### **DONATION FROM PHILLIPS 66 FUNDS SCIENCE KITS**

The Linden Public School District has received a \$58,000 donation from Phillips 66 Bayway Refinery to support the district's science curriculum. The funds will be used to purchase science kits for all of the district's 400 secondgraders.

"Phillips 66 and our colleagues at the Bayway Refinery support our local Linden school community in so many ways," said Cynthia Apalinski, the district's elementary science specialist. "Their generous donation is one in a long line of us joining together as partners to provide the strongest science learning opportunities possible to our students.

"This most recent support is representative of our partnership to develop the next generation of scientists and engineers. We are extremely grateful for their continuous support and with these funds we are able to purchase new science materials for our second-grade classrooms."

The Full Option Science System (FOSS) kits supply students with materials to study and investigate units on Insects and Plants; Solids and Liquids; and Pebbles, Sand, and Silt. In all three units, students spend significant time outdoors exploring their schoolyards and the local community to make real-life connections with the science concepts they are learning about in their classrooms.

"Thank you to our neighbors at Phillips 66 for their generous support for our science curriculum," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Marnie Hazelton. "They say it takes a village to educate a child and this kind of financial backing from one of our vital community partners puts that mantra into action."

Access to high-quality instructional materials allows Linden's elementary teachers to provide students with rich and engaging experiences as they investigate phenomena in science and solve problems in engineering.

"At Phillips 66, one of our key focus areas for our philanthropic giving is Education and Literacy. We are very proud to support the purchase of required curriculum materials that will help the development of local Linden students," said Chris Gallo, general manager of

Phillips 66 Bayway Refinery. "We have supported this community need over the past six years, annually addressing a different grade level. With Bayway's contribution this year, Grades 2 through 8 in the Linden Public Schools will have state-required science kits."

Apalinski added: "These materials allow our student scientists to develop a love of science, learn how science and engineering can improve our world and solve its most challenging problems, and help them envision a potential trajectory into a science-related career."

The FOSS program gives students in-depth exposure to life, physical, and earth and space sciences while engaging them in the engineering design process:

Insects and Plants: Young biologists study the biodiversity of plants and animals by investigating firsthand the life cycles and behaviors of common insects and plants. They observe and care for mealworms, milkweed bugs, and painted lady butterflies live in their classrooms. They also plant their own seeds and collect and analyze data about their growth.

Solids and Liquids: Students explore solid and liquid materials by observing, describing, and sorting them according to their properties. Next, they investigate interactions between solids and water, liquids and water, and the melting and freezing of familiar liquids.

Pebbles, Sand, and Silt: Student geologists observe the properties of rocks of various sizes and study the components of soil. They study and analyze the results of weathering and erosion and work collaboratively to locate natural sources of water. They discover various earth materials' important role as natural resources and uses as building materials.

Abigail Armstead, Ashley Agbottah Grubbs, and Trinity Ellis will take part in virtual classes through the Huaxia Chinese School in Edison each Sunday, in which they will learn about language and culture.

"I am so proud of our student's enthusiasm in learning a different language and culture," said Lin Lin Hu, the students' Chinese teacher at LHS.

The scholarship covers all tuition and fees for the school, and was given by Bo Wang, chief executive officer of Wealthhouse Advisers of Metuchen.

"Our students were selected because Mr. Wang was impressed by their love for learning Chinese language and culture and their involvement in the community, which Mr. Wang has always been passionate about," Hu said.

She explained that Wang funds the scholarship to give back to the community because an American millionaire gave him a chance over 30 years ago, paying his way to come to the United States.



# **NATIONAL NETWORK SEEKS TO RESHAPE EDUCATION**

#### Linden Public Schools

Linden Public Schools have joined "Learning 2025," a collaborative nationwide network of districts aspiring to become more student-centered, equity-focused, and future-driven.

The network, administered by AASA, The School Superintendents Association, includes more than 60 "demonstration systems" that represent a collection of forward-leaning urban, suburban, and rural districts serving as national models to help guide partner districts by sharing successful practices, as well as challenges.

The program allows members to collaborate and learn with school systems that are committed to supporting the whole learner, ensuring antimarginalization, and adopting practices that anticipate future needs in a bold effort toward a holistic redesign of America's schools.

"Serving as a demonstration site for 'Learning 2025' is an honor for Linden Public Schools," said Superintendent Dr. Marnie Hazelton. "We look forward to working with other school districts from across the country to learn more about their strategic improvement efforts. In addition, our staff will be able to network with peers nationwide and share strategic ideas and winning solutions in our collective effort to strengthen our communities and raise student outcomes.

"Sharing ideas with colleagues within the network can only help us in making certain that every child is valued and supported."

The initiative's end goal is systemic redesign of the public school system by 2025. Along the way, member school districts will receive support in areas such as early learning, technologyenhanced learning, and enabling students to be co-authors in their education. Districts will receive personalized consultation on strategic direction and become part of a community of learners who help each other.

