STUDENTS STEP UP FOR COMMUNITY SERVICE WEEK

Westfield Public Schools

The Westfield Public Schools community demonstrated its considerable civic-mindedness in March, with students across the district packing lunches, designing greeting cards, making care packages, picking up litter, and participating in many other activities as a way of giving back to those in need.

Whether a Community Service Night or a Week of Service, parent volunteers coordinated and organized the many activities at each of the ten schools. At Washington Elementary School, for example, students gathered in the gymnasium on March 24 to lend a helping hand, painting and potting plants for local senior citizens, making animal beds and toys for a nearby animal shelter, decorating baby onesies for the non-profit organization Moms Helping Moms, packing "grab and go" bags for St. Joseph Social Services Center, and sending treats and thank you notes to local police officers, emergency medical technicians (EMTs), and firefighters.

Additionally, Washington 5th graders participated in a targeted clean-up of Mindowaskin Park on March 25, part of a collaborative project with the Garden Club of Westfield, the Westfield Department of Public Works, and the Town of Westfield to renovate and plant a native wildflower garden on a hillside slope.

"The students raked and cleaned up trash and debris in preparation for spring and summer planting," says Washington PTO member Nicole Ozturan. "We hope to get them back before the end of the school year so they can throw down some wildflower seeds. The field should be there for years to come so we hope they can see the results in the future."

Wilson Elementary students collected toiletries during the week of March 14, with each grade assigned specific items to contribute to the supply kits packed by student and parent volunteers and donated to St. Joseph's.

During the week of March 21, Roosevelt Intermediate School students wrote words of encouragement to Ukrainian children, sent letters of thanks to health care workers, cleaned up

nearby Clark Park, and collected and organized non-perishable food items to be distributed to local families and individuals facing food insecurity.

And during Westfield High School's Week of Service beginning on March 21, students, staff, and families collected approximately 1,200 toiletry kits for a local food pantry, sent more than 800 thank you notes to healthcare workers at Overlook Hospital, collected thousands of books for Friends of the Westfield Memorial Library and dozens of bags of gently used summer clothing for a community in Cartagena, Columbia, and raised hundreds of dollars for the Wounded Warrior Project.

"To finish the Week of Service, we presented our WHS nurses with thank you cards and flowers," say WHS Community Service Club advisors Zorana Culjak and Gregory Bowers.

Superintendent Dr. Raymond González thanked all who organized and participated in Community Service Week, adding "I have been impressed. but not surprised, by the giving spirit of the Westfield school community which embodies the district's mission to educate our students to be productive, responsible and well-balanced citizens who respect individual differences and diversity in an ever changing world."





For adults we offer a Zumba & More class on Monday evenings at 7:00 p.m. It combines a full body workout to lively music while you strengthen your core and increase your flexibility in a 50-minute class. 





Westfield Preservation Commission

The Westfield Historic Preservation Commission will celebrate National Preservation Month on Monday, May 23, from 7 to 9 a.m. with a "meet & greet" and free coffee at the historic South Avenue train station kiosk. Members of the commission will be on hand to discuss local preservation efforts and answer questions over coffee donated by Boxcar, the concessionaire for the recently restored newsstand.

"We are delighted to have this opportunity to showcase the kiosk among the town's recent preservation successes," said Maria Boyes, chair of the Historic Preservation Commission. "Several of our most beautiful neighborhoods were set in motion by the arrival of the railroad, so it makes an especially fitting platform to celebrate Preservation Month."

Dating to 1893, the Union News Company kiosk is believed to be the last of its kind still in operation and serves as "a physical remembrance of a time when newspapers controlled the flow of information throughout the United States and the railroad controlled the country's mobility," according to the historic designation report. Originally located by the North Avenue station, it was moved to the south side in 1980 where it began selling coffee as well as newspapers to morning commuters.

"Boxcar is thrilled to partner with the town of Westfield in celebrating the restoration and reopening of this historic gem," said George Garcia, manager of The Kiosk by Boxcar. "We look forward to carrying on a long tradition of serving commuters while adding some very 21st-century amenities."

The Historic Preservation Commission was established in 1984 to promote and protect Westfield's rich architectural heritage as an essential element of the town's unique character. In addition to preserving historical structures, the Commission encourages property owners to follow restoration standards through its advisory services and recently updated Design Guidelines for Historic Sites and Districts. 





NEW DEALS FOR OLD WHEELS

On Saturday, May 7, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, Faith Lutheran Church, 524 South Street in New Providence, will again be collecting second-hand bikes for use by adults and children in third world countries. The collection is being conducted on behalf of Pedals for Progress, an organization which annually recycles 6,000 bicycles for persons in developing countries. Anyone with a bicycle in repairable condition is urged to donate to this worthy cause. Bikes may be dropped off at the parking lot next to the church. On that day, members of Faith will repair and process the bikes for shipment by P4P.

