Girl Scout troops in Madison and Harding are getting ready for another fun-filled year. Though this past year and a half has looked like no other year, troops were able to make adjustments, be creative, and continue to provide new experiences for the girls.

Some leaders held outdoor meetings during all seasons. The fifth grade Central Avenue School troop met at Dodge Field after school twice a month throughout the school year to earn badges and do craft projects, including making catapults, bath bombs, string art, and dream catchers. A Cadette troop held a cooking lesson outside where the girls made chicken salad sandwiches, yogurt parfaits, and s'mores pies. Another troop celebrated the end of the school year with a trip to the ropes course and zipline at Treetop Adventure Course in West Orange.

In the spring, a special outdoor story time

was led by ninth grader, Libby Nebres, and seventh grader, Charlotte Nebres. The girls expanded their Girl Scout Silver Award project, Little Diverse Library, by inviting younger troops to join them on the lawn of the library as they read books featuring diverse stories, characters, and authors. First grade Daisy troop 8108 enjoyed a story and songs, and leader Valerie Librizzi organized a tissue paper flower garden craft to symbolize the diversity in our community. Each troop member also brought an appropriate book to donate to the Little Diverse Library, which is on the lawn of the Museum of Early Trades and Crafts.

In May, fourth grade Kings Road School troop 7192 participated in a Bike Rodeo, held by the Madison Police Department Traffic Safety Bureau. After learning about bike safety and how to correctly fit their helmets, the girls took a bike ride with the officers through downtown Madison.

In addition to holding outdoor meetings, leaders also creatively used technology to connect their troops. One seventh grade troop asked the girls and their families to host online cooking classes. They taught fellow troop members to make family favorites and multicultural recipes, including tabbouleh, stuffed grape leaves, challah bread, and pioneer corn bread.

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# **BIKE DONATION BOOSTS COMMUNITY POLICING**

#### Thursday Morning Club

The Thursday Morning Club (TMC) graciously donated a new Fuji Code 3-XT Police Mountain Bikes to Madison Police Department (MPD), for use by the department's only female pedal officer, Corporal Stephanie C. Aquino.

MPD's Bicycle Unit is a community-oriented unit assigned to patrol on bicycles allowing for higher visibility and interaction with the community. The unit also allows for faster response times in municipal parks, while also being environmentally friendly.

"The women of the TMC are delighted to support the local MPD by donating a bicycle to the only female pedal officer in Madison," said Susan Packie, TMC President. "The TMC is proud to be a willing partner to numerous Madison Community groups who work hard to offer support and assistance to our local and surrounding communities," continued Packie.

With the addition of this new bicycle, MPD now has five pedal bikes in its fleet for use throughout town, and at large events like National Night Out, Bottle Hill Day, Memorial Day Parade and the Christmas Parade.

"We are very grateful to the women of the TMC for their donation of a new bicycle to the MPD Bicycle Unit," said Acting Chief John R. Miscia. "With this donation we are able to interact with the community on a different level and expand our Community Relations Unit, which strives to build strong, trusting relationships with the citizens of the Rose City," continued Miscia.

"As an avid bicyclist, I am happy to see that we are adding to MPD's bicycle unit thanks to the generosity of the TMC," stated Mayor Robert H. Conley. "The TMC never hesitates to partner with organizations that do good for the community, and this is just another example of

that," continued Conley.

The bicycle unit consists of thirteen officers. Prior to joining the bicycle unit, officers attend a weeklong Police Bicycle Patrol Training Course hosted by the NJ Juvenile Justice Commission at the New Jersey State Police Academy in Sea Girt, NJ. Officers are trained in safe operations, proper techniques, basic bicycle maintenance and care, nutrition and the establishment of a fitnesstraining program for in-season and off-season training.


The Fall Exhibit will run from September 26 through December 6, 2021 and is free and open to the public.

Susan Scarince Jones and Alan Jones, mixed media artists, are the combined solo exhibitors. The title for their show is "Nature's Impressions".

Susan, whose artwork is inspired by nature, especially landscapes of the southwest, enjoys creating impressionist paintings and collages using metal, copper and tin. Her colors range from warm earth and rust tones of the west to the cool blues, greens and pastel colors depicting spring gardens and trees of the eastern woodlands.

"I rarely use a plan other than the size of the canvas and the colors or textures I would like to use. Trusting my intuition, I let my art 'happen'. My main goal is to express myself and draw the viewer into my paintings," states Susan.

Susan was born and raised in Madison, NJ. A shy, quiet kid, she used art as a way of expressing herself. Majoring in fine arts in Boston, she worked in NYC in the advertising field concentrating on illustration, giftware and package design. "My biggest thrill as an

As a member of the Art League of the Chathams and Drew Art Association, she has exhibited and sold her work in numerous solo and juried shows. Susan has given art instruction to both children and adults throughout the Tri-County Area.

Susan has created and published a series of three photo books for young children called Skippy Chipmunk. The books contain her photographs and stories about a real live chipmunk living in her garden. As an author, she visits local nursery schools and enjoys seeing the children's reaction to her stories. Her Skippy books and photos will be on display at the exhibit.

Alan Jones is new to the art community, but not new to the artist world. He diligently worked behind the scenes assisting Susan with many of the technical art issues.

Born in Newport, Wales, he moved to the US as a teenager. After finishing school and serving in the US military, he met Susan on a blind date. By coincidence, they had both been reading Thoreau's Walden. At that point, there was an instant connection with their love of nature and interest in art (and each other). They married, moved to Long Valley and raised two children.

Alan has always been interested in art, but it was after he retired from a career as a machine designer for various engineering firms that he then began to paint, design and construct clocks using tile, copper and wood.

