(FPCC) is preparing for its free eight-week seminar, "Journey to Wholeness - Healing the Grieving Heart", taking place every Sunday from April 11 to May 30 from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. Everyone across the United States who has experienced loss of any kind, in the past or present, are welcome to attend, as well as those who have previously attended this seminar. This unique seminar will take place via Zoom. Registration is required to attend this event. Call Patti Williams, seminar founder and trained pastoral bereavement counselor, to register at 908-709-1341.

Eight sessions, each designed to lead a person through the process of grief, will help those who have suffered any type of loss better understand the process and learn ways to cope, while also practicing self-care. Patti Williams, R.N. and Certified Pastoral Bereavement Counselor, and Virginia Waters, PhD. Psychologist, have helped almost 3,000 people experience healing, find new purpose for their lives and feel joy once

Per Williams, "We are all navigating through especially challenging times due to the ravages of the pandemic, exhaustion from political conflict, depletion of our resources, the loneliness of increased isolation, and the unprecedented chaotic environment in which we currently exist. When you are also grieving a loss in the midst of all these stressors, life can become very dark and every day may seem overwhelming."

The sessions include learning about the stages

The First Presbyterian Church of Cranford of grief and understanding the tasks of the grieving process, coping strategies and tools for the journey, taking good care of ourselves, dealing with changes, decisions, loneliness, holidays, anniversaries, building a support system and more.



HIGH SCHOOL PRESENTS VIRTUAL PRODUCTION OF SHREK THE MUSICAL

The award-winning Rahway High School performing arts program is proud to present a truly unique production of Shrek the Musical: Theatre for Young Audiences (TYA).


Liveness and theatre go hand-in-hand. But, with the recent shift to online learning, there is an opportunity for performances to have an unlimited reach and find a new audience. This new audience is of the digital world, craving new stories and ways to connect with them. The pandemic has given theatre makers challenges that beg the following question: how can we make art together, but apart?


On the heels of their fall drama, A Christmas Carol: a Radio Play by Philip Grecian, the Rahway High School theatre department is crafting ingenious ways to create theatre with students, with an added awareness of health and safety and new technology and media. "Technology is just as much the content as the libretto of Shrek the Musical TYA," says director-choreographer Mrs. Jensyn Oertel-Modero, or Mrs. Mo, as the students call her. The creative team and students auditioned and rehearsed 100% virtually using Google Meet and Zoom.

Then came the filming. Twenty green screens were purchased and sent home with each student as well as an at-home kit, complete with each cast member's costumes, props, and makeup. "The whole process is very student-centered because they must take center stage in their own learning," adds Mrs. Mo. Small groups of students report to school to film using a socially-distant three-camera setup with some of the newest recording and broadcasting technology to allow the students to record scenes together—while very much apart. Filming wrapped before spring break and will be edited during the month of April. Mrs. Mo and Mr. VanWyk, the musical director, are extremely proud of the tenacity and work ethic of all students involved in this unique and exciting production.

Shrek the Musical won a Tony Award for costume design and was nominated for eight others, including Best Musical. It is based on the popular movie franchise and children's book of the same name about a green ogre who, in the face of a world that he feels has rejected him, abandons his secluded forest home to rescue a princess and reclaim his home - and along the way discovers friendship, love, and the confidence to be who he is.

The performances will be streamed on Friday, April 23, at 7 p.m. and Saturday, April 24, at 2 p.m. Purchase a ticket at wearerahwayarts.org and let your "Freak Flag" fly!



RAHWAY BOARD OF EDUCATION VOWS TO PROTECT ITS CHILDREN

Their actions spoke louder than any words could. Classrooms were empty, frustrated students and parents were soldiering through the challenges of virtual learning, and school districts throughout the state were affecting plans to return to in person learning as soon as possible in a variety of formats. Rahway's Board of Education however, along with the district's Superintendent of Schools, boldly chose a different path. They listened to the science...and to their hearts.

Since March 13, 2020, return to school dates were visited, revisited, and continually revised with one consideration remaining paramount: what's best for the health of the children, their families, the community, the teachers, the administration, the staff and for all the people their lives, in turn, would ultimately touch. On Tuesday, January 12, the Board approved a resolution to once again extend virtual learning, now until March.

Board President Brittany Hale explains, "We did not want any of our students or staff to risk exposing themselves or their families to COVID-19." Vice-President Lori Kennedy firmly concurs. "The safety and health of our students and staff were always the most important factor in our decisions to extend virtual learning."