"Our goal is to galvanize and synergize thought leaders from all sectors to emerge from the pandemic in better shape than they were before," said Daniel A. Domenech, executive director of AASA. "This initiative will ensure that educators are empowered and equipped to meet whole learners' needs by personalizing and customizing instruction involving students in designing their own learning and coordinating resources to support all children's overall growth and well-being."

The initiative is grounded in the foundational work of the AASA Learning 2025 National Commission, which recommended essential principles for school system redesign, including the creation of demonstration districts.

"This report contains a blueprint to empower school districts to design their plans and meet the specific needs of their learners, educators, and communities," said Kristi Wilson, 2020-21 president of AASA, and one of the 27 "Learning 2025" commissioners. "Every district that commits to becoming a demonstration system will receive a personalized consultation and become part of a community of learners who help each other as 'critical friends' focused on student learning."



# **STUDENTS GET A PERSONALIZED LOOK AT VETERANS DAY**

#### Linden Public Schools

Linden High School students got uniquely personalized lessons for Veterans Day when two of their teachers held sessions discussing their time in the military with students around the school.

Social studies teachers Derrick Potts and Gary Mazurek talked to their classes in person while other social studies classes logged in to watch and listen through videoconference. They shared stories about their time in the Army, discussed why they joined the military, and answered student questions that ranged from "What was the food like?" to "Would you do it over again if given the chance?"

"Mr. Potts and I were incredibly humbled, and thankful, and very flattered that we were asked to talk about and answer some questions about our experiences serving in the military," Mazurek said.

Mazurek told students he enlisted in the Army infantry in 1991, going to Fort Benning, Ga., for infantry training school. He then served three years in Berlin before he was discharged in 1994 and headed to college.

He turned the bulk of the session over to Potts. whom he said "did far more remarkable and courageous things than I did."

Potts told students that he served in the Army National Guard while working as a teacher at LHS. He trained for years to work with field artillery.

"When 9/11 hit, that was the turning point for everything," he said. "Then when the Iraq War started in 2003 everything started to change."

He was sent to Iraq in 2004, where he got the chance to combine his work as a soldier with his calling as a teacher.

"I was the only teacher in my unit, and they asked if anyone was a teacher," Potts said. "So I raised my hand and this colonel says, 'Have I got a job for you.' It turned out it was one of the coolest things I've ever done."

Potts was put in charge of a school where they educated Iraqi civilians who had been arrested to give them skills to find work and to understand



the new Iraqi government.

"It was our job to educate these people the best that we could," Potts said. "It was really successful.

"I had trained for 20 years to fight with guns, and I ended up fighting a war with education."

Both Potts and Mazurek said that they entered the service looking for the direction and discipline that they needed when they were younger. When a student asked them if they would do it all over again, they gave very nuanced answers.

"I support the troops," Mazuek said. "They're all like me, working-class kids who were looking for an alternative coming out of high school. But when I think about war, I want my nation to be a nation that looks to war as the very last alternative. Just like we do in the classroom: We don't want our students fighting in the classroom. We want our students to talk out our differences and hopefully come to some sort of resolution."

Potts told students the military experience is

whatever you make of it.

"If you have an idea that it's going to be awful, then it's going to be awful," he said. "If you want to go in and learn and see different things, it's a great, great experience. I made a lot of friends and had great experiences. Did I see bad stuff? Absolutely.

"But I would do it over again in a heartbeat."



# **SCOUT EXECUTIVE SPEAKS TO ROTARY CLUB**

Marc Andreo, the Scout Executive and CEO of the Patriot's Path Council, Boy Scouts of America spoke to the Rotary Club of Westfield on Tuesday, September 21, 2021. His topic was to update the club on the state of the local Scouting. The pandemic has decreased the scouting program somewhat, but it is still going strong, and they are planning to rebuild it to where it was before the shutdown.

Paul Harris, the man who started Rotary International in 1905, was great friends with James E. West who started the Boy Scouts of America in 1910. Paul gave advice on how to spread the program throughout the US, mirroring the way Rotary clubs were spreading. Both organizations have a lot of similarities, including an ethical code, teaching leadership skills, being community based and service oriented. Rotary clubs currently charter 1,000 scout units across the US.

The Patriot's Path Council, BSA consists of 5 counties in northern New Jersey with more than 10,000 scouts and 4,000 adult volunteers. They are in the counties of Sussex, Morris, Somerset, Union and northern Middlesex. The headquarters in Cedar Knolls has only 25 full-time staff. There are two scout shops one in Cedar Knolls, and one in Mountainside.

The Council offers three Day Camps: at Watchung Reservation; Johnson Park, New Brunswick; and Camp Wheeler at Mt. Allamuchy Scout Reservation. The Council offers four overnight camping opportunities: Winnebago Scout Reservation in Rockaway, NJ; Mt. Allamuchy in Byram Township; Sabattis Adventure Camp in Long Lake NY, and the four national high adventure bases: The Summit in West Virginia; Northern Tier in Minnesota, Sea Base in the Florida Keys, and Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico.

