Get your kids back on track!

10 TIPS TO HELP YOUR STUDENT WITH HOMEWORK AND STUDYING

The 2020-2021 school year might be the most diverse yet in terms of how kids and teens will be learning. Whether you're doing online classes, homeschooling, in-person learning or some hybrid mix, we've got some tips to help your student with homework and studying.

- **1.** Encourage your study to keep a planner with assignments, quizzes and tests, as well as long-term project deadlines. As a general rule, aim to complete work 3-5 day in advance so they'll have extra time if something unexpected goes wrong (like a power outage).
- **2.** Rather than cramming for a test the night before, encourage your student to study daily in small chunks of time; 15-20 minutes should be plenty if it's done regularly.
- **3.** Index cards or flash cards can help with vocabulary or math formulas. Use different colors to help your brain make connections by association for each fact.
- **4.** Don't allow your student to stay up all night to study. You're better off encouraging them to get a full night's sleep and then studying a bit more in the morning.
- **5.** Focus on nutrition, including a mix of protein and carbs with every snack or meal. The brain needs fuel to work

- properly and sugar, caffeine and saturated fats can hinder learning and memory.
- **6.** If you're not strong enough in a particular subject to help older students, consider pairing up with another parent who is or ask for extra help from teachers during scheduled online office hours.
- **7.** Remove all distractions during school-related sessions, including homework. This includes TVs, laptops and cell phones. Some students perform fine (or better!) with music, while others need complete silence.
- **8.** Set smaller goals for students to help them create a sense of achievement. As a general rule, the younger the child, the smaller the goal should be.
- **9.** Celebrate milestones. Finishing a book or project, wrapping up a semester or completing a particularly difficult chapter in a book may feel like an insurmountable task to some students. Mark the occasion with accolades!
- **10.** Review your student's homework nightly. Rushing through homework in order to watch a movie or get to soccer practice doesn't indicate learning or comprehension; their focus should be on understanding the material-not just completing it.



STORMWATER MANAGEMENT NEVER LOOKED SO GOOD:

Columbia Park Gathering Place Project is Elegant, Functional, and A Giant Sponge

What is elegant, leafy, sports a gorgeous architectural design, prevents flooding by putting stormwater back into the ground, and provides tennis players, pickleball players, and all others who pass by with a great place to take a break or just relax? The Columbia Park Gathering Place Project in Lower Columbia Park, of course.

The finished project, a stormwater management project, consists of a brick retaining wall that doubles as a seating area, has a deck that's home to 2 picnic tables, hosts 8 native shrubs in a planting bed, and is adjacent to two new, swamp-friendly trees. Not only do the shrubs assist in capturing stormwater, but the trees serve as large sponges of sorts, given that their roots slurp up stormwater runoff and absorb groundwater. The project will capture stormwater runoff, flooding from the creek that flows into the Passaic River and provide visitors with a beautifully landscaped facility near the bike/walking trail, children's playground, and other park amenities.

"This project aims to both educate the public about stormwater management while demonstrating that sustainable design can be both functional and stunningly beautiful," said Berkeley Heights Environmental Commission (BHEC) Co-Chair Kim Diamond. simplicity of the structure is quite an amazing bia-Park-Gathering-Place-Project.

achievement for all that it does from a sustainability, aesthetic, and practical use perspective. Come check it out!"

In addition to serving park visitors, the project is envisioned as serving as an "outdoor classroom" for science teachers and students from Columbia Middle School, located adjacent to the park. With the project's two picnic tables in addition to the planting bed seating area, the ample seating will provide teachers with an "outdoor classroom," similar to the outdoor classroom adjacent to the parking lot at Governor Livingston High School.

The project, a collaboration between the BHEC and the Berkeley Heights Recreation Department, was made possible in part by a 2020 Association of New Jersey Environmental Commissions (ANJEC) Open Space Stewardship Grant. Local landscaper Joe Franchino jlfranchino@comcast.net of JLFranchino played a critical role in the Project's initial stages of development, while the Berkeley Heights Department of Public Works (DPW) provided additional assistance to bring the project to completion.



SCOUTS CONTINUE TO SERVE COMMUNITY THROUGH PANDEMIC

Despite a rough year of partial remote Fall leaf cleanup. schooling and navigating their way back to a more "normal" life, Berkeley Heights Boy Scout Troop 368 continued to do what they do best serve their community and make an impact, all while further developing their own skills and connecting with their fellow scouts and scout leaders.

"They continued to develop leadership skills at meetings and camping trips, to work on advancement and merit badges, and to find ways to volunteer within the community. Covid 19 definitely did not stop these boys from growing, connecting, and serving our community...we even had 5 Scouts complete their Eagle project this past year!"

> Troop activities included a camping trip to Camp Minsi in the Poconos where they went fishing and canoeing, a bike riding outing where the scouts fished and then got a tour of the Untied Brewing company, learning how they make root beer. And in March, the Troop went rappelling at Allamuchy Mountain State Park.

> In June the Troop attended the Annual World War II Warbirds Air Show at the Mid-Atlantic Air Museum in Reading, PA, and celebrated their well-earned achievements at their Court of Honor Ceremony held June 17. Scouts will continue to work on earning badges and having fun this summer at various Scouting Camps.





For the thirteenth consecutive year, Faith Lutheran Church in New Providence has given backpacks with school supplies to children, whose families cannot afford them.




