Westfield Public Schools

Offering five new workshops along with Robotics, Stop Motion Animation, Forensics, and other favorites, the Westfield STEM Camp was back in-person this summer after a two-year pause due to COVID-19.

"All the workshops involve hands-on, problembased learning activities having to do with Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math," says Edison Intermediate School Industrial Arts teacher Sean Bonasera, who co-directs the camp with Laura Paiva, a computer technology teacher at Edison.

Begun in 2013 and taught by 11 Westfield Public School teachers with a passion for STEM education, this year's STEM Camp welcomed 108 campers in grades 6-8 and 168 in grades 3-5 for weeklong sessions during which campers participated in 4 workshops consisting of hands-on, real-world STEM activities. The sessions ran from July 11-29 with such offerings as "DNA: Cracking the Code of Life," "Engineering Design Challenges," "Mind Blowing Experiments," "Natural Disaster Survival," "Robotics Exploration," and "Mission Impossible" which had campers learning about the science of optics and decoding messages.

"There is much to love about this program but what comes immediately to mind is just how much fun the students have while participating in these authentic learning experiences," says Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Instruction and Programs Dr. Paul Pineiro. "Mr. Bonasera, Ms. Paiva, and the instructors continually evolve the modules each year to include the latest technologies and most engaging activities."

Another new workshop was "Makey Space," with Roosevelt instrumental music instructor James Doyle first introducing a circuit board known as a Makey Makey board.

"Through hands-on learning, the circuit boards teach the students about how to create a simple circuit and the conductivity of different materials, all while interacting with online apps," Bonasera explains. "As the week progresses, the campers get comfortable with the understanding of how to wire their boards to create different sound effects. By the end of the week, the campers have creatively designed their own instruments out of cardboard and different conductive materials."

Bonasera and Paiva say they hope campers came away with the mindset that "learning can be challenging yet still fun" while developing their

creativity, ingenuity, and problem-solving skills.

"STEM Camp is important because it provides the kids the opportunity to have exposure to different experiences and technologies. Campers are learning to integrate knowledge from the different areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math without solely focusing on any one discipline," says Bonasera. "STEM Camp provides an environment that gives campers the ability to innovate and create without the structure of a typical classroom. They are developing their knowledge, critical thinking skills, teamwork and communication skills all while having fun."

In the Fall Justin will be attending Princeton University, where he plans to study **Operations Research and Financial Engineering** with an eye toward a career in finance.

Justin received the CMC's \$500 award for academic excellence at the Westfield High School graduation ceremony on June 23. While at WHS. Justin served as President of the Student Government Association and as Secretary General of the Model United Nations. Among his academic honors, he earned a perfect score of 800 on the SAT Math Level 2 subject test.

The College Men's Club of Westfield was founded in 1922 and over the past century has helped hundreds of young men by providing college tuition assistance and funding for standardized test preparatory courses. Since its founding, the CMC has raised and distributed over \$1.2 million to young men from the Westfield community. In 2022 the CMC awarded a total of \$61,500 in four-year scholarships and one-year grants.

Mrs. Newell and her husband Robert Newell worked on the garden surrounding their 1884 Victorian home for over 30 years. Since the passing of Mr. Newell last year, Mrs. Newell has continued to lovingly tend the garden, which flourishes with trees, shrubs, perennials, and vegetables. The garden holds many memories from the planting of trees in remembrance of family members.

Trees include a crimson king maple, a sugar maple, a cucumber tulip tree, an apple tree, a crepe myrtle, and a magnolia. A variety of shrubs create interest throughout the seasons. Blood red azaleas, rhododendrons, and a brilliant orange flowering quince blossom in spring while colorful hydrangeas adorn the garden in summer. Fall shrubs include the smokebush whose leaves turn to burnt orange and the firebush with flaming red leaves. A grapevine has been growing on the side of the house for 100 years. The garden also brings delight with its wonderful array of perennials: hellebores, astilbe, coneflowers, coreopsis, phlox, hostas, and black-eyed Susans. Mrs. Newell has also planted dark orange sunflowers and yellow dahlias for even more color.

ROTARY CLUB STUDENT BOOK COLLECTION SUPPORTS KIDS IN NIGERIA

School children in Westfield, NJ, USA collected books for the school children in Obike, Nigeria. This is the first year that Obike will have schools for children, and they need English language books to stock their new libraries.

The Rotary Club of Westfield sponsors six student service clubs in our public schools: "Interact" Clubs for the High School and Intermediate schools; and "Early Act" clubs for the Elementary schools. The goal of the service clubs is to teach the importance of giving back to those in need.

