EARTH DAY RAHWAY RIVER CLEAN-UP - APRIL 23

All volunteers are invited to celebrate Earth Day 2022 with Boy Scout Troop 330, Cub Scout Pack 30 and members of the Rahway River Watershed Association in a clean-up of the Rahway River on Saturday, April 23rd (with a rain date of Sunday, April 24th). The clean-up will focus on areas upstream and downstream of the dam at Winfield Park, New Jersey throughout Rahway River Park. Please plan to stop by the parking area adjacent to the waterfall of the Rahway River by the dam at Winfield Park at 8:45 a.m. to register, pick up bags, gloves, bottled water and snacks, and receive safety information.

Teams will be encouraged to travel to any part of the river within the park where they would like to perform cleanup activities but we specifically will ask folks to always work in small groups for safety purposes with folks socially distanced.

Cleaning up a river and park area is a great way to celebrate Earth Day and if you haven't participated in an event like this before, you will find it invigorating, and you will feel good about what you have accomplished. It is also fun and educational, especially for scouts and young adults as they always find something interesting. Over the 20+ years this cleanup has occurred thousands of folks have participated, including girl scouts, cub scouts, boy scouts, fishermen, local activists and citizens, and we pulled some amazing things from the river.

The clean-up will generally be between 9a.m. till noon, but any amount of time or effort that folks can volunteer is appreciated. There is always a large volume of floatable debris to pick up, and this year there remains substantial debris in the floodplain from Hurricane Ida last fall. The team working registration will provide suggestions on areas with large volumes of floatable debris.

All participants should wear jeans, long-sleeved shirts, gloves and boots, waders are welcome for folks who like to get a little wet. Each participant should bring a standard 5-gallon carry bucket with a handle (put your name on the bottom), this makes for easy carrying of "stuff" for transfer to the

large garbage bags. A mulching rake is also a great asset to have to enable reaching out and pulling debris into shore from the river bank. When we complete the event we do a basic inventory of the "big stuff" that we removed, and within approximately 24 hours Union County Parks removes and disposes of all the trash. 



125TH ANNIVERSARY CPD BRICK SALE



KATIE RABIECKI SWORN IN AS ADVOCATE FOR LOCAL FOSTER YOUTH

CASA of Union County

The new class of community members to step up and train as advocates for Union County foster youth have taken their oath before Union County Superior Court Judge Lara K. DiFabrizio and become the newest volunteers with Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of Union County.

Since 2005, the nonprofit has recruited, trained, supported and supervised nearly 600 community volunteers to advocate for more than 900 such youth, protecting best interests and ensuring needs are met in the courtroom, classroom, and community. As caseworkers, foster placements, and schools can change frequently, CASA volunteers often are the only consistent, caring adult in a youth's corner, helping ensure already experienced trauma is not exacerbated as youth await permanency in a safe and loving home.

Cranford's Katherine (Katie) Rabiecki, currently pursuing the field of social work and a mentor of Big Brothers Big Sisters. Her journey in advocacy continues now as a CASA volunteer to positively impact kids in the community.




Judge DiFabrizio presided over the Zoom swearing-in ceremony of Rabiecki and her classmates Lynda Sun Lee of Berkeley Heights, Dina Gharaibeh of Kearny, Lila Monroe of Roselle, Julia Dranishnikov of Scotch Plains, and Robert Mallard of Union. In commemoration with gratitude, Judge DiFabrizio noted, "Thank you all for your commitment, passion, hard work, and loyalty to these families that desperately need it. It takes a village and now you're a part of it." Each volunteer will now be matched to a foster youth or foster sibling set, and begin putting their 30-hour training into practice, ensuring their needs are met and best interests are protected while they await permanency.

Anyone passionate about making a difference in a child's life can apply to volunteer; there is no prior experience or background needed to serve as an advocate. Each undergoes a thorough training process and is supported by CASA staff

Judge DiFabrizio presided over the Zoom throughout their work. Successful advocates have varied life experiences and this class is no exception, as professional backgrounds include social work, education, judicial clerkship, health management, and business.

Upon being court-ordered to a case, the CASA volunteer has access to the youth's foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists, and teachers and, through their regular child visits, identify and report to the judge any concerns and needs in order to protect the child's best interests.

As the only nonprofit serving as extra eyes and ears for Union County judges hearing cases of youth in the child welfare system, the organization regularly recruits community volunteers to serve these local child-victims from birth to age 21.To learn more about CASA of Union County, how to join a training class, and other ways to Change a Child's Story, email info@casaofunioncounty.org.

