LOCAL AUTHOR PUBLISHES BOOK THE SCHOOLING OF A 21ST CENTURY PRINCIPAL

Michael L. Cahill, of Florham Park, recently self-published a memoir entitled The Schooling of a 21st Century Principal. It conveys his various roles and experiences in education, primarily in the Millburn Township Public Schools district.

The Hoboken native and Seton Hall graduate always wanted to be a teacher. After serving at what was then the Summit Junior High for three years, there was no longer a position available to him. Cahill then worked for a year in two corporate positions in Manhattan and was interviewed in the lobby of the New York Museum of Modern Art by a Millburn supervisor who was chaperoning a field trip. It was the inauguration of 30 years of service in Millburn as a teacher, team leader, coordinator, assistant principal, and principal.

In his memoir, Cahill tells his readers that becoming a principal was never on his bucket list. The confluence of timing, mentors, and opportunity led him to his leadership post.

Cahill highlights the challenges he faced as principal, starting with the events of 9/11 on his fourth day on the job. His middle school enrollment was soaring from 513 to nearly 1200 students, making space - bond referendums and construction projects - a priority. New standards

for learning, a more demanding standardized test, and teacher evaluations hitched to the performance of students generated stress for students, teachers, and parents.

He proudly recalls wonderful highlights of his tenure as well. Several events for Holocaust survivors, including the "Prom of Your Dreams," were sponsored by Millburn Middle School. The school's peer leadership programs involved hundreds of students in service to their school and various community, national and international projects. Unique guidance programs promoted career awareness, mental health initiatives, and intergenerational communication.

The writer chronicles the many reforms and mandates that swept schools everywhere during the second decade of the new millennium, and he also details the cultural shifts in schools due to stress, school shootings, aggressive parents, and rising mental illness among preadolescents and adolescents. The Schooling of a 21st Century Principal is a portrait of the changing landscape of schools and the principalship.

HELP MINE MINERS' HISTORY

The County of Morris

"Morris County's Miners" is an archival digital collection that delves into Morris County's mining history—and it is a work in progress. Although history has recorded the names of the mining barons, the names, faces, and stories of the miners have been largely forgotten. Therefore, historians under the auspices of Morris County's Office of Planning & Preservation (MCOPP) are seeking to uncover vintage photos, facts, and stories to add to this collection.

"Our invitations to the public to assist us in compiling historical information for other projects has worked well, and we would love more information on the miners. The prize for us would be photographs," said Jan Williams, a Cultural and Historic Resources Specialist for the MCOPP.


Morris County has a deep history of mining still visible today, from the names of locations such as Mine Hill Township and Richard Mine Road, to the pits and sinkholes marking the landscape to the remnants of historic mills that processed the bounty, including the Boonton Ironworks.

Morris County historians have gathered many names from census data in Morris County, and in some cases, for example, the 1880 Census for Teabo Mine in Rockaway Township even made a distinction between an individual who works in mine and a miner. Morris County has included them all in "Morris County's Miners."

"Also included are those who made their living in service to miners: shopkeepers, physicians and contractors," Williams added.
