### **GEAR FOR SCOUTS COURTESY OF SUMMIT FOUNDATION GRANT**

In 2020, Summit's Boy Scout Troop 67 was honored to receive a grant in the amount of \$2,426 from The Summit Foundation to cover the purchase of new camping equipment. While the equipment has not yet been used on an overnight campout (due to COVID-related restrictions on unit camping), the Scouts were able to test it all out and get themselves organized for an anticipated return to unit camping during summer 2021.

Purchases funded by The Summit Foundation grant included 8 tents, 2 cooking stoves, and 4 sets of cookware. In order to ensure that the Scout program remains accessible to all who are interested, Troop 67 maintains a gear closet at St. Teresa's Church, which charters the Troop. For prospective or new Scouts, having the proper equipment for backpacking and/or camping can be an obstacle for participation. Proper equipment such as tents, backpacks, sleeping bags, and cooking stoves are not only necessary to make a trek enjoyable, but also safe. These are high-cost items and many boys likely do not have them when they first join or may not be able to afford them. Troop 67 maintains an inventory of these critical items so that all boys are able to participate. However, these items are frequently used and need to be replaced periodically to

ensure proper functionality.

One of the goals of the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) is to help boys develop into strong, principled young men. The boys learn leadership, team building, outdoor skills, life skills, such as first aid, and the value and benefit of community service. These experiences and skills are developed through regular weekly meetings and monthly treks (day and overnight backpacking and camping) that the boys undertake with trained, uniformed adult leadership. In 2020 and in the first half of 2021, the trek program has been modified to include only day hikes and activities such as horseback riding and climbing, etc. Community Service activities, such as the annual food collection for St. Teresa's food pantry, brown bag sandwich assembly for SHIP, and toiletry/food collection for Bonds of Courage were able to be executed as planned with Covid-specific safety modifications. Troop treks in recent years have included a bicycle tour of Gettysburg, ice climbing in the Shawangunk Mountains, river rafting, and many more adventures.

The Summit Foundation has been active in the local community for more than 50 years, and has granted support to the Troop 67 scouts many times over the years. In the past 10 years alone, the Summit Foundation has invested \$8.6 million dollars in philanthropic support to the local community via grants, scholarships, and donor-advised distributions. Other 2020 grants from The Summit Foundation support local programming such as Sage Eldercare's Meals on Wheels Program, the Sustain Summit program supporting downtown small businesses impacted by the pandemic, and a lengthy list of other community-based organizations in the local area.

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### MEALS ON WHEELS DELIVERS MORE THAN A MEAL

SAGE Eldercare's Meals on Wheels volunteer, Lorelei Burns describes herself as "lousy at relaxing." A resident of Summit for 33 years, Burns has volunteered since 2015. What inspires this high energy woman to deliver meals two days each week year after year? Simple, she said, it's the meaningful relationships she has with her clients and the SAGE staff.

A former ATT executive, who appreciates competence and structure, Burns says she feels at home with the Meals on Wheels team. "I like organizations that are successful, well managed, and get things done."

She also praised SAGE for their timely response to the pandemic. "They didn't close their doors. They didn't stop doing business. The rules and procedures they put in place to keep the operation running were most impressive."

The most challenging part of being a volunteer, she said, are the losses. Whether it is saying farewell to an elderly client who has died or delivering food to a client who has lost their

spouse, it's difficult. A widow herself, Burns can empathize with these people and share their feelings of loss. Yet, even with the sadness, she said, the visits are positive and so necessary as many of the meal recipients have no other daily visitors other than their volunteer. While the food is vital "It is the visit that counts," she explains.

The passion Burns has for her giving and helping extends beyond Meals on Wheels. She is active at the Newark Museum, North Star Academy and has a shop at Covenant House, which provides clothes to homeless children.

Referring to SAGE, she said with modesty, "I am nothing more than a volunteer; I have no desire to be retired." For her, SAGE represents "friends, food and home." The relationship she has with the nonprofit is mutually beneficial, she said. "This is my home."

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### AMANDA O'DOWD SWORN IN AS ADVOCATE FOR FOSTER YOUTH

#### CASA of Union County

The most recent class of community members seven volunteers representing six municipalities including Amanda O'Dowd of Summit-have completed 30 hours of training to become advocates for CASA of Union County, the only nonprofit advocating for the best interests of abused, neglected or abandoned youth removed from home and placed in foster care through no fault of their own.

Next, the new advocates will be matched to a foster youth or sibling set and, once legally assigned to their case by court order, can make arrangements to meet their assigned youth and begin their casework. This class ranges in age from 34 to 63 and includes both parents and nonparents, and those employed as well as retired. Experience includes teaching, law enforcement and homemaking.

Executive Director Mariel S. Hufnagel noted, "It's such a wonderful moment when these dedicated individuals, who have made the decision to become Court Appointed Special Advocates, face the judge as they did today, as the culmination of weeks of intensive training. Being a CASA volunteer is a tremendous commitment, and as these individuals raised their hand and took their oaths, the pride and joy was palpable."

Terry Gould, Advocate Liaison on the Board of Trustees, added, "I have volunteered my entire life and found my CASA work most rewarding because, although my CASA youth has aged out of the system, our friendship will be forever. It brings me great pleasure to see him beat the odds. He is a survivor. These new advocates are ready to hit the ground running and I am beyond excited for them and the adventure ahead!"