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Patricia Camp, applying her analytical training as a scientist to educational issues, notes, "This has truly been a bizarre year! As educators, we all want our students back in school every day, all day. The students need us and we need them. But we must remember that before the students can learn they must be healthy and feel safe. I and the district's Reopen Committee firmly believe that consistent education is important too - and so we have


hesitated to open for in person teaching until we homes." can be assured that once the students are in school, they can stay in school."

Yet what is their response to those who would quote figures that indicate children are safer in the classroom, that statistics show that there have been very low infection rates in school, and that the educational benefits far outweigh the risk? Board member Ray Lopez offers, "While it may be true that children are at minimal risk, there are so many other factors we must take into consideration. Families in our diverse community are constructed in many different ways. When polling these families, it was clear to the Board that the health and safety of everyone, including our teachers and staff, had to be our primary concern." President Hale avers, "We have to consider our children's health and safety and those they live with, not to mention our staff. We

Response to the caring reflected in Board decisions to extend virtual learning have not gone unappreciated by administration, teachers, and community parents as well. High School math teacher Jenna Scaletti notes, "I am so very thankful to our Board for continually extending the opening date of school. By doing this the lives of both Rahway students and teachers are not put at risk. What other district would do that? My students are still safely learning and I am grateful that our Board values everyone's health as their priority." Mr. Victor Motino, parent of RHS senior Victor 'Jr.', shares, "By keeping our kids safe, they are keeping us safe."

By all accounts it is apparent that, thanks to the academic and community health influenced decisions of Rahway's Board of Education and Superintendent, nothing will stop the music of education from playing on.

EARTH DAY RAHWAY RIVER CLEAN-UP — SAT., APRIL 24

All volunteers are invited to celebrate Earth Day 2021 with Boy Scout Troop 330 and members of the Rahway River Watershed Association in a clean-up of the Rahway River on Saturday, April 24th (with a rain date of Sunday, April 25th). The clean-up will focus on areas upstream and downstream of the Bloodgoods Pond Dam at Winfield Park, New Jersey. Please plan to stop by the parking area adjacent to the waterfall of the Rahway River by the dam at Winfield Park, NJ at 8:45 a.m. to register, pick up bags, gloves, bottled water and snacks, and receive safety information. Folks should feel free to travel to any part of the river where they would like to perform cleanup activities but we specifically will ask folks to work in small groups for safety purposes with folks socially distanced and wearing masks. The team working registration will provide suggestions on areas with large volumes of floatable debris.

Cleaning up a river and park area is a great way to celebrate Earth Day and if you haven't participated in an event like this before, you will find it invigorating, and you will feel good about what you have accomplished...it is also fun and educational...especially for scouts and young adults as they always find something interesting.

The clean-up will generally be between 9 a.m. - 12 noon, but any amount of time or effort that always a large volume of floatable debris to pick up. 



THREE FROM RAHWAY GRADUATE THE TRINITAS SCHOOL OF NURSING

One hundred and six students received their nursing diplomas from the Trinitas School of Nursing on January 21st, including Rahway residents Samy Pigne, Justin Appenzeller, and Kristen Perrine.

"Trinitas School of Nursing is a National League for Nursing Center of Excellence in Nursing Education for the fourth time," said Dr. Roseminda Santee, Dean of the Trinitas School of Nursing, which is affiliated with Union County College, and also awards Associates in Science Degrees to the graduates. "I have data to show that the enrollment and applications to the School of Nursing have increased. And during


the pandemic, it did not falter. It continued Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN), increasing. You would think that people would no longer be interested. Instead, they go forward. We are very proud of our class of January 2021, and our faculty and staff, for doing this professional work during a very challenging situation and practicing all precautions including screening, social distancing, handwashing, and masking."

Trinitas School of Nursing, operated jointly by Trinitas Regional Medical Center and Union County College, currently holds accreditation from the Accreditation

and the New Jersey State Board of Nursing. The National League for Nursing has awarded the School of Nursing a fourth designation as a Center of Excellence in Nursing Education status for the years 2015 - 2024 for Creating Environments that Enhance Student Learning and Professional Development. The School also holds a 20-year, 40-class national licensing examination (NCLEX) passage rate of 86.30% on first writing.



THE 17 YEAR CICADAS

This spring one of the most incredible insect cicadas fill the air. Luckily for us they settle down phenomena will occur in our area; the emergence of the 17 year cicada.

