THE SUMMIT FOUNDATION AWARDS LOCAL GRANTS

The Summit Foundation has awarded more than \$292,000 in grants to 22 local area nonprofit organizations providing vital food, shelter, education, arts, culture, and health services. Some of the grants include:

- \$5,000 to St. Teresa of Avila Loaves and Fishes for household supplies and personal care products for weekly distributions.
- \$15,000 to Bridges Outreach, Inc. for Welcome Neighbors services for homeless and necessity-insecure residents.
- \$15,000 to Promly Support, Inc., for a social media platform that will provide mental health resources and fight teen suicide.
- \$16,000 to PG Chambers School for assistive technology for children with special needs.
- \$8,000 to KinderSmile Foundation for free dental care for children served by GRACE in Summit.
- \$9,000 to New Jersey Bicycle Coalition for construction of a bike depot at the Summit train station.
- \$10,000 to Union County College Foundation for debt relief for students enrolled in Operation Graduation.

• \$5,000 to Somerset County YMCA, Inc., for a summer camp program that will address COVID-related learning losses among K-5 grade students from Plainfield School District.

The Summit Foundation also provided grants totaling more than \$124,000 to support SAGE Eldercare, The Connection for Women and Families, Reeves-Reed Arboretum, and the Visual Arts Center of NJ.

Other organizations receiving grants include Our House Foundation, Pillar Care Continuum, Literacy NJ, Contact We Care, Inc. (Caring Contact), Dreamcatcher Repertory Theatre, Summit Interfaith Council, Hilltopper Stage Productions, Continuo Arts Foundation, CASA of Union County, and The Adult School of the Chathams, Madison, and Florham Park.

The Summit Foundation fosters philanthropy by identifying local needs and offering donors flexible ways to make a difference in the lives of their neighbors. Since 2010, it has awarded nearly \$6.3 million through 454 competitive grants to tax-exempt organizations that serve our area.

REEVES-REED ARBORETUM RECEIVES GRANTS TOTALING \$35,000

The mission of Reeves-Reed Arboretum is to engage, educate, and enrich the lives of our constituents to become better stewards of nature and the planet. With an ever increasing visitorship – now over 100,000 annually – the Arboretum acknowledges and embraces its responsibility to make the grounds safe and welcoming to visitors of all abilities, and to fully embody the goals of its mission.

Thanks to recent funding from E.J. Grassman Trust, The Summit Foundation, The Summit Garden Club, and the National Environmental Education Foundation (NEEF), the Arboretum was awarded a total of \$35,000 in 2021. With COVID-19 still impacting the Arboretum's operations this spring, the \$10,000 grant from the Summit Foundation provided much needed general operating support.

"The \$20,000 grant for repairs to our deer fence from E.J. Grassman Trust is timely; this summer we are experiencing a level of damage to our plantings from the deer that I have not seen in my 13 years of working here," according to Jackie Kondel, Executive Director of the Arboretum. "The \$2,500 grant from the NEEF Restoration and Resilience Fund will be used to remove invasive plants along the Wildflower Trail and replant the area with natives since many of the native species have been browsed by deer." The work will be completed with a combination of volunteers and staff, including a seasonal



gardener funded by The Summit Garden Club.

"We are so grateful for the support of our community partners," says Kondel.


ONE-YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF A LIFESAVING CPR SAVE BY SUMMIT FIREFIGHTER

The one-year anniversary of a lifesaving CPR an update that the patient was in stable condition. save by Summit firefighter John Bonczo passed this Summer.

On July 25, 2020 at approximately 1 p.m. Watchung Police officers were called to the Watchung Square Mall on Route 22 in the area of DSW shoe store for a report on an 83-year-old unresponsive male. On arrival, officers observed the patient on the ground with off-duty City of Summit firefighter John Bonczo engaged in lifesaving measures. Firefighter Bonczo remained on the scene and assisted Watchung Police, EMS and paramedics until the patient was transported to Overlook Medical Center. Approximately three hours later, police received

Firefighter Bonczo has been a member of the Summit Fire Department for the past 11 years. Emergency preparedness and response is an important component of firefighter training.

