Our team focuses on helping our veterans and first responders have a better way of life through our volunteer mobile outreach mentoring program. We believe by aggressively seeking out veterans in need and contacting them before they are in crisis, we can really have some positive results. Contacting a person in need first is a great way to build trust and make it easier to begin a friendship. People will do better when they have human contact in their lives, too many programs are automated and lack the empathy and compassion needed to help someone in crisis.

We are not afraid to tell our veterans and first responders that they are loved and we strive to give them purpose. The team immediately empowers and gives its members a new family unit to be part of again. Nearly everyone that joins the team wants to help others and make a difference in someone else's life. New Jersey Veterans Network is constantly keeping active thru our Operation Rebound Racing Team which hosts numerous hikes, runs, bike rides and all other types of physically challenging events. 
HOW YOU CAN HELP

11TH GRADER SELECTED AS NEW JERSEY GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL SCHOLAR

Westfield High School 11th grader Ashley Talwar has been accepted into the prestigious New Jersey Governor's School in the Sciences to be held July 11-31, 2021.

"As a Governor's School Scholar, you will be one of a group of outstanding high school juniors from all parts of the state who have been chosen to participate in the program," the program directors wrote in an email to Talwar.

In its 38th year, the New Jersey Governor's School in the Sciences is a 3-week program for rising high school seniors where students are immersed in intense college-level research at Drew University. Normally a residential program held on the Drew campus, the organizers announced that "the engaging and challenging curriculum, including genuine research experiences, expected for this distinguished program" will be in a virtual format this summer.

"I feel honored to be selected as a New Jersey Governor's School of Sciences scholar this summer as this remarkable experience will propel my scientific interests to greater heights and serve as a major stepping stone towards my career in the biomedical field," says Talwar. "Collaborating on a team research project, gaining a diverse family of friends and professors, and learning about neuroscience and biochemistry at the college level is a dream come true."

K-12 Supervisor of Science Thomas Paterson notes that the Governor's School is "where New Jersey's brightest teen students have the opportunity to broaden their understanding of science through coursework, laboratory investigations, and interaction with professional scientists."

"Acceptance to the New Jersey Governor's School in the Sciences is a tremendous achievement and opportunity for Ashley," adds Paterson. "The Science Department at Westfield High School is proud of Ashley and all of the hard work she has put into her education, allowing her to be part of this elite group."

Paterson also commends the teachers of Westfield "who have supported and helped guide Ashley in her studies."



FIRST GRADERS EXPLORE LIFE CYCLE OF PLANTS

As the nation celebrated Earth Day on April 22, first graders in the Westfield Public Schools are studying seeds and plants as part of a Life Sciences unit that has youngsters planting seeds and observing the germination process in the classroom before transplanting the healthy seedlings – some in school gardens.

First graders in Alison Schreier's class at Wilson School recently enjoyed transplanting wax bean, cucumber, and watermelon seedlings into newly built plant beds occupying a sunny spot in the school's new learning garden. As part of the unit, the students observe the plant's growth and change over time while noting the similarities and differences between the seedlings. As part of active investigations, they learn that plant roots take in water and nutrients, that leaves make food from sunlight, and that seeds are alive and grow into new plants.




VIJAY SREENIVASAN SELECTED AS GOVERNOR'S SCHOLAR



EARTH DAY INITIATIVES IN THE SCHOOLS

Westfield Public Schools

Whether cleaning neighborhood storm drains, tending to school gardens, or collecting gently used toys and clothing to both aid those in need and reduce landfill loads, a tradition of environmental stewardship remains constant in the Westfield Public Schools community on Earth Day and year-round.

Environmental Science students at Westfield High School (WHS) are participating in several projects, including teaming up with the Westfield Department of Public Works and the Westfield Green Team on the New Jersey "Adopt a Storm Drain" program (nj.adopt-a-drain.org). Westfield "adopt-a-drain" organizers point out that "when it rains, stormwater carries grass clippings, leaves, garbage, pesticides, fertilizers, antifreeze, paint, gasoline, motor oil, and animal waste directly into our local watersheds."

"There are 2,400 storm drains in Westfield,"

adds WHS environmental science teacher Judith McLoughlin, who asked student volunteers to familiarize themselves with the "adopt a drain" program and to follow the tips to safely clean 3 drains near their home using a broom/rake, gloves, a waste bag and other tools. "While most of the students are seniors who will be heading off to college, we hope that raising awareness of this issue may help garner support for this endeavor among other students and residents."

McLoughlin also assigned her students to

McLoughlin also assigned her students to interview a person in their 60s or 70s to gain a historical perspective of environmental issues dating back to when Earth Day was first created in April, 1970. The students will ask the same questions of people in the 16-26 age range as part of the project.

