FRIENDS OF FANWOOD LIBRARY CELEBRATE 35TH YEAR

Borough of Fanwood

The 35th anniversary of the Friends of the Fanwood Memorial Library was celebrated with a lawn event outside the library on Sunday, June 6, featuring live music, a book sale, face painting and trivia. It was a hot day, but there was enough shade and a breeze to keep things comfortable.

The Friends are the chief fundraiser for the library, which depends on both donations and taxpayer dollars for its operations.

Friends founder and president Carol Campbell and Library Director Dan Weiss were on hand, along with Mayor Colleen Mahr and County Commissioner Al Mirabella.

Mayor Colleen Mahr announced the reopening of Fanwood's public facilities closed more than 14 months ago due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I'm pleased we are able to welcome our citizens back to Borough Hall, our recreation buildings and library," she remarked. "It's timely since the state of New Jersey's health emergency has been declared over."

Since last spring, most government business has been conducted by phone, email and ZOOM. The recreation buildings at Forest Road Park and LaGrande Park were closed to avoid the spread of COVID. Fanwood Memorial Library loaned books at curbside and later offered limited browsing by appointment only.

Beginning in the fall of 2020, Borough Hall underwent an interior redesign that better uses space, creates offices for staff and reconfigures the spaces where the public may conduct business. A new service window has been established in the entry hall as a first stop for people with business or inquiries. There is also a window to pay tax and sewer bills. The construction office has its own wing. Computer/IT infrastructure has been updated as has a portion of the adjoining Police Department "The building was long in need of an upgrade to accommodate the traffic that's increased over

the decades," said Mayor Mahr. "While we're glad it's been reopened, we still urge citizens to check our website first for the information they are seeking, fanwoodnj.org. Masks will still be required to enter the building and our staff will also mask when interacting with the public."

Recreation buildings may again be booked for events. Complete rules and availability are available at fanwoodrecreation.org/rental-policy. Those renting the Forest Road Park building will be surrounded by new landscaping and paving, along with upgraded walkways, bike racks, basketball court and new pickleball court.

The library and its many programs for people of all ages are back to pre-pandemic schedules. Visitors may once again browse the stacks. There will be a 30-minute limit on computer time. Library hours will be:

- Monday 9:30 a.m. - 7:00 p.m.
- Tuesday 12:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m.
- Wednesday 9:30 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.
- Thursday 9:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.
- Friday 9:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m.

"For the time being, Borough Council meetings will continue to be held via ZOOM and Facebook streaming," said Mayor Mahr. "We are hoping to reopen the meetings for limited public attendance over the summer."



FANWOOD AND SCOTCH PLAINS LEADERS MOVE FORWARD WITH RACIAL HEALING STRATEGY

A community-wide effort to further a dialogue on combating racism has resulted in an action plan now being carried out across the Fanwood-Scotch Plains community by groups of concerned elected and community leaders. This action plan addresses ongoing concerns about bias, especially in the areas of policing and education.

This forward movement is the result of an almost year-long listening tour during 2020, culminating in a report that codifies the concerns of citizens, students and community leaders. The report, listening tour and the ongoing discussions are conducted under the Truth, Racial Healing and Transformation (TRHT) model, a national project funded by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation and others. Our local Fanwood-Scotch Plains TRHT Committee is engaged with consultants and trainers from Rutgers University-Newark in implementation of the TRHT framework.

Recent incidents of racial bias in our schools and elsewhere in the community prompted our own non-profit group, Social Justice Matters, to recommend the TRHT model.

“This important work is being done by a grassroots committee made up of our neighbors and leaders who are heavily invested in our towns,” said Fanwood Mayor Colleen Mahr.

The Committee's report focuses on these main conclusions:

- Top issues are policing and education
- Minority parents see their children facing the same challenges at school and in the community that they experienced in their youth
- Emphasize racial healing, improved consistency in delivery of a diverse curriculum and staffing in schools
- Improve communication with police
- Build improved race relations in general

Since the presentation of the Committee's report in late 2020, the following actions have been taken:

- The SPF School District is implementing anti-bias training for administrators and educators
- The Fanwood Police Department has a more diverse roster and is currently undergoing a review of its policing policies and command hierarchy
- Fanwood and Scotch Plains leadership have pledged to broaden the scope of their cultural offerings
- Subcommittees composed of members of our local TRHT Committee are currently discussing these and other topics of concern towards presenting action plans

Superintendent of SPF schools, Dr. Joan Mast said, “We need to ensure all children and families have the same benefit of our excellent school system. We’re committed to sustainable change in equity, curriculum, diversity and inclusion. This is the time for us to capitalize on this moment as a unified community.”

The Committee also learned people love this community and are willing to work to improve it. Residents of color wish to stay within the community and engage their children in activities. Connections are important – residents want to get to know their police.

Scotch Plains Mayor Joshua G. Losardo remarked, “I encourage members of both communities to contact Social Justice Matters and participate in upcoming programs. The more candid conversations we have with our neighbors of different backgrounds and experiences, the more we continue to learn from one another and create better understanding. I appreciate this important partnership with Fanwood, as we continue to proactively work together to improve racial equity.”





JOE NAGY, 98,

U.S. Army, 78th Infantry Field Artillery Battalion, retired as a Major after serving 20 more years after the war.

Joe served in Japan and, as a 2nd Lieutenant, had the sad duty of visiting the city of Hiroshima after the atomic bomb was dropped to see if it could be rehabilitated. During that October 1945 assignment, he found a small saki jug in a pile of rubble which he still has today. Joe has been married to Claire for 72 years. They have three children, three grandchildren and two great grandchildren. Joe has been Fanwood's unofficial historian and served on the board of the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Scholarship Foundation and has been involved in many other volunteer pursuits.

DANTE MARIANI, 97


U.S. Army, Private First Class, 67th Signal Battalion





COUNCIL RECOGNIZES POLICE OFFICERS FOR EXTRAORDINARY SERVICE

Borough of Fanwood

Mayor Colleen Mahr, the Borough Council Public Safety Committee and Capt. José Vendas, Officer in Charge of the Fanwood Police Department, presented awards for extraordinary service on May 17, 2021, to more than a dozen officers. The Mayor and Borough Council recognized them during the regular Council meeting, held via ZOOM, in observance of National Police Week. The presentations occurred before the meeting outside Borough Hall.

The officers were cited for their actions during a variety of emergencies including an

aggravated assault in a Fanwood home that resulted in the quick arrest of the suspect and timely medical aid to the victim, a drug overdose, a child struck by a car and trapped under it, the helicopter evacuation of a resident with a traumatic injury following a fall, the capture of a burglary suspect, giving life-saving CPR and AED treatment to a fall victim who stopped breathing and outstanding service to the public during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The officers honored are: Off. Elliot Bernard, Off. Kathy Case, Det. Sgt. Nicholas Falcicchio (Union Co. Prosecutor's Office), Lt. Marc Gottlick (retired), Off. Carlos Gonzalez, Sgt.






