CELEBRATE LUNAR NEW YEAR WITH SCLSNJ

On February 1st, the Lunar New Year will be to encourage children to embrace their own celebrated around the world. Welcome the Year of the Tiger with award-winning and New York Times bestselling author and illustrator, Grace Lin, and the Somerset County Library System of New Jersey (SCLSNJ) during a virtual program on January 25th at 4:30 p.m.

During the program, students in grades K-3 will digitally connect with Lin as she shares samples of her works, explains customs and stories around the Lunar New Year commemoration, as well as leads participants in an interactive drawing demonstration and Q&A session.

From illustrating to writing, the author of over a dozen children's books, has loved creating books since she was a child. Lin realized she "wanted to be an author and illustrator forever," after winning fourth place in a national book making competition when she was in the seventh grade.

"There is something about stories and storytelling, and the need to communicate and share that is inherent in all humans," said Lin. "Reading a book takes a concept that might seem foreign, and makes it familiar. When you use a book as a shared experience, it takes what is unfamiliar and makes it familiar."

The author, an advocate for diversity, aspires

unique identities and cultures, as well as explore others.

"I hope kids who read my books realize that heritage is something really wonderful and something to treasure," she said. "I hope it gives kids a glimpse into how wonderful and how magical it can be to see and experience things from other points of view and other identities. Reading books are magical and wonderful windows into other cultures."

In 2021. Lin won the Children's Literature Association Phoenix Picture Book Award for her 2001 release, Dim Sum for Everyone!. The award recognizes a work first published 20 years earlier "that did not win a major award at the time of its publication, but from the perspective of time, is deemed worthy of special attention."

The book tells the story of a young girl visiting a bustling restaurant in Chinatown with her family, where they share and enjoy variations of traditional Chinese dumplings, buns, and small snacks known as dim sum.

Attendees are encouraged to read Lin's books, The Year of the Dog and/or Bringing in the New Year, prior to the program.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT ON CARRIE BROOKNER

CASA SHaW

Our Volunteer Spotlight this month highlights one of our CASA volunteers who has been an amazing CASA volunteer for some time now: Carrie Brookner!

Carrie has been married to her husband, Jeffrey, for 27 years. They have two amazing children, Dennis and Jessica. Dennis is 24 and in graduate school and Jessica is 19 and a rising college sophomore.

When Carrie is not engaging her CASA case, she enjoys spending time with her family and traveling when possible. At home, she enjoys playing mahjongg with her girlfriends and working on home improvement projects with her husband. She also recently enrolled in a graduate certificate program in Medical Device Regulatory Affairs. Her coursework is keeping her busy!

How did Carrie come to CASA SHaW? Well, she had spent many years as an active volunteer in her children's schools, serving as PTO president and chairing a variety of events. As her children became more independent and their schools needed less parental support, she was looking for a way to make a difference in the broader community. She recently said, "when I

learned about CASA, I knew this was a great way to make a difference in the life of a child who was facing trauma or other challenges. I had the time and love to give and I feel strongly that every child deserves a trusted adult in their life who puts their needs first. It's heartbreaking to hear some of the children's stories, and I want to make sure each child has a dedicated advocate."

We also asked Carrie what she's gotten out of the "CASA experience" thus far. She said, "I have learned a lot by being a CASA advocate. The training program educated me in so many ways and further motivated me to stay involved. I have seen how truly important the 'little things' are to the children in our cases, just like they are to all kids. These children are in difficult situations through no fault of their own and they need unconditional love and support."

Carrie's current CASA child is 15 months old and she has been on her case since she was a newborn. At first this case seemed very straightforward, and it was not always clear that her involvement was making a difference in the life of a baby. However, in the last few months the case has become more complicated and demonstrated how important an independent CASA voice has been. Adoption may end up being the best for her particular case.