Noting the colors selected for his projects looked perfect next to her artwork, Susan urged him to try his hand at painting. "I have been encouraging everyone around me to get into art and then realized Alan had potential with just a bit of encouragement!"

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## MADISON ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION TO HOST FREE ECO GARDEN TOUR

Butterfly-friendly plants and trees, native shrubs, rain gardens, composting, beekeeping and organic lawn care are all on the agenda for Madison's Eco Garden Tour. Organized by the Madison Environmental Commission (MEC), the tour will be held on Sunday, September 12 from 12:00 p.m. (noon) to 4:00 p.m. (Rain date is September 19, 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.) The event is free, but advance registration is required at bit.ly/madison-eco-garden-tour 2021.

"The Eco Garden Tour is a great way to see how our yards can be beautiful—and provide a pesticide free habitat for bees, butterflies and pollinators," says John Hoover, Borough Council Liaison to the Environmental Commission. "Suburban yards are actually ideal for recreating the pollinator-friendly conditions of meadows and woodlands that used to be common in New Jersey," continued Hoover.

The self-guided tour will feature eight locations that can be visited in any order. Homeowners include a native-plant gardener who raises chickens and is an expert composter; a landscape architect who has an organic vegetable garden and two beehives; and a master gardener who has lots of advice on how to switch to cost-saving organic lawn care.

Gardens on the tour come in all shapes and

Butterfly-friendly plants and trees, native sizes. There are mini meadows that border driveways, rain gardens, composting, beekeeping d organic lawn care are all on the agenda for adison's Eco Garden Tour. Organized by the lawns used to be.

Several exhibitors will be featured at the starting point for the tour, including Friends of Madison Shade Trees, Friends of the Drew Forest, and Electric Landscaping of Pitman, New Jersey, which specializes in using quiet, electric leaf blowers and lawn care equipment.

"Homeowners are all native plant enthusiasts who can offer lots of advice both on what to plant, and what non-native species they'd like to remove from their yards," says tour organizer Joan Maccari of the Madison Environmental Commission. "The work of Douglas Tallamy and his Homegrown National Park movement which encourages people to shrink their lawn and plant more native trees and pollinator plants—has been inspirational to so many of us in Madison, not only those who have been working on this tour. It's very exciting to see the growing enthusiasm for native plants and more eco-friendly gardening and landscaping approaches," continues Maccari.

## **POLICE REVIVE RESIDENT IN CARDIAC ARREST**


On August 14, 2021 at 12:10 p.m., Madison Police Officers were dispatched to a 9-1-1 call for a man who collapsed and was lying on the sidewalk in the area of Main Street near Station Road. The caller stated that the patient was unresponsive and not moving.

Madison Police Patrolman Patrick Strafaci, who was patrolling in the downtown area, arrived on scene within seconds of being dispatched and assessed the patient, who was identified as a 53-year-old Madison resident. When Patrolman Strafaci assessed the patient, he observed that the patient was not breathing, did not have a pulse, and was in cardiac arrest. He immediately notified Madison Dispatch and began performing lifesaving measures.

Patrolman Strafaci was joined by another passerby who was identified as a Madison resident and a Registered Nurse. Arriving shortly after was Morris County EMS and Madison Fire Department who also assisted in lifesaving measures. An automated external defibrillator (AED) administered several shocks and a pulse was later regained on the patient. The patient was ultimately transported to Morristown Medical Center and is recovering.

"The quick response and action by all first responders, the nurse who assisted emergency responders, and the witness who called 9-1-1, ultimately gave this patient another chance at life", says Acting Chief John R. Miscia.





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# FALL VIRTUAL MINICOURSES AT MADISON LIBRARY

Friends of the Madison Public Library announce that registration opened on August 23 for three Fall 2021 Zoom minicourse offerings:

"19th-century European Art: Romanticism to Post-Impressionism," by Dr Kimberly Rhodes, Professor of Art History, Drew University; 5 Mondays 10 a.m. - 12 p.m.; September 20, 27, October 4, 11 and 18.

The 19th century was a period of dramatic transformation for the visual arts: artists began to seek inspiration in their imaginations, make overtly political art that responded to contemporary events, and question long-standing artistic traditions. Simultaneously, new industrially produced materials became available that allowed artists to experiment with such aesthetic attributes as color and texture in exciting ways. Society itself was also changing rapidly, as populations moved from rural to urban environments, transportation allowed for ease of travel, European nations expanded their global power through imperialism, and women and

help developing an online marketing plan.

people of color sought equal rights. This course will consider these topics and many others through a chronological discussion of the major movements of the century, including Romanticism, Realism, Impressionism, and Post-Impressionism.

"Churchill," by Dr. Jonathan Rose by Professor of History, Drew University; 5 Tuesdays 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.; September 21, 28, October 5, 12 and 19.

Winston Churchill (along with Adolf Hitler) is one of the most consequential and intensely studied figures of modern times. For half a century he was an electrifying presence in British politics, holding (at various points) nearly every important post in the British cabinet. He led his country to disaster in the First World War and to victory in the Second World War. He switched parties twice, in part because he was too independent to fit into any conventional ideological category. He inspired fierce loyalty in some, while others were absolutely determined

to keep him out of power. And he was a bestselling writer who won the Nobel Prize in Literature, the author of histories, biographies, war reportage, literary criticism, and even a novel. This course explores -- and attempts to explain -- the life and times of this extraordinary, ingenious, and often contradictory figure.

"The History of U.S. Constitutional Themes and Concepts" by Dr. Ian Drake, Associate Professor of Political Science and Law, Montclair State University; 5 Wednesdays 10 a.m. to 12 p.m.; September 22, 29, October 6, 13 and 20.

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
