The parade route starts at Union County College and travels southbound on Springfield Avenue towards Downtown Cranford. The parade will then turn right onto North Union Avenue, cross North Avenue, and turn left into the Walnut Avenue entrance to the Train Station parking lot (Municipal Lot # 4).

A portion of the parade route from Springfield Avenue to Penn Road has been designated as a "sensory-friendly zone", with no sirens or horns being used by the participating agencies.

STUPIDITY RUNS DEEP. STUPIDITY -THE LACK OF GOOD SENSE OR JUDGEMENT

My hands are shaking as I write this. Recently while driving home from work I passed by Lincoln Park. My heart shuttered. Someone started to remove all of the plants growing within the fence where the Pepperidge Tree one stood. Could people be so short sighted. Are they really ripping this up to put in a pollinator garden?!?

There were hundreds of native plants coming up. Dozens of native trees, oaks, maples, cherries and yes pepperidge, lots of pepperidge. Dozens of pepperidge. These trees had come up from the root system Cranford's historic Pepperidge Tree. A small forest if you will sprang up. This mono-culture was similar to one of the worlds most unique forests; Pando the Tree in Utah. Look it up. New trees growing from the roots of a mother tree are not unusual, actually they are quite common. It is a natural occurrence. So why do WE frown upon it?

God and nature supplied more. Maples, oaks, cherries; seeds blown in or dropped by some passing animal. Elderberry, violets, yarrow, golden rod and many more came up naturally, dozens of varieties of native plants. All gone.

Had anyone taken the time to look at the site? At the park? At what was actually growing?!? The Pepperidge sapling that was planted at the other end of the park is barely 20 feet, it was planted as a seed collected in the early 1980's. Pepperidge are slow growing long lived trees. The trees that sprang up from the healthy roots of the Historic Pepperidge tree were almost 15 feet!! And yes they were the Historic Pepperidge. Genetically identical. And again, Yes, great native pollinators. The sprouting trees were becoming tall enough to create shade something lacking greatly in the park. The lower branches could have been removed to create space to put benches. Some of the trees could have been thinned out to create an open canopy. It will take decades upon decades to replace all the trees removed from Lincoln park; the oaks, the maples and now again the Pepperidge. Why are we so determined to remove them?

Now a pollinator garden is to be planted. Hopefully maintained. Indefinitely...not likely. But hey, WE have something WE did to better the environment right? WE can say WE planted a garden to encourage the pollinators, to better the environment. WE created a place to let people know WE care for the environment.

Maybe a better suggestion would have been to plant a pollinator garden in our perfectly manicured landscape, out where people could see them. Hundreds of them throughout the town. Instead...

We cut down the forest to be able to see the trees. Bad on us. What were WE thinking?

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF CRANFORD CELEBRATES 135TH ANNIVERSARY

The First Baptist Church of Cranford, located at 100 High Street, celebrated their 135th anniversary with a Family and Friends Day. Held on Sunday, September 11, 2022, the day began with a Sunday service, and was followed by refreshments in the community room.

The First Baptist Church offers: Sunday Worship at 11 a.m.; Sunday School at 9:30 a.m.; Prayer Service / Bible Study on Wends. at 7:30 p.m. All services are also offered on Zoom. A BRIEF HISTORY OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH -1887-2022

One hundred and thirty-five years ago First Baptist Church of Cranford, New Jersey had its beginning at 104 High Street. It was organized by Reverend William A. Wallace in June 1887. This small group of loyal Christians became the first Baptists in the growing community of Cranford.

Under the leadership of the Reverend William A. Harm. the current church edifice was constructed and completed in 1896. Rev. Harris was followed by a number of pastors.

Rev. David W. Cannon, Sr. became pastor in 1916 after completing studies at the Princeton University Theological Seminary. There were many significant innovations during his pastorate. Reverend Cannon felt that much could be gained in inspiration through the participation of the congregation with other likeminded groups. Hence. he was one of the founders of the Middlesex District Baptist Convention and the Afro-American State Baptist Convention and its auxiliaries.

Reverend George Reavis succeeded Reverend Canon. During his tenure 1922 the church was incorporated in the state of New Jersey 1922.

In 1927 First Baptist called Reverend W. H. E. Smith as its pastor. During his administration a tennis court was built in the rear of the church. Many members who had been excluded from the private club of Cranford learned how to play tennis. One of our members became the champion of Cranford High School.

