SENIOR CITIZENS CLUB HOLIDAY LUNCHEON



The "Seeds of Change Award" was inspired by the late State Sen. Leanna Brown, who passed in 2016, and her longtime friend and colleague, the late Morris County Freeholder Patricia Maynard, who died a few months later in 2017. The honor is intended to highlight and celebrate women who build up other women, and that includes those who work at the grassroot levels in the community.

It is preferred, but not required, that the recipient be linked with a cause of current interest to the Advisory Committee on Women. Current areas of interest include housing and homelessness, human trafficking, incarcerated women, women in the military, female veterans, and other areas that impact women.

Ms. Brown served on the Chatham Borough Council from 1969 to 1972. She was the first

woman elected to the Morris County Board of Chosen Freeholders (now the Board of County Commissioners), becoming the Director in 1976. In 1978, she was named president of the New Jersey Association of Counties.

In 1983, Ms. Brown was also the first Republican woman elected to the New Jersey Senate. She was a champion of women cause and mentor to many women who sought to join the political and electoral process. Ms. Brown also was the driving force behind the county's creation of the Morris County Advisory Committee on Women.

Ms. Maynard was passionate about public service and helped to maintain and improve the cultural and educational opportunities and the quality of life in her many roles in Morris County. Her activities included the Morris County 9 Memorial Committee, Morris County Library Foundation and as trustee at the Morris Museum, Ralston Cider Mill, the County College of Morris Foundation and N.J. U.S. Olympic Committee.

Prior "Seeds of Change Award" winners include: 2018 - Lila Bernstein of Mendham Township; 2019 - Phyllis Chanda of Flanders; and 2022 - Mary Ledyard of Rockaway Borough.

DOCUMENTING VETERANS OF THE "FORGOTTEN WARS"

County of Morris

The signing of the Korean Armistice Agreement 69 years ago on July 27, 1953, officially ended the brutally destructive, large scale military actions that defined the Korean War, which left more than 5 million dead after three years.

But no peace treaty was ever signed, and hostilities continued over the decades, particularly from October 5, 1966 to December 3, 1969, when North Korea launched dozens of violent, armed incursions into South Korea. United States military personnel were on the ground to repel the attacks each time, and they have remained there with nearly a hundred Americans making the ultimate sacrifice in what are called America's "Forgotten Wars."

Morris County's Office of Planning and Preservation is documenting its "Veterans of the Z," those who served in the formal Korean War and those who have served since 1953 along the volatile and dangerous Korean Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) – a 2.5-mile wide, heavily militarized dividing line between North Korea and South Korea by the 1953 armistice.

"The Korea veteran listing is anticipated to be a unique one, encompassing not only the Korean conflict from 1950 to 1953, but the considerable tensions in the ensuing decades," said Jan Williams, Cultural and Historic Resources Specialist for the planning and preservation office.

"Along with the original soldiers that served during the 1950's, many veterans in the 1960's were sent to Korea instead of 'Nam. The expectation is that the public will be submitting names of Korean veterans from 1950 all the way up to soldiers that served in 'The Z' quite literally through yesterday," she added.

In 2012, the Office of Planning and Preservation began the task of listing Morris County veterans from several conflicts. The undertaking was inspired by a WWII veteran from Rockaway, Mr. Peter Chipko, who said that history would forget the military service and sacrifice that the men and women of Morris County rendered to the country.

The list, known as the Morris County Veterans Compendium, is releasing this latest effort to capture veterans' histories regarding Korea.

The criteria for listing in the Morris County Veterans Compendium remains the same as what has been established for listings of Morris County Veterans who served in Vietnam, WWI, WWII and other conflicts. They must have been born in Morris County or lived in the county for ten years. If a veteran meets the criteria, but has retired out of state or passed away, they remain eligible for listing.

The basic information required for listing is the veteran's name, Morris County municipality of birth or residence and the military branch in which they served.

LIBRARY WILL BE "FINE FREE" BEGINNING JANUARY 2023

ranks of Libraries across the nation and our region abolishing late fees for overdue materials. The new "fine free" policy will go into effect January 2, 2023. As a fine free library, Florham Park Public Library will not charge fines for materials that are overdue or returned late. Additionally, patrons with existing fines for late FPPL materials on their accounts will have their fines waived.

The Florham Park Public Library has been more lenient with charging fines for patrons in the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic, as a measure to help increase library use and create a culture of convenience and friendliness for

The Florham Park Public Library will join the Florham Parkers. This measure is a step toward making that culture more permanent, so that the Library is an open and welcoming place to visit. "Most library fines are no more than a nuisance," said Nancy Shah, the Library's director. "The average fine for overdue materials is \$0.80. Removing these small fees is a kind gesture that discourages a feeling of shame in bringing back materials late. We want our users to feel welcome, and we want our books to be used by all!"

> Contrary to popular belief, library fines do not ensure the timely return of library materials. In fact, the opposite is true: people are less likely to use the library after incurring a fine for late

materials. When the threat of fines are removed, fine-free libraries have often observed an increase in library card adoption, more materials being borrowed, and the return of long-lost items. "That's one of the most interesting things to me," remarked Shah, "fine-free libraries have had items overdue for decades returned to them once the patron realized they wouldn't be penalized for it. I am curious to see what, if anything, comes back to us at Florham Park!"

Going fine free has been a trend in the library industry since 2019. According to the American Library Association, getting rid of library fines removes barriers to access library services and materials, and can help individuals and families to save money and frustration. Fine-free policies are particularly helpful to create a more equitable library, since library fines are more likely to have a negative effect on low-income and minority users.

Several libraries bordering Florham Park and in the greater Morris County area have gone fine-free since 2020, and each year more and more public libraries make the switch. Other fine-free Libraries in our area include: Morristown, Chatham, Parsippany, Roxbury, Livingston, Montclair, Newark, and Bloomfield.
