FRAZEE HOUSE RECEIVES NJ HISTORIC TRUST GRANT

On Friday, June 24, the Rotary Frazee House board observed the 245th anniversary of the Battle of Short Hills. In attendance were representatives from Scotch Plains Township (including Mayor Josh Losardo and Township Manager Al Mirabella), NJ Historic Trust, the County Board of Commissioners, several historic organizations, the Frazee House Board and the FSP Rotary Club.

An oversize check for \$337,161 was presented to Andy Calamaras by Dorothy Guzzo, Executive Director of the New Jersey Historic Trust. Linda Stender, who is now a board member of that organization, was also in attendance.

Calamaras noted that "the SPF Rotary Frazee House Board has achieved tremendous progress over the past 15 years. The Frazee House is a local Scotch Plains treasure, and we are proud to save it for future generations." He also thanked the Scotch Plains township and NJ Historic Trust for their support over the years.

The funds will be applied toward the second phase of the Frazee House restoration project. A bathroom cottage will be built adjacent to the house and will include two bathrooms and a utility area where the meters for the gas, electric and water will be located. An ADA accessible ramp will allow access to the bathrooms and to the house. The two rooms in the West wing of the house will also be finished, including power, data ports, heat and air conditioning. The restoration work will be done by a certified conservator, yet to be determined.

There was also a brief presentation about the Battle of the Short Hills and the Legend of "Aunt Betty", given by former Scotch Plains Councilman Ted Spera.

The Frazee Board is planning a number of events this October to raise additional funds: the annual Harvest Festival, the Great Pumpkin Patch, and the Ghost Walking Tour. For further information about the history of the Frazee House and the planned events, go to frazeehouse.org.

DR. TERESA QUIGLEY RETIRES, HER LEGACY IS RECORDED

Two members of the Garwood Historical Committee (GHC) interviewed School Superintendent, Dr. Teresa Quigley, on July 27, 2022, just prior to her retirement from the Garwood School District.

Dr. Quigley was inspired to pursue a career in teaching, specifically in Special Education, by her special needs brother. While originally from New York, she moved into the area after college. She presently resides in Scotch Plains with her family. As the former Ms. Cahill, she applied for a position in the Garwood Schools in 1989 and was hired as a Language Arts teacher. After furthering her own education, her subsequent positions in Garwood included Coordinator of Special Services in the year 2000, and Supervisor of Special Services and Curriculum & Instruction in 2002. In 2003 Dr. Quigley was appointed to the Principal position. Then in 2007, she was selected to be our Superintendent of Schools.

When asked what she is most proud of during her time in the district, she cited the genuine caring and concern for each student and staff member, especially during the extraordinary challenges of COVID. Throughout her distinguished career, she witnessed and adapted to the many changes occurring in the field of education, school district safety being one major concern. The New Jersey Veterans Network

GARDENING QUESTIONS? NEED INSECTS IDENTIFIED? RUTGERS COOPERATIVE EXTENSION OF UNION COUNTY CAN HELP.

After being closed for the past two years due to the Covid pandemic the Helpline is now open to help solve your questions and problems.

Even landscape professionals occasionally need assistance identifying problems. Diseases of trees and shrubs or insects need to be properly diagnosed before they can be cured or controlled.

Rutgers Garden Helpline is staffed by trained volunteers to assist the citizens of their county with continuing educational opportunities supplied by Rutgers agricultural department during the year.

Rutgers Garden Helpline of Union County is located at 300 North Ave East, Westfield, NJ, (Colleen Fraser Building, 2nd floor). For questions and office hours call the Garden Helpline at 908-654-9852

There are three ways you can reach the garden helpline with your questions.

Or clients can bring a plant, lawn, or insect samples to the office. Specimens are the surest way to guarantee a proper identification.

Hours are Monday to Thursday, 10 a.m. until 2 p.m., and Friday 10 a.m. until noon.

The Garden Helpline volunteers are well trained to identify tick* species including 'deer ticks' which transmit Lymes disease to humans and pets.

This is an extremely valuable service as the deer and tick populations continue to grow in New Jersey.

The Asian Lantern-fly invaded Union County last spring and has already damaged many fruit trees and vines. The Helpline will keep you updated on the latest information how to control this colorful but destructive leaf hopper.

In addition to garden critters the Helpline will identify house infesting insects such as carpenter ants, termites and food infesting pest.
