### STUDENTS GET A TASTE OF SUCCESS AT LUNCH FORUM

Rahway Public Schools

Recently, Rahway High School students were invited to participate in the second school lunch forum of the 2021-2022 school year. The school lunch forum was created out of student-led action in reaction to school lunch quality and service. After reviewing the student survey data, High School Principal Dr. Cary Fields wanted to ensure that students were heard: "I believe in elevating student voices whenever appropriate. Students are stakeholders in the educational process and their concerns should be addressed as readily as those of staff members."

Students initially completed a survey in which they were able to express their satisfaction or concern with the school lunch, and were then asked to participate in a Q & A session with members of the school lunch management team.

Pomptonian, the food service provider, used feedback from the first forum to redesign the school menu as well as offer more choices for students in an effort to improve the quality of the food. During the second forum students were presented with smoothies, bottled water, and varied international dishes including Peruvian chicken and rice to sample.

Following the menu sampling students were able to ask additional questions. Some students were still concerned about food options for those with special dietary considerations such as vegans. Pomptonian offered several options such as black bean burgers for students with this type of diet. Additionally, Pomptonian asked students what types of food they eat when away from school. Pomptonian might then be able to mimic the food served by popular national brands to make cafeteria food more palatable to students.

Overall, students were pleased to be included in the process and be given an opportunity to voice their concerns about something that impacts them daily in school.

# PHILLIPS 66 PROVIDES DISASTER FUNDS



### EARL REED SILVERS — PROLIFIC WRITER AND RESPECTED RUTGERS DEAN

Earl Reed Silvers (1891-1948), a Rahway resident for almost his entire life, became a widely-known author of short stories and novels and a popular and respected figure on the campus of Rutgers University in a career that spanned 37 years. His achievements in the fields of literature and academia were acknowledged when he became the first Rahwayan to be selected and included in "Who's Who in America" (1926-1927), the well-known list of noted American personages. Although he was recognized well beyond the bounds of Rahway, he remained a familiar figure in the city by serving on important civic boards and taking an active part in community groups.

Silvers, whose ancestry had deep roots in Rahway, attended the city's grammar schools and graduated from Rahway High School in 1909. After graduation he attended Rutgers University where he was editor of the university's newspaper, The Targum, and the senior class yearbook, The Scarlet Letter. An all-around student/athlete, he was president of the Varsity Club and the vice-president of the Philoclean Society, a university literary group. He graduated in 1913 with high honors and was elected to membership in the Phi Beta Kappa Society.

Shortly after returning to Rahway, he became editor of the Rahway News Herald, a bi-weekly publication of local news. His tenure as editor was short lived, however, as he was called back to Rutgers to begin a career that would last almost four decades. He spent his first year in the position of Alumni Secretary and in 1916 was promoted to the office of Assistant to the President, a post he held until 1925. During World War I he directed the university's War Service Bureau and subsequently wrote a history of the Rutgers men who served in the war. After nine years on the president's staff, he was named Director of Public Information and eight years later became Director of Alumni Public Relations. It was in this position that he was

awarded First Prize for the Best Editorial of the Year (1936) by the American Alumni Council for his entry "At Rutgers No Athletics are now being Over Emphasized." The editorial was written in defense of collegiate athletes in view of reports alleging that universities were buying athletes to participate in their athletic programs. Silvers founded the Rutgers Alumni Quarterly and edited its successor, the Rutgers Alumni Monthly. In 1937 he was appointed the first director of Rutgers University Press. It should be noted that while he was fulfilling the responsibilities of these various important positions, he was educating the young men of the university as an Associate Professor of English. In 1944 he was named Dean of Men, a position he held until his death in 1948.

It was after Silvers started his work at Rutgers that he began to write. Penning his first story in 1916, he would go on to produce more than 1000 short stories, 27 adolescent-themed novels and several books for adult audiences. His Dick Arnold and Nick Beals serials were tales about the exploits of high school athletes and students. In these entertaining stories, the author always presented a sensitive and insightful analysis into the situations encountered by young adults. He was a prolific contributor to magazines, including Boy's Life, Reader's Digest, American Magazine, and Good Housekeeping, often writing under the penname David Stone. Silvers was published in so many magazines so frequently that he once wrote an article that became popular for would-be authors titled, "The Editor Accepts – How to Write Short Stories that

Magazines Buy." One of his short stories, "If in Years to Come" was dramatized by Orson Wells as a radio feature in 1941. The famous actor/director praised the story as, "One of the warmest and nicest love stories I have ever found for radio." In 1942, he was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Letters by his Alma Mater.

With all of his responsibilities at Rutgers and the efforts he devoted to his writing, Silvers still gave time and attention to his home town, most often serving on committees that involved youth. He was a member of the Board of Education, serving several terms as its president, and was an influential member of the Juvenile Advisory Panel. In 1942 he was named secretary of the Recreation Planning Committee, a group formed to find a suitable recreation facility for use by the black community. He was a faithful member and elder of the First Presbyterian Church and was active in several social clubs including the Ilderan Outing Club.

