VIRTUAL ENRICHMENT AT WESTFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

Recently, members of the Westfield High School Spanish Club gathered to learn how to make flan, a sweet baked custard dessert, and to prepare a tortilla española or Spanish omelet. Not able to meet in person, club members and WHS Spanish teacher Rose Calimano arranged virtual cooking classes.

and WHS Spanish teacher Rose Calimano arranged virtual cooking classes. "The 2020-2021 Spanish Club officers have been going above and beyond to come up with creative and meaningful experiences to keep members involved and engaged during this time of virtual-only meetings," says Calimano about virtual club activities which included viewing and discussing a family film from Spain and creating a Kahoot game based on Spanish culture.

Students, teachers, and club advisors, like Calimano, are finding virtual ways to weave the curriculum into enrichment opportunities. On February 3, WHS social studies teachers Kimberly Leegan and Steven Cohn took their Humanities class on a virtual field trip to the Montclair Culinary Academy. Set up in their kitchens at home, each student followed along as Chef Karen Fischer provided step-by-step instructions in how to prepare combread.

"We chose this enrichment activity in conjunction with our study of Harper Lee's 'To Kill a Mockingbird," says Leegan. "Specifically, we learned about food cooked in the Deep South during the Great Depression."

Leegan says the virtual field trip corresponded with a current class unit on culture and identify.

"Exploring the history of what type of food was available, how and why items were prepared, and whether certain food was more likely to be available to certain groups can provide students with a deeper appreciation of this time period and how issues of economic inequity impact every aspect of society, including what we eat," Leegan adds.

Stephen



worked with Westfield High School students this past October in celebration of Red Ribbon Week and he is excited to return to Westfield to work with our parents this spring.

"It was a powerful experience speaking to over 1,700 Westfield High School students virtually, and I am thankful to the Westfield High School administration and Westfield Municipal Alliance for allowing me to do so. I truly appreciate all of the students that reached out to me personally and thanked me for speaking. I am hoping I can come speak in-person next school year," shared Stephen.

On the evening of October 28, Stephen spoke to over 1,700 WHS students virtually about his struggles with addiction and how he found wellness during Red Ribbon Week. Stephen also did a Q&A session with the WHS Dream Team following his large group presentation. The feedback in the following days was overwhelmingly positive. Those who got to hear Stephen's story expressed gratitude for his honesty and transparency. The Municipal Alliance, AAKF, and MTT Memorial Fund also received several parent emails from those who didn't get to attend asking if there would be another opportunity to hear Stephen's story.

Stephen will be returning virtually to share a new evening of learning with our community on

March 10 specifically designed for parents. As in October, Stephen will share his story again, however this time, the program will also include a 30 minute live Q&A session with Stephen and Stephen's father, Kevin Hill, to address any questions parents have after hearing Stephen's story.

Kristen Sonnek-Schmelz of the MTT Memorial Fund stresses how important these programs are to our community and hopes as many will join as possible. "Michele and I both lost our brothers to opioid overdoses, Albert Kayal and Matthew Toriello. The gut-wrenching scream I let out the morning I received that phone call will forever live inside my head. It's our hope to save other families from similar pain by building awareness through addiction education and prevention programs, and letting families know it's ok to talk about addiction. People naturally want to help others, but they can only do so, if they know how. By bringing programs such as Stephen's to Westfield, we hope to encourage an open conversation about substance abuse in our community. "

COURSE ON DEALING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS

The NAMI Family-to-Family Education Course will be offered by the Union County Chapter of NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness). The course will be online via Zoom starting on Thursday evening, March 4 at 7 p.m., and meet each Thursday over a consecutive 8week period. We ask that you be able to commit to the full series of dates through April 29, and be able to attend from a computer, tablet, or smartphone and attend with some sense of privacy.

The course is offered specifically to the parents, siblings, spouses, teenage and adult children, and significant others of individuals with severe and persistent mental illness. The program is not appropriate for individuals who, themselves, suffer from one of the major mental disorders. The course is taught by NAMI members who have completed intensive training.