She served on the board of Cranford Family Care for 17 years and contributed to Project Home of Cranford for more than 10 years. She was an honorary member of the New Jersey State PBA and a silver card member.

> Dottie was involved in countless projects to improve Cranford's downtown. Back to Nature, the health food store that Dottie and her husband Charlie owned and operated, was a vital part of the downtown for 30 years. She went on to serve more than 22 years on the Cranford Area Chamber of Commerce, where she was Executive Director for five years. With others on the Chamber, she organized the annual Pride in Cranford awards, Cranford Street fairs, Christmas and Easter activities for children and many other events.

> She will be remembered for her many years of service in numerous organizations, including the Parent Teacher Associations at Walnut Avenue School, Livingston Avenue School, Hillside Avenue School and Cranford High School. Cranford Democrats remember her for her service as a Democratic committee woman.

> If someone was hurting and needed help, Dottie was there. She volunteered as a crisis counselor for the Cranford public schools. She organized a memorial when her local school crossing guard passed away. She sent cards, meals, and whatever was needed to hundreds of friends and families.

> In her free time, Dottie's favorite things were traveling with her husband, shopping with her

her grandson, whom she adored. Her children and grandchild were the light of her life. Dottie would always take care of everyone else before herself and never asked for anything in return. She was an amazing wife, mother, grandmother, aunt, sister and friend to all.

Surviving are her husband Charlie Baniewicz, her daughter Megan, son-in-law Michael and her grandson Charlie, as well as many nieces and nephews whom she loved very much.

Upon her retirement from the Cranford Chamber of Commerce, the Cranford Township Committee honored Dottie with a proclamation on February 11th 2020.

An excerpt: WHEREAS, Ms. Baniewicz's love of her family and the Cranford community inspired her tremendous contributions to providing the Cranford community with lively, interesting and fun events such as the Chamber of Commerce-sponsored Breakfast with Santa and Breakfast with the Easter Bunny, Trolley Rides, the Downtown Tree Lighting, Street Fairs, Cruiser Nights, the Circus and networking events for business people; and Ms. Baniewicz was instrumental in organizing the Cranford World Trade Center Memorial Committee after the September 11, 2001 tragic events. With this Committee, Ms. Baniewicz has organized Cranford's annual 9/11 ceremony commemorating the Cranford residents who lost their lives on this day.





Graduation is an exciting time for high school seniors. It's a milestone that marks many achievements and allows young adults to reflect on their past as well as their future. Project Graduation is a celebration that does just that. It provides a safe, drug and alcohol-free party that gives graduates the chance to spend one last night together before moving on.

Project Graduation began in 1979, in Oxford Hills, ME, after the town experienced seven alcohol and drug related teen deaths during the commencement season that year. Cranford

Cranford adopted the tradition in 1989 and it has become much more than a single event for the senior class on graduation night. It is a community-wide planning process that strives to engage the township, support local business, and create a safe environment for our teenagers. It also gives parents peace of mind knowing their children are at a supervised function and delivers a benefit to the public knowing everyone is safer on the roads on graduation night.

As part of CHS PTSA, Project Graduation is a non-profit organization and relies on fundraising and donations to offset the costs of such a large event. Each year, approximately 85% of the graduating class attends. This year's class has 286 students and 250 are expected to join the event taking place on Wednesday, June 22, 2022.

The Project Graduation Committee is made up of parent volunteers who work closely with many in the community, including the CHS Administration, Cranford Police and Fire Departments, First Aid Squad, and others to


manage fundraising activities and the event itself. Planning began in October 2021 and so far, nearly 65 volunteers have pitched in and run nine different fundraisers such as the Holiday Lights Tour of the Town, the SouperHero Stroll and the CHS Senior Fashion Show. These community-based events leveraged partnerships with Downtown Cranford and local businesses who were essential in providing support. 





Jack the Ripper in Cranford? Unpacking Our Town's Ties to a Historic Case.

In 1891, a brutal homicide near Manhattan's waterfront led New York's coroner to announce Jack the Ripper had come to America. Amid the ensuing frenzy, police instead charged an Algerian immigrant with murder. Ameer Ben Ali finally regained his freedom more than a decade later, only after a mysterious Cranford resident came forward with an artifact from the crime scene. The killing of the woman called Carrie Brown remains unsolved today.

Recently, however, author Luke Jerod Kummer discovered evidence pointing to a fresh line of inquiry by looking more closely at the local New Jersey connection to this story, which inspired his Audible Original drama, Takers Mad.

