GROUND BROKEN FOR NEW FIRE HEADQUARTERS

City of Summit

On Thursday, October 28 at 10 a.m., Summit Fire Department officially broke ground on its new fire headquarters at 301 Broad St. in Summit. The 32,000 sq. ft. building is expected to take approximately 18 months to complete and will include eight equipment bays, training classrooms and streetscape simulation areas, decontamination zones, Emergency Operations Center, and a history room.

"The breaking of ground for a new fire headquarters is a significant moment in the history of the Summit Fire Department," said Summit Mayor Nora Radest. "They are not just physically moving to a new location a few blocks away on Broad Street. The Summit Fire Department is moving forward. The new building will enable them to expand resources and educational opportunities, ensuring the department is stronger and better prepared as we move into the future."

Research for the project began in 2012 and a final concept for a new fire headquarters was approved by Summit Common Council in 2019. It was designed by architects LeMay, Erickson, and Wilcox. Construction will be completed by Brahma Construction.

"We went through an extremely in-depth valueengineering process during concept development to ensure taxpayers' dollars were spent wisely and designs stayed within budget," explained Fire Chief Eric Evers. "Our new fire headquarters will be constructed with many features that

are essential in a modern-day fire station. Today, fires burn hotter, faster and are more dangerous than ever. Having the ability to train on site with training props incorporated into the building design, will give our firefighters the flexibility to pursue training activities that are geared towards successfully handling and surviving those challenges."

Evers continued: "As we move forward with the construction phase of this project, we look forward to working with key stakeholders from around the city. To complete the project, we will need the support of the entire Summit community, residents, and businesses alike."

Zagorski joined the Summit Police Department in 1989. He was promoted to Sergeant in 1999 and assigned to the Patrol Bureau. During his tenure as a Patrol Sergeant, he also served as the Auxiliary Police Coordinator, Crime Prevention Unit Supervisor and the Bike Unit Supervisor. Zagorski was promoted to Lieutenant in 2007 and served as the Detective Bureau Commander for five years. He was promoted to Captain in 2012 and served as the Operations Division Commander until 2020. He currently serves as the Support Services Division Commander.

Captain Zagorski has received numerous service awards and citations including, the NJ Honor Legion Valor Award, two meritorious service awards, two exceptional duty awards, six distinguished service awards, three unit-citation awards and 33 letters of commendation for

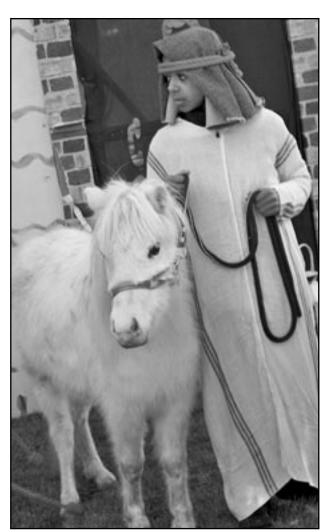

The Board of Student/Partner Alliance (S/PA), a Summit based non-profit, which supports lowincome, urban high schools in the greater Newark and Jersey City areas is pleased to announce the completion of our first in person mentor/mentee event since the start of the pandemic. More than 50 students and 18 Partners and Mentors gathered together and shared stories face-to-face on a crisp fall day. While for some mentors and mentees, this was their first in person meeting, for juniors and seniors, there were happy reunions between mentors and mentees who had to rely on zoom conversations or texts to keep their relationship

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Margaret Momber, Executive Director of S/PA notes, "We are pleased to have been able to be back safely on St Benedict's Prep campus on October 28th. To ensure the safety of our students and our mentors, and according to state regulations, we required proof of vaccination or a negative PCR test before admitting our mentors into the outdoor tent that St. Benedict's Prep hosted us in. Personally, I was so excited to reconnect with my mentees in person for the first time in 18 months."

Our traditional in-person mentoring program shifted to a virtual platform in 2020, and we have been using Zoom for our events. With the support of outside consultants, we continued to support our students throughout the pandemic, and we are continuing to operate in a hybrid fashion. This fall, we held virtual student and mentor orientation and held a virtual college preparatory information session in November.

S/PA Board Treasurer Chris Birosak notes, "Today's student luncheon at St Benedict's was amazing and a perfect example of why S/PA continues to be a positive influence on our sponsored students, not just financially but through mentorship as well."

