
Freshmen, Sophomore and Junior parents, please consider getting involved with Project Graduation in the future.

Project Graduation includes many activities throughout the year including a Senior Breakfast in the fall, Prom Fashion Show in February, a











### **GENE JANNOTTI RECEIVES NJBIZ ICON HONOR**

Gene Jannotti, CEO of GWACC (Greater Westfield Area Chamber of Commerce), received the NJBIZ ICON Honor Award during a breakfast held on June 28, 2022, at The Palace at Somerset Park. This award recognizes New Jersey business leaders over the age of 60 for their notable success and demonstration of strong leadership both within and outside of their chosen field.

Gene graduated Cum Laude from Siena College in Loudonville, NY and was elected to Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. He received a

Following a military service as an officer in the US Army Reserves, Gene began a career at New York Telephone (NYT) Company in the fledging computer department as a programmer assistant, ending his career there as a Division Manager. NYT selected Gene to attend the Master's Degree Program for Executives at Columbia University where he graduated with an M.S. in Business Policy. Upon retirement, he joined Bell Atlantic Yellow Pages as Vice President and Chief Information Officer. With the merger of Bell Atlantic and NYNEX, Gene left the Bell System to join Computer Sciences Corporation (CSC), an international outsourcing and consulting firm, as a Director of Operations. Gene managed the outsourced IT department of General Dynamics; performed transformation services for companies such as Nortel, Motorola, and the NSA. He then moved to the CSC consulting division and worked for several Fortune 500 companies managing large IT projects for them. He spent one year in Asia working for AIA, at the time when they were the Asian insurance subsidiary of AIG, and for Manulife Insurance, operating as John Hancock in the United States. His wide range of program and project management skills and experience gave him the opportunity to work for many diversified corporate clients. His projects were valued at several million dollars.

Upon retiring from CSC, Gene joined GWACC, the Greater Westfield Area Chamber of Commerce in 2014. He raised the membership


level from 260 business members to approximately 500 now. The Chamber started a 501c3 Foundation with the purpose of providing scholarships to high school students in the five towns served by GWACC, Fanwood, Garwood, Mountainside, Scotch Plains and Westfield and to also provide grants to non-profit GWACC organizations.

In 2016, he received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Patriots Council of the Boy Scouts. Gene is a past member of the Trinitas Medical Center Foundation Board, a past President and current member of the Board of Trustees of the Union County Performing Arts Center and currently on the Board of the Union County College Foundation. He is also Vice President of the World County and Line DanceSport Federation and had competed Internationally in line dance competitions. Gene enjoys dance, world travel, golf, music and reading James Patterson novels, his high school friend.

Westfield Service League Co-Presidents Rosann LiVolsi and Susan McClelland recognized the organization's first two volunteer interns during a membership luncheon held on June 7 at the Echo Lake Country Club. The students, Nina Johnson and Leah Weiss, have volunteered at the League's Thrift and Consignment shops this past year.

LiVolsi and McClelland thanked the students for their energy and enthusiasm and presented each with a check for \$250, a gift certificate to the shop and a basket of college essentials — a small token of appreciation to begin their college careers.

Johnson is a graduating senior at Scotch Plains Fanwood High School and plans to attend New York University in the fall. In accepting her gifts, Johnson described how impactful volunteer service has been to her.

She began volunteering at the shops after a shopping visit with her mother and worked during COVID when students did virtual learning from home. Johnson, who spent her lunch breaks working at the shops, said volunteering "was a breath of fresh air." She added that she wrote her college essay on the League. "Thank you for helping me get into my dream school," she told League members at the luncheon.

"The Westfield Service League helped me realize how incredibly easy it is to be generous with your time and help others, and how much gratification it leaves you with. I hope that another person will have the opportunity to spend as much time as I did at the Westfield Service League."

Weiss is a graduating senior at Westfield High School and will be attending Penn State University in the fall.

"Volunteering at the Westfield Service League has shown me how important up-cycling clothing is," she said of her experience. "Just because one person is done with a clothing item doesn't mean somebody else won't love it. Having access to clothing that makes you feel confident is so important." Thrift Shop Co-Chair Jan Herringer, who chairs the Intern Committee, praised the interns for a job well done.

