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ORGAN DONOR MAURICE MURCHISON REMEMBERED

NJ Sharing Network recently honored the memory of the generous, fun-loving Maurice Murchison of Elizabeth as part of Black History Month. In life, Maurice's big-kid exuberance brought smiles to family, friends, and all those he met. In death, Maurice brought healing and the gift of life to others through the donation of his organs.

A lifelong Elizabeth resident, Maurice will be remembered for the joy he brought to others and for his simple love for being in the company of his family. He especially enjoyed playing video games and challenging his nine nephews and nieces to show them that, despite his age, he was the "Top Gamer" in the family.

"Maurice was definitely a kid at heart all the way," said Marcia McGowan, Maurice's sister. "He had great charisma and everyone seemed to connect with Maurice. He had an amazing ability to enjoy the little things in life, and he would show it with his big, toothy smile. He just had a heart of gold."

NJ Sharing Network joined in the celebration of Black History Month by sharing inspirational stories of hope of local organ and tissue donor heroes and their families who embody its lifesaving mission. According to United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS), nearly 4,000 New Jersey residents are waiting for a life-saving transplant, and 67% are people of color. Just one organ and tissue donor can save eight lives and enhance the lives of over 75 people.

"Each year in New Jersey, thousands of lives are saved and enhanced through organ and tissue donation and transplantation. Clearly, this is something to celebrate. However, there is an urgent need to raise awareness of organ and tissue donation to help save more lives in our diverse communities of New Jersey," said Joe Roth, president and CEO of NJ Sharing Network. "Although organs are not matched according to race and ethnicity, and people of different races frequently match one another, all individuals waiting for an organ transplant will have a better chance of receiving one if there are large numbers of donors from multicultural communities."

"We were not aware that Maurice was a registered donor until we were told at the hospital," said Marcia. "My father was definitely a bit hesitant and unsure at first. But then, I spoke with my dad to explain that Maurice was doing a good deed to leave a legacy and let someone else live on. We are thankful that NJ Sharing Network was there for us and continues to honor and remember Maurice and his legacy."

After having that important conversation, the entire family began to recognize organ and tissue donation as a beautiful miracle. They also understood that Maurice's decision was just another way for him to show his compassion for others.

ST. JOSEPH SOCIAL Services Capital Campaign

Elliot Dee and Mary Beth Lapham recently spoke to The Rotary Club of Westfield about the three-year Capital Campaign for St. Joseph Social Services in Elizabeth. The Rotary Club of Westfield has supported St. Joseph for decades, but most recently by making sandwiches and bringing them to the center every Wednesday for the past 94 weeks through the Covid-19 pandemic. The center provides a wide range of social services to the poor and homeless in Union County.

Ms. Dee and Ms. Lapham explained to the club that the center has been overwhelmed by the needs of the community, and the physical space is no longer meeting their needs for efficiency. Following a recent feasibility study, new plans have been drawn for an expansion project.

Currently St Joseph's runs a Soup Kitchen on Saturdays which feeds 200 people each week; provides 400 bags of food every week which feed a family of four for six days; has a program with the Community Food Bank of NJ which feeds 150 households; and runs a farmers' market. Each year the center provides 250,000 meals, and never missed a day during the Covid shutdown.

In addition to food, St. Josephs provides clothing, home goods, diapers, and school supplies to those in need. They also provide support services including mental health counseling, case management, job training, computer skills and summer camp for kids. The center accomplishes all of this with only four full time and 10 part time employees.

The Capital Campaign will raise funds for a bigger food pantry; space for clothing and home goods; renovation of the existing buildings; installing private counseling areas, and reconfiguring and repaving of the parking lot. The cost for the campaign is projected to be \$1.8 million, and is expected to take three years for the construction to be complete.

The center shares space with its sister organization, the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless. The coalition's goal is to help people who have recently become homeless to get back into society as a functioning person with a job and being able to support themselves. They house a family for a short while, assist in substance abuse recovery, provide mental health counseling, job counseling, computer skills workshops, allow them to save up the deposit on an apartment, and eventually move them out. and bring the next family in. The Rotary Club of Westfield helped the coalition construct an additional two-family house in 2007, so they now have four two family houses- housing eight families.

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SCOUT ERECTS BLUEBIRD HOUSES

Jersey, thriving in areas that were open and had sparse ground cover. Not to be confused with the common Blue Jay, Eastern Bluebirds have a brilliant blue plumage and a flash of brick red on their breast.

Due to the negative effects of pesticide use and habitat loss, the number of bluebirds declined dramatically from the 1930s to the 1970s. Aggression from non-native birds like House Sparrows and starlings also took a toll.

However, a survey of breeding birds for 2005-2015 showed the number of bluebirds in New Jersey to now be increasing by about 7% annually. This is due in part to the efforts of environmentalists and bird enthusiasts who have provided better habitat and nesting sites.

James Whelan, a resident of Mountainside, recently joined that effort. As a member of Boy Scout Troop 23 in Elizabeth, Jimmy is working toward earning the Eagle Scout rank. His interest in birds led him to work with the Union County Parks Department on his Eagle Scout service project requirement by constructing and installing twenty-five birdhouses in three county parks: Lenape Park in Cranford and Snyder Avenue Park and Passaic River Park in Berkeley Heights.

The birdhouses erected in Lenape Park and Eastern Bluebirds were once common in New Passaic River Park were built to specific dimensions that favor bluebirds and discourage or prevent use by non-native birds. All of the poles on which the houses were mounted now have metal baffles to discourage predation or entry by squirrels or raccoons. The new birdhouse in Snyder Avenue Park will be welcoming to several species of native songbirds.

> Jimmy searched online for plans for a birdhouse that would be sturdy, long-lasting, attractive to songbirds, and be easy to clean out and maintain annually. He developed a list of the lumber and fasteners that he needed for the County to purchase. And he recruited other scouts, Scout leaders, family and friends to cut the wood, assemble and seal the birdhouses, erect poles, and install the birdhouses and baffles. Working with a master carpenter, Jimmy learned a lot about woodworking and project management.
