FOOD COLLECTED FOR THE NEEDY

On Saturday, November 19, over eighty-five members of Faith Lutheran Church and the New Providence community gathered at Faith to sort and pack into boxes an estimated \$32,700 of canned and packaged food designated for the needy.

Summit resident Cheryl Bock, a parishioner of Faith Lutheran Church, was the chairperson of the Fall Food Drive. For more than twenty years, Ms. Bock has fulfilled this significant responsibility.

The food had been collected from New Providence residences by Boy Scout Troops 1 and 63 and Cub Scout Packs 99, 263 and 363. The prior Saturday, the scouts had left empty bags at the residences with requests to contribute food for pickup on November 19.

The eighty-five volunteers prepared over one hundred forty boxes of food for twenty-five families who live in New Providence. The boxes were distributed to the local residents by the New Providence Community Service web site is famfaith.org.

More than two hundred additional boxes were packed in a truck and delivered on Saturday, November 26 by Faith to StarFish Pantry, a combined Jewish/Christian organization in Plainfield. The delivery was coordinated by Chris Melhuish and seventeen other volunteers from Faith. StarFish Pantry provides emergency aid to about 9,000 people in the Plainfield area, two-thirds of whom are children. While the resources of the Pantry were almost depleted, the new food will meet the needs of the Pantry throughout the winter and early spring.

SUMMIT EMS RESPONSES – NOVEMBER 2022

Summit's EMS Volunteers responded to 199 emergency calls during November. Responses included 113 medical emergencies; 30 falls; 22 motor vehicle accidents, including two into a pole or tree, one off the road and one overturned vehicle; 10 traumatic injuries; seven cases of overdose or poisoning; two responses to a medical alarm; one burn injury; once case of Carbon Monoxide (CO) exposure; and six pedestrians struck by a vehicle. Squad Volunteers also provided four "lift assists" to patients who did not require transport to a hospital.

On November 14, several off duty Squad members joined the on-duty crew to staff all 3 ambulances and answer simultaneous emergency calls, with one patient transported to the trauma center at Morristown Medical Center, another to the pediatric unit at Morristown and the third to Overlook Medical Center.

CITY OF SUMMIT ANNOUNCEMENTS

2023 ORGANIZATION MEETING

The 2023 Organization Meeting of the Summit Common Council will be held on Tuesday, January 3, at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall, located at 512 Springfield Avenue. The meeting will be broadcast live on the City of Summit YouTube channel and HomeTowne TV Comcast channel 36 and Verizon channel 33. Citizens are invited to attend.

At the meeting, Mayor Nora Radest will provide her State of the City address and a new Council President will be elected. Ward 1 Councilmember-elect Delia Hamlet and Ward 2 Councilmember-elect Lisa Allen will be sworn in. Retiring Ward 1 Councilmember Danny O'Sullivan and Councilmember-at-Large Beth Little will be recognized. Retiring board members will be recognized, and the 2023 mayoral and council appointments for city boards, commissions, and committees will also be announced at the meeting.

CURBSIDE CHRISTMAS TREE PICKUP

Curbside Christmas tree collection begins on Monday, December 26, 2022, and continues through Monday, January 30, 2023. All ornaments, lights, and decorations must be removed, and trees should be removed from plastic bags. Residents should place garlands and wreaths in or next to trash cans; they will be picked up with trash collection. There are no specific pickup dates or times for Christmas trees. Please do not report a concern about tree pickup until after January 30, 2023. For more information visit cityofsummit.org/recycling. **STRING LIGHT RECYCLING**

Summit residents can bring old or broken string lights to the collection bin on the upper level of the Transfer Station. The materials are reused. String lights should not be included with household curbside recycling items; the lights will damage sorting equipment at the recycling facility. 24 emergency calls were answered by an offduty "back-up crew" of volunteers responding from home or work when the on-duty crew is busy. There were also 18 emergency responses by Summit volunteers to provide mutual aid assistance to six neighboring towns. 20 patients transported to a hospital by Squad members also received advanced life support care from hospital-based paramedics who accompanied the Squad's ambulance.

Squad members also provided EMS stand-by coverage at two fire scenes, including a commercial structure fire, as well as nonemergency coverage of an event at Kent Place School.

The Squad answers calls for help 24 hours a day and at a variety of locations. November responses included 89 to a patient's home or apartment; 24 for accidents or medical

emergencies on roads or highways; one in a public park; six in public buildings; 14 at a local business; and seven to a health care professional's office. There were also eight medical incidents on sidewalks; four in parking lots; eight at Summit's train station; 15 at a local behavioral health facility; 10 on the grounds of Overlook Medical Center; five to an assisted living facility, one in a house of worship; two in a day care center; and two at a school.

The all-volunteer First Aid Squad responds to emergency calls 24/7 and is entirely funded through private donations and does not bill for service. The Squad is always looking for new volunteers to join its ranks. All needed training, uniforms and equipment are provided. A CONVERSATION WITH HEATHER MCGHEE

equality for all, The Connection hosted a conversation with Heather McGhee, author of New York Times Bestseller The Sum of Us, at Summit High School in partnership with the Interfaith Council AntiRacism Summit Committee.

A renowned expert on the American economy, Heather McGhee is one of the most brilliant and influential thinkers exploring inequality today. Both her viral TED talk and her instant New York Times Bestseller The Sum of Us reveal the devastating true cost of racism-not just for people of color, but for everyone. Deeply stirring, intelligent, and compassionate, McGhee's talks offer an actionable roadmap during one of the

history.