As the soil warms up one foot underground, the cicada larva (immature insects) will release themselves from the tree roots that have been their source of nourishment for the last 17 years and begin their climb to the surface, creating little mounds of soil as they dig upward. There they will wait until the time is perfect. Then one spring day when the soil temperature reaches sixty-four degrees, millions of cicadas across our region will leave the ground and climb nearby trees. Once securely latched onto the tree the larvae will enter a period of metamorphosis soon to emerge as a transformed adult cicada.

Metamorphosis is a process in which an insect transforms from its larvae form into an adult often looking much different from the larvae. One good example is a caterpillar changing into an adult butterfly. In the case of the cicada the most notable change will be its clear wings.

As you walk though parks and fields you will see the 1/2" holes the cicadas have prepared, patiently waiting underground for the correct evening to begin this timeless ritual. Temperature plays a key part in this timing.

Once full-grown adults, the masses of insects will feed on tree sap, clumsily getting used to flight, as they bang into each other and humans. This of course is very annoying to people. Animals including dogs and cats feast on the abundance of this prey and can gorge themselves until they get sick. It is important to keep a good eye on your pets at this stage. Thankfully cicadas are not toxic.

Rapidly the cicadas become good flyers and buzz around searching for mates. Noise to some and music to others, the whirring sound of

in the evening and are not active at night. Within six or seven weeks the process will reach its climax.

Female cicadas will find a branch often high in a tree to lay her eggs. There they chew a hole in the branch and deposit their eggs. Nymphs are the second stage of the cicada's life cycle which are: eggs, nymphs, larvae and adults. There, the nymphs will grow until they are ready for the next major step. The young nymphs will fall to the ground at the base of the tree and dig down to attach to a root where it will live for seventeen years, waiting to start the process all over again.

Later in the summer, brown tree branches show evidence where this feeding has happened. This is a form of natural pruning and doesn't harm mature trees. Young trees however can benefit from a protective covering. Cover small young trees with a protective cloth in June to guard them from the egg laying females. This will not be a major problem for mature trees which can survive a 'natural pruning'.

The life cycle of the 17 year cicada is an incredible survival story. Appearing all at once in the millions is assurance that no predator would be able to get them all.

The sudden appearance of so many cicadas led early Americans to confuse them with the Biblical 'locust'. Actually, true locust of the Bible are swarms of grasshoppers, not cicadas. The locust devoured fields of wheat and grain while cicadas survive on tree sap. This mistake remains common today as cicadas are often referred to as "17 year locust".

This seemingly fool proof life style technique of the cicada has now come across an unpredictable problem. As millions of trees are removed from the environment by humans for development, vast areas of cicada habitat are disappearing. Along with the cicada, millions of other animals and birds are losing their habitat to mankind.

CELEBRATING 10 YEARS WITH HEART TRANSPLANT

Emma Rothman of Cranford, NJ will be graduating this spring from Syracuse University with a degree in Food Studies. Like most college graduates, she has mixed emotions about taking the next step in her life's journey.

"I am definitely a bit terrified, but I am excited about the variety of opportunities that lie ahead," said Emma.

This is a remarkable time for Emma as she is also celebrating the 10th anniversary of her life-



saving heart transplant (April 1). She is humble home. and always thankful for her donor who gave her the gift of life and made her achievements possible.

"Everything after my heart transplant was working towards moments like this," said Emma. "It motivates me to appreciate the day to day – being able to travel, go away to school, and have life experiences without my health dictating what I can and cannot do is a blessing. I owe all of this to my organ donor's act of extraordinary humanity."

In March 2011, Emma was 12-years-old when she suddenly began to feel extremely fatigued and could not make it through an entire day at school. Her parents brought her to Newark Beth Israel Medical Center (NBIMC) for what was supposed to be a quick, routine blood test. However, Emma went into cardiac arrest, was put on life-support under an induced coma and was rushed to the pediatric cardiac intensive care unit at New York-Presbyterian/Morgan Stanley Children's Hospital.

Emma, who showed no prior symptoms, was somehow battling end-stage heart failure brought on by hypertrophic cardiomyopathy. On April 1, 2011, Emma, underwent a successful emergency heart transplant, which saved her life. Just 15 days later, Emma was discharged, taking with her new knowledge about what a heart transplant is and how she could best care for her new heart at www.NJSharingNetwork.org.