"My wife Kristine, who was five months pregnant at the time, and I were returning from a shopping trip when I noticed an unconscious male on the ground in the parking lot," explains Bonczo. "When I first checked the patient had a slight pulse that disappeared before I began CPR. I am incredibly grateful that the assistance I provided alongside Watchung police and EMS saved a life that afternoon. I look forward to sharing the story with my daughter one day."



SUMMIT'S REPAIR CAFÉ – SEPT. 18



Bridges Outreach

Bridges is honored to announce a \$100,000 bequest from the estate of John J. Hurley of Chatham, NJ. Mr. Hurley found his way to Bridges through former Board Treasurer, Bob Rowan, and founders, Geoff and Ginger Worden, formerly of Summit, NJ. Bob and John's friendship during retirement was partially founded on a mutual connection to Bridges Outreach. Together they made numerous "Bridges Runs" to Newark. As John experienced the full impact of the Bridges Organization in action, he became a strong proponent of its work, ultimately working with Rowan and the former Executive Director, Lois Bhatt, to commit to this major gift.

Mr. Hurley was born in Glen Gardner before

moving to Roselle Park, New Jersey. Having lost his parents early in life, he was raised by his godmother and her family as one of their own. After graduating from Roselle Park High School, he attended Rider University. He was also a US Army veteran. Professionally, Mr. Hurley worked for Wilkinson Sword, Inc. before it was associated with Gillette. While there, he was known for his attention to detail and respect of the family atmosphere. He ended his professional career as the Business Manager for Kent Place School. He managed the school's finances with respect for the program and the wisdom of careful spending. It is there that he connected with the Worden's, with whom he stayed in contact well after his retirement in 1997. Arlene Gibson, former Head of School at Kent Place, worked with John for nine years. She remembers him fondly as a man with a wry sense of humor who supported the school with care. "It is not surprising that John became involved with Bridges, a program in which the school's faculty, staff and students worked both to aid the homeless and to learn from them. I am touched by his gift and applaud Bridges in the effort to match his generosity."

Bridges is grateful for his commitment to our work, and we have begun the John J. Hurley Housing Success Fund with his bequest. This fund will help cover the cost of the voucher process, provide a basic care package, and extended transition support for those newly housed. Rich Uniacke, Executive Director, recognizes the long-term impact of this bequest. "Getting people out of homelessness and into housing, rather than shelter, is our highest aim. Keeping them successfully housed can itself be a challenging process which can last indefinitely. The establishment of this fund is meant to be a lasting tribute to the man who made this kind of impact possible."

Bridges' aim is to raise another \$200,000 dollars to match this gift by September 30, 2021 and transform the lives of those we servecovering the costs of the housing voucher process and providing some basic items to start a new home. Bridges has raised \$96,000 of our \$200,000 goal, and we are asking for your help.

Founded in 1988, Bridges Outreach has actively supported people experiencing homelessness in New York City, Newark, Irvington, and Summit. Bridges works to end homelessness through volunteer driven outreach and case management focusing on health, and independence. We form housing, relationships with those experiencing homelessness while meeting their most urgent needs. With case managers at our drop-in center, Project Connect, in Newark, we have been the primary organization providing identity documents, access to health and social services, shelter, daily food, and connections to employment.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, Bridges has sustained Runs in New York City, Newark, and Irvington and self-care access in Summit. Bridges has also committed to Street Outreach in Newark seven nights a week to provide food, clothing, PPE, and access to Covid-safe shelter. We have worked tirelessly to permanently house 30 clients with HUD mainstream housing vouchers and are working to prevent imminent homelessness with rental arrears support. Since April 2020 with our volunteers and case managers hard at work, Bridges has had more than 1,100 shelter placements, distributed over 35,000 lunches, and served over 8,000 people.

SUMMER OF HIGH ADVENTURE FOR SUMMIT'S SCOUTS

Submitted by Matthew Hecker, Troop 67 Summit's own Boy Scout Troop 67 was able to do something truly incredible over the summer that they were waiting to do for years. From July 14 to July 28, a select group of scouts traveled to New Mexico to go backpacking at the Philmont Scout Ranch for two weeks. We used all of the skills we learned along our path to Eagle Scout, and got to have an experience that most scouts could only dream of. Philmont is one of only three High Adventure Camps in all of America, and only 20,000 scouts get to go over the entire summer. We flew to Colorado to spend two days becoming acclimated to the 7,000+ foot altitude, then took a bus to the ranch itself, and started the eleven-day hike. This trip was indescribably amazing, but I hope that I can at least try to describe even a fraction of it.