"Nina and Leah were such great additions to our shops. They brought a new and refreshing perspective to how we showcase our inventory, especially for younger shoppers," she said. "To build upon their success, we decided to formalize and expand the intern program and look forward to working with other students in the future."

The League's internship program will be open to juniors and seniors in the surrounding area and begins with the new school year in September. (The shops are open during the school year and close during the summer.) Interns will be expected to work approximately 30 hours over the school year. Each intern will be assigned a mentor who will provide an orientation to the Westfield Service League and be available to answer questions. Responsibilities include visual merchandising of store displays, assisting with special events, such as a holiday sale or a fashion show for seniors, and sorting and pricing donations of clothes, toys, and household items.

The Westfield Service League has actively assisted the Westfield and surrounding communities through volunteer service and charitable donations since 1932. WSL manages Thrift and Consignment shops at 114 Elmer Street in Westfield. Shop proceeds help fund grants, which are awarded to other non-profit and service organizations in Westfield and the surrounding area. During its almost 90-year history, the League has awarded \$2.9 million dollars to dozens of organizations. Each year, the League members seek and recruit volunteers to work in the shops during spring, fall and winter months. In addition, League members also volunteer at Mobile Meals of Westfield and the Holy Trinity Food Pantry.

GLHS students in the Programming Club (also known as the Coding Club) participated in the "American Computer Science League" Competition which ran from November 2021 through May 2022. During the competition, the GL team competed against over 500 teams across the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia.


In the "Senior 3" Division, the GL team scored in the Top 25 of all schools, edging out competition from schools across the United States, China, Indonesia, Canada, Taiwan, and more.

In addition, three students – Juniors David Andrews and Daniel Long, and Sophomore William Ng, competed in the ACSL Invitational Finals in late May. Out of over 500 students, the team scored in the top 300, with Daniel Long finishing in 32nd place and earning Bronze medal honors.

This relatively new club was formed three years ago by GLHS Juniors David Andrews and Daniel Long. The overall goal of the club is to learn coding (no experience necessary), talk about and develop projects, find resources for skill building, and explore STEM applications. The club members themselves found the ACSL competition and decided to participate in it.

According to GLHS Math Teacher and Club Advisor Justin Polce, "The students in the club are diligent, self-motivated, and very helpful when it comes to learning code, discussing cool projects, and competing in the ACSL. I'm very proud of them for the work they have done, and the foundations they have built for programming at Governor Livingston High School. Computer Science is a key skill to have now, and in the future, and we explore everything from Python to C++ to Boolean Algebra. These students are the leaders we need to help advance the district and the community in these areas."

### **SAGE WORKSHOP RENEWS FATHER'S DAY GIFT**

Ed Midgley of Berkeley Heights received a bench as a Father's Day gift from his children. After years of outdoor weathering and exposure to the temperatures, it had fallen apart in a distant corner of his garden. While spring cleaning this year, Ed decided to have it refurbished at SAGE Workshop in Summit and it is now a focal point of curbside appeal for his home. "Coming into the workshop in the basement" said Ed, "is like coming into Santa's Workshop with every workstation abuzz with elves working on gifts for the holiday."

Simon Rosenstein, workshop volunteer, chose mahogany flooring to restore the bench. He measured, cut the wood planks to fit the originals, and painted the wrought iron back to its original glamour. "Repairing this bench for Ed was an honor," said Simon.

Since 1961, the SAGE Eldercare Workshop has offered the public fine-quality furniture repair. The volunteers will consider repairing any piece of furniture that can be carried into the workshop. The Workshop has a reputation throughout Union County and beyond for its fine reweaving of caned and rushed chairs. Our artisans are all highly trained volunteers. Proceeds from the Workshop benefit SAGE programming. Prices are reasonable and depend upon the condition of the chair or furniture item and the materials required in the restoration process.

The Workshop started out over fifty years ago as a place for older men who no longer had access to a home workshop. Dozens of women have worked in the historically male enclave.