Curriculum topics include: schizophrenia, bipolar disorder (manic depression), clinical depression, panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder etc., the clinical treatment of these illnesses and how caregivers can learn to cope more effectively. Attendees will learn about new research, medications, skills needed to successfully communicate with a relative and how to deal with critical periods.

FAMILY CAREGIVERS WEATHERING COVID-19

Having reached a dead end in his career, Thomas Corea decided to become a stay-home dad when his son, TJ, was 18 months old. Not long after that, he and his wife, Carol, discovered TJ was on the autistic spectrum. Thomas Corea has been the family caregiver for his son, now 26, ever since.

While Thomas Corea is a very positive person - he is a musician by trade - he often found it daunting to deal with the system that is in place to provide people with disabilities and their families the supports they need.

"Unless you stand on a mountain and scream, you get nothing," he said. "You try to keep your head above water and their head above water to keep them safe."

According to estimates from the National Alliance for Caregiving, 65.7 million Americans serve as family caregivers for an ill relative or a relative with a disability. Per the Administration for Community Living, research indicates family caregiving takes a significant emotional, physical and financial toll. With nearly half of all caregivers over the age 50, many are vulnerable to a decline in their own health, they say. Studies show that coordinated support services can reduce caregiver depression, anxiety and stress.

To ease that stress, Thomas Corea turned to Community Access Unlimited, first for direct support services while TJ was in school, then for respite services when he turned 21. Monique St. Claire is the family's support counselor, providing the family with 6.5 hours of respite support one day each week. St. Claire takes TJ on short trips, such as to outside events.

"TJ's mother and father need a break because he takes a lot to handle," St. Claire said. "I'm getting him out of the house and giving his parents respite...He gets frustrated when he doesn't get what he wants. But I can reason with him and then he says with a sweet voice, 'Okay.' It's very endearing."

St. Claire's support became even more important when Covid-19 hit the United States and all TJ's other supports stopped. St. Claire is back to visiting weekly.

"He lost all his routine," Thomas Corea said. "He lost his sense of day and night. He needs constant attention...Now that he has it back, he's back to normal."

CAU plays a major support role for thousands of family caregivers and has not abated its services during Covid. Yet the agency is facing drastic increases in expenses related to the pandemic and is asking for help.

"CAU is working hard to keep our members

TOWN OF WESTFIELD ANNOUNCES CURBSIDE RECYCLING CHANGES FOR 2021

The Town of Westfield has contracted with Grand Sanitation Services to provide curbside recycling pickup in 2021. While service will remain on a biweekly basis, residents are advised that the collection zones and schedules have changed.

WHAT'S CHANGING

• Service Provider: Grand Sanitation will begin curbside service in 2021. Their customer service number is 908-222-1566, and their email is

westfieldrecycles@grandsanitation.com.

Collection Zones: Grand Sanitation will utilize ten collection zones in Town. Residents should refer to the map in the upcoming mailer to determine their correct zone. An online version of the map provides the ability to zoom in for a detailed view of street locations.

Collection Schedule: Assigned collection days may differ from previous years for some households. Residents are encouraged to view the updated schedule to avoid missing a pickup. Curbside collection begins in Zone 1 on January 4.

WHAT'S NOT CHANGING

Acceptable Materials and Guidelines: There are no changes to what can be placed curbside.

Biweekly Collection: Although collection days have changed for some households, service will remain on a biweekly basis.

Residents are also reminded of the recycling opportunities available at the Conservation Center. The following items can be dropped off free of charge, with no permit required:

- Curbside recycling items
- Fluorescent light bulbs
- Household alkaline batteries
- Plastic bags
- Styrofoam
- Scrap metal
- Household electronics
- Clothing/shoesChristmas trees

Other free drop-off programs at the Center are offered as availability permits, with updated information posted at westfieldnj.gov/ conservation. These include tennis balls, wine corks, plastic toys, and food waste. In addition, fee-based options are available for mattresses and bulk waste. The Conservation Center will begin its seasonal hours on January 2 from 9:00 – 3:00 each Saturday in January.
