TMC CELEBRATE 125 YEARS OF SERVICE

On September 26, 2021, at the Madison Community House (MCH), the Thursday Morning Club of Madison (TMC) celebrated 125 years of service to the Madison community. The celebration was attended by Mayor Bob Conley; the family of George Burroughs, the first director or the MCH; TMC past presidents; former MCH chairwomen; TMC members and guests. Music was provided by the Bottle Hill Big Band.

TMC began its mission of service in 1896. TMC became a member of the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs in 1900 and a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in 1907.

Amongst the first services, TMC hired Madison's first public health nurse in 1906; created the first supervised town playground in 1908, now known as Dodge Field; started the first morning kindergarten in 1912, now part of the Madison Public School system; and created the Baby Keep Well Station, which was the prelude to the Madison Health Department.

In 1924, TMC built what is now called the Madison Community House (MCH) with a bequest from member Mary B. Cash. With its own building, TMC created, operated or provided space for: a Thrift Shop in 1925; the Braille Association in 1925; Madison Friends of the Library in 1938, now an independent organization; Nursery School in 1960; Morris County Legal Aid Society in 1967; TIME OUT Adult Day Care Center in 1988, which is now Harmony House; Project Community Pride in 1995; and Dress for Success in 1998.

As TMC entered the 21st century, the club continued its mission of service to Madison with Before and After School Child Care, and full day Nursery School. In addition, throughout its 125 years of volunteer work in the community, TMC has supported hundreds of service projects including Operation Chillout, Support the Girls, Operation Cookie (for local care facilities, and the Madison Police and Fire Departments), May Day, Free Little Library, Tree Planting, CASA, the Battered Women's Shelter of NJ, and the Madison Eagle Christmas Fund. TMC offers summer adventure camps for children, and enrichment programs for children and adults throughout the year. TMC also funds numerous scholarships and awards to members of the community, including: the George Burroughs Scholarship, the Dress for Success Northern NJ—10 Counties Scholarship, Girls' Career Institute, Hugh O'Brian Youth Leadership Program, the Laura E. Allocco Preschool Scholarship, Memorial Day awards, and Madison Junior School Awards.

All activities and the MCH are funded through user fees, fundraising activities, donations, grants and hundreds of volunteers donating time and talent.

Madison Police Department is pleased to announce the recent graduation of Acting Police Chief John R. Miscia from Northwestern University - School of Police Staff and Command (SPSC) as part of their 496th class. Acting Chief Miscia was among 24 graduates who completed the 23-week academic training that was held between March 1 and August 1, 2021.

Since the program's inception in 1983, this course, which is nationally recognized as a premiere leadership program and it is reputed for its rigorous academic curriculum, has graduated over 18,000 students both nationally

and internationally. The School of Police Staff and Command provides college level instruction in a total of twenty-two core blocks of topics during each session. The major study topics include leadership, human resources, employee relations, organizational behavior, applied statistics, planning and policy development, budgeting and resource allocation.

"I am proud to have graduated from one of the premiere law enforcement executive training courses in the nation. I look forward to applying what I have learned through the past twenty-two weeks to continuing to lead the Madison Police Department in an effective, professional, and efficient manner," said Miscia.

HELP US FIND PURPLE HEART HEROES

County of Morris

In the final days of the American Revolution, on Aug. 7, 1782, General George Washington established the Badge of Military Merit to, as his general orders stated, "cherish virtuous ambition in his soldiers." It was the birth of what we now call the Purple Heart, presented to military personnel wounded in the line of duty.

Morris County has a rich and storied history of Purple Heart honorees and its historians have joined the mission of the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor in New Windsor, N.Y. to collect, preserve and share the stories of all Purple Heart recipients. The Morris County Office of Planning and Preservation wants to make a full accounting of the local men and women who earned the honor, and the office is interested in any photographs, news accounts or artifacts that help to tell the story of each soldier.

"The Purple Heart Project is another avenue for veterans to get their history out there. We want to include everyone, regardless of the conflict they served in. Veterans' history isn't just national or global history, it is also a personal history of families on a very local level – even gut level. It's important for future generations to know what their ancestors did. Their bravery and sacrifices should not be forgotten," said Jan Williams, a Cultural and Historic Resources Specialist with the Morris County Office of Planning & Preservation.

The county has a list of more than 350 area veterans who received the Purple Heart, but historians are convinced it is only a fraction of the actual number. Williams also noted that the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor, which operates as a research center and maintains a

national database of Purple Heart recipients, also is trying to make a full accounting on a national level.

"This Purple Heart database contains service members' names and units, but it has gaps and I hope that families will add this important information to the archives. For researchers and family members, it's difficult to find information sources like this, completely cost free and easily accessed from home," she explained.

Anyone may enroll a Purple Heart recipient to the national database, but documentation is required. Go to thepurpleheart.com.

We hope to too see a large turnout of both veterans and citizens to support our many vets living in the Madison-Florham Park area.





The Madison Downtown Development Commission held the annual Bottle Hill Day festival on Saturday, October 2, 2021. This year marked the 46th Anniversary of this signature Madison event which is centered in Madison's business district. 



For the last few years the New Jersey Veterans Network and its mobile outreach team has been aggressively seeking out veterans in need and providing them resources to have a better way of life. This is only possible because of our volunteers' commitment and dedication with helping our veteran community. Donations are wonderful and help us purchase food, clothing, medical equipment and other life changing items, however someone's time is what makes an enormous difference.

During our charity's existence, we have provided meals for thousands of veterans and servicemen, dropped off PPE and clothing to veterans, provided medical equipment for disabled veterans, had 30 cars donated to disabled veterans, and most importantly we successfully saved the lives of veterans who were in some type of a dangerous crisis.

Every day we lose approximately 22 veterans to suicide and unfortunately this number hasn't changed over the years. Depression, PTSD and trauma run extremely high among our veterans and their family members. There are countless lifesaving programs out there for veterans, however it's a difficult task to get veterans to trust others and go get the help they need to live a better life.

The New Jersey Veterans Network also has a program called Operation Rebound that consists of a mobile outreach team that helps to train veterans for events like races, hiking, and other athletic activities. The goal of Operation Rebound is to do athletic events from 5k races to long distance Iron Man competitions in order to empower the veterans and show the public how people can do amazing things with the proper support. It is truly incredible to see the veterans go from no physical activity to completing these tremendous athletic challenges.

Our charity has been able to work alongside other amazing charities that always put veterans first and are capable of rapidly providing them with essential resources. Recently, we formed a veteran anti-suicide and PTSD awareness coalition, called Uniformed Heroes, that will

provide peer support sponsors for any veteran in need. Our peer support sponsors will be trained by the VA and Penn Med and our goal is to have volunteers statewide to help veterans in need.

To make this upcoming Uniformed Heroes campaign successful, we are in desperate need of volunteers from both the veteran and civilian communities. There are numerous events and daily tasks that our charity could use assistance with and we are always looking to have more volunteers willing to help us reach veterans in need.

Our goal is to provide all veterans in need with a peer support sponsor that will do whatever they can to help veterans with obtaining the resources needed to live a better life. This is not an easy thing to do, but the New Jersey Veterans Network has already been able to make a huge difference because of the team's volunteers and its strong partnerships with other charities.
