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# 53RD ANNUAL EASTER EGG HUNT – APRIL 9

The New Providence Lions will be hosting their 53rd annual Easter Egg Hunt on Saturday, April 9, 2022, at Oakwood Park in New Providence. The hunt is open to all New Providence Pre-School, Kindergarten, First and Second Graders.

According to New Providence Lions Club President Tom Montrone, "For over 50 years, the Easter Egg Hunt has been a long-standing tradition for the New Providence Lions Club. This year is particularly special, as we will be returning to our traditional Easter Egg Hunt celebration at Oakwood Park, which we have organized since 1969. While last year's Easter Car Parade was terrific in its own right, we feel blessed to return to our traditional event. We're all looking forward to having a good time with the children and their families."

The Hunt will take place Rain or Shine, with festivities beginning at 9 a.m. near Oakwood Park's Picnic area, accessed from Woodbine Circle and Roessner Place. At that time, Lions volunteers will be handing out balloons to the kids, and New Providence EMS and Fire and Police Departments will be on hand with their vehicles for viewing, dressed in their Superhero costumes to pose with children and their families. Teachers from Allen W. Roberts, Salt Brook and Our Lady of Peace Schools will also be there to greet the children and their families. The Easter Bunny will arrive at 9:15 a.m. to greet the families as a prelude to the actual Easter Egg Hunt, which will begin at 9:30 a.m. sharp! There will be thousands of colored eggs to be found. The children who find the special Gold and Silver eggs will receive chocolate bunnies as special prizes.

Families should plan on arriving at least 15 minutes before the 9:30 a.m. start of the Hunt, and later arrivals may have to park curbside on nearby streets. The Lions ask that parents be courteous and respectful to residents near the Roessner Place entrance to the park, and consider carpooling with friends.

# **CLUB Z! TUTORING RAISES MONEY FOR HIGH SCHOOL PTSA!**

#### DONATIONS

As in the past, the Summit College Club's Book Sale will fill the American Legion Post 433 next to the Library at 357 Elkwood Avenue in New Providence. Readers with books to donate should bring them to the American Legion Post, on three days only: April 18th from 1 to 7 p.m., and April 19th and 20th, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The sale accepts a variety of media in good condition: books, CDs, DVDs, etc. The only items not accepted are encyclopedias, magazines, manuals, and textbooks.

As in past years, for the customers' convenience, volunteers will sort the items for sale into about 50 different categories, ranging from astronomy to zoology. Traditionally the

# The Book Sale itself will occur from April 21 through 24. Nearly all the items will sell for either 50 cents, one or two dollars. The opening day, April 21 from 9 a.m. -2 p.m., has a \$25 admission charge; although everyone is welcome, the customers on that day are typically book sellers from the tristate area.

The next three days, April 22 through 24, are free of charge. Hours are: Friday the 22nd, from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.; Saturday the 23rd, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.; and Sunday, Bag Day, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. On Sunday, the final day, readers may fill a grocery bag with books of any type for \$5 or with electronic media for \$10.

Masks are required to enter the hall during donations and the sale.

Summit College Club, a branch of the American Association of University Women, is dedicated to advancing gender equity through research, education, and advocacy. The profits from the SCC Book Sale help fund annually awarded scholarships for local college-bound high school seniors. Last year alone, the club gave away \$24,000.

Volunteers are more than welcome! Men and women are needed to gather, categorize, and arrange the books before the sale, and to straighten the various book areas during the sale.

Anita Meritt, membership chair, notes that several current members were originally volunteers, who, seeing how the sale worked and enjoying the camaraderie of the members, joined Summit College Club.