"The last thing I remember was feeling uncomfortable while the nurses were attempting to draw blood at the hospital thinking I might have had mono or a virus," said Emma. "I woke up six days later and learned that I had a heart transplant. Prior to that, I had never heard of organ and tissue donation or transplantation."

In 2013, Emma and her family, guided by their firsthand experience, established Hearts for Emma, a 501 (c)3 organization that provides assistance to families of children with heart disease, and supports educational initiatives related to heart transplantation and promotes awareness of organ and tissue donation. As part of a joint outreach effort, Hearts for Emma established a Partner Fund within the NJ Sharing Network Foundation that has raised more than \$50,000 since its inception. The Hearts for Emma Partner Fund has helped educate more than 100,000 students in New Jersey about organ and tissue donation and transplantation through the production and distribution of education materials and related programs, and provides scholarships to high school seniors who are advocates of or personally impacted by the mission.

RAHWAY JOINS UNION CAUSE AT START OF CIVIL WAR

PART I RESPONDING TO THE CALL TO ARMS

The assault on Fort Sumter took place 160 years ago on April 12, 1861, marking the beginning of four long years of terrible strife for our relatively new nation. When word reached the cities and towns in both North and South, it was met with the premature excitement that greets too many wars. Politicians rose to the occasion and gave patriotic speeches, shopkeepers closed their doors as if for a holiday, and young men rushed to organize and enlist "before the war was over."

The young men of Rahway couldn't wait to get into the action and after President Lincoln's call to arms on May 4, 1861 for 75,000 United States volunteers, the War Department directed New Jersey to form three infantry regiments. A local man, James Bodwell, was the first to sign up. New Jersey's initial volunteer infantries, which included seventy-two men from Rahway, were mustered into the Union Army on May 21. A year later, thirty-two more would join and by the close of the war 535 men from the city, almost one-tenth of Rahway's population, would participate in the deadly conflict.

Prior to Lincoln's May 4th call, one group of Rahway men had secured a brass Napoleon cannon and were intent on forming an artillery unit. They sought out an experienced leader and approached John R. Chapin, who had been a captain of an artillery battery in Newark, to guide them in their efforts. Chapin accepted their appeal and went to the Irving Street carriage factory owned by Isaac Osborn to ask him if the boys could meet and store their equipment in the basement of his warehouse. Osborn consented and a meeting was set for the end of the week.

Almost seventy-five young men between the ages of sixteen and twenty-two arrived at Osborn's and although the boys wanted to hurry off to the front, Chapin explained that a period of training was essential. Newspaper accounts recorded that "The boys were drilled in their marchings and facings and the residents of Rahway witnessed squads of ununiformed boys

who raised the dust in the streets at night, and to whom it seemed very much like playing soldiers." It would be almost a month and a half before equipment arrived and the delay caused many of the young soldiers to lose interest. To them, there didn't seem to be much fun in marching through the streets without uniforms or weapons.

While the monotonous and unglamorous drilling proceeded, Chapin applied to Trenton offering the unit and their cannon to the war effort. The state officials, however, turned down their request because New Jersey at that time was not enlisting the services of cavalry or artillery units. (The state would raise additional regiments throughout the war and would eventually accept cavalry and artillery units). The disappointment felt after receiving this news was quickly alleviated when a dispatch arrived from New York asking them to join ranks with the Ninth Regiment of that state. The offer was accepted, and Company K of the Ninth New York State Militia was formed under the command of

Lieutenant Walter M. Bramhall, a well-respected figure in the city.


Six days before the newly designated company's departure, school children conducted a flag-raising ceremony at the Second Ward schoolhouse on Union Street. A large American flag, prepared by teachers and students, was raised on the school's flagstaff. Following speeches given by prominent ministers, all joined in singing patriotic songs.

On Sunday, June 9, 1861, Company K, now composed of thirty-nine men, marched to the First Baptist Church located on Milton Avenue opposite Fulton Street. Every seat in the church was occupied and those who couldn't get in listened at the door. Reverend William Rollinson delivered an eloquent sermon (Luke VIII:5 "For He Loveth Our Nation") and closed by advising the boys to be wary of the demoralizing influences of camp life.

When the sermon was completed, the company marched up Milton Avenue to Fourth Street (Esterbrook Avenue) and came to attention at the home of Commander Chapin. He presented a speech in which he told the boys of the sadness of battle, the honor of serving, and the righteousness of the cause. He also warned them to mind their conduct and to beware of liquor and profanities. He then presented Bibles, which had been donated by a lady of the city, to each soldier to "carry and peruse." Chapin then turned the company over to Lieutenant Bramhall.