The depression took its toll on the congregation and finances of First Baptist. as it had the general life of America, and the church bad many needs.

Rev. Dr. Benjamin W. P. Allen, who was a graduate of Oberlin College and Drew University, was called to the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Cranford, New Jersey in the year 1934. He delivered his first sermon on the first Sunday in October 1934---at a time when our nation was in the grips of a severe depression and the church's membership was very small. Owing his pastorate the membership listened, followed, grew and multiplied tenfold. Rev. Allen continued his studies and in 1953 he received his Ph.D. degree from Drew University.

In the year 1944, through Dr. Allen's foresight and guidance, a state charter for the operation of a credit union was obtained for The First Baptist Church of Cranford, New Jersey. This was the oldest church Credit Union in New Jersey.

Although the membership was small in comparison with many credit unions, its assets blossomed. There was great pride taken in church's Credit Union.

Under the leadership of Dr. Allen, the church members planned and made many renovations on church properties. In order to meet the hardship of the year's shortages, a Food Club was created, as well as a Coal Purchasing Club.

One of Dr. Allen's great dreams was to have a good male choir. A male choir was organized in 1947, under the direction of Reverend George White.

During this pastorate, First Baptist contributed to the education of a young man who would become a major figure in the Civil Rights movement of the fifties and sixties. serving as administrative assistant to the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. That man was the Reverend Dr. Wyatt Tee Walker, great teacher, preacher, and musicologist. Dr. Walker later pastored the Canaan Baptist Church of Christ in New York City. Dr. Allen passed away in 1965.

Reverend George H. White, Jr., teacher, preacher and musician, succeeded Reverend Dr. Allen in 1965. His association with First Baptist began when he was hired as organist and choir director before he was old enough to drive from his home in Newark. Having three degrees, including a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Drew University, a Master's in counseling and guidance from Rutgers University and a Bachelor's in music from Montclair State College, he was ordained into the Christian ministry at First Baptist in 1955. He believed that a religious community must practice brotherhood out of the conviction of its faith.

During his pastorate Reverend White reorganized the Trustee Board. Our facilities were expanded. The house at I 04 High Street was renovated for use as Sunday School facilities. A dream of the late Deacon Lawrence Kelsey was fulfilled when the old warehouse was renovated into our present Sunday School building. Reverend White with choir director, Mr. Jacob Donald Walker, Jr., developed an excellent music program. First Baptist was blessed with many excellent voices especially those of Deacon John Johnson and Eva Morris Thomas.

Our current pastor, Reverend Alfred E. Brown, Jr., was called in 1975. Pastor Brown received a B.A. in Sociology from St Mary's University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, and a Master of Divinity degree from Drew University. Pastor Brown sought to bring a "new vision" to First Baptist Mrs. Brown, a native of Nova Scotia, Canada, contributed greatly to grass roots ministries to senior citizens and established a Memorial Field.

During Rev. Brown's pastorate the church has become increasingly involved in community activities and services. In support of Reverend Brown's belief in the involvement of the church in the wider community. First Baptist Church voted to join the New Jersey Convention of Progressive Baptists in January 1977. This was our first commitment to a convention in fortyfive years. Reverend Brown has served as the president on two occasions. Members of this congregation have served as heads of the Laymen (Deacon James Kelsey), Women's Department (Elvira Bergen. Lillie Brown and Dr. Deborah Wolfe).

The first revival conducted at First Baptist in fifty years was initiated by Rev. Brown and was conducted during the 95th Anniversary celebration with Rev. W. Emmanuel Barrett, pastor of the First Baptist Church of South Bound Brook, as the preacher. Many of the church auxiliaries were revitalized including the Sarah Cyrus Missionary Society, and a new youth group called The Searchers. The church has become involved in ministries to the homeless and prison ministries.

Rev. Brown has been sensitive to the changing identity of women as be introduced an amendment to the Church Constitution which provided greater dignity to the role of Deaconess. Rev. Brown later had the church give equal status to Deacons and Deaconesses. He also strongly supported the appointment of Reverend Doctor Deborah Cannon Wolfe as Assistant Pastor.

In 1977 the church voted to borrow money to renovate the exterior and foundation of the church and improve its properties. After only four years on October 18, 1981, the mortgage was burned, thus saving the church nearly \$30,000 in principal and interest fees.