Our first stop was Colorado. After flying in from Newark Airport into Denver, we collected our bags and were immediately picked up by the Blue Sky Adventures bus. We were driven to the Garden of the Gods, a gorgeous rock formation. Our hike around the formation allowed us to get accustomed to having less oxygen when we hike. We then drove to Great Wolf Lodge, which is where we'd be staying for the next two nights. When we woke up the next morning, we immediately boarded the bus to get a tour of Pikes Peak, driving up to over 14,000 feet above sea level. After getting a view from the top, we drove to a local park for lunch, and then to the Arkansas River to go whitewater rafting. Whitewater rafting intensity ranges from 1 (borderline still water) to 6 (extremely dangerous, and should be avoided)- and we reached a 4! It was easily one of the most fun parts of the trip and was a great bookend to our time in Colorado.

We stayed at Philmont Base Camp for 1 day, which was similar to a standard day camp. But the following day, we started on our trail. Hiking at Philmont was truly amazing, with a once-in-alifetime view at every turn. Our hikes ranged from roughly 2 miles to nearly 10 miles. There were days with elevation gains of 2500 feet, and multiple hikes had to be done in the rain. But the best part of the hikes was undoubtedly the comradery. From hour-long conversations about Kung Fu Panda to chanting, "We Ready," our crew was able to thrive in the heat, sun, rain, and fatigue of Philmont.

The activities at Philmont were so varied, yet every single one of them added so much fun to the trip. On day 2, we got to rock climb on 30 foot high cliff faces, something so different compared to the indoor gyms we have here in New Jersey. On day 3, we shot and reloaded Civil War-era muskets, even getting to put our own hats down range to be shot. On day 4, we branded a lot of our gear with the Philmont logo, as well as getting to cook and eat peach cobbler. We got to pet goats, burrows, and chickens on day 5. The side hike up to Mt. Phillips and subsequent lightning storm of day 6 was easily a highlight of

the entire trip, since we got one of the prettiest views I've ever seen, and more importantly, cell service. On day 7, we got to prepare 30.06 rifle bullets, as well as actually fire the rifles at targets, hats, and even at flip flops. day 8 brought the most activities. Some of us learned how to play mandolin, others played poker, and then we all got to explore an old mine shaft as well as pan for gold (no gold was found, but some say that the real gold was the friends we made along the way). The next two days both included fly fishing, which was probably the only time on our trip that the advisors got some peace and quiet. And finally, day 11 included a hike and climb up the Tooth of Time, the greatest landmark of Philmont, and an incredible way to end our journey.

When we weren't hiking, fishing, rafting, climbing, shooting, reloading, chanting, singing, panning, exploring, or hiking some more, our crew was having to handle the scariest part of the trip: boredom. And food. The food was just as scary. Dehydrated meals, pop tarts, and meat sticks were the vast majority of our sustenance, but we made it through. And the boredom was overcome through copious amounts of poker. But from poker to meat sticks to uphill hikes to heat to sunburns to blisters, every challenge only made us stronger. This trip was not only a journey, it was truly an experience. One that I, and the rest of the crew, wouldn't trade for the world, and will never forget.

the Flintlocks BSA, Inc. ran the Cub Scout Wood Tools Program at the Watchung Mountain District Spring Cub Family Camporee at Boy Scout Camp Winnebago in Rockaway, NJ this spring.

Fifty-three Cub Scouts earned a Woodcraft badge by learning about how to use wood tools, safety measures, and building a small bird house. The program starts with one of the Flintlocks explaining how to use wood tools properly and important safety measures. After the Cub Scouts build their bird house, they may practice using screwdrivers and a coping saw. The parents work with the children, and the Flintlocks offer guidance.