Company K left Rahway on Thursday, June 13 on the 11:20 train. Members of volunteer fire companies and a great many flag-waving citizens escorted the soldiers to the station. Each had been furnished with a knapsack, a haversack, a canteen, woolen and water-proof blankets, belts, and a mess kit. The Daughters of Liberty had supplied havelocks, undershirts, and drawers. Leaving peace, security, and youth behind, they were about to be thrust into the great abyss of war.

ADVOCATES TAKE OATH TO SERVE LOCAL FOSTER YOUTH

Nine Union County residents ranging from age 22 to 63 make up the newest class of volunteer child advocates for CASA of Union County, the only nonprofit advocating for the best interests of Union County youth removed from home due to abuse or neglect, and placed in foster care.

Superior Court Judge Marc R. Brown presided over the recent swearing-in ceremony via Zoom; advocates will now be matched to a foster youth or siblings and begin putting their 30 hours of training into practice. The class includes both non-parents and parents, and such backgrounds as teaching, freelance, law and homemaking. They are Jacqui Lenner and Nicole Sandstedt of Westfield, Laurie Litterio of Cranford, Rebecca Muston and Amy Saunders of Summit, Sue Pangis of Berkeley Heights, Tamara Parraga-Sez of Newark, Lydia Pernia of

Linden, and Jackie Rodriguez of Clark.

Prior to administering the oath, the judge shared, "I find the value of CASA volunteers immeasurable. Although I practiced family law for decades, it involved pieces related to a family, like divorce. In these cases, everything we do is attuned to the entire family and it's the most rewarding in my career. I didn't previously realize the extent of need out there - from poverty, substance use, mental health, and the guidance needed, all of it. CASA is so significant; I always make a point of hearing from the CASA volunteer during the hearing." Acknowledging that COVID-19 requires the swearing-in and court hearings remain virtual for now, he added, "I so look forward to being able to shake your hand and congratulate you. The assistance you will provide is, again, immeasurable. Thank you for doing this."

Currently, the organization serves just over 80

percent of all Union County foster youth in care. With a goal to provide an advocate for every youth that needs one, the organization has remained steadfast – despite the pandemic – in efforts to ensure its work continues. To that end, a fully online training and recruiting infrastructure was put into place, and protocols implemented to ensure advocates remained both connected to their youth and able to report to judges, and staff continued recruiting and training volunteers to help meet the need for youth still awaiting an advocate.

Upon being court-ordered to a case, CASA volunteers have access to the youth as well as foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers in order to identify concerns and unmet needs, and protect best interests.

groups, but with different offerings. ACE is CAU's answer to post-graduation learning for adults with developmental disabilities. Program choices are designed to appeal to every type of student.

This fall, CAU students participated in a financial literacy workshop series presented in partnership with Valley Bank. The program was specifically designed for members using presentation materials provided by Valley. The four-part series has concluded for ACE students and is currently being offered to students in the Pathways to Academic & Career Exploration to Success program, a college and employment prep service for high school and college-aged youth at risk. The special series is not the only collaborative educational partnership for ACE this year—the program also partnered with Kean University in November for a virtual music workshop for individuals with disabilities.

Students said they were eager to learn more about money to set goals and develop good habits.

Student Alyssa Elenis works part time at ShopRite and has set a goal to save enough money to buy a new laptop for her online classes.

"I think I spend too much money and I want to lower that," she said. "They did a great job with the class and were helpful with answering questions."

Student Jessica Sucuzhanay said she enjoys taking ACE classes to continue learning and retaining her education.

"I want to learn how to save and manage money," said Sucuzhanay, who is looking for a part-time job. "I want to know how to spend money when I go to the supermarket and how to create a budget to plan for the future."

Elenis said that she is reaping the benefits of virtual services with classes in music and theater, computers, art and media, and self-help.

"It helps a lot," she said of her self-help class. "We practice taking notes, learning about current events, and managing how we're feeling."

The financial literacy series has helped members better understand how money works, how to make smart spending decisions and what a bank can do to support and help them reach their financial goals, according to Stacy Marshall, assistant executive director of Educational Services.

"It's empowering to understand money and make knowledgeable decisions about how to spend that money," Marshall said. "They can feel more independent going out into the community and making those choices. We appreciate our partnership with Valley Bank to learn about personal finance."




