Summit Troop 67

On June 4th, four Boy Scouts from Summit's Troop 67 were honored in a joint Eagle Scout Court of Honor ceremony held at Maskers Barn in the Watchung Reservation's Deserted Village. The ceremony was a celebration that recognized the achievements of the Scouts and officially bestowed the rank upon them. Members of Troop 67, family members and friends of each Scout, as well as local dignitaries, including Summit Mayor Nora Radest, Common Council President Marjorie Fox, and Common Council members Greg Vartan and Lisa Allen, attended the ceremony. The Scouts who achieved the Eagle Rank were:

JACK DETWEILER (6.18.2021) Jack's project involved constructing three benches and installing them alongside Martin's Brook Trail in Summit to provide a place for people to relax and enjoy nature. He also defined the trail with fallen logs and timber to make it easier to find and safer to use. An animal shelter was also built near the trail utilizing natural materials.

SEAN MCCORMICK (7.26.2021) Sean's project involved the installation and construction of a new and easily accessible platform for the Summit Volunteer First Aid Squad's trash and recycling containers. Stone pavers were also installed in the back entrance of the property to improve overall accessibility to the building. **JOSH MOORE** (2.24.2022) Josh's project involved building an outdoor classroom at Brayton Elementary School in Summit to be used for in-school and after-school activities. During the pandemic, the classroom gave the teachers a safe and defined space to teach outside while allowing mask breaks. The project revitalized an area of the school that had been worn down over the years.

ANDREW SIRABIAN (7.26.2021) Andrew constructed five benches and installed them on the grounds of St. Hubert's Animal Shelter in Madison. The benches prevent the dogs from digging under the supports of the pavilion on the site, as well as provide people with seating opportunities.

Nationally, only 8% of all Boy Scouts earn Scouting's highest honor. To be considered for this rank, a Scout must first fulfill requirements for 6 other ranks, including community service and leadership hours, earn 21 merit badges in different disciplines, including 13 required skilland civic-based badges, as well as conceive, design and execute a capstone community service project. Each of these four Scouts was able to earn the Eagle Rank by embodying Scouting's core values, including the development of good personal conduct, outdoor skills, citizenship skills, leadership skills, and respect for others.

125TH ANNIVERSARY OF FAITH LUTHERAN

1897 was the year that the current Faith Lutheran congregation was created in Summit, NJ and whose members adopted a constitution. Since many were Swedish immigrants, the members named their religious society, the Swedish Evangelical Lutheran Salem Congregation.

The next year, the congregation constructed a church building on Morris Avenue in Summit. Regular church services began.

In 1957 in response to a need for a Lutheran Church in the New Providence-Berkeley Heights area, the Summit congregation, whose facilities required expansion, moved to its current location, 524 South Street, New Providence. The congregation officially changed its name to Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church of New Providence.

On Sunday, June 12, 2022, Faith Lutheran Church of New Providence began the celebration of the 125th year of its founding. The day commenced with a festival worship service at 11 a.m. It was conducted by Rev. Jane McCready, pastor of Faith, and Rev. Robert Kriesat, Rev. Markus Vaga, pastoral associates of Faith.

Enhancing the special service was the music, led by Shea Velloso, Faith's minister of music. The sanctuary choir sang. A piano duet with Faith member, Nancy Coleman, played. Guest instrumentalists and organist, Mr. Velloso, played prior to and during the service. The congregants, regardless of their vaccination status, wore masks as a visible sign of love for neighbor.

Subsequent to the service, a luncheon was held in Faith's Educational Center, Franklin Nelson Hall. Socializing and reminiscing were thoroughly enjoyed by the guests. Games were available to the children.

June 12, 2022 was only the first of subsequent occasions on which Faith will be commemorating its 125th anniversary.

SUMMIT EMS RESPONSES – MAY 2022

Summit's EMS Volunteers answered 194 emergency calls in May. These included 116 medical emergencies: 26 falls; 18 motor vehicle accidents, including two on a highway, two into a pole or tree, and one into a building; 12 traumatic injuries; eight cases of overdose or poisoning; one allergic reaction; one animal bite; five responses to a medical alarm, three pedestrians struck by a vehicle, and one woman in labor. Squad Volunteers also provided two "lift assists" to patients who did not require transport to a hospital.

On May 2, Squad members staffed 3 ambulances to respond to 3 simultaneous 9-1-1 calls, just as they had done the previous Monday, April 25. Squad members also responded to the Short Hills Mall on May 21 when there were multiple emergencies following a power outage and participated with all 4 vehicles in Summit's Memorial Day Parade.

