt a great need to help the indigent and came to know the needs of each poor family better than anyone else. Because of this earned reputation, citizens wishing to give to those in need would contact her when they had clothes or food to donate. As attendance officer, she would visit the homes of children who were absent from school and would often learn that they were too embarrassed to attend because they didn't have shoes or nice clothes to wear. It became her practice to carry clothing items on her bike to give the children so they might return to school feeling better about themselves. It was not unusual for Miss Shotwell, after a day of bike-riding, to return home in her stocking feet having given her own shoes to a needy individual. Over the years, those same children she helped had told her how she induced them to go to school and how that changed their lives.

In 1932, the Board of Education, knowing that she would not resign, offered to give her an assistant which she refused contending she could carry-out the work herself. She continued to cover her route by bicycle until 1934 when she finally purchased a car.

Miss Shotwell also served as a librarian in the children's department at the Rahway Library. Working with youngsters, she had an innate sense of knowing what books each child would enjoy. would encourage their children to read and credited her with fostering their education.

During the summer months Miss Shotwell supervised the playground activities at Riverside Park now known as Veterans Field. She was a favorite of the children and was held in such high esteem by city officials that when the new field house was being planned, her needs were incorporated in the layout. Built in 1930, the structure, deemed to be one of the most attractive field houses erected in the state, was designed by Seymour Williams, the city's leading architect at the time. Prominently, it featured a large window on the west side of the building so Miss Shotwell, who by that time was almost seventy, could sit in her office and have a view of all the children playing at the park.

11, 1936, several tributes were made in her memory. A month after her death, the Rahway Recreation Commission proposed establishment of a permanent, well-equipped Parents called upon her to select the titles that playground "as a fitting tribute to the memory of a woman who devoted her life to work of this type." Shotwell Park was eventually created behind the public library on Seminary Avenue. The Men's Club of Grover Cleveland Elementary School planted a memorial tree on the front lawn of the school in appreciation for all the good works she did in helping students succeed. A plaque, set in stone, was placed next to the sapling with the words:

In Memory of

Miss Annie Shotwell

Dedicated October 31, 1937

By Men's Club of

Grover Cleveland School

Rahway, NJ

The stone and plaque are still there, and the sapling has grown to be a sturdy oak, a symbol of After Miss Shotwell's passing on September a life well-lived and a life worth emulating.

WINTER BIRD FEEDING 2020/21: A WINTER WITHOUT ACORNS

Although most people haven't noticed, oak trees have not produced many acorns this year. This is most likely due to poor weather conditions during the time of pollination in early spring. Oak trees pollinate by the wind carrying its pollen to the tiny female flowers. If there is too much rain or other unfavorable condition such as a calm and windless spring it will reduce the success rate of pollination and result in a poor acorn harvest. This problem will have no affect on the health or survival of trees and is part of its normal cycle of life.

Not long ago a year without acorns would have been devastating to Native Americans and other humans who depended on acorns as a source of protein during the winter months. In recent times we have stopped eating acorns and switched to other more desirable nuts to eat.

Unfortunately, a year without acorns is tragic for the wildlife that depend on them as a reliable winter food source. Deer, chipmunks, squirrels, raccoons, possum and white bellied mice are a few of the creatures that will have very difficult winter. Even Black bears include acorns in their diets to fatten up before hibernation. Included in this group are many of our wild songbirds such as blue jays, cardinals and finches. Luckily these birds can fly to backyard birdfeeders to help survive the winter. If you have never fed back yard birds before this winter is a perfect year to start.

Backyard winter bird feeding is one of the most popular hobbies in the United States and Europe. Many people spend a lot of money on birdfeeders and different types of seed to attract various birds to their yards. In this article I am going to discuss a few ways you can supplement this protein and help our feathered friends survive this winter.

Try to keep your feeding areas close by so they easier to maintain, with a good view from your window. The easier it is, the more likely it is you will keep doing it. Birds need our help most when the snow covers the ground and cuts off all other food supplies.

