FRAZEE HOUSE SCHEDULES ANNUAL OCTOBER FESTIVITIES

The historic Frazee farmstead will host annual October festivities on its site. "We're excited to continue to host activities at the Frazee farmstead, home of Aunt Betty Frazee, a brave woman who defied the British on their march past her house in 1777," said Andy Calamaras, president of the Rotary Frazee House committee. The committee has spearheaded a 15-year project to rescue the house's structure.

The Rotary Frazee House committee and the Township of Scotch Plains will host the annual Harvest Festival at the Frazee Farmstead. There will be activities for every age group: live music, games, pony rides, a petting zoo, food trucks, pumpkin tossing, a haunted trail and the Great Pumpkin Patch. "We've continued to make progress on the Frazee renovation. Last year, the external renovation of the Frazee House was completed and this vear the internal renovation is scheduled to begin." said Calamaras. The Harvest Festival is a great opportunity for the community to visit the site and see for themselves - rain or shine - at the Frazee House site, 1451 Raritan Road in Scotch Plains, Saturday October 16, from 12:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Additionally, in October, overlapping the date of Harvest Festival, will be the Frazee House participation with Union County's annual "Four Centuries in a Weekend," on October 15 and 16. The county Board of Commissioners sponsors coordinated open houses that weekend at more than 50 sites all over the county — homes, museums, trails, cemeteries and parks — of which the Frazee site is one of the oldest.

Representatives will be at the Frazee site between 12 p.m. and 5 p.m. on both days with brochures, bookmarks, a video demonstration and an external tour of the house. History buffs can note that the Frazee House is one of the stops on the Battle of Short Hills Historic Trail as well as being renowned for the legendary confrontation between General Cornwallis and Aunt Betty Frazee.

The Great Pumpkin Patch is ongoing from October 1 through 31. There will be hundreds of pumpkins in various sizes and colors, and they'll be sold every day from 11 a.m. to dusk. The site will be decorated for Halloween and is the perfect setting for fall photos.

Finally, the Frazee House Ghost Walking Tour will take place at the

site on October 22-23 at 3 p.m., 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. The 90-minute tours will be led by renowned psychic-medium Jane Doherty and will begin with a short orientation at the restored Frazee homestead, including details about the spirit world. It will proceed with a walk along the property, stopping at each "ghost hangout" to reveal the stories and secrets there. The Frazee House Committee is excited to introduce this new event. Tickets must be purchased in advance.

APHASIA COMMUNICATION GROUP OFFERED

The Adler Aphasia Center is currently offering an Aphasia Communication Group for stroke and brain injury survivors with aphasia in Scotch Plains, NJ. This group provides those diagnosed with aphasia an opportunity to socialize with others who share similar experiences, provide tips to communicate more effectively, and time to practice communication skills in a natural environment. Aphasia is a language disorder caused by stroke or other brain injury. It affects spoken language, reading, and writing, but does not affect one's intellect.

This group is facilitated by a licensed speech language pathologist and is offered two Fridays of each month for two hours. A person with aphasia may join the group at any time but must pre-register. There is a nominal charge, but we never turn people away for lack of funds, we

offer scholarships to those who are not able to pay \$80 for eight sessions.

Adler Aphasia Center, a non-profit organization with three full-service facilities based in Maywood, West Orange, and Toms River, NJ and Aphasia Communication Groups located throughout the state, is an innovative, post-rehabilitative program that addresses the long-term needs of people with aphasia and their families. Aphasia is a communication disorder that impairs the expression and understanding of spoken language, reading, and writing. It occurs most often from a stroke or other brain injury. It affects a person's ability to communicate, but not

his or her intellect. This communication disorder affects 40% of all stroke and brain trauma survivors. The Center is considered a world leader in long-term, post-rehab community-based care for people with aphasia. With 2.5 million people diagnosed with aphasia in the U.S., the Center is the only one of its kind in NJ, an area with an estimated 70,000 people living with aphasia.

Step back in time to experience the simple joys of childhood. Costumed docents will provide hands-on activities, including quoits (ring toss) and 9-pin bowling. Make a colonial hat and wear it as you stand next to our colonial children cut-out boards for an amazing photo-op!

Imagine waking up each morning shortly after sunrise. In the winter, there might be a thin layer of ice on the water in the pitcher you would use for washing up. In the summer, you sweated while the mosquitoes bit and the flies buzzed in your bedroom. Life in colonial days was vastly different than life in the 21st century.

In each family, children were expected to do chores. Boys worked with their fathers to plant, water, and harvest crops. They helped raise livestock and hunt wild animals to feed the family. They chopped wood, built fences, and some even went to school. However, many children did not attend school because there was no free public school like we have today. The girls helped their mothers do all the cooking, cleaning, washing, gardening, child care, and sewing to make clothes for their large families.

Children of long ago had fun despite their many chores. They always found time to play.

Most of the toys were simple and a good imagination made playtime the most enjoyable time of each day. Boys played with spinning tops, jacks, or clay marbles. They made whistles out of blades of grass and made boats out of sticks and leaves. Girls played with corn husk, handkerchief, or wooden dolls. They made bracelets and necklaces out of dandelions and daisies. Both boys and girls had fun running while spinning a large wooden hoop with a stick. Some of the most popular toys were ball in a cup, Jacob's ladder, spinners, quoits (ring toss), and draughts (checkers).

The bikes are adapted for use as trash haulers, produce trucks, taxis, and farm machinery.

FLINTLOCKS READY FOR ACTION

The Flintlocks, BSA, Inc. are a group of retired scouters who dedicate their time and talents to helping the Boy Scout Camps in northern New Jersey. They annually donate approximately 5,000 hours of skilled labor to the scouts. The group includes many tradesmen, but also volunteers of every background. Most are retired, but some still work full time, and occasionally people volunteer to help for a day here and there. It is a very friendly group with a good sense of humor. When one member reached age 100, they designated a parking spot reserved for all Flintlocks over 100 years old.

The Flintlocks meet every Thursday at Camp Winnebago, Rockaway, NJ, all year round. They are organized as a 501c3 non profit corporation. All of the members are registered with the BSA. They provide a variety of skilled services to the Council. They have built cabins, picnic tables, painted the dining hall, built the archery range, built all the structures at the waterfront, financed, built and equipped the STEM Lab at Allamuchy Scout Reservation, repaired damage to camp structures, etc. In addition to building structures and doing repairs and maintenance, they also volunteer at many Council activities throughout the year. More than half of the Flintlocks have been awarded the Silver Beaver or have received other Council and National Awards. They typically provide approximately 5,000 hours of volunteer skilled labor every year. Previous years were interrupted by COVID shutdowns, and the camps were not operational some summers, but now the Flintlocks are all vaccinated and have been back to work. The Council most recently opened the summer Scout camps again, and the Flintlocks have brought them up to code to receive campers.