McGhee was introduced by Julie Lanzone, Chairwoman of The Connection Board of Trustees, to the crowd of 250 attendees before sharing with the audience about her background in economy, what she learned about racism from looking at the data, and what led her to delve into the root of our most complicated issues off the spreadsheet.

Heather McGhee shared stories of hope and solidarity that she encountered on a road trip across America for her Podcast, also titled The Sum of Us, before sitting down for a Q & A session with co-moderators Jayne Graepel, former Associate Executive Director of The Connection, and Michelle Fielder, member and facilitator for the AntiRacism Committee. Attendees were encouraged to submit their questions ahead of time and the co-moderators led a conversation where McGhee spoke about the racism she discovered in our politics and policymaking, how addressing those issues would benefit us all, and what we could do as individuals to help.

"Since the moment The Connection opened as the YWCA of Summit, our foundation has been built upon values which foster diversity and inclusion. The choice to be fully integrated-and anti-racist—was made deliberately, and without

"We look to all we have in common to help move us forward; the strong respect for one another, the need to speak up at injustice, the desire to make space for all voices, and the commitment to listen and learn. SUMMIT TEENS SERVE OUR NEIGHBORS IN NEED

Bridges Outreach

On a cold morning in early December, a group of local teens trekked from the Oakes Center in Downtown Summit to Irvington's Civic Square on a mission to distribute 100 new winter coats, 150 sandwiches, and other sustainables to those experiencing homelessness and/or food insecurity in Essex County.

The group, Teens Tackle Homelessness (TTH), is a program of Bridges Outreach, the Summitbased organization that is dedicated to ending homelessness in New Jersey. TTH members are high schoolers from local counties that meet once a month to discuss the causes and costs of homelessness, as well as to explore creative solutions to ending homelessness.

Bridges is well known for their street outreach runs, where staff and volunteers distribute 65,000 brown bag meals, 10,000 pairs of socks and underwear, 7,500 hygiene kits, and tons of clothing each year in Newark and Irvington. December's TTH outreach run was bolstered by a generous donation of 100 new winter coats and 150 sandwiches coordinated and collected by the "1774 Sandwich Initiative" led by it's founder and TTH co-President, Leon Sarkissian.

"These coats will hopefully warm the hearts of many people, despite these frigid temperatures," exclaimed Sarkissian, who personally gave out the coats with a smile, while other TTH members served hot chocolate and soup to clients in line. In addition to the coats distributed on the outreach run, an additional 125 coats were

delivered to the Thirteenth Avenue School in Newark. The coats were generously donated by the Knights of Columbus.

The 1774 Sandwich Initiative started at the beginning of the year with the goal of collecting 1,774 sandwiches for distribution by year-end (1774 is a nod to the founding year of Newark Academy, the high school that Sarkissian attends and where the sandwiches are student-assembled). With over 5,500 sandwiches already distributed, they've increased the target tenfold to distribute 17,740 sandwiches by 2025 (Sarkissian's graduation year). As a result of the success of December's run, a new initiative to distribute 1,774 coats is now also underway.

"It's a privilege to help raise awareness at our schools and in the community" said Alice McNamara, who shares the role of TTH President with Sarkissian. Together, McNaramara and Sarkissian are organizing a "Sleep Out" fundraiser on February 17 where they are challenging friends, families, and businesses to spend one night in their backyard, car, or other outdoor space to raise crucial funds.

"I'm excited by the enthusiasm and fresh ideas this group has to offer and I'm grateful for their help in raising awareness and funds to support our mission," said Richard Uniacke, President of Bridges Outreach. "The next big idea for ending homelessness may well come from this group, and I can't wait to see where they take this."

Ruby Bridges is the story of the 6-year-old child who desegregated the New Orleans public school system in 1960. Board of Education had been decided, Ruby braved a crowd hurling hatred, insults, and death threats. Accompanied by federal marshals and her mother, Ruby succeeded in entering the all-white school, but she was to remain the only child in her class for the entire year.

Immediately after the screening, Hedy Tukey of the Summit College Club and Jean Crichton of the League of Women Voters will lead a discussion of the film.

SUMMIT ACHIEVES SUSTAINABLE JERSEY **CERTIFICATION**

The City of Summit has been awarded silver level certification from Sustainable Jersey for 2022.

The process was led by the Summit Environmental Commission and is the culmination of a year-long effort to document programs and policies in Summit that aim to reduce waste, cut greenhouse gas emissions, stimulate local economies, and increase resiliency and progress toward an equitable society.

"Municipalities that achieve certification are considered by their peers, state government, and civic organizations in New Jersey to be among the leaders in the state," explains Summit Mayor Nora Radest. "I am so proud that we have yet again achieved this important designation. Thank you to the Environmental Commission members and numerous city staff that collaborated on this important project. Your everyday efforts to make Summit a more sustainable community do not go unnoticed."

The City of Summit has achieved Sustainable Jersey certification in 2009, 2010, 2011, 2014, 2017, and 2019. In the 2022 certification process, Summit received 620 points from 50 separate actions.

The major categories in which Summit was awarded points include Waste Management (110 points); Public Information and Engagement, and Emergency Management and Resiliency (a total of 85 points generated from the Communications Office); and Natural Resources (80 points). The additional 345 points were spread across 11 additional categories.

"Sustainable Jersey certification benefits our city in many ways," reports Summit Environmental Commission Chairperson Donna Goggin Patel. "Summit has been awarded grants in the past that help us to fund programs like the Summit Free Market at the Transfer Station. This would not be possible without certification. It also provides an opportunity for us to analyze all sustainable actions citywide and examine where we may be able to take additional steps to enhance our environmental efforts."