We asked Carrie what the most gratifying part of being a CASA volunteer has been. She said, "knowing that I really made a difference in a child's life and was able to make sure her home was safe before she returned. Hearing the law guardian often quote my reports in court, I knew my findings were taken seriously and had an impact. My CASA child really needed someone in her corner, and I am happy I was able to do that for her."

We are thrilled and happy that Carrie has been able to do that for her CASA child as well! As we are with all of our CASA volunteers, we truly are grateful for all that Carrie has done and will continue to do in the future for abused and neglected children in our region.

CASA of Somerset, Hunterdon, and Warren Counties is part of a statewide network of community-based, non-profit programs that recruit, screen, train and supervise volunteers to "Speak Up for a Child" removed from home due to abuse or neglect. CASA is the only program in New Jersey that uses trained volunteers to work one-on-one with children, ensuring that each one gets the services needed and achieves permanency in a safe, nurturing home. For the last few years the New Jersey Veterans Network and its mobile outreach team has been aggressively seeking out veterans in need and providing them resources to have a better way of life. This is only possible because of our volunteers' commitment and dedication with helping our veteran community. Donations are wonderful and help us purchase food, clothing, medical equipment and other life changing items, however someone's time is what makes an enormous difference.

During our charity's existence, we have provided meals for thousands of veterans and servicemen, dropped off PPE and clothing to veterans, provided medical equipment for disabled veterans, had 30 cars donated to disabled veterans, and most importantly we successfully saved the lives of veterans who were in some type of a dangerous crisis.

Every day we lose approximately 22 veterans to suicide and unfortunately this number hasn't changed over the years. Depression, PTSD and trauma run extremely high among our veterans and their family members. There are countless lifesaving programs out there for veterans, however it's a difficult task to get veterans to trust others and go get the help they need to live a better life.

The New Jersey Veterans Network also has a program called Operation Rebound that consists of a mobile outreach team that helps to train veterans for events like races, hiking, and other athletic activities. The goal of Operation Rebound is to do athletic events from 5k races to long distance Iron Man competitions in order to empower the veterans and show the public how people can do amazing things with the proper support. It is truly incredible to see the veterans go from no physical activity to completing these tremendous athletic challenges.

Our charity has been able to work alongside other amazing charities that always put veterans first and are capable of rapidly providing them with essential resources. Recently, we formed a veteran anti-suicide and PTSD awareness coalition, called Uniformed Heroes, that will provide peer support sponsors for any veteran in need. Our peer support sponsors will be trained by the VA and Penn Med and our goal is to have volunteers statewide to help veterans in need.

To make this upcoming Uniformed Heroes campaign successful, we are in desperate need of volunteers from both the veteran and civilian communities. There are numerous events and daily tasks that our charity could use assistance with and we are always looking to have more volunteers willing to help us reach veterans in need.

Our goal is to provide all veterans in need with a peer support sponsor that will do whatever they can to help veterans with obtaining the resources needed to live a better life. This is not an easy thing to do, but the New Jersey Veterans Network has already been able to make a huge difference because of the team's volunteers and its strong partnerships with other charities.

TONY TRISCHKA AND BRUCE MOLSKY AT ARTS CENTER - JAN 23

The Watchung Arts Center is delighted and honored to present two outstanding performers, each at the top of his field, on Sunday, January 23 at 3 p.m. Tony Trischka, "known as the father of modern bluegrass" by The New York Times, and Bruce Molsky, "one of the world's premier Appalachian-style fiddlers" from Bloomberg News, will join together in this very special performance. There's some virtuosic and joy provoking common ground in the fusion of Tony Trischka's bluegrass banjo worldview and Bruce Molsky's new, but true to tradition, old time, southern mountain fiddling and singing. Their new and old songs as well as tunes showcase the best of each, and hearing them together is always a wonderful visit between old friends.