Last month, 11 emergency calls were answered by an off-duty "back-up crew" of volunteers responding from home or work when the on-duty crew is busy. There were also 17 emergency responses by Summit to provide mutual aid assistance to four neighboring towns.

Summit's EMS Volunteers answered 194 16 patients transported to a hospital by Squad mergency calls in May. These included 116 members also received advanced life support care from hospital-based paramedics who accompanied the Squad's ambulance.

The Squad answers calls for help 24 hours a day and at a variety of locations. May responses included 77 to a patient's home or apartment; 33 for accidents or medical emergencies on roads or highways; eight in public buildings; two in a public park; one on an athletic field; 19 at a local business; two at a school; one to a health care providers office; and one to an industrial facility. There were also six medical incidents on sidewalks; three in parking lots; 11 at Summit's Train Station; 15 at a local behavioral health facility; nine to an assisted living facility; and seven on the grounds of Overlook Medical Center.

The all-volunteer First Aid Squad, responds to emergency calls 24/7, is entirely funded through private donations and does not bill for service. The Squad is always looking for new volunteers to join its ranks. All needed training, uniforms and equipment is provided. Rutgers Garden Helpline is staffed by trained volunteers to assist the citizens of their county with continuing educational opportunities supplied by Rutgers agricultural department during the year.

Or clients can bring a plant, lawn, or insect samples to the office. Specimens are the surest way to guarantee a proper identification.

Hours are Monday to Thursday, 10 a.m. until 2 p.m., and Friday 10 a.m. until noon.

The Garden Helpline volunteers are well trained to identify tick* species including 'deer ticks' which transmit Lymes disease to humans and pets.

This is an extremely valuable service as the deer and tick populations continue to grow in New Jersey.

The Asian Lantern-fly invaded Union County last spring and has already damaged many fruit trees and vines. The Helpline will keep you updated on the latest information how to control this colorful but destructive leaf hopper.

In addition to garden critters the Helpline will identify house infesting insects such as carpenter ants, termites and food infesting pest.

The City of Summit's 75th annual Fourth of July celebration will take place on Monday, July 4, 2022, at Soldiers Memorial Field, located at 5 Myrtle Ave. The community celebration will include entertainment, rides and amusements, and a food court.

NEW RECYCLING VENDOR AND SCHEDULE CHANGE

The City of Summit has contracted with a new recycling vendor, Grand Sanitation Service, for household recycling pickup. The new contract and all subsequent changes will go into effect on Friday, July 1, 2022.

The pickup schedule for household curbside collection will change under the new contract. Instead of the current, citywide collection day on Thursday, pickup will now occur five days a week, on the same day as residents' weekly trash collection. View the trash collection schedule on the city website.

If pickup falls on a holiday or snow day, recycling will be collected the next day, and every collection during that week will move forward one day. Recycling will not be picked up on the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas Day.

Household curbside recycling will now operate as a single-stream collection; cardboard and paper items can be placed in the same container as plastic and glass items. Clean and dry recyclable items should be placed in covered containers at the curb. Wet cardboard and paper cannot be recycled.

President Lynne Rogerson commented: "During the last two years SCC continued to award scholarships, just as we had for more than one hundred years of our history, but the covid pandemic made a difference. We were not able to hold our annual Book Sale, which helps fund the scholarships, until this year; nor we were able to come together in an awards ceremony to meet and greet the winners. So we're happy to be back. We're happy to be together with the honorees and their families."

The first speaker was due to be Sydney Villegas, a 2020 scholarship recipient. The Club had sponsored Sydney's participation in AAUW's National Conference for College Women Student Leaders. Unfortunately, Sydney herself was quarantined, but she sent in her speech, which praised the conference and how much she had learned from it.

Then Anna Torell, a 2021 scholarship recipient, spoke about her first year at college. Anna, who is a world-class synchronized skater and an impressive artist in ceramics, spoke of the rich array of clubs, classes, and activities that she participated in at the University of Michigan.

Lara Cota was awarded the final SCC Merit Scholarship. At Summit High School, Lara was captain of the women's cross country team, played the lead clarinet in the marching band, and wrote for the school newspaper. An activist for both gender equity and cultural awareness, Lara speaks Spanish and Croatian in addition to English. Lara will attend the University of Pennsylvania, where she will study law, journalism, and psychology in anticipation of a

The presenters were Ellie Redington, Barbara Sayres, Kathy Tatlow (committee co-chair), Susan Abely, and Kathy Brock, all members of the scholarship committee. Also on the committee were Jee-Hoon Krska and Marilynn MacLean (co-chair).

After the ceremony was over, the room adjourned to refreshments, congratulations, and the students' happy anticipation of college in the fall.