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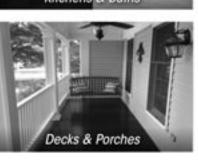
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NJ YOUTH SYMPHONY PRESENTS CONCERTS AT ST. ELIZABETH

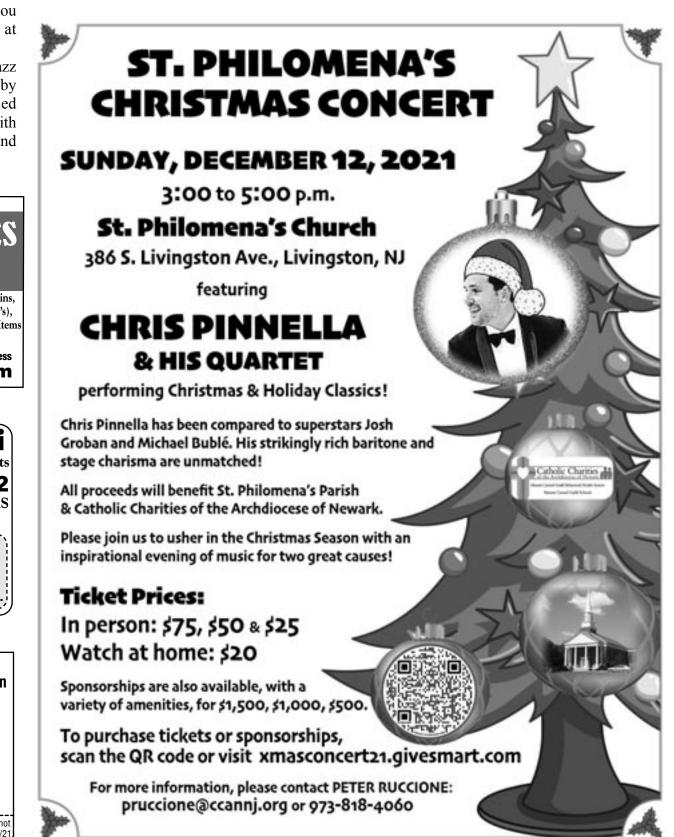

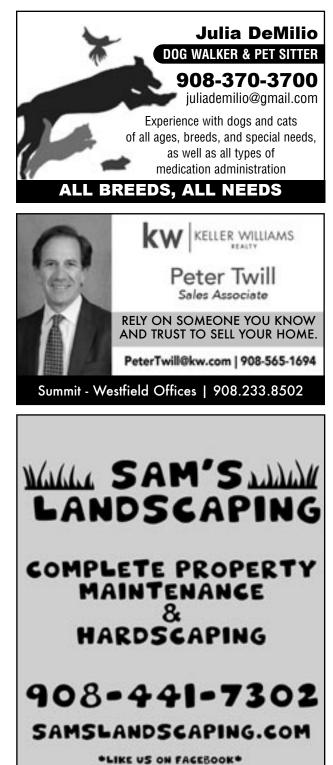

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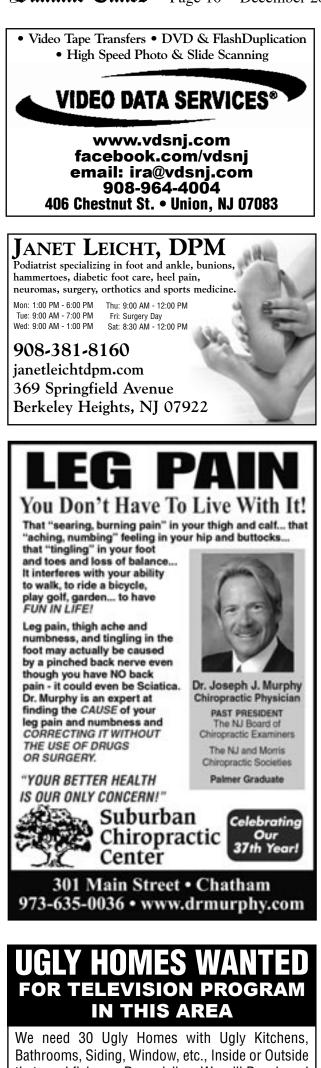
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ELF THE MUSICAL JR. TO SUPPORT SERVICES FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

A triumphant musical returning this December promises holiday cheer, a lot of laughs, and possibly too much sugar.

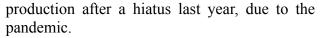

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PARK LINE RECEIVES 30K GRANT FROM RAILS-TO-TRAILS CONSERVANCY

City of Summit

The Summit Park Line Foundation was recently awarded a \$30,000 unsolicited grant from the national Rail Trail Conservancy organization to help fund the construction of the linear park and placement of a pedestrian bridge linking two sections of the Park Line over Morris Avenue.

In a statement about the grant, Tom Sexton, the Northeast Region Director of the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy said: "Through this grant, Rails-to-Trails Conservancy applauds and supports the visionary work of the Summit Park Line Foundation and the Summit Common Council to bring a dormant section of the historic Rahway Valley Railroad (RVRR) back into productive use. This public-private partnership is an example of local creativity and dedication that can be replicated in many other locations in the state."