Upon his passing, funeral services were held at Kirkpatrick Chapel on the Rutgers campus. It was reported to have been one of the largest funeral gatherings in the history of the school. The Rutgers President gave the eulogy remarking, "He possessed the gift of being able to look into the hearts and minds of young men to understand their perplexities and their aspirations, to guide them, to restore confidence and hope. He was not concerned with a man's ancestry, or the color of his skin, only with the quality of his mind and the color of his heart. He had unbounded faith in students and they had unbounded faith in him."



### **POLLINATORS**

Although most gardeners rush out into our gardens at the first sign of nice weather, many professionals suggest we wait until temperatures reach fifty degrees before we clean our gardens. This is the same time when lawns begin to turn green and forsythia bushes begin to bloom.

Why? By this time many of our pollinators have come out of hibernation and are safer from destruction caused by gardeners invading their winter habitats.

Why are pollinators so important? Creatures such as bees, butterflies, birds, hummingbirds, flies and bats are essential for our survival on Earth. Humans depend on plant pollination for many resources, including nearly all the food we eat.

Plants and pollinators have co-evolved over millions of years in this win-win relationship. Although this relationship is much older than human civilization, it is now in danger around the world and in many cases, humans are to blame.

As our population spreads out, we destroy territory never occupied by humans before, cutting down trees, clear cutting forests and meadows as our population grows faster than ever before.

In recent decades manmade chemicals have been used carelessly by uninformed people to kill every insect that walks by without a second thought about our environment or their place in it. Not only do we spray indoors, chemical companies encourage us to spray outdoors also.

Bees: When we hear the word "pollinators" many of us think of bees, and with good reason. Bees are the most efficient pollinator. A single honeybee colony can pollinate 3 million flowers a day.

Surprisingly honeybees are not native to North America. They were brought by early settlers to produce honey. Today honeybees are our most important, hard-working pollinator.

A major difference between honeybees and our native bees is our native bees don't nest in hives. They tend to nest alone or in small numbers in rock crevices, shrubbery or holes in the ground.

We should not underestimate the pollinating power of native bees. Though evolution many plants and native pollinators have perfected techniques that are unique to each plant and bee, or other pollinators species.

Butterflies: Over the centuries Monarch Butterflies have captivated humans with their bright colors and annual migration during which they often appear in large groups, called a 'roost'. The Monarchs actually migrate alone and not in flocks like birds. On this journey Monarch populations depend on Native North American "Milkweeds", the only plant on which they lay their eggs.

In our area, with modern construction taking more land for development, milkweed plants are rapidly disappearing. In rural areas and farm lands, the use of herbicides is also taking its toll

on Milkweeds. This sadly has a negative effect on the Monarch population. They have less host plants for their eggs and caterpillars.

Milkweeds (Asclepias) get their name from the sticky white sap that oozes from the leaves when they are damaged. More than 100 species of this herbaceous perennial are native to the U.S. and Canada. Many have adapted to different regions of the country and a wide range of climates and terrains, from deserts and rocky areas to marshes and open prairies. Some species grow exclusively in specific regions while others will thrive in just about any habitat.

Milkweed is both a food source and the only host plant on which the Monarch lays her eggs, depositing them on the underside of the leaves. The caterpillars then feed on the leaves after hatching, but cause no permanent damage to the plant. In turn, the toxic chemicals contained in the sap of Milkweed plants make both the caterpillars and adult butterflies unappetizing and even toxic to predators.

This technique has worked so well for Monarchs, it was long believed Viceroy butterflies had evolved with similar colors and markings to mimic the Monarch and fool predators that they too are unappetizing. Recent studies now show Viceroy butterflies are also toxic.

The black swallowtail butterfly is native to eastern North America. This butterfly feeds on nectar but the caterpillar eats plants in the carrot family dill, parley, carrots, fennel and one of my favorite wildflowers Queen Ann's Lace which is not a native flower.

Because some of these herbs are common and easy to grow, many people now help these butterflies by bringing the eggs and caterpillars indoor for safety until the leave their chrysalis and can be more safely released into the wild. It is very important to ensure your herbs are pesticide free or you will poison your caterpillars. Do not feed them parsley or herbs bought in a super market.

In the wild it is estimated that only 2% of swallowtail caterpillars survive to adulthood. Birds, wasp and other predators feast on the eggs, caterpillars and defenseless chrysalis (cocoon). The goal is to help these butterflies to survive to adults and reproduce the next generation.

What can we do? Plant native species such as common milk weed, a bright orange flower that attracts Monarch butterflies for food and reproduction.

I plant beds of parsley around flower beds to give the swallowtails easy to care for plants on which to lay their eggs.