Tony Trischka is the man who made the banjo bigger, jazzier, and more worldly! Some musicians open up whole new realms. In the world of the banjo, the music that marked the change came from Tony. Up out of bluegrass and country, then all over to roots in Africa and to heights of jazz, banjo, unbound, and Trischka set it free. "...the great banjo liberationist...", said Tom Ashbrook from National Public Radio (NPR). Trischka embraced all manners of possibilities, while keeping one foot firmly planted in the traditional bluegrass roots, which first inspired him to make music.

Mr. Trischka has, over the past half-century, garnered a reputation as one of the most influential figures in roots music. As a banjoist, he set new standards for genre-bending virtuosity, inspiring legions of younger players, among them Béla Fleck. Through his tireless efforts as an educator as well as working on such divergent projects, for example, his collaborations with his friend and fellow banjoist, Steve Martin, he's helped to elevate and transform his chosen instrument's profile within American culture. His album, This Favored Land, is a visionary exploration of Civil War history featuring an allstar cast. Tony's newest release, Shall We Hope, is a work of historical fiction that tells tales of love, loss, and hope, drawn from our nation's fraught history. The narrative is told through brilliant songwriting and stellar musicianship, with a gathering of artists that includes Michael Daves, Guy Davis, Phoebe Hunt, John Lithgow, Maura O'Connell, and Catherine Russell.

Bruce Molsky is one of the most revered "multi-hyphenated career" ambassadors for America's old-time mountain music. His authentic feel for the repertoire transports audiences to another time and place. His collaborations range from classic old-time

fiddling to Andy Irvine's world fusion ensemble Mozaik. For decades, Bruce has been a globetrotting performer and educator, a recording artist with an expansive discography including seven solo albums, well over a dozen collaborations, and two Grammy-nominations. His live and recorded work has not only drawn raves from his fellow musicians, but also the media. No Depression calls Molsky "an absolute master," while Mother Jones calls him "easily one of the nation's most talented fiddlers…he transports you, geographically, historically, and most of all emotionally". NPR says, "his playing is mesmerizing, transporting, and best experienced live."

"Performing and teaching traditional music is the biggest thing in my world," concludes Molsky. "For me, being a musician isn't a standalone thing; it informs everything I do in my life. It's always been about being creative and being a part of something much bigger than myself, a link in the musical chain and part of the community of people who play it and love it."

Tickets are \$20 per person and must be purchased in advance. Tickets will not be sold at the door. To purchase tickets online, visit, watchungartscenter.eventbrite.com. All in-house events and performances will require masking as well as proof of vaccination or a negative PCR test taken within 36 hours.

From fantastical journeys to Westeros in "Game of Thrones" and the Upside Down in "Stranger Things," to relatable experiences in Stars Hollow with the "Gilmore Girls" and Pawnee, Indiana with the crew from "Parks and Recreation," many of us took the opportunity to "quaran-stream" a variety of binge-worthy adventures during the pandemic.

Now it's time to turn off the tube, and explore new sights and destinations with the Somerset County Library System of New Jersey's relaunched Cultural (SCLSNJ) recently Adventure Pass program.

"The relaunching of the Cultural Adventure Pass program shows SCLSNJ inching ever-closer to a return to our full complement of public services," said Christopher Korenowsky, director of public services. "Twenty-twenty was a tough year for everyone and we are pleased to reintroduce this very popular service."

"The careful reopening of many of our partner locations has led us to relaunch our Cultural Adventure Pass program, and seeing the pieces come into place has been a rewarding process," said Darryl Voorhees, manager of adult services programming and collaborations, public services. We are working up to an eventual 10 locations, but currently, there are four destinations available to discover: The Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), IMAGINE THAT!!!®, Eastern State Penitentiary, and Morris Museum. SCLSNJ wishes everyone enjoyable adventures in our reemerging world."

By reserving a Cultural Adventure Pass, Library customers will have the opportunity to explore history at the African American Museum and Eastern State Penitentiary; to connect with nature at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden and Morven Museum and Garden; to discover contemporary and classic art at the Solomon R.