The K-12 curriculum includes units on earth systems, animal habitats, weather, pollution control, and other aspects of earth and environmental sciences. Dedicated Green Team and other student clubs raise awareness about the environment, while students and staff participate in recycling initiatives. There are water bottle refilling stations at each of the district's ten schools with electronic counters that advise how many disposable plastic bottles will not wind up in landfills through use of the re-filling station. And, across the district, students and parent volunteers have begun springtime efforts in school gardens that provide important learning opportunities.

"It is the small actions that can really make a difference," says McLoughlin.

Students who nominated Trzepla say she "is always willing to help me out and talk to me when I miss something or don't understand something in class. She is very patient and always willing to meet when anyone needs help."

The Above and Beyond Award recognizes a teacher or counselor who has made a difference in the life of a student either socially, emotionally or academically, This year's recipient is English teacher Nicole Scimone, lauded as an educator who "provides the perfect, comfortable environment to learn." One fully remote student nominator wrote that Scimone made "the biggest effort to connect to all of her students, learn their interests, and learn about how they work." "Overall, she's always going the extra mile to check up on everyone and make sure they're okay," this student said.

Science teacher Molly Dennis received the Parent-Teacher-Student Organization (PTSO) Teacher of the Year Award which annually recognizes a teacher who is encouraging and motivating, is a good role model, and shows respects for co-workers, students and parents. Dennis is applauded for being "always optimistic and happy during classes, even those that are very early in the morning." One student nominator noted that Dennis hosts review sessions before tests and "once drove to the house of every student [in her AP Biology class] to give them hot chocolate."

For helping students work towards their goals,

school counselor Andrew Buckner was honored with the Robert and Linda Foose Memorial Award, named for a former principal and teacher. "Mr. Buckner has made an amazing contribution to my high school education by helping make my dream of an independent study in herpetology a reality," said a student nominator.

"We are grateful for all of the nominations that recognize our amazing teachers and staff for all they do to promote a positive learning environment. The four teachers were selected for the impact they make in students' lives, both in and outside the classroom," says Asfendis. "I am proud to work with these phenomenal educators who are passionate, dedicated and inspiring to their students. They are all well-deserving of their respective awards."

WESTFIELD ELEMENTARY STUDENTS HEAR FROM HOLOCAUST SURVIVORS

Westfield Public Schools

As part of a Historical Fiction unit, 5th graders in Westfield Public Schools read Number the Stars by Lois Lowry, a historical fiction novel that follows a friendship between a Jewish girl and a Christian girl in Copenhagen and their journey to freedom during World War II. Recent virtual presentations on the Holocaust provided students important real life context to these classroom experiences.

Holocaust survivor Peter Fleischmann joined Tamaques Elementary School 5th graders virtually on March 26 to share his story. Fleischmann was 14 years old when his family fled Nazi-occupied Czechoslovakia in 1941.

"Six million Jews were killed in the Holocaust. That is a statistic," said Fleischmann as he showed the students a picture of his beloved aunts and uncles during his virtual presentation. "These aunts and uncles took care of me every summer. They were close to me. They made sure I was okay. [All but two] were killed in concentration camps. Their only guilt was that they were Jews. They are not statistics. They are persons who were close to me, with personalities, who took care of me. I miss them to this day."

The journey from Czechoslovakia took Fleischmann, his parents, and older brother to Germany, France, Spain, Portugal, Cuba and finally to New York City. While at the French-Spanish border, a stranger intervened to save the family from having to remain in Nazi-occupied France

"We survived because a total stranger saw something happening that he did not feel was correct and came to our assistance," said Fleischmann who explained that his father's name had appeared on a list of people who fought against the Nationalists during the Spanish Civil War. "This stranger put us up for the night and explained to the police chief that the Paul Fleischmann on the list was not my father."

This misunderstanding was cleared up and the family was able to continue their journey, said Fleischmann who works with the Holocaust Council of the Jewish Federation of Greater Metrowest New Jersey to share his experience

with students. The Tamaques 5th grade team of teachers Marisa Truselo, Victor Alfonso, Nicole Barbuto, and Lori Swanson worked with the Holocaust Council to arrange the virtual presentation.

"Every day I work with survivors to bring their stories to students like you. I hope and pray they are here to tell their stories for many, many years to come," said Ilyse Shainbrown, Director of Holocaust Education at the Holocaust Council. "You are probably the last generation to meet with a Holocaust survivor, to meet them face-to-face and hear their story. Think of somebody you will see or speak to in the next 24 hours – your parents, siblings, a friend – and please promise to tell the story of Mr. Peter Fleischmann to that person. If we each tell that story one time, we double the amount of people who hear his story."


"The lesson I would ask you to learn from my story is not necessarily the details of my story but that, in your lives, you cannot go through life with a blind eye or deaf ears," Fleischmann added. "Don't stand by and allow something to happen that shouldn't be happening. Don't do something that you shouldn't be doing. Don't be a bystander. Be an upstander."

A stranger also saved Holocaust survivor Sally Frishberg and her family. McKinley 5th graders welcomed her for a virtual presentation on March 18.