The Camporee has many different activities, including Archery, Batting cages, BB guns, First Aid Classes, and Fishing Derby, Climbing wall, Basketball, Volleyball, a 2-mile Hike, Rockets and Catapults. The shooting sports programs have NJ State Certified Instructors. Since it is a

Bird houses have the bottoms attached with screws since a mother bird wants to build a new nest every year. HATCHER MICONE OF SUMMIT TURNS 100 WITH A "PINK "CELEBRATION

Susan G. Komen North Jersey Founder and Past Volunteers Pay Tribute to a Life Well Lived

Hatcher Micone, a long-time resident of Summit, was honored on August 4, 2021 at a 100th Birthday Celebration held in her honor at the Fairmount Country Club in Chatham. Micone, who is a breast cancer survivor, was a dedicated and passionate Komen North Jersey volunteer for decades. Nearly 30 fellow former Komen volunteers, all of whom worked with Micone in the early days of the Affiliate, were there to celebrate her life, and to pay tribute to the "one-and-only Hatcher."

"Hatch started volunteering with us around 2004, not long after we'd moved to our new offices in the pink-shuttered house in Summit," says Deborah Q. Belfatto, Komen North Jersey's founder, and a Summit resident for more than 20 years. "She was amazing from the start, so we put her in charge of our volunteers. She ran a tight ship, but they adored her and would do anything for her, so much so that they became known as 'Hatcher's Girls.' There wasn't a single person at her 100th year celebration whose life hasn't been touched by

Hatcher Micone, a long-time resident of her. She is such an inspiration, and I can only home that I will look, and feel, and act, and be like her. She really is the one-and-onlye Fairmount Country Club in Chatham. Hatcher."

> Micone was born on August 2, 1921 and grew up in Freeman, Virginia. After graduating from high school, she attended Longwood College in Farmville, VA as a Physical Education major. She later studied at the Pan American Business School in Richmond, and met her husband, Edward Micone, in Richmond. She and Ed were married on June 11, 1944, and after living in Jacksonville, FL during WWII and San Diego, CA during the Korean War, they settled in Summit, NJ. She and Ed were married for 69 years (Ed passed away in 2013 at the age of 94) and had three children, Lacy, Edward and Roger. There are also five grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Micone resided in Summit for 75 years before moving to assisted living at Juniper Village at Chatham.

> In addition to her work with Komen, Micone served as a candy striper at Overlook Hospital,

dabbled in musical theater (she was cast as a chorus girl in a few Overlook Hospital theater productions), and was an excellent golfer—in 1978, she was the Fairmount Country Club Ladies Club Champion.

Micone was recognized in 2006 by Komen North Jersey as Volunteer of the Year and given their top honor, the much-coveted "Angel Award." In 2007, she was photographed as a "Journey of Courage," a unique Komen North Jersey photo essay comprised of portraits of survivors who agreed to share their stories to heighten awareness of the disease that touched their lives. Her portrait includes this quote: "Surviving breast cancer inspired me to appreciate the gift of life and motivates me to work, play and love fully. I am thankful for the support of my family and friends, and have faith, hope and trust that cures will be found." At the close of her birthday party, she expressed the hope that "all the wonderful people here will be around to celebrate her next 100..." We hope so too. Hatcher.

"Hearts for Emma is focused on educating present and future generations to ensure everyone understands the importance of organ and tissue donation and transplantation," said Rothman. "Gabriella serves as a perfect example of what it means to take an active role in supporting these important outreach efforts."

Scholarship applicants were measured on academic achievement, community and volunteer efforts, extracurricular activities and advocacy for organ and tissue donation. The application process included a thorough review by a committee of NJ Sharing Network Foundation Board members and volunteers.

"We are grateful for the generous support of Hearts for Emma and their ongoing commitment to rewarding students who share a commitment to our life-saving mission," said Elisse E. Glennon, Executive Director of the NJ Sharing Network Foundation. "We know that Gabriella and all of our scholarship recipients will continue to be strong leaders in educating others about donation and transplantation as they move forward to begin college."

According to NJ Sharing Network, there are nearly 4,000 New Jersey residents currently waiting for a life-saving transplant, and one person in New Jersey dies every three days waiting for a transplant. 