Buy a hummingbird feeder to attract them to your garden. There are recipes on line that are easy to make and store. Keep your feeder clean and change nectar (simple syrup) three times a week. Hummingbirds will quickly reject a dirty feeder. Keep nectar refrigerated until use.

If you are wary of insects please just stay away and do them no harm.



The most popular craft kits sold at the Cedar Knolls and Mountainside Scout Shops are the bird houses, bird feeders, benches and handy boxes. The men also volunteer at many of the Patriot Path Council activities for the scouts. Since they are a 501c3, they do not need to pay

make picnic tables, paint the dining hall, do sales tax, and they provide skilled labor for free. The Council has 3 camps and the volunteers are important to keep things running smoothly. Many of the scouters had children or have grandchildren in the scouts. More than half of the volunteers have been awarded the Silver Beaver Award, which is the highest National Honor offered by the Boy Scouts of America. They are an outstanding group of volunteers.

### HIRING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES IS A WIN FOR EVERYONE

### Community Access Unlimited

Ronald Vigliano has proven himself as a valuable employee with nearly 22 years of experience working at ShopRite. He prepares orders, delivers them to customers, and processes returns at the bustling store.

Tonya Hopson enjoys her job at Target and has worked at the store for 18 years, stocking and organizing in different departments and preparing drinks at Starbucks.

Vigliano and Hopson are two of thousands of people with developmental disabilities who have unique skills and a desire to work in the United States. Yet across all age groups, people with disabilities are much less likely to be employed than people with no disabilities.

The 2018 American Community Survey found that only 36% of people with disabilities were employed, compared to 77% of the total population. Further, according to a 2019 Census Bureau report, workers with disabilities earn only two-thirds as much as the average worker without a disability. Workers with disabilities have also been disproportionately affected by the pandemic, making this a critical time for inclusive hiring practices in American economic recovery.

"If they have the ability to do the work, they should be allowed to have a job," Vigliano said. "Why not?"

Vigliano's boss, Store Manager Frank Juba, said the store welcomes employees with different abilities and works to accommodate them.

"We're flexible, and a gentleman like Ron is fully capable," Juba said. "We find a position that suits their abilities."

Vigliano and Hopson receive job coaching support from Community Access Unlimited (CAU). Every week, Deirdre McCray visits them at work to provide supervision and assistance with any work-related tasks that they need, such as, learning how to use a register or taking a training test. People with disabilities that are seeking assistance in their job search, job readiness training, or businesses looking to hire people with disabilities in New Jersey, can contact CAU. CAU is an Elizabeth-based nonprofit that seeks to integrate individuals into the community through comprehensive ways.

"The people I work with know their jobs," McCray said. She added that she helps members stay on task and follow any business procedures and rules, as well as may pitch in physically depending on the member's needs.

The extensive benefits of hiring people with different abilities are becoming well-documented. A 2018 study by Accenture, in partnership with the American Association of People with Disabilities as well as Disability:IN, reports that businesses that actively seek to employ people with disabilities outperform businesses that do not. Their revenues were 28% higher, net income was two times more, and profit margins were 30% higher. Additionally, workers with disabilities have high employee retention rates, high reliability, and a positive effect on employee motivation.

Vigliano and Hopson said that working is an

important part of their lives. They feel productive during the day, get out of the house, and most importantly, earn an income that helps pay their bills and other expenses.

"I like to be out of the house and the activity
— I like to be working," Vigliano said.

Hopson said she loves the people she works with and appreciates that the store hires people with different abilities.

"There's someone at my job who is deaf, but she works great," Hopson said. "They're equal at my job and there's no prejudice or anything."

After paying bills, Hopson said her favorite way to spend her money is to take care of her dog, Lexie. For Vigliano, it's important to have extra funds to buy his favorite foods.

"We work to find the right jobs for people with different abilities, and we want businesses to see the opportunity and benefits of hiring them," said Sandra Lynch, Managing Assistant Executive



### **CHECK TREES FOR SPOTTED LANTERNFLY EGG MASSES**

### NJ Department of Agriculture

The weather is warming up, check your trees for Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) egg masses. When you find them crush them. Use an old bank card, small rolling pin or putty knife.

Citizens are advised to destroy the Spotted Lanternfly in all its forms.

### **WHY YOU SHOULD CARE**

SLF is a serious invasive pest with a healthy appetite for our plants and it can be a significant nuisance, affecting the quality of life and enjoyment of the outdoors. The spotted lanternfly uses its piercing-sucking mouthpart to feed on sap from over 70 different plant species. It has a strong preference for economically important plants and the feeding damage significantly stresses the plants which can lead to decreased health and potentially

As SLF feeds, the insect excretes honeydew (a sugary substance) which can attract bees, wasps, and other insects. The honeydew also builds up and promotes the growth for sooty mold (fungi), which can cover the plant, forest understories, patio furniture, cars, and anything else found below SLF feeding.