Since 2002, Faith Lutheran has been collecting bikes for P4P. In 2021, five hundred sixty-four bikes were collected from persons and organizations in New Providence, Berkeley Heights, Mountainside, Westfield, Chatham, Warren, Scotch Plains and Fanwood. The collection by Faith occurs throughout the year. The range of towns was aided by articles published in Renna Media publications.

Every year affluent Americans buy 22 million new bicycles and discard millions of old ones, abandoning many more in basements, sheds and garages. Most of these end up in our already overburdened landfills.

P4P ships its reconditioned bikes to persons in need of countries in Latin America, Africa and Asia. The bikes provide reliable transportation to commute to work, transport produce to market, access health care and other services. Steady employment for adults is vital to the development and success of these economies.

P4P reports that the cost of shipping bikes has increased significantly in recent years and now presents a substantial financial burden to P4P. Last year, Faith contributed \$3,000 toward the shipment of the bikes. Persons donating bikes gave \$1,273 toward shipment. P4P is asking persons to donate \$15 toward the shipping costs, if they are financially comfortable doing so. Donation or not, Faith welcomes all bikes in repairable condition.

Since 2016, the chairperson of Faith's Pedal for Progress ministry has been Casey Walsh of Bridgewater, a long-time member of the church.







WESTFIELD HALL OF FAME 2022 INDUCTEE: CLARA "CHIC" BOLGER — MILLER-CORY HOUSE MUSEUM FOUNDER

The Westfield Historical Society

Clara Bolger, known as "Chic" to her family and friends, was born and raised in the Bronx, the only child of a local school teacher and a NYC Police Inspector. After graduating from Bucknell in 1947 as a psychology and sociology major, she moved to NY and took a job with the Vick Chemical Company. There she met William Bolger, whom she married in 1951; they moved to Westfield several years later. While raising their three daughters in Westfield, Clara became involved in many civic activities, among which were serving as a speechwriter for Robert Mulreaney (Mayor of Westfield from 1965-68) and doing volunteer work for the Westfield Service League, the NJ League of Women Voters and the Friends of the Westfield Memorial Library. However, most of us would agree that Clara's most significant work was as a founder of the Miller-Cory House Museum. This year, 2022, is the 50th anniversary of the Miller-Cory House Museum, so it seems only fitting that Clara Bolger be honored today. If it weren't for Clara, Westfield would not have the Miller-Cory House Museum to be celebrating!

Clara had gone to an historic house tour in a neighboring town and was not impressed, feeling that Westfield could do it better. The Westfield Service League sponsored a well-attended tour of historic homes in Westfield and the Jones House was on the tour. Through that, she met and became good friends with Donald and Isabel Jones. When they decided to move, knowing that Clara loved the house, they contacted her to see if she wanted to buy it. Having recently finished a big renovation to their Tremont Avenue house, Bill responded with an emphatic "No". Instead, she had the idea of turning the house into a living museum. And so the journey began.

As Clara was well known in town, she was able to reach out to people who could help the dream become a reality. One of her meetings was with several past mayors - Bob Mulreaney, Emerson Thomas, Charles Bailey – and with a potential financial resource, the Wallace Foundation. The mayors became believers (even if some were reticent), and soon the Citizen's Committee to Preserve the Miller-Cory House was formed, including Trustees of the then small and fairly inactive Westfield Historical Society, who provided the museum with its non-profit status. As Clara tells the story, she received a call from Betty Pate at 11:30 one night - "You don't know me, but you need me" - and their partnership and great friendship were quickly established. Betty Pate is also a Westfield Hall of Fame member recognized for her tireless efforts on behalf of Westfield, Union County and New Jersey history.

Fundraising to purchase the house was critical, as was getting many people on board with the overall idea. While large individual donations and grants from foundations provided the bulk of the funds, several of the grassroots fundraising ideas and events increased visibility and support from

the community. Cherry Pie Socials – to host and attend – became all the rage. The merchants down town agreed to have the streets closed to cars so that activity booths could be set up. The booths educated and demonstrated crafts, cooking and skills of the 1740s. These same booth ideas became the programming for the Miller-Cory House. The merchants found the day to be very successful and the "Fall Festival" was started. A Volunteer Committee was established and run primarily by Clara. Her contacts and the fundraisers brought in any interested volunteers while Betty trained and educated the docents. Betty insisted on authenticity. Clara knew about programs and education in Williamsburg and Sturbridge Village to achieve that goal and set up field trips for the volunteers. It took a village to create a robust, volunteer-led Miller-Cory house

Museum. But it was Clara who brought it from a dream and a house – to a living museum!