Since 2005, CASA of Union County has served more than 900 local foster youth and trained more than 600 advocates. With courtordered access to the youth, foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists, teachers and others in order, advocates identify concerns and unmet needs, and ensure best interests are protected.

On May 18 and 19, the Scholarship Committee of Summit College Club (SCC) visited six houses, each one the home of a local high school scholarship winner, in order to award the SCC 2021 scholarships. This year Summit College Club, a branch of AAUW, awarded a total of \$24,000.

This was the second year that the dangers of COVID forbade holding a reception that would gather all the winners indoors. This was the second year also that the Scholarship Committee, which runs the program, undertook the in-person,

on-site delivery of the awards. At each house, the young woman in question emerged from her home, some with one parent, some with two, some with a sibling. There were even a few family dogs in on the fun.

Outside each home, the presenter delivered a short talk about Summit College Club, the particular scholarship being awarded, and some of the reasons why that particular girl had been chosen. Each girl received a bouquet of flowers, a certificate, and a check for \$4,000.

The sunny, breezy weather could not have been better. The smiles-on the part of the winners, their families, and the Scholarship Committee—could not have been wider. Over and over, it was a joyful occasion.

Several members of the Scholarship Committee noted that this year's winners seemed exceptionally accomplished. Hedy Tukey, president of Summit College Club, said that the organization has given out scholarships in nearly every year of its 101-year history; "indeed, the Tilla Thomas award is named for the woman who founded the club in 1920 and who started the tradition of awarding scholarships just a few years later."

### **LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS ANNOUNCES CITIZENSHIP AWARD WINNERS**

The League of Women Voters of Berkeley Heights, New Providence and Summit is pleased to announce the winners of its annual Citizenship Award to High School Juniors. A junior from each high school is selected based on an essay addressing the topic: "How do you Promote Good Citizenship in your School and Outside Activities?"

The award recipient from Governor Livingston High School in Berkeley Heights is Alyssa Pradhan, whose experiences facing racial prejudice prompted her to action at the local and state level.

Here is an excerpt from her essay:

"As an Asian American female, navigating a dominantly white high school made me reflect on who I really was. In Spring 2020, some friends and I founded the Understanding Asian Cultures (UAC) Club and I became Co-President. We have weekly meetings that focus on celebrating Asian cultures by presenting holidays and traditions and addressing societal issues that the AAPI community faces, especially in light of racially motivated hate crimes. As Co-President of UAC, I feel most proud during our meetings, as students of all backgrounds voluntarily attend during their lunch break to learn more about Asian cultures. This summer, the UAC Executive Officers will lead a virtual Summer Reading Circle for elementary school students across the Berkeley Heights School District on books representing Asian culture. I hope our presence will influence young leaders of the next generation to further





our efforts for unity and inclusivity."

From New Providence High School, Grace Coimparetto won the award. She aspires to a career in medicine.

Here is an excerpt from her essay:

"No one is born a good citizen. Rather, they are raised and molded into strong-willed and trusted members of society. Wealth, gender, ethnicity or age play no factor in determining the character of a person. For me, being configured into a respected citizen of your community means to be dedicated to bettering the lives of others. In my life I see this idea playing out in my dream job as a healthcare professional. Through clubs such as 'Future Medical Professionals', participating in Rutgers Medical classes in my high school and an internship in medicine and healthcare at American University this summer I hope to use my motivation and knowledge to bring more people to this field. Citizenship is a fundamental principle in building a working community with a strong moral code."

Summit High School's winner is Victoria MacArthur, who is active in student council and believes being a positive role model is key to good citizenship. Here is an excerpt from her essay:

"Good citizenship means to actively create a supportive, safe environment instead of only being a bystander. I believe good citizenship is about integrating yourself into your community as a positive role model.

"I participate in the Student Council at Summit High School which allows me to fund raise, both for the school and for various charities, and use my leadership skills to navigate through peer discussions about how to implement change for the better of our school community. I also participate in the Unified Physical Education program where I work with students with special needs.

"Outside my school community, I show good citizenship by assisting my neighbors. For example, an elderly man lives next to me and I often walk his dog or shovel snow in his driveway since these are difficult tasks for him to complete alone.

"No matter how big or small a community is, showing good citizenship can go a long way. Whether it's being a member of leadership at the high school or taking time to talk to a neighbor, small acts create a ripple effect."

### **SUMMIT POLICE INVESTIGATION LEADS TO ARREST IN FLORIDA**

Following a one-year long investigation by the Summit Police Department, Bradley Fisher, 24, of Hudson Florida has been charged with transmission of material harmful to minors, a third degree felony in the state of Florida under statute 847.0138.

Summit police detectives delivered crucial evidentiary material to allow the Pasco County Sherriff's Department Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Unit to continue the investigation and ultimately arrest Fisher for the exchange of explicit sexual messages with a juvenile female, age 12, from Summit, NJ.

The suspect allegedly solicited pornographic images from the victim and shared sexuallyexplicit photos of his person on the Discord Department, go to cityofsummit.org/police.

"A thorough investigation by police detectives ensured the apprehension of the suspect," Chief Bartolotti said. "Communication is essential in protecting young people from online exploitation and the immediate contacting of police by the victim and her family led to a successful outcome. Online predators pose a security risk for children and teens, and it is extremely important for parents to speak openly with their children about online activity."

These criminal charges are mere accusations. Every defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty in a court of law.