In a special event hosted by the Cranford Historical Society, Kummer will present his new findings, while also discussing how this strange chapter in our town's past relates to a broader reexamination of prejudices in the justice system. AN OPEN LETTER TO THE TOWNSHIP OF CRANFORD **ABOUT THE INCREASE OF VEHICLE CRIMES**

The following was written by Chief Ryan J. • Lock your vehicles, take your keys. Greco of the Cranford Police Department in response to an uptick of motor vehicle thefts over the course of the past year. Released, March 16th, 2022.

During last week's New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police meeting, Acting Attorney General Matthew Platkin addressed Chiefs of Police from around the State of New Jersey about the rise in auto thefts in our State. The Attorney General ensured the leadership of Municipal Law Enforcement Agencies that his office plans to provide local police agencies with the tools and resources necessary to address auto theft in our State, especially in light of auto crimes now being associated with other violent crimes. This alarming data was recently outlined in a March 11th, 2022 article written by the Acting Attorney General Platkin and New Jersey State Police Colonel Patrick Callahan (Together, law enforcement and the public can curb NJ auto theft | Opinion).

Cranford is not immune to this auto theft crisis, seeing 34 vehicles reported stolen from our Township in just over 1 year between January of 2021 and March of 2022. During one such incident, the homeowner was nearly struck by the stolen vehicle as the actors intentionally drove toward them to flee the scene of the crime. In Cranford, we can no longer assume that these events will only result in the theft of moveable property, especially when the suspects are willing to risk significantly injuring our residents in the process of stealing a car.

Why is this happening? According to Kelley Blue Book, car theft has been rapidly on the rise since the start of the pandemic. Vehicle shortages create a high demand and when vehicles are not properly safeguarded by their owners, these "crimes of opportunity" become more commonplace. A suburban community may get a reputation for having high-end vehicles and leaving those vehicles unlocked with their key fobs readily available. The proverbial "word on the street" gets out to would-be criminals, who may easily access our community through one of two Garden State Parkway interchange locations. These vehicles are also being stolen for the purpose of being utilized in the commission of more violent crimes.

Although these statistics and events are a troubling statewide trend trickling into our community, residents should rest assured that they live in a safe Township with an expectation of finding their vehicle in their driveway each morning. Anything short of that is unacceptable, and we are working with local, County and State law enforcement agencies to combat this crisis together.

Residents can help in this effort by changing old routines and following simple steps to decrease the possibility of becoming a victim of auto theft:

- Remove valuables from your vehicle and ensure your windows are closed.
- Place fobs in purses or in jacket pockets to avoid accidentally leaving them in vehicles.
- Never leave a vehicle idling for prolonged periods of time.
- If you see something suspicious, call 9-1-1 immediately. Avoid taking matters into your own hands. The faster you call 9-1-1, the faster our officers may respond.
- Research if your vehicle has a tracking system that can be used to recover your vehicle if stolen and if so, determine how to immediately access this critical information after a theft.
- · Always have your license plate and distinguishing characteristics of your vehicle (magnets, bumper stickers) readily available. Have current photos of your vehicle in your smartphone saved under "favorites".
- If you receive Ring or Nest notifications about activity around your home, check these notifications immediately and alert police if you see actors walking up to vehicles or walking through your property – especially near driveways.

The Cranford Police Department often utilizes technological tools to track stolen vehicles entering and leaving our community. We still rely heavily on our residents' observations and home surveillance footage when conducting vehicle burglary and theft investigations. If you have a Ring, Nest, or surveillance system, please visit our free Cranford Police app and click on "CCC Program" to register your system with our Cranford Civilian Camera program.

I continue to work closely with the Union County Police Chief's Association to connect our municipal agencies with our partners in the Attorney General's Office and the New Jersey State Police to help combat this growing trend. We have voiced our frustration with some of the legislated changes to our statewide motor vehicle pursuit policy, bail reform, but most importantly, municipal law enforcement agencies not having a seat at the table during legislative decisionmaking. I am confident that Acting Attorney General Platkin and Colonel Patrick Callahan have heard our collective concerns and have mobilized their organizations to lead the way in ending the vehicle theft crisis in our State. I have equal confidence in the professionals of the Cranford Police Department who respond to, investigate, and aid in the successful prosecution of those who are committing crimes in our community. 
GEORGE WASHINGTON 250 ANNIVERSARY HALF DOLLAR
