SEA SCOUT EARNS COUNCIL LEADERSHIP AWARD

Sebastián Heredia has been awarded the 2021 Patriots' Path Sea Scout Leadership Award. Sebastián is a Sea Scout from Ship 228 in Linden and he is an Eagle Scout from Troop 67 of St. Teresa of Avila Catholic Church in Summit.

Sebastián discovered Sea Scouting in 2017 and has been dual enrolled in Ship 228 and Troop 67 ever since. In 2019, Sebastián was nominated Sea Scout of the Year and he was the only Sea Scout from Patriots' Path Council to attend the World Scout Jamboree in West Virginia as a member of the National Sea Scout Ship. At the World Scout Jamboree, 40,00 Scouts and leaders participated from all over the world.

FLINTLOCKS RUN CUB SCOUT WOOD TOOLS BADGE PROGRAM

Submitted by Dr. D. Michael Hart The Flintlocks BSA, Inc. ran the Cub Scout Wood Tools Program at the Watchung Mountain District Spring Cub Family Camporee at Boy Scout Camp Winnebago in Rockaway, NJ this spring.

Fifty-three Cub Scouts earned a Woodcraft badge by learning about how to use wood tools, safety measures, and building a small bird house. The program starts with one of the Flintlocks explaining how to use wood tools properly and important safety measures. After the Cub Scouts build their bird house, they may practice using screwdrivers and a coping saw. The parents work with the children, and the Flintlocks offer guidance.

The Camporee has many different activities, including Archery, Batting cages, BB guns, First Aid Classes, and Fishing Derby, Climbing wall, Basketball, Volleyball, a 2-mile Hike, Rockets and Catapults. The shooting sports programs have NJ State Certified Instructors. Since it is a family camporee, and since girls may now join scouts, entire families may enjoy the fun, and the scouts earn various badges. Attendance at the camporee was 150 scouts with an equal number of parents. This was one of the first big events at the scout camp since the shutdown

over a year ago.

The Flintlocks BSA, Inc are a group of 27 retired scouters who volunteer every week all year round to help the scout camps of the Patriot's Path Council. They are incorporated as a separate 501c3. Facebook page is "Flintlocks". They do maintenance at the camps, build cabins, tent platforms, picnic tables, etc. In 2018 they built a STEM lab classroom for scientific related merit badges. The members also volunteer to help the scouts with various programs throughout the year. The Flintlocks purchase lumber from a lumber mill, then make the parts for the craft kits in their wood shop which are sold at the Council Scout shops. Bird houses have the bottoms attached with screws since a mother bird wants to build a new nest every year. The old nest needs to be cleaned out in the fall so a new family can start over again in the spring.

HISTORIANS SEEKS PHOTOS OF RAILROAD WORKERS FROM YESTERYEAR

County of Morris

There was a time when "Railroaders," as they were known, were revered in New Jersey and around the nation.

In Morris County, the term "railroader" became a catchall phrase for railroad employment, from those who worked on the railroad and at the depots to ticket agents and, of course, the engineers, who were written about in absolutely heroic terms in early newspapers of the 19th Century.

It was a time in America when the railroads served as a commercial boon for the towns they served, whether it be commuter trains or the freight lines. The "Iron Horse" allowed for settlements in the west, and the growing railroad network allowed wealthy northerners to winter in the south, establishing Florida as the place for "snow birds" more than a century ago.

Morris County historians are compiling lists

and records of the local men and women who built, supported and just made the railroads go in those early days and are asking anyone with photographs to share them. The county is interested in any aspect of railroad employment.

It is an important aspect of Morris County history worth documenting. Railroads were once a staple in Morris County life. They provided shopkeepers with goods, afforded speedy mail delivery and, most importantly, were a key source of employment. Railroads served as a companion tool for the Morris Canal; eventually overtaking the canal as a favored transportation mode for ore, goods and people.

There are examples of "canalers" trading life on the water for one on the rails.

It is worth noting for the "railroader" enthusiasts that Morris County boasts its own steam locomotive, which is pictured on this page. The United States Army Steam Locomotive No. 4039 is listed on both the New Jersey State and National Registers of Historic Places.

The locomotive has been under restoration with the help of a large federal grant, public donations and funds from the Morris County Historic Preservation Trust Fund. The fund also has helped to restore and preserve historic railroad stations, such as in Butler and Lake Hopatcong, and even support systems, including the Boonton train trestle.

Locomotive No. 4039 will be housed at the Whippany Railroad Museum, which is dedicated to preserving and recording the history of railroad activity in the region.