Black oil sunflower seed is perhaps the best food you can use to feed your birds. Black oil is high in protein and attracts a large variety of wild birds including goldfinches, mourning doves and cardinals. Birds use protein as fuel to burn and keep themselves warm during freezing temperatures so black oil seeds are a desirable high-quality food source. Black oil seeds are a desirable

'Wild bird' seed mixes are available everywhere and seem like a great value but they are loaded with cheap fillers like corn which has little nutritional value for wintering birds. These fillers also attract bigger more aggressive birds like grackles and starlings that will gobble your seed and chase the smaller more colorful and desirable birds away. Many people would like to help feed birds during the winter, but for various reasons do not want to get involved with tending bird feeders. When the ground is frozen or covered with snow there is a simple technique you will appreciate and many birds love. Simply sprinkle seed on the ground and your birds will eat it up. I have a mulched area close to my door that I use to sprinkle the seed on. In early spring I simply put fresh mulch over this area to cover up the old seed hulls.

Gleaning is a type of foraging technique where birds methodically pick over an area to collect food, typically insects or seeds. Many species that overwinter in our area use this of feeding method. Dark-eyed Juncos, White-crowned sparrows, Mourning Doves and even Cardinals will frequent your garden to glean seeds off the ground.

In the early morning I sprinkle some seed, but not too much at once because I don't want unnecessary and expensive waste. If you have an easily assessable area with a view from a window, that is perfect. If you are enjoying your bird watching you can always sprinkle more. Even if you are a devoted back yard bird watcher, tossing some seed on the ground will give your feathered friends more areas in which to feed.

Birds with diets that depend mostly on insects have the hardest time finding enough proteins and calories in other food sources such as fruit and seeds. For these birds, 'suet' is extremely valuable.

Suet is a winter bird food made from animal fat that is easily digested and metabolized by many birds; it's a high-energy food, especially valuable in cold weather. Suet is particularly attractive to woodpeckers, nuthatches, chickadees, blue jays, tree creepers, and starlings when they visit feeders. Of course, squirrels love suet and will gobble every bite if permitted.

Suet cakes are sold almost everywhere we shop. Garden shops, hardware stores, and even our local grocery stores. I try to find suet cakes at the best price and stock up on them. They can be stored in a cool spot or put in a freezer for long term storage.

Commercial suet feeders are available, and are an inexpensive investment. They have a latch to close them but I also use a twist tie to prevent squirrels from opening the cage and knocking the cake on the ground. in protein and the favorite seed of Cardinals. Place the suet in feeders at least five feet from the ground to keep it out of the reach of pets.

Do not put out suet during hot weather as it can turn rancid. During hot weather the dripping fat can damage natural waterproofing on bird feathers causing permanent damage and a shorter life; not what we are hoping for when we feed birds.

Today suet cakes come in a wide variety of

ingredients and flavors. Everything from citrus, blueberry or hot chili. The birds are coming for the fat, so the simpler the ingredients, the better. If I find a suet cakes filled with corn, I put it back. Corn is the least nutritional "filler" with only twopercent protein.

It is possible to make your own suet from leftover fat. You can find information on how to make it on the internet and YouTube.

To discourage squirrels and undesirable birds I use a simple trick that helps avoid or limit this problem. Hang your suet cake feeder upside down. When I unwrap the suet, I only take off the top wrapper, leaving the plastic tray on the rest of the cake. Place the suet in the feeder with the exposed suet facing down and the plastic upward. This makes it difficult for the larger birds to hang on for long and they soon search for an easier food supply. The smaller birds are able to cling upside down and have no trouble eating the suet.

Peanut butter is very high in protein. I attached a board on my tree and spread the peanut butter mixed with some black oil seeds in it on that so I don't harm the tree. Peanut butter will attract many birds including woodpeckers.

Raw unsalted peanuts are beloved by Blue jays. If you put out a cupful every day your local Bluejays will appear within minutes bringing a frenzy of activity to your garden. Many people ring a bell to alert the Blue jays its dinner time.

Lastly, gray stripped sunflower seed are high in protein and the favorite seed of Cardinals. The shells of these sunflower make an unsightly mess. The shells also contain oils that can inhibit the growth of other plants so avoid using them over a flower bed. Many shops sell sunflower seeds with the shells off but they can be expensive. If you have an area where you can easily rake and clean up the shells in the spring they are a welcome addition to your birds winter menu.

As for squirrels I have given up long ago. They need to eat also.
