When given the award, Athena said, "I promise I will keep being kind." She inquired if she earned the award because she was deaf, and was pleased to learn that the award was solely based on her kindness.

This was strenuous on her eyes, but instead of complaining, she encouraged her peers to endure the challenges of being deaf students. Athena was also involved in a concert band and played percussion for three years. She'll attend Bergen Community College in the fall.



3 SKILL SETS STUDENTS NEED TO THRIVE THIS FALL

LearningRx (www.LearningRx.com), the largest one-on-one brain training company, is sharing tips to help students ease the transition from summer to school. The tips highlight three key skill sets that students need to thrive in any setting.

This fall will be a return to in-person learning for many students across the country in nearly 18 months. In addition to the standard learning loss that typically occurs when formal education stops during the summer, this past year and a half was compounded because of school closures, disruptions, and new challenges with online learning. • SKILL SET #2: TIME MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATION

Summer often means late nights and sleeping in, making the transition to early morning starts particularly stressful. Start by gradually adopting a sleep schedule to best prepare your student for an earlier wake-up.



Like time management, organization often serves as a reflection of learning success. As one might imagine, a well-rested teen with strong note-taking skills, clearly labeled binders, and a detailed homework schedule will likely perform better than a sleep-deprived teen who struggles to stay on top of tasks. Invest in the tools your student needs to keep academics organized like colored markers, binders, notebooks, highlighter pens, a calendar, and a whiteboard. Designate a quiet space in your living quarters - whether it's a desk, fold-up, or dining room table - to establish a learning environment without distraction.

• SKILL SET #3: COGNITIVE SKILLS

Also known as "brain skills," cognitive skills are the underlying tools that enable kids to focus successfully, think, prioritize, plan, understand, visualize, remember, and solve problems. Those skills include auditory processing, visual processing, short and long-term memory, comprehension, logic, reasoning, and attention skills. If one of these skills isn't as strong as the others, it can affect the brain's ability to perform efficiently. Just imagine a bright student whose attention skills make it difficult to focus on the teacher's instruction. They might miss taking critical information while taking notes, a homework assignment, or project details. Imagine if every cognitive skill were strong, including their attention skill, they would thrive in school and perform at their highest potential.

The offense was propelled by Jackson "Drago" Crimaldi and Michael Basile as they each hit 3 home runs and drove in 25 RBI with Michael leading the team with 15 and Jackson with 9. Speedy Reid Bazydlo led the team with an impressive team high 17 stolen bases and hit .500 for the tourney. Owen Keough and Addison Adornato also stole

a combined 16 bases and hit .400 for the tournament, while also playing stellar defense. As a team, the Green Machine hit and amazing .427 for the tournament.

In the semi-final game against Summit, Mountainside got off to a slow start, making a few errors and found themselves in a hole, 4-0 after 3 innings. In the bottom of the 3rd innings, Owen Keough, Tyler Kanarek and Ryan Lamera took control of the offense with 3 doubles off the fence to get the offense going. Mateo Liloia and Reid Bazydlo pitched against Summit and gave up 0 earned runs as they each threw 3 innings each. Mountainside then poured on 10 runs in the inning and never looked back. Lamera and Kanarek hit .333 for the tourney and scored 10 runs and played solid defense in the outfield. Michael Donahue, Tyce Hanratty, and Jack Samuelson all had multiple hits and provided solid defense when called upon throughout the

tournament.

Along with averaging over 11 runs a game, pitching, catching, and defense were the keys to victory. Michael Basile was the anchor for this team behind the plate, framing strikes, blocking balls when needed, and threw out 6 base runners. The pitching was led by Matthew Filiaci, Reid Bazvdlo and Mateo Liloia. They pitched a combined 25 innings without giving up a run. CASA NAMES ANUJA BHAMARE ITS JULY SPOTLIGHT VOLUNTEER

Berkeley Heights resident Anuja Bhamare's advocacy journey began just one day after her husband shared an article from a local newspaper. As the desire to do more meaningful volunteer work inhabited Anuja's selfless spirit, the piece about a local organization providing residents with the opportunity to advocate for abused, neglected and abandoned children hit the spot.

"I found the whole process very systematic and methodical," says Anuja. She completed her 30 hours of training and, two years ago next month, she was sworn in by a Union County judge. That August she was assigned to her first case, that of a nine-year-old girl. Today, Anuja continues to navigate the case and admits, "It has given me a new perspective on a lot of things." Among them? The now-deep understanding that being part of a stable household can so easily be taken for granted.

While in the advocacy trenches, volunteers often realize the rewards come both big and small, and an exchange or experience that may

last mere seconds can gratify one's heart for a United States to complete her Master's Degree lifetime. Anuja says she cherishes her time spent walking and playing at the park, as do her youth. If Mother Nature isn't on board with a park visit, they will read or draw. She says that among her most gratifying moments is being asked by her foster youth if they can stay longer at the park the next time around. "It feels good to have a connection with a child who has seen so much inconsistency, instability and change in their short life." It's especially during those times, she adds, "I do feel the necessity of such a role."

The information technology professional is a project/program management consultant at New York-based Marsh McLennan with a full professional plate, and with two young children - a two-year-old and seven-year-old - Anuja admits that adequately performing the advocate role takes planning, but she's committed. "It is difficult at times, but ... I prioritize my things to do every day and that helps me manage everything I want to do."

Originally from India, Anuja came to the



and she and her husband, children and the family cat all call Berkeley Heights home. In her downtime Anuja likes to garden, and the family reaps the rewards as fresh veggies abound in her backyard. She likes to keep active through a good walk or hike, and also practices meditative yoga. As for her hiking companion, Anuja is all ears ... to her audiobook, that is. When not inside chapters in the mystery genre, she also enjoys listening to Indian yogi and author Sadhguru, who started the Isha Foundation, a nonprofit spiritual organization at which Anuja also volunteers. She holds close one particular sentiment from Sadhguru: "If you choose, you can be joyful in this moment. You just have to make this choice."

Her weekend mornings are considerably nostalgic as Anuja tries to recreate her father's homemade omelets. Another childhood favorite that she shares with her family is khichadi, a classic Indian dinner dish with rice and lentils. Having grown up in a very family-oriented culture, she says it's difficult to choose just one person who has inspired her. In addition to her parents, notes Anuja, an elder cousin and uncle, both with a loving heart and a lending hand, each hold a special place in her heart.

"It's very satisfying to know I am doing whatever little I can to improve a child's life," says Anuja. "I think it's the responsibility of all of us to look beyond our own homes and families, and I ask everyone to give it a little thought, and then some time."

Surely the values she remembers her cousin and uncle for are embedded in perpetuity right within Anuja's own selfless spirit.