This grant comes through RTC's Trail Grants Program, which emphasizes strategic investments in support of significant regional and community trail development goals. Many of these grants support projects that are small in scope and scale and can be hard to finance within traditional funding streams, but essential to building and maintaining trails. Through the Trail Grants Program, RTC is able to help complete and connect trails, improve the trail user experience and support local organizations dedicated to new and existing trails across the country.

Founded in 2015 by former Summit Councilmember Dr. Robert Rubino, the initiative establishes the first new park in Summit in 85 years. The former Rahway Valley rail line land was obtained from the State of New Jersey to be converted into a linear park. The goal of the park is to connect downtown Summit to neighborhoods throughout East Summit and to the county parks on the perimeter of town. Additionally, the path passes near Overlook Medical Center the Summit Family Aquatic Center, Jefferson Elementary School and the Summit Community Center. The Park Line will also serve as a pedestrian and bike path to create safer, off-street transportation routes, as well as green space.

"As an elected official at the time, I thought it was important to use the power of city government to obtain the land but to avoid using taxpayer dollars to finance it," states Rubino. "We have been able to get this far solely through private funding from individual citizens, not-forprofits and corporations."

Rubino continues: "We are doing great work, connecting neighbors and neighborhoods, and creating access to new green spaces. We are very grateful for the recognition from the Rail-to-Trails Conservancy. When a national organization of this stature recognizes our work as meaningful, it boosts the morale of our volunteers and board members and helps with additional funds for the project. The entire city has embraced the project, and unanimous approval from Common Council this month underscores that support."

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VOLUNTEER GRIEF SUPPORT FACILITATORS NEEDED

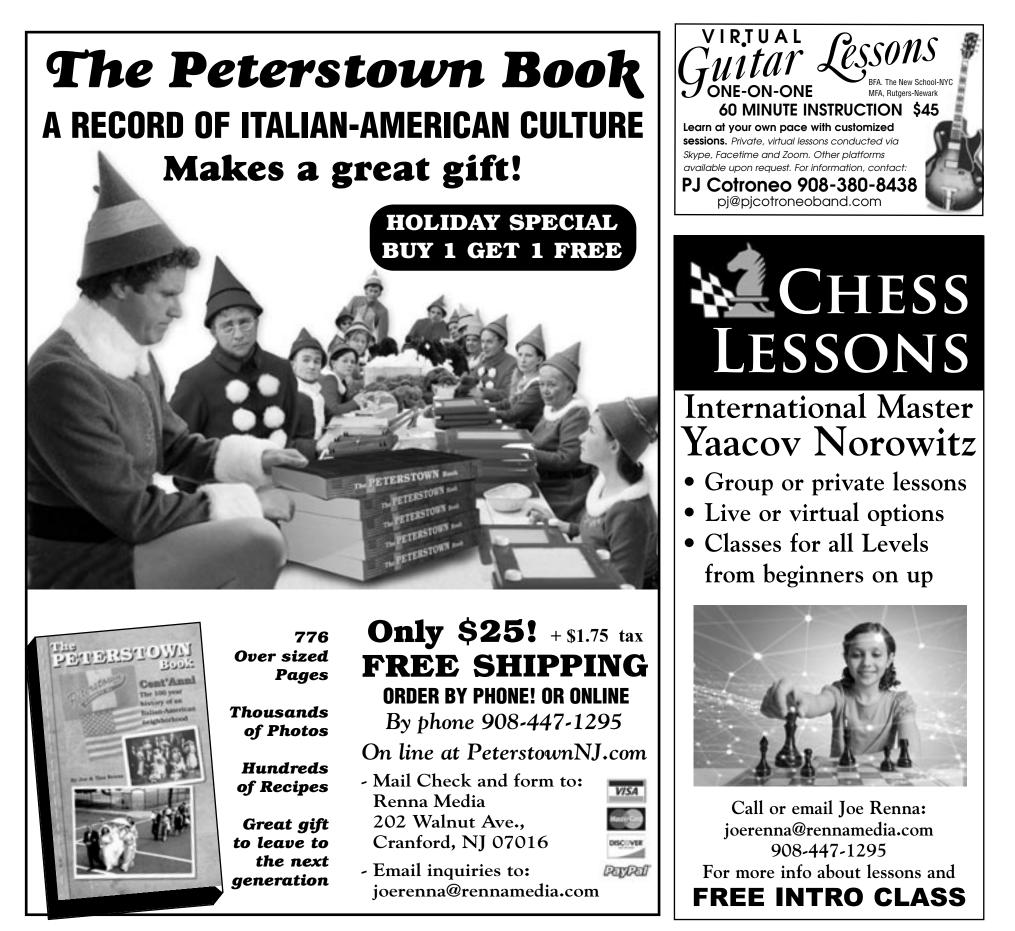
