Rotary meetings are at 8:00 a.m. each Thursday via Zoom and are open to the public. For July 2021, the line-up of guest speakers for Rotary meetings includes:

#### JULY 15: DR. ROZELLA CLYDE, LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS

Dr. Rozella G. Clyde is an educator and an environmental activist. She taught middle and high school Social Studies and created Law Studies Programs in several NYC public schools over a 44 year period before retiring in 2012 and moving to New Jersey. Dr. Clyde currently serves as the Educational Director for Clydeoscope Educational Consultants, is a Commissioner on the Chatham Borough Environmental Commission and chair of the Borough's Green Team. Dr. Clyde also serves as Education co-chair for the League of Women Voters of New Jersey, and as Membership and Education Directors for the Morristown Area Local LWV, and is active in a range of other civic organizations. Dr. Clyde and her husband Jim live in Chatham Borough.

Dr. Clyde will address the overall mission of the League of Women Voters (LWV) and in particular will touch on how the LWV supports the election process to promote a well-informed public and to help assure fair and open elections.

#### **JULY 22: DON BAILEY, BRISTLECONE PARTNERS**

### GOOD GRIEF 5K RUN & WALK RAISES \$160,000 FOR GRIEVING FAMILIES

### **WALK-A-THON BY 60 MADISON HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS A SUCCESS**

Interact Club program benefits girls of the Maasai Village Ngong'Narok in Kenya

Submitted by John Hogan During the Madison High School (MHS) Day of Service on Friday, May 28, sixty students from MHS, under the leadership of the Madison Rotary sponsored MHS Interact Club, walked a 6-mile route through Madison. The Interact Club sought to raise awareness of their project to create an international bridge from high school students in Madison to high school girls from the rural Maasai village of Ngong'Narok in Kenya.

After a visit to this village ten years ago, Rotary members Paul and Avery Mantell created a foundation, the Maasai Girls Fund (maasaigirlsfund.org). They were deeply moved when learning that, at that time, girls as young as eight were genitally cut and "sold" as child brides to older men in exchange for cows and goats – to lead a life of ignorance, servitude and often pain. Through the Mantell's efforts, the village chief agreed to allow the Mantells to fund some girls' education and stop cutting. Girls from the village lucky enough to get a sponsor could look forward to attending boarding high school and a life making their own choices. Cost of a full year of high school – including tuition, room & board, uniforms, and books – is only \$600.

Students wore lanyards with pictures of some of the girls from the village whose high school education was sponsored through the Fund. The Interact Club raised \$600 on their own, received donations from students attending the walk, and seeks to raise the full additional \$600 from the Madison community to allow funding for one girl for two years of high school. They plan to follow this girl's progress through written and video communication and share the story with other students.

### **MORRIS COUNTY MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVANCE 2021**

Commissioners presented their Distinguished Military Service Medals to six veterans on Wes., May 26, at the Morris County Annual Memorial Day Observance ceremony on the Morris County Courthouse lawn in Morristown, where honors also were delivered by state legislators and Congressional representatives.

Morris County recognizes resident veterans by presenting them with the Distinguished Military Service Medal, which are unique to the county and have been awarded since 2000 to veterans or their family members to honor their service to our country. More than 10,000 have been presented.

Among this year's honorees were Amabel Scharff Roberts - an American nurse serving in France during World War I.

Born in Madison, Morris County, on Sept. 16, 1891, she grew up there and attended what was then-called Vassar College, graduating with honors with the Class of 1913. She won an academic prize to attend a summer course at the National Biological Laboratories in Woods Hole, Massachusetts.

Her experience there may have influenced her decision to enter the School of Nursing at the Presbyterian Hospital of New York, now Columbia University. She undertook the work during peacetime, and it was an unusual choice for a child of privilege because nursing was considered menial labor.

Miss Roberts graduated with honors with the Class of 1916, and thanks to her extensive training, she retained a supervisory position at Columbia University Hospital, where she was working when the United States declared war on Germany in April 1917.



She volunteered to be an American Red Cross nurse wartime for service. explaining in a letter she wrote that she "would not have been contented to be a slacker." In mid-May 1917, six weeks after the United States declared war on

The Morris County Board of County Germany, she sailed for France with other to die and the first American Army nurse to die volunteer nurses to care for the British and French soldiers already embroiled in the war.

> While enroute, she and other nurses were enlisted into the U.S. Army and she was stationed at Presbyterian Hospital Base Number 2 on the Normandy Coastline in Étretat, France.

> A glimpse into the character of this selfless woman was offered in one of the many letters Nurse Roberts sent home.

> "I don't think we can do enough for them, these men who have left everything....I am more thankful every day that I took up nursing, even though my bit is so very small indeed," she wrote.

> Sadly, on January 17, 1918, Nurse Roberts died of blood poisoning, contracted while she tended the injured soldiers.

She was only 26 years old.

Miss Roberts was the first citizen of Madison

in that "War to End All Wars."

In France, she was the subject of a huge military funeral, and when her body was returned to Madison, the outpouring was the same as family and friends buried her in Hillside Cemetery.

A memorial tree was planted in her honor at James Park in Madison, along with a World War I Eagle Monument that bears her name. Other plaques in Madison and elsewhere continue to honor her.

In 1937, The American Legion Post 3662 was chartered as the Amabel S. Roberts Post – the first to be named after a woman.