The Rotary Club of Westfield recently raised \$30,000 to buy medical supplies for a new medical clinic in Obike, Nigeria. Father Kingsley, a priest formerly of St Helens Catholic Church in Westfield, grew up in Obike. He started DMIWOO (Divine Mercy International Widows and Orphans Organization) https://dmiwoo.org to give back to his community. Fr Kingsley has been working to build this medical clinic for over 2 decades. The Rotary Club of Westfield helped him accomplish that goal by providing a Global Grant of \$30,000 to purchase medical supplies. Rotarian Clark Lagemann of the Westfield Area Y wrote the Rotary Global Grant application to support the Medical Clinic. Father Kingsley travels back to his hometown in Nigeria on a regular basis to check on the progress.

Father Kingsley's latest project has been building three new (and only) schools in that town. The next closest school is in a town 5 miles away, so many of the local children have to travel several hours a day to get an education. The population of Obike is 20,000, a few thousand people smaller than Westfield. Just imagine if Westfield did not have any doctors' offices or schools!

Hearing about this need for English language books, three of the school's Rotary clubs sprang into action and started collecting books.

Julie McGeough, PTO liaison for McKinley School, counted over 3000 books collected by the children. Cathy McGarry is the McKinley School Early Act club advisor. The Jefferson Early Act Club is estimated to have collected over two thousand books. Dr Susie Hung was instrumental in getting the book drive off the ground. Joanna Leach is the main contact for the Jefferson School

Early Act Club. Due to the club's large size, there heart!" are several other teachers who assist. The Roosevelt Intermediate School Interact Club kids collected 1,800 books. Their advisor is Mrs. Kimberly Bennett.

Westfield Rotarians loaded a cargo van, provided by Access Self-Storage of Garwood at a discounted rate, with over 5,000 books collected by the schools Early Act and Interact Clubs. Liz Ensslin, Past President of the club, and Rotarian Mark Wright drove the van with the books to Hartford, CT to go into a shipping container leaving for Obike, Nigeria. A neighbor Julie McGeough, Joe Ensslin, Past President Bill Bonsall and Rotarians Heidi Caponigro and JoAnn Araya helped load the van.

When Fr Kingsley realized how many books were collected, he said, "This is such amazing news. I am totally speechless to hear about the success of your efforts. It really warms my

Fr Kingsley is hoping to open the schools in August. The books are going over in a container ship with dozens of bicycles for the kids, fishing poles, gardening tools and two cartons of book marks made by the students at McKinley and Jefferson Early Act clubs. ROTARY HONORS BYRON MILLER

Westfield Rotarian Byron Miller has been selected to receive the prestigious Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award. Only 50 Rotarians may receive this award each year, out of 1.4 million Rotarians worldwide.

Byron is happily married to Joyce, with one adult son. Byron was a medic in the NJ National Guard 1970-76, then graduated from Rider College with a BS in Business Administration. Byron ran the family business, Portasoft, Inc., a water conditioning company. As a hobby, he is an avid golfer

Byron joined The Rotary Club of Westfield in 1981. He served as club President from 1986-87. Byron has served on many club committees including Scholarship, Grants, Membership Orientation, and was the Chair of the Club Foundation.

Byron held several Rotary District positions, including District Membership Chair, Assistant Governor, Deputy Governor, and Rotary International District Foundation Chair. In addition, Byron was the Rotary International Foundation Water Resource Coordinator for 6 years.

Being an expert in water, Byron has attended several conferences with "Pure Water for the World, Inc." which was started and is run by

Rotarians. He had been to Nicaragua twice at his own expense and had been installing water filters there for a two-year period. In 2007, he decided to lead the district in a massive Matching Grant to save many more lives. He then personally lectured to over 100 Rotary Clubs throughout our state. 32 Rotary clubs were recruited which have contributed \$50,000 to this \$71,000 Matching Grant. The purpose of this grant was to develop a manufacturing plant for the Bio Filters in Leon, Nicaragua. With the ability to manufacture these filters in Nicaragua, the local villages can then have the filters installed and maintained locally, creating jobs and providing a sustainable project. Every water filter- which is about the size of a garbage can - has a Rotary Logo on it. The people along the "Mosquito Coast" love Rotary and Byron is only going to increase that love and respect for our organization.

With Byron's education and professional expertise in water, he is the perfect person to be leading this project.

Not resting on his laurels, Byron's next focus was Haiti, which is the poorest country in our hemisphere. He went to Haiti at his own expense and installed water filters in 250 schools. The children can bring a bucket of clean water home at the end of the school day. After the earthquake of 2010, he again flew down at his own expense to check on all 250 filters to make sure they were still functioning properly.

Byron is a dynamo of new ideas and has the energy and enthusiasm to implement them. Byron has won many Rotary awards including the District Rotarian of the Year, Rotary International Service Above Self Award, The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service, and now this current Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award.

Byron is very humble and does not look for credit or awards. He truly wants to help people. He is an outstanding individual, a leader in his profession, and is respected by the community, and in the Rotary world.

