RESCUE SQUAD GETS HAPPY UPDATE OF BABY BORN IN AMBULANCE 23 YEARS AGO

Among the treasured moments for Fanwood Rescue Squad members is the privilege of assisting with the birth of a baby. In 1998 there were two ambulance births within two months. Born in July was Haley Knudsen, whose family moved away some years later. Then in September, Lisa Kline couldn't wait for parents Sue and Stuart Kline to get to the hospital.

Over the years, the Klines, who still live in Fanwood, have kept in touch with the squad. And during the July 4th fireworks in Scotch Plains this year, Mrs. Kline showed Captain Ian Lewis a photo of Lisa today, 23 years later, on her graduation from Rutgers University where she graduated this spring with a Bachelor's degree in accounting.

The story of Lisa's birth is one mom won't ever forget. Strong contractions had caught Mrs. Kline home alone on September 15th. 1998 and forced her to call 911.

"I actually had to crawl to the phone and then all I could say was, 'I'm having a baby!" she later told the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Times.

It was about 11 a.m. when squad members Bob Kruthers, Steve Siegal, Ruth Wegmann and Bill Crosby arrived. Stuart Kline, a Borough Councilman at the time, returned home just in time to see his wife being loaded into the ambulance. But there wasn't even time for the rig to pull away from the home. With two pushes, Lisa Kline was born in the parked ambulance.

"It was just amazing," said Mr. Kline of his daughter's birth at the time.

"We've helped with several other childbirths over the years," remarked Capt. Lewis. "It's one of those moments you might never see in an entire EMS career. But when you do, it's unforgettable. We wish Lisa all the best and a bright future as a college graduate."

Lisa is already working as a senior accountant at Prevention Links in Roselle.

RESCUE SQUAD ADVICE FOR RESIDENTS

No one ever knows when an emergency will arise or what form it will take. It can be a natural disaster, such as a hurricane, or man-made, such as a house fire.

So, what can you do to prepare yourself and your family for these unexpected events? The first is to have an emergency plan of action in place. For example, where would you go if you needed to leave your home? Do you have family and friends you could stay with? Could you afford a hotel? What about your pets? What would you do with them?

Trying to find solutions to these issues while dealing with anxiety and fear will often increase feelings of helplessness, so think it through beforehand and put it in writing. This way, you'll have a definitive plan to follow.

Also, be sure to have what you need on hand in case you have to make a fast exit. Most emergency responders have what's called a 'go bag.' Each and every member of your family should have one as well. A go bag can be a backpack, a tote bag, or any soft durable waterproof case that you can carry. And be mindful of what you pack - you don't want it to

be too heavy.

Every go bag will be a little different depending on the needs of each person, but here are some critical items to include: change of clothes, maps and a list of important phone numbers (in case your phone doesn't work or you can't recharge it), bottled water, high-protein bars, cash, basic first aid kit, battery-powered or hand-crank radio, flashlight, and batteries. At the time of departure, add your cell phone, cell phone charger, medications/prescriptions (for humans and pets), and other non-perishable food, if possible.

The trunk of your car is also a great place to stash emergency supplies. Besides the obvious spare tire and jack, keep bottled water, blankets, flares, an extra set of clothes, maps, and nonperishable high-protein snacks. If you have a solar-powered charger, throw that in there as well. In colder months, include blankets, hats, socks, scarves, and gloves.

It doesn't take long to get these items together, so do it now. You may never need to put your emergency plan into effect, but if you do, you'll be ready to go.





Dimiana Ibrahim, an Elizabeth resident, followed her dream of becoming a doctor to Princeton University to join the Class of 2025. What helped make the decision to study medicine were her experiences as a volunteer and a Medical Explorer at Trinitas.

As a high school sophomore, she entered the Teen Volunteer program, run by Lisa Liss, Director of Volunteer Services at Trinitas. "I wanted to be further exposed to the hospital setting to see if medicine was really the right path for me," Dimiana says. "Volunteering on the maternity floor allowed me to observe the ins and outs of how a hospital floor works. Helping different varieties of patients exposed me to how different and equally important each patient's story is. I was exposed to real-world hardships, celebrations, and stories that I would've never been able to see otherwise. It taught me the great importance of patience and compassion in the field, which is something you really have to feel and not just read about in a book."


Then Dimiana joined the Medical Explorers Club, for those interested in healthcare, nutrition, physical therapy, and nursing, among other careers. "Although short-lived due to COVID, it was an overall really fun and educational experience for my friends and me. I learned a lot about different specialties in the hospital, like anesthesia and dialysis. It showed me how truly excited I felt learning about medicine. It helped me realize that this is the excitement I aspire to have my entire life when it comes to my chosen field. These experiences, along with many others, helped me achieve the self-reflection and discovery needed to not only find my career path, but to recognize how I intend to get there. Attending Princeton University will be one of my first of many steps towards becoming a physician."

Liss, who also oversees Nurse Camp for high school students and the Collegiate Medical Mentor program for college students, says, "I'm always thrilled to hear about students taking their experiences at Trinitas and running with them. Dimiana was a shining example of how enriching these programs can be for students who may either be on the fence about healthcare as a profession and figure out that they definitely want it, or know for sure they want to study medicine at some level and can't wait until college to get started. Dimiana took advantage of what we have to offer and we hope to see her in our Collegiate Medical mentor program as she excels at Princeton."

CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR ADULTS WITH DISABILITIES

Community Access Unlimited

There is no such thing as "one size fits all" when it comes to education. For adults with developmental disabilities who are looking to continue their academics and job skills training, Community Access Unlimited offers an alternative to traditional day programs.

The new Academy of Continuing Education (ACE) location opened in July in Roselle and offers a variety of options to appeal to every type of student, including recent graduates and older adults. The current hybrid schedule includes virtual and in-person groups this summer so members may choose the option that is right for them.

ACE is reopening after providing virtual services through the pandemic; the new Roselle location offers plenty of space for social distancing, group learning and activities.

"We're very excited and the members are very excited," said Stacy Marshall, assistant executive

director of educational services. "You can't Olympics. replace what it's like to be face-to-face in a shared space with other people. For some, it's going to be like a cloud is lifted."

Student Dianna Simms, 30, has attended ACE since 2014 and took virtual courses in math, reading, music, and visual and digital art.

"I wanted more education," said Simms, who said she likes to encourage others to continue their education on social media.

Simms has a vision impairment and said she appreciates that teachers have worked with her to compensate for that, such as setting her up with a screen reader to enlarge worksheets.

Although she was able to continue her education at home virtually, "I would rather see my friends and my teachers in person," Simms added.

ACE courses include topics in reading, math, science, music, art, computers, self-help and more. The academy promotes learning through hands-on activities, and students gain skills that can be applied in developing career interests. ACE is a NJ Division of Developmental Disabilities-qualified program offered by Community Access Unlimited (CAU). CAU is a Union County-based, statewide nonprofit that works to integrate people with disabilities and youth at risk into the general community through comprehensive supports.

The academy is flexible to allow students to pursue as many courses as they choose and balance their studies with outside activities such as employment or athletics. Many members are employed, and many engage in community programs such as theater or the Special

Marshall stressed that individuals with disabilities and families need to start learning about their post-graduation options as early as possible to start planning for a successful future. A new NJ law extending eligibility for the state's special education program due to the pandemic is a step in the right direction.

"I think in New Jersey attention to special education has been lacking for some time," Marshall said. "In some ways [the pandemic] deepened that divide and in some ways it increased visibility. I think it's now on folks' radars that we can and should do better."


