ROSELLE PARK ACHIEVES SUSTAINABLE JERSEY CERTIFICATION

Sustainable Jersey representatives announced municipalities. that Roselle Park has met the rigorous requirements to achieve Sustainable Jersey certification. Roselle Park is one of 55 towns that have attained certification in 2020 and will be honored at the Sustainable Jersey Virtual Awards Luncheon on Thursday, March 11, 2021. Sustainable Jersey's participating communities represent over 81 percent of the state's



"Thank you to Roselle Park's Green Team and Environmental Commission, especially to Michele LoManto, Green Team and Environmental Commission member and Sustainable Jersey Agent, for your work in ensuring Roselle Park's Sustainable Jersey Bronze certification. Here in Roselle Park, we believe in an environmentally responsible approach and we thank Sustainable Jersey for this recognition," said Roselle Park Mayor Joseph Signorello III.

To become Sustainable Jersey certified, Roselle Park submitted documentation to show it had completed a balance of two of the required sustainability actions, meeting a minimum of 150 action points. In addition to reaching 150 points, each certified community had to create a green team and select at least two out of 12 priority action options. Roselle Park met 210 action points and selected 3 of the 12 priority actions by completing a Natural Resource Inventory, Prescription Drug Safety and Disposal action and Sustainable Land Use Pledge.

"With nearly 90 percent of the New Jersey population living in a Sustainable Jersey community, we know our work at Sustainable Jersey has never been more important," said Randall Solomon, executive director of Sustainable Jersey. "Congratulations to the

municipalities that achieved certification in a very challenging year. Your hard work brings us closer to the goal of a sustainable New Jersey."

The Borough of Roselle Park registered with Sustainable Jersey and established the Green Team in 2018 when LoManto was placed in the leadership position. "I'm proud of the work we've done to be recognized by Sustainable Jersey as a Bronze Certified community for the third consecutive year. 2020 proved to be a most difficult year, one filled with many challenges, and we would not have accomplished this achievement without the support of our governing body and the efforts of our Green Team and Environmental Commission members. We look forward to seeing our borough continue on this path to sustainability."

VOLS WANTED FOR MEDICAL RESERVE CORPS

The New Jersey Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) – a network of community-based, locally organized units comprised of volunteers – is looking for reinforcements, particularly those with vaccination skills. MRC volunteers are especially vital during emergencies and disasters when paid public health and emergency response assets are overwhelmed. Healthcare professionals (including recently retired individuals) having vaccination skills are

especially needed now that COVID-19 vaccines are available.

In addition to skilled vaccinators, individuals with all types of skill sets (for example, security, language translation/interpretation, education and outreach, warehouse operations, clerical, counseling, and more) are needed. COURSE ON DEALING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS

The NAMI Family-to-Family Education Course will be offered by the Union County Chapter of NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness). The course will be online via Zoom starting on Thursday evening, March 4 at 7 p.m., and meet each Thursday over a consecutive 8week period. We ask that you be able to commit to the full series of dates through April 29, and be able to attend from a computer, tablet, or smartphone and attend with some sense of privacy.

The course is offered specifically to the parents, siblings, spouses, teenage and adult children, and significant others of individuals with severe and persistent mental illness. The program is not appropriate for individuals who, themselves, suffer from one of the major mental disorders. The course is taught by NAMI members who have completed intensive training.

Curriculum topics include: schizophrenia, bipolar disorder (manic depression), clinical depression, panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder etc., the clinical treatment of these illnesses and how caregivers can learn to cope more effectively. Attendees will learn about new research, medications, skills needed to successfully communicate with a relative and how to deal with critical periods.

million acre swath of forest and wetland that confounded Chris and Paulie in the episode "Pine Barrens," was actually the country's first National Reserve and designated by UNESCO as a single-site biosphere reserve. It is the largest body of open space on the Mid-Atlantic seaboard and home to dozens of rare and endangered species.

Yet even though the Pine Barrens claim some 22% of the state's land, it is not the only highlight when it comes to New Jersey's environmental diversity. Our state hosts portions of the Appalachian Trail and the black bears who live along it, streams full of native brook trout, fields where wild turkey roam and song birds compete for blueberries, and homes for marine wildlife all along the Jersey Shore.

New Jersey Outdoors was created with the idea of highlighting and celebrating New Jersey's rich environmental heritage. First published in 1950 by the Department of Conservation and Economic Development – the precursor to the modern Department of Environmental Protection - New Jersey Outdoors featured articles on hunting, fishing, and conservation related topics. The combination of photography and illustration by local artists gave each issue a unique personality.

The New Jersey State Library is pleased to provide free online access to its entire collection of New Jersey Outdoors. Issues from 1961-2002 have been digitized in color and are available through the Library's Digital Collections.

Browsing the table of contents reveals the breadth of topics in each issue – from in-depth commentary on particular species, to fishing tips, and profiled conservation projects. The issues also provide a glimpse at how environmental concerns changed over time.

For example, the January 1963 issue features commentary on what could happen to New Jersey's wildlife and food supply in the event of nuclear disaster. Tensions between sportsman and environmentalists were highlighted in the August 1971 issue – just a year after the first Earth Day and the rise of the new environmental movements. In July/August 1983, an article on urban waterfront restoration projects showed the culmination of years' worth of work. Peppered throughout the issues are articles on historical and archaeological topics, as researchers explored human interaction with their environment.