"RAILROADERS" HONORED IN MORRIS COUNTY ON-LINE COLLECTION

"Railroaders" were once revered in New with the Office of Planning and Preservation. Jersey and around the nation - the workers whose jobs ranged from conductors to ticket agents and, of course, the engineers, who were written about in heroic terms in newspapers of the early 19th Century.

Morris County's Office of Planning and Preservation has compiled an on-line collection documenting the names of Morris County's "railroaders," including vintage photographs, news clippings and biographical data from the very early days through modern times. In some cases, only their names and brief information are listed because little else is known about them.

However, Morris County continues to search for more information and invites the public to help document these long-gone "railroaders."

"The 'Iron Horse' changed the national landscape in the 1880s, both economically and physically. This list attempts to pay homage to the locals who made the railroad possible in Morris County - those who built it and those who worked it," said Jan Williams, a historian

"Major rails were built to service the Morris Canal and much like 'canalers,' the 'railroaders' appear to have been a generational profession with fathers, sons and grandsons working side by side," said Joseph Barilla, Director of Planning and Preservation.

"Railroads have shaped the development of the county and have proven to be of economic importance for generations of Morris County residents. From supplying our industries in the 1900's to providing a present day transportation source to the offices of Manhattan, the railroads were and are a key accessory to the employment of many," Barilla added.

In Morris County, the term "railroader" became a catchall phrase for railroad employment, from those who worked on the railroad and at the depots to conductors and engineers. The 19th Century was a time in America when the railroads served as a commercial boon for the towns they served, whether it be commuter trains or the freight

lines.



HELP US FIND MORRIS COUNTY'S PURPLE HEART HEROES

County of Morris

In the final days of the American Revolution, on Aug. 7, 1782, General George Washington established the Badge of Military Merit to, as his general orders stated, "cherish virtuous ambition in his soldiers." It was the birth of what we now call the Purple Heart, presented to military personnel wounded in the line of duty.

Morris County has a rich and storied history of Purple Heart honorees and its historians have joined the mission of the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor in New Windsor, N.Y. to collect, preserve and share the stories of all Purple Heart recipients. The Morris County Office of Planning and Preservation wants to make a full accounting of the local men and women who earned the honor, and the office is interested in any photographs, news accounts or artifacts that help to tell the story of each soldier.

"The Purple Heart Project is another avenue for veterans to get their history out there. We want to include everyone, regardless of the conflict they served in. Veterans' history isn't just national or global history, it is also a personal history of families on a very local level – even gut level. It's important for future generations to know what their ancestors did. Their bravery and



sacrifices should not be forgotten," said Jan Williams, a Cultural and Historic Resources Specialist with the Morris County Office of Planning & Preservation.

The county has a list of more than 350 area veterans who received the Purple Heart, but historians are convinced it is only a fraction of the actual number. Williams also noted that the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor, which operates as a research center and maintains a national database of Purple Heart recipients, also is trying to make a full accounting on a national level.

"This Purple Heart database contains service members' names and units, but it has gaps and I hope that families will add this important information to the archives. For researchers and family members, it's difficult to find information sources like this, completely cost free and easily accessed from home," she explained.


Anyone may enroll a Purple Heart recipient to the national database, but documentation is required. Go to thepurpleheart.com.

PUBLIC ASKED TO BE ALERT FOR EHD IN DEER

The Division's Office of Fish and Wildlife Health and Forensics is asking those who are out in the fields and woods of New Jersey at this time of year to be alert for deer that may be affected by Epizootic Hemorrhagic Disease (EHD) and to report any suspected cases to the Division.

Symptoms of HD in deer may include difficulty standing, drooling, lethargy, respiratory distress, emitting foam from the mouth or nose, and swelling of the face, tongue, and neck. Because the disease causes fever, sick or dead deer are often seen in or near water, after drinking or attempting to cool off. Affected deer may also show reduced activity, loss of appetite, and develop ulcerations on their tongue.

Deer exhibiting any of the above-mentioned signs in late summer and fall, or dead deer observed in or near water should be reported to the Bureau of Wildlife Management at any one of the following numbers: Deer Biologist - Jodi Powers, 609-259-6965; Division Veterinarian -Dr. Nicole Lewis, 908-735-6398 or email nicole.lewis@dep.nj.gov.

HD is not a public health issue. Neither EHD nor BT viruses can be transmitted to people, and humans are not at risk by handling infected deer, being bitten by infected midges, or eating infected deer meat - though the Division of Fish and Wildlife strongly advises against consuming meat from any game animal that appears ill.

EHD virus rarely infects domestic animals, while BT is a known disease of domestic animals such as sheep, cattle, goats, and even domestic dogs. To date, no cases of livestock illness related to BT have been reported. People suspecting HD in domestic animals should have them tested for the virus.