WESTFIELD RECREATION FALL PROGRAMS

Fall is almost here and it's time to keep everyone active and having fun! The Westfield Recreation Department offers a wide variety of Fall programs and classes for every age. To see a full description of programs, go to our program secure.rec1.com/NJ/westfieldcatalog at nj/catalog

For those who are sports minded, we offer numerous youth sports programs and clinics. Starting Sunday, September 11, we have our Field Hockey Clinics for girls' grades 2nd – 4th (8-9 a.m.) and grades 5th – 8th (9-10 a.m.). This program is directed by WHS Head Varsity Coach Corinne Varhley. Also starting on September 11 is our Fall Track programs: Cross Country (Sundays 9-10 a.m.) and Track & Field (Wednesdays 6-7 p.m.). In its 20th year, the Extended School Year (ESY) Program in the Westfield Public School District assists students in preschool through high school who have been identified as those who would benefit from additional instruction and related services during the summer.

The five-week, state-mandated ESY program, which ran from July 6 through August 9, helps to prepare students for the new school year.

"The ESY program provides a safe environment for students to review material from the previous year while maintaining and strengthening academic skills for the upcoming year," says Alex Linden, ESY supervisor and a special education teacher at Edison Intermediate School. "The program also gives the students social opportunities to foster peer relationships with students from all of our schools across the district."

specialists Instructional in reading,

behavior/social skills, speech, occupational and physical therapy join special education teachers, paraprofessionals, and a school nurse in administering the program. Many of the ESY staff are longtime educators and aides with Westfield Public Schools.

Twenty-seven students in grades 6-12 attend the ESY program at Westfield High School, each with a morning homeroom and a rotation schedule of core academic classes. Enrolled in the preschool through fifth grade ESY program at Wilson Elementary School are 101 students who also receive instruction in reading, writing, and mathematics, along with related services. An additional 24 ESY students at Wilson receive related services only, which can include OT, PT, speech, behavioral services, and reading instruction through the Wilson Reading System.

Linden adds, "We hope that our students come away from the ESY program prepared and with confidence as they enter the new school year."

ENRICHING ENGLISH LANGUAGE OPPORTUNITIES

Westfield Public Schools

The study of animals and their habitats was the focus of the English Language Learners (ELL) Summer Experience, a two-week summer camp for Westfield students that provides meaningful enrichment activities to help students continue their English language acquisition.

This year's ELL program ran from July 11-22 at Wilson Elementary School and welcomed 19 students in grades 1-5 whose native languages include Chinese, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Turkish, and Ukrainian.

"One of our goals was to highlight community and being connected. We started with the foundation of 'What is an animal and what does it mean to be alive?' We discussed the importance of shelter by building bird houses, the necessity of food by constructing bird feeders, and interconnectedness by designing our own food chains," says Edison world language teacher Jillian Martinez, who runs the program with fellow world language teacher Mercedes Poyntz. "Our daily lessons were designed to deeply

explore animal concepts while encouraging communication that practiced and strengthened their language production."

"The hands-on activities allowed us to weave important SEL competencies that enhance language acquisition," adds Poyntz.

K-12 World Languages and ELL Supervisor Enrique Pincay says the campers enjoyed the two-week program.

"The ELL Summer Experience is a wonderful opportunity for English Language Learners (ELLs) to enrich their academic knowledge and language skills," says Pincay. "Students also have the chance to make new friends as they're grouped with ELLs from other schools within our district."

Pincay credits the teachers with doing "a wonderful job infusing in their lessons everything about animals," adding "we expose our ELL campers to student-centered activities that not only improve their literacy skills but also enhance their social-emotional development through meaningful educational experiences."

Boright for a program entitled "Union County's Reign of Terror" on Sunday, October 2 at the Cranford Community Center, 220 Walnut Avenue, Cranford. The presentation centers on a Union County man who earned infamy as one of the most notorious killers in the state of New Jersey. His rampage in the 1950s into the 1970s began with grave desecration and arson, and escalated to rape, murder, and cop killing. He was not linked to some of his crimes until decades after they were committed. This serial killer eventually was convicted of murder and imprisoned for life where he later died of natural causes.

Union County Historical Society President Joanne Rajoppi said, "We are excited to have Dr. Boright, a noted author and historian, review the history of these crimes for the Society's program. Dr. Boright is a respected, well-known author of six local history books and nearly 200 published articles about local, county, and New Jersey State history," she added.

Dr. Boright earned a bachelor's degree as a history major from Kean University in Union where he also taught New Jersey history. He taught history in Clark schools and became a New Jersey superintendent of schools. He earned master's and doctoral degrees at Seton Hall University. He served as a Kenilworth councilman and was elected five times to the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders (now the Board of Commissioners). Dr. Boright has presented many programs to schools and

organizations about local, regional, and New Jersey history.