New Jersey Outdoors was published monthly from 1961-1973, bimonthly 1973-1991, and then seasonally from 1991-2003. Publication ended in 2003 after the publication of the Department of Environmental Protection's new magazine, Fish and Wildlife Digest. Fish and Wildlife Digest eventually split into three separate, annual magazines: Hunting and Trapping Digest, Freshwater Fishing Digest, and Marine Digest. These magazines are also available through the Library's Digital Collections.

Unfortunately, we are missing the earliest published issues (1950-1960) of New Jersey Outdoors from our collection. Anyone who would like to donate copies of these issues to the New Jersey State Library can contact Deborah Mercer or Caitlyn Cook in Reference Services at refdesk@njstatelib.org.

FAMILY CAREGIVERS WEATHERING COVID-19

Having reached a dead end in his career, Thomas Corea decided to become a stay-home dad when his son, TJ, was 18 months old. Not long after that, he and his wife, Carol, discovered TJ was on the autistic spectrum. Thomas Corea has been the family caregiver for his son, now 26, ever since.

While Thomas Corea is a very positive person – he is a musician by trade – he often found it daunting to deal with the system that is in place to provide people with disabilities and their families the supports they need.

"Unless you stand on a mountain and scream, you get nothing," he said. "You try to keep your head above water and their head above water to keep them safe."

According to estimates from the National Alliance for Caregiving, 65.7 million Americans serve as family caregivers for an ill relative or a relative with a disability. Per the Administration for Community Living, research indicates family caregiving takes a significant emotional, physical and financial toll. With nearly half of all caregivers over the age 50, many are vulnerable to a decline in their own health, they say. Studies show that coordinated support services can reduce caregiver depression, anxiety and stress.

To ease that stress, Thomas Corea turned to Community Access Unlimited, first for direct support services while TJ was in school, then for respite services when he turned 21. Monique St. Claire is the family's support counselor, providing the family with 6.5 hours of respite support one day each week. St. Claire takes TJ on short trips, such as to outside events.

"TJ's mother and father need a break because he takes a lot to handle," St. Claire said. "I'm getting him out of the house and giving his parents respite...He gets frustrated when he doesn't get what he wants. But I can reason with him and then he says with a sweet voice, 'Okay.' It's very endearing."

St. Claire's support became even more important when Covid-19 hit the United States and all TJ's other supports stopped. St. Claire is back to visiting weekly.

"He lost all his routine," Thomas Corea said. "He lost his sense of day and night. He needs constant attention...Now that he has it back, he's back to normal."

CAU plays a major support role for thousands of family caregivers and has not abated its services during Covid. Yet the agency is facing



drastic increases in expenses related to the pandemic and is asking for help.

"CAU is working hard to keep our members and staff safe during the pandemic and we continue to incur significant expenses, such as personal protection equipment," said Bernadette Griswold. "We are asking people to consider becoming a monthly donor – 100 percent of their donations will support ongoing safety measures and program expenses as we continue to support individuals and families with special needs in New Jersey."

MAKING MAGICAL MEMORIES AT CAMP FATIMA

Like most nonprofit organizations, Camp Fatima of New Jersey is experiencing major challenges due to COVID-19. Founded in 1968 by four Seton Hall seminary students, the camp offers free sleep-away programs for disabled children and adults. And it's determined to continue doing so. Seeing the smiles on the faces of those it serves, and providing a respite to their families, is not something that can be sacrificed due to a pandemic.

And smile they do. It's not called FATIMAGIC for nothing. The campers, regardless of their disabilities, get to do things that most able-bodied children and adults take for granted. They splash around in pools, sing songs, eat s'mores, dance, and take part in arts and crafts. Every child has his or her own dedicated counselor to ensure the utmost care, so each activity can be individually tailored according to the camper's ability.

Its mission statement, "Camp Fatima provides free, life enriching camp experiences for children and adults with developmental disabilities," says it all. Some of the campers are in wheelchairs, while others have neurological, sensory or other serious issues. Camp Fatima and its volunteers open their hearts to all who come. It truly is a magical place.

The volunteers come from diverse ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds. Most have experience working directly with the disabled, and include teachers, nurses, police officers,



firefighters, college students and other professionals. For these selfless individuals, the sounds of laughter and the looks of pure joy on the campers' faces are all the payment they need.

Many of these volunteers live locally. Billy Malone, a Scotch Plains firefighter and Fanwood resident, became a volunteer in 1994 and has been the chairperson for the past 13 years. Scotch Plains resident and former Scotch Plains police officer, Jamie Denman, has been a volunteer since 1979, and is the current director.

Even though no one at the camp is paid, all this magic requires funding. It costs several hundred thousand dollars to operate the two children's summer sessions and the four adult weekends each year. Funding to support and host the more than 200 campers and over 450 on site-volunteers comes from generous benefactors, corporate matching gifts, private giving, and fundraising. Because of COVID-19, many of the usual fundraisers are not able to take place. So this year, Camp Fatima is looking for individuals to sponsor a camper. The cost to feed, house, and supply materials to each camper is more than \$1,000.
