ALJ 2021 WINTER ATHLETIC AWARDS



KUMPF STUDENTS ACCEPTED INTO UNION COUNTY ARTS PROGRAM

Thirteen students from Carl H. Kumpf Middle School were admitted into the Arts High Grades 6-8 - 2020-21 program in Union County. The program is designed for students who are gifted in the literary, performing and visual arts.

According to the website, "Arts High is a special release-time program for gifted and talented students, grades 6-12. Students interested in joining the program must audition to participate. It is administered by the Arts & Education Center which has been operating the program in Middlesex County since 1980. The program was expanded to include Monmouth County in 2004 and Union county in 2019. Due to COVID-19, the 2020-21 program will consist of live, interactive virtual classes and be open to students throughout the entire state. Those accepted into the program will receive classes in the literary, performing and visual arts, taught by distinguished teaching artists. The classes are taught at an advanced level, and provide a rigorous curriculum for developing artistic skills and creative expression in the art form of the student's choice. Arts High classes are held from

February to May, with each student scheduled to attend one afternoon per week for a twelve week term in grades 6 through 8."

RUTGERS SCIENCE EXPLORER BUS GOES VIRTUAL

Each year, seventh grade students from Carl H. Kumpf Middle School have the opportunity to participate in a real-life STEM activity in cooperation with Rutgers University. The "Science Bus" usually comes to the Kumpf School each spring and students participate in a hands-on activity with graduate student fellows from Rutgers University. This year with the COVID-19 restrictions, the bus could not visit the school.

However, Rutgers University RSE Senior Program Coordinator, Dr. Patricia Irizarry and Program Assistant, Emmanuel Serrano-Perez, were able to create a virtual learning STEM activity for the middle school students. The activity was presented to the students by the graduate student fellows through a "Zoom" link during their individual class periods. Both remote and in-person students were able to participate in the program.

Kumpf Science teachers, Danielle Bihuniak and Ann Marie Lambertti coordinated the Zoom sessions with the Rutgers Fellows and the Kumpf students. The program presented focused on Stem Cellular Explorations and Genetics. The students were able to see how the information they have learned in class can be applied to real life scenarios and how cells work together in our

bodies. Students were able to ask questions to the Rutgers graduate students in real time. The classes also were given a follow-up board game on the main concepts of the day's lesson to help reinforce what they learned.

According to Mr. Rick Delmonaco, the principal of Kumpf School, "Each year, the Kumpf students look forward to the Rutgers Science Bus visit. We were so grateful that Professor Irizarry and Mr. Serrano-Perez were able to adapt and come up with such a worthwhile experience for our students."





Mrs. Bernadette Jacobi's Anatomy & Physiology classes at Arthur L. Johnson High School recently participated in a re-articulation challenge activity, where the students had to construct a full skeleton from a pile of bones in the middle of the table. Each team had a full size articulated skeleton to use as a guide. The students used what they have learned about the anatomy of the human skeleton to build their skeleton. The teams delegated specific parts of the skeletons to each team member, so every student had an important job to do.

The winners of the contest were evaluated based upon the accuracy of the positioning of the bones as well as how much time it took each team to construct their skeleton. Each winning team member was awarded extra credit points on their next assessment.

According to Jacobi, "This activity was a fun and refreshing way to exhibit the skills and the knowledge the students have gained regarding the human skeleton, while fostering a healthy competitive atmosphere in the classroom."

Rehearsals took place virtually over zoom through the last few months. Students sang in cars, in their bedrooms, in their basements, etc. All recording was done remotely and then edited together.


"This production had its own challenges, including the music direction. The students did a fabulous job of rising above those challenges, and sound fantastic," said musical director, Pacella.

CLARK'S JACKIE RODRIGUEZ SWORN IN AS CASA VOL FOR FOSTER YOUTH

Nine community members ranging from age 22 to 63 make up the newest class of volunteer child advocates for CASA of Union County, the only nonprofit advocating for the best interests of Union County youth removed from home due to abuse or neglect, and placed in foster care. Among them is Jackie Rodriguez of Clark.

Said Rodriguez, "I wanted to become a CASA volunteer because I wanted to do something that was going to be rewarding but also impact someone else. I worked with kids for a long time many years ago and I miss that. When I heard about CASA and did my research, I felt this was the way to go. I want to be a voice to children who need it and hopefully make a positive change in their lives."

Superior Court Judge Marc R. Brown presided over the recent swearing-in ceremony via Zoom; each advocate will now be matched to a foster youth or sibling set and begin putting their 30 for doing this." hours of training into practice. This class includes both non-parents and parents, and such backgrounds as teaching, freelance, law and homemaking. In addition to Rodriguez, class members are Jacqui Lenner and Nicole Sandstedt of Westfield, Laurie Litterio of Cranford, Rebecca Muston and Amy Saunders of Summit, Sue Pangis of Berkeley Heights, Tamara Parraga-Sez of Newark, and Lydia Pernia of Linden.