Clara was always interested in the world around her. She had great concern for and openness to other people and maintained deep friendships with her closest friends. She was spirited and great fun, and many of us still treasure her uproarious laughter. Seeking warmer weather and appreciating the history of the area, Clara and Bill retired to Williamsburg, VA in their later years. There she continued to pursue her interest in American Colonial history and continued to show her concern for others through volunteer work at the Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg and marching with her daughters in support of women's reproductive rights in Washington, DC. Although Clara turned 95 on April 20, 2020, when COVID cases were climbing, this did not stop her quest for fun. She had a birthday party on Zoom with her three daughters who live in New York and Scotland. Even in her final days she was a real adventurer with a fantastic spirit, and those who knew her will always remember her as an intrepid woman ahead of her time.

The Westfield Hall of Fame is a Committee of The Westfield Historical Society which has named nine inductees for the 2022 Hall of Fame Class. In addition to Clara "Chic" Bolger, they are Allen Chin, Samuel Downer Sr., Ralph Jones, Charles R. Morrison Sr., James & Melba Nixon, Nancy Priest, Theodore K. Schlosberg, and Mabel L. Sturgis with Helen French Welch. The Hall of Fame Committee has a long list of qualified candidates submitted by the public for its consideration in future inductions. The 13 members of the 2022 Hall of Fame selection committee are planning the induction ceremony for October 7, 2022. Historical Society members and the public at large are encouraged to submit profiles of persons believed to be strong candidates for the Westfield Hall of Fame to the Westfield Historical Society, P. WESTFIELD HALL OF FAME 2022 INDUCTEE: DR. THEODORE K. SCHLOSBERG – MAKING WESTFIELD MUSICAL

Dr. Theodore K Schlosberg, also known as Ted, is a Westfield resident who has contributed significantly to the lives of its residents of all ages for the past fifty-one years. His work has allowed people to develop their talents and skills while enriching their lives. He began teaching band and orchestra instrumental music at the Edison Intermediate School in 1967 and retired in 1996.

In the summer of 1972, in response to parent and student requests for musical options during the summer, Dr. Schlosberg founded The Westfield Summer Workshop. The Workshop's popularity grew, and over the next few years it evolved into musical theater, drama and dance, fine arts and crafts, language, writing, pre-school classes, and special interests. It was designated a 501(c)3 organization and eventually became The New Jersey Workshop for the Arts. Some of the Workshop students became famous in their own right, namely Colleen Sexton, a Broadway show star vocalist, and Matt Sklar, composer, conductor and performer.

In addition to teaching music, Dr. Schlosberg plays and teaches brass, woodwind, string and percussion instruments. His main instruments are Trumpet, Alto Saxophone, Violin, Viola Cello, Baritone, French horn and the Alphorn. He has played TAPS on Memorial Day, Veterans Day, on 9/11 days, and for police and fire department funerals since 1960.

His accomplishments are numerous. He directed The Westfield Community Band for seven years and developed it into a year-round band. He initiated Westfield ensembles that have participated in various Westfield festivals and events such as First Night and holiday events.

Ricola, USA engaged him to record the Alphorn for commercials and play at special events. Ricola also sponsored him to study performance techniques in Switzerland in 2002 at the Swiss Alphorn Academy with the renowned Jozef Molnar. He played the Alphorn at the United Nations by invitation from the Swiss Mission, played for The Year of the Mountain and for when Switzerland became a

member of the United Nations. He was invited by the Consulate General of Switzerland to perform at the landing ceremony to welcome the first solar-powered airplane, the Solar Impulse, in New York's JFK Airport, and at Dr. Ruth's 80th birthday party.

A Westfield Foundation Grant enabled him to begin The Music Connection program for special needs students who are developmentally and/or physically handicapped, to play musical instruments.

He has received many honors including the Westfield Historical Society Award, The TCNJ distinguished Alumni Music Award, Westfield Downtown Corporation Plaque, Rotary Club Emerson Thomas Award, and The New Brunswick Education Foundation Hall of

Distinguished Alumni Award, etc.

Dr. Schlosberg has helped organizations with funding their projects and has entertained music lovers with concerts, street fairs and has filled the air with music while maintaining Westfield's reputation as an outstanding town for the arts.

Ted and his wife Kitty have a combined family of four children including ten grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. For the past thirteen years they have helped raise three of their grandchildren after Kitty's daughter passed away.