"Our 5th graders continued a tradition, albeit in a different way, by listening to and learning from Mrs. Frishberg," said McKinley principal Dr. Marc Biunno in an email to the school community. "Mrs. Frishberg joined our fifth grade classes remotely and took them through her story while she urged them to be the sorts of people who do the right things on behalf of others."

Born in Poland in 1934, Frishberg shared her experiences as a young child whose family was forced to flee their home in Poland when the Nazis invaded their village. She and her family were taken in by a Polish farmer and hidden in his attic for two years.

"He was the man who saved us," Frishberg told the students. "He was an extraordinary man

who never gave up helping us."

After the war ended, the family eventually immigrated to America. Frishberg, a former high school teacher, was awarded the Yavner Award for Excellence in Holocaust Education in 2005 and now speaks regularly to students. A mother and grandmother, she encourages her audiences to choose kindness over hate.

"These differences between us are very small. They don't matter," she said. "You reduce the value of your life when you hate."

"After traveling at night and living in an attic for two years to escape the Nazis, Mrs. Frishberg has taught us to help others through kindness," said McKinley 5th grade teacher Ann McDonough who organized the virtual program with fellow teachers Nicole Giles, William Hannis, and Joseph Paradise.

Asked about Mrs. Frishberg's presentation, 5th grader Dominick DiDario said "Hate is never the answer and growing up with that can lead to disastrous things like Hitler. It made me feel encouraged to be more thoughtful."

The McKinley 5th grade team and their students also made a virtual field trip to the Museum of Jewish Heritage in Brooklyn, New York on March 10.

The museum is "a living memorial to the Holocaust," said Gallery Educator Lisa Hunter as she shared some of the museum's artifacts virtually. "It's very important that we keep the memory alive."

Superintendent Dr. Margaret Dolan notes that these "powerful, age-appropriate presentations" enhance the district's Holocaust Education curriculum.

"We are grateful to Mrs. Frishberg, Mr. Fleischmann, and others who share their stories with our school community, reinforcing the common message that hate cannot and will not be tolerated anywhere."



TOWN ADMINISTRATOR SPEAKS TO WESTFIELD ROTARY CLUB

Westfield Township Administrator Jim Gildea spoke to the Rotary Club of Westfield via Zoom at their regular weekly meeting held on Tuesday. May 4th. Jim grew up in Westfield, and graduated from Westfield High School in 1988. His parents owned two stores in town: his dad owned Celtic Imports, Ltd., and his mom owned Juxtapose Gallery. Jim earned a BS from U. Vermont in Small Business Management, and a Master's in Public Administration from Kean University.

Westfield has a different form of Government than most towns in NJ. The Council has 9 members. There are 4 Wards which each elect 2 councilmen, plus a Mayor which is elected by a town wide election. No one on the Council is compensated, they are all volunteers. The Council makes the policy and the administrator implements it. He has 15 departments which report to him, including: Fire Dept; Police Dept; Town Clerk; Tax Collector; Court Administrator; Library; Town Engineer; and the Recreation Dept. Jim is especially fond of the Recreation

Dept. because that is where he started in town government, first as a life guard at the town pool, then spending 7 years in that department full time after college. He started as the Town Administrator in 2001. Jim also has the HR responsibilities for the Township, which include negotiating with the 6 unions or bargaining units representing the township workers.

Jim answered a number of questions, which included paving the roads. Westfield has 100 miles of roads, but only has the budget to pave about 5 miles per year. The old roads lasted about 20 years, but the newer materials which are more ecofriendly, only last 10 to 12 years, and need to be replaced more frequently. However, Jim struck a deal with the utility companies serving Westfield that if they dug up a street, they would pave the entire street, curb to curb, and the entire length. This policy saves Westfield substantial tax revenues and allows the acceleration for the paving implementation- to the point where the town is now having 20 miles of roads paved every year, instead of 5. Within a few years we

should be back up to having a high compliance of paved roads.

Jim remembers 1994 when the Rotary club purchased a big screen TV for the Recreation Department Teen Center located at the Town Hall basement. The goal was to give teens a place to go after school, rather than having them hanging around on street corners. The Rotary Club has a long history of helping the town with service projects and providing scholarships to the high school students. The club will be celebrating it's 100-year anniversary this year.

The Rotary Club members asked Jim if there is anything we can do to help the town, and he said there may be a planting coming up by Rutgers to put in a rain forest at Tamaques Park for which they may need volunteers. The Rotary Club has been actively planting trees every year in town. They planted 20 trees at Jefferson School with the help of the Rotary Early Act Club students, and 40 trees on Dudley Court. Trees are good for the environment, the leaves filter out heavy metal air pollution, they remove carbon from the air (reducing Global Warming), each tree produces enough oxygen for two people, most trees live 100 years, with oak trees living 300 years. In addition, the trees make Westfield more attractive, increasing property values.

The Rotary Club of Westfield meets the first three Tuesdays of the month at noon by Zoom. Guests are always welcome. Rotary is a coed service and business networking club. Successful business people who want to give something back to the community.