Prior to administering the oath, the judge shared, "I find the value of CASA volunteers immeasurable. ... CASA is so significant; I always make a point of hearing from the CASA volunteer during the hearing." Acknowledging that COVID-19 requires the swearing-in and court hearings remain virtual for now, he added, "I so look forward to being able to shake your hand and congratulate you. The assistance you will provide is, again, immeasurable. Thank you

Currently, the organization serves just over 80 percent of all Union County foster youth in care. With a goal to provide an advocate for every youth that needs one, the organization has remained steadfast – despite the pandemic – in efforts to ensure its work continues. To that end, a fully online training and recruiting infrastructure was put into place, and protocols implemented to ensure advocates remained both connected to their youth and able to report to judges, and staff continued recruiting and training volunteers to help meet the need for youth still awaiting an advocate.

Executive Director Mariel S. Hufnagel said, "In the face of the challenging life circumstances we are all facing due to the COVID-19 global health pandemic, this tremendous group of women still made a decision to give of their time and energy, and train virtually to become advocates. I am so proud to welcome them to the CASA family and can't wait to see all of the ways in which they positively impact the youth to whom they will be assigned."

Upon being court-ordered to a case, the CASA volunteer has access to the youth as well as foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers in order to identify concerns and unmet needs, and protect best interests. RETIRED OFFICERS REMEMBERING THE PAST, BUILDING THE FUTURE

On Sunday, March 14, 2021, Retired Clark Police Officers gathered to say goodbye to their previous workplace, the soon to be demolished Clark Police Headquarters.

Twenty-three of the retired members met at headquarters to reminisce about the times spent working together on the Clark Police Department.

The retired officers were all happy to see each other again, especially two of the most senior retired members, Lt. Raymond Gulbin, who retired in 1996, and Sgt.George Sikora, who retired in 1991.

Whenever the senior members come together, especially those who were working at the time, William "Billy" Waterson's name is always mentioned. William lost his life, almost 50 years ago, while on duty on July 4,1971 by gunfire at the old Howard Johnsons in Clark, which is currently the Clark Shop Rite. The monument placed to commemorate his memory is currently being relocated while the new Police Headquarters is under construction.

For many of the officers, entering the old building was the first time since their retirement. After a brief photo session, the members walked through the hallowed halls of the building. While walking through the empty building, the officers pointed out the offices that they had worked in, the old jail cells, communication desks, and the antiquated equipment that was used at that time. They all joked about how technology has changed police work since then, and laughed

about how the old police cars didn't even have an AM radio. Now they are equipped with computers. They spoke about the recent passing of Sgt. Arthur Wesley, retired in 1989, and Detective Michael Kutch, who retired in 1987, along with other retired members whom have also passed and were there in spirit.

Some of the members that attended drove for more than an hour, some less than two minutes to say their final goodbye to the building that served all of us, and the community as well. They were then invited to take a look at the new

facility, which as you can imagine, is very impressive. The new building will be of great service to the current Clark Police Department and the well-deserved officers along with the Clark community.

So many memories were shared, lives that we saved, arrests that were made, some happy days and some sad - working birthdays, holidays, weekends, and shifts away from family. To these officers, this was more than just a building- it was a place where many lasting friendships were made.

PEER MEDIATION AT VALLEY ROAD SCHOOL

Students in grades three through five at Valley Road School recently had the opportunity to be trained in conflict resolution and peer mediation. Sarah Badillo, school counselor and program facilitator, is offering the program as a way to teach skills that can be utilized throughout elementary school and into adulthood.

Olivia Catarino, a fifth grade peer mediator stated, "I loved learning ways to keep friends glued together and learning ways to resolve conflicts are skills that I can use forever."

According to Badillo, this program consists of students working with their peers to manage conflicts and disagreements. Peer Mediators help uncover the root causes of disputes. They help create an atmosphere where both students feel comfortable expressing themselves and working toward a fair resolution to the conflict. Students spend twelve sessions learning various aspects of the mediation process and then put all their lessons into practice.

Gianna Gracia, fifth grader, commented that peer mediation is a valuable tool because it teaches you to resolve problems with words and not with violence.

Through these lessons, third grader Lila Stebbins, stated "We learned we could work

together even if we didn't know each other."

Through their training, students are taught not to judge the individuals but help individuals reach an agreement. "I could not be prouder of those who completed the process of becoming a mediator. They did this on their own time, virtually and even though they are completely trained they still come back to practice the skills they developed," stated Badillo.
