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
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
## **KIWANIS FISH**& CHIPS DINNER

#### THURS MORNING CLUB "PILLOW TALK" PROJECT

The Thursday Morning Club (TMC) is a 120+ year member of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs (NJSFWC). Every 2 years, NJSFWC member clubs adopt a charitable organization voted on by members for assistance and support. In 2019, CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) was one such organization and the TMC quickly moved to devise a plan which would benefit the CASA children who have experienced abuse and neglect due to their unacceptable and sometimes volatile home situations.

The "Pillow Talk" project included TMC members making themed pillowcases in conjunction with a service project for the students of the TMC's Before and After School Child Care

(BASCC) program in Madison's three (3) elementary schools. The students painted white pillowcases in bright colors of pictures and sayings to brighten the days and nights of the CASA children. In February, 2020 these were collected, ironed, and given to a CASA representative for delivery. The project was reported in the TMC's annual report to the NJFSWC which awarded it a first place among all New Jersey women's clubs for creativity. The State Federation has forwarded it to the General Federation of Women's Clubs (GFWC) for further consideration of a National award.

The objective of both Federations, NJSFWC and GFWC, is service which is found outwardly in the motto of the TMC: "Ich Dien", "I Serve".

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
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#### **ISABELLA HADDOCK TO DEBUT AT** TRIBECA FESTIVAL

#### **BOY SCOUTS' 3-DAY BACKPACKING TREK**

Boy Scouts from Troop 25 went on a spectacular 3-day backpacking adventure in Harriman State Park in April 2021. They hiked a total of 15 miles on difficult terrain with a total elevation gain of 3,500 ft.

Star-ranking Scout Timmy Rauschenberger said he learned a lot on the hike. His favorite part of the hike was his "arrival at camp on Saturday. It was extremely satisfying to finish a very challenging hike, and the sunset was amazing."

Scouts hiked in with everything they would need for the 3-day trek, including gear, food and water. Each backpack weighed an average of 35-40lbs. They set camp at 2 different sites along the Appalachian Trail. One site was on a cliff overlooking a pond, and the other was on top of a plateau with amazing views. It was a little rainy and foggy both nights but the elevation was so high the second night that they were above the fog and could see for miles.

The Scouts were responsible for setting up their own tent and cooking their own food. Scouts filtered their own water from a stream with pump purifiers. First-class Scout Jack Graham said he enjoyed collecting large pieces of wood for the bonfire. He said they kept the fire burning for at least 3 hours each night.

Scouts followed the BSA "Leave no Trace" policy. Anything they carried in, they carried out. Nothing was left behind. Bear bags (bags used to suspend food in a tree) were hung each evening to avoid animals from entering the campsite.

The trek was part of a training program the Troop put together in order to prepare Scouts for a high adventure camp in New Mexico this Summer, where they'll hike roughly 80 miles over the course of 11 days in the wilderness. Troop 25 has two 12-person crews that will go to Philmont, which is the Boy Scouts of America's largest National High Adventure Base. Many Scouts also fulfilled a requirement for their Backpacking merit badge.

#### Mary Cassatt: Impressionist Painter and Print Maker Monday, June 28 1:30 p.m.

Mary Cassatt was born in Pennsylvania but lived most of her adult life in France. She became acquainted with Edgar Degas, who introduced her to the Impressionist circle. Out of social necessity for an upper middle class, unmarried woman of her era, she mostly created images of the private lives of women, with particular emphasis on the intimate bonds between mothers and children. But her treatment of her subjects was confident, original, and sometimes even radical. It was very difficult for a woman to be a successful painter in 19th Century Paris, but Mary Cassatt persevered and is today remembered as one of the greatest Impressionists.