Recent changes to the Scouts include welcoming girls to the Cub Scout and the legacy Boy Scout programs three years ago. The purpose was to include entire families in the activities. To accommodate this change, the "Boy Scout" program for ages 5th grade through age 18 was renamed the "Scouts BSA". The name of the parent organization remains the Boy Scouts of America. The Cub Scout program is for children from K through 5th grade; Scouts BSA is for children 5th grade through age 18. Other programs have been coed for many decades, including Explorers - who explore career opportunities, Venture Crews - who go on high adventure trips, Sea Scouts who learn mariner skills, and a relatively new program - STEM- in which students explore science related careers. These last four programs welcome boys and girls from ages 14 to 21.

Cub Scout Dens may be all boy and all girl, or coed. Scouts BSA Troops are either all girl or all boy. This year there are 250,000 young women in the scouts, and 1,000 girls were the first graduating class of female Eagle Scouts. Only 4% of all scouts ever achieve the rank of Eagle, making it a mark of distinction.

The residents of Westfield are enthusiastic supporters of Scouting. There are 12 units: 7 Cub Scout Packs and 5 Scout Troops, with nearly 500 youth, which is double the national average. Last year the Patriots' Path Council recognized 315 Eagle Scouts and Scouts collectively earned more than 6,200 merit badges. The Rotary Club of Westfield has been a long time supporter of the Scouts. Several members are Eagle Scouts, and many of the children of Rotarians are in the Scouting program, and a number have earned the rank of Eagle. The club likes to support Eagle Service projects financially.

Scout Executive Marc Andreo asked the Rotarians to help spread the word about local Scouting. With units and camps open again, they are seeking more youth to join the local programs. Please visit beascout.org to locate a unit near you!







# HANUKAH: A CELEBRATION OF RELIGIOUS FREEDOM

Hanukah is one of the Jewish religion's most popular holidays. No doubt, part of Hanukah's popularity derives from its proximity to Christmas and the bundling of a variety of religious, ethnic and cultural holidays that occur at this time of year creating a festive holiday season.

You might be surprised to know however, that unlike Christmas, Hanukah is not one of Judaism's major holidays. That billing goes to Rosh HaShanah (the Jewish New Year) and Yom Kippur (the Day of Fasting and Atonement) and the Pilgrimage Festivals of Passover, Sukkot and Shavuot that are explained and discussed in The Book of Leviticus (Chapter 23).

But Hanukah is important for many reasons. In the first place, next to the Passover Seder, more Jews celebrate Hanukah than any other Jewish ritual or holiday observance. We celebrate two miracles on Hanukah: the military victory of a small, outmanned Jewish army winning out over a superior Syrian-Greek King Antiochus

Epiphanes, who forbade the Jewish people to study their scriptures, keep their calendar, observe their holidays or offer sacrifices in the Temple. The King wanted the Jews to sacrifice to the Greek Gods and study the best of Greek culture. King Antiochus was jealous of the God of Israel and sought to eradicate distinctive Jewish practices and culture.

The second miracle of Hanukah is the story in Rabbinic tradition, that when the revolt ended and the Jewish people sought to rededicate and purify the Holy Temple in Jerusalem that had been defiled by the decree of King Antiochus by lighting the Menorah, the religious candelabrum that served as a major symbol of religious Jewish life in the Temple, that there was only enough purified olive oil to last for one day, but the lamp remained burning for eight days!

But I also think the story of Hanukah teaches and shares important lessons for our friends and neighbors of other faiths about religious faith and belief. To me, Hanukah represents the first

victory in human history of religious freedom. In a certain sense, Hanukah is a universal holiday of religious freedom. If the Jewish people had lost this physical and spiritual war in 164 BCE (before the common era) and 164 years before the birth of Jesus, Judaism would have died out and since Christianity and Islam emanate out of and are connected to Judaism, there would not be today any adherents of these great faiths. Judaism, Christianity and Islam exist today because of the religious faith of these defenders of Judaism to stand up for their beliefs and rights.

Hanukah also teaches religious tolerance and the celebration of pluralism. Hanukah reinforces the rights of a minority to stand up for its beliefs while living in a larger secular or religious culture of other religious faiths. Our country was built on the idea of freedom of religion and the freedom to live by and practice the customs, rituals and commandments of our respective religions. Hanukah teaches me that sometimes miracles happen in the quiet constancy of our everyday practice of our respective customs, prayers and traditions and our interaction and bonds of friendship and community responsibility with our neighbors of all religions and ethnic groups.

The most enduring symbol of both Hanukah and Christmas is the celebration of light. We light a Menorah to symbolize the miracles of our survival and the dedication of our people - for over four-thousand years even in the midst of persecution or the attempt to suppress our faith and practice – to practice our customs and traditions with hope and confidence in the future as a monotheistic ethical religion and culture.

For our Christian friends, the lights of the Christmas season represent essential religious beliefs including joy, peace, kindness and service to our fellow human beings. Even with the challenges the Covid-19 pandemic has caused, among the most difficult in our lifetimes, may the lights of our respective traditions strengthen our commitment to our respective faiths and our obligation and opportunity to make a difference in our community and in the world at large. As one great rabbi wrote: "It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness." Wishing all of us a meaningful holiday season!


