

on Saturday, Dec 3rd on the Village Green.

The Watchung Rescue Squad 2022 Tree of Lights honors the origins of this winter tradition. Returning from vacation at Martha's Vineyard in 1990, Judie McCumber approached the Watchung Rescue Squad with a suggestion for fundraising. For every donation, a light would be placed on a tree. After some discussion, Judie eventually convinced Captain Shirley Cattabiani and President Diddy Adario of this event's potential, despite the fact that the town's Village Green or even a tree had been established! With Judie's persistence, Shirley's can-do attitude, and Diddy's direction, ground was broken, a tree was planted, and lights were strung. And thus, the Tree of Lights was born.

With Judie's suggestions, the "original tree three" created a festive winter celebration and fundraiser that has come to be known as a Watchung tradition. The event originally took place on December 7th in honor of Pearl Harbor Day and remembrance of the lives lost protecting our freedom. Out of necessity, the ceremony was gradually established on the first Saturday of December. In addition, the Watchung Rescue Squad selects an annual dedication for an individual or group that has greatly impacted the Watchung community. Holding true to the themes of this celebration, the tree is always decorated with red and white lights for honor and remembrance. Donations to the Watchung Rescue Squad make it possible to commemorate lives and memories of our loved ones.

For over three decades, the countless members of the Squad and Watchung community have sustained the Tree of Lights through their dedication and support. Once again they extend their gratitude to all participants who have helped keep this tradition alive with their contributions, attendance, and cooperation.

CHARITY TAKES A DIFFERENT APPROACH TO DOMESTIC ABUSE

Watchung residents Rebecca and A. Stuart Kaplan, with the support of Robert Woods Johnson Foundation have launched Caged Birds Sing Inc.

According to the increase in hotline calls and Internet search analysis, incidents of Domestic Abuse and Violence have risen by up to 40% since the stress and isolation of Covid-19 lockdowns. In a move to address this dangerous trend that threatens public safety, Caged Birds Sing Inc. (CBSI) proposes a new, more approachable narrative (storyline), referring to these events as 'Household Harm' from which no one is immune and too many of us suffer in silence.

A CBSI spokesperson suggests, "We formed this charity to let victims know they are not alone, empower them to step forward, and raise awareness to escalate this fight. Our name is based on the iconic poem by Maya Angelou that uses a Caged Bird as a metaphor for those who sing in bitter captivity while they long for freedom. Our first 'Household Harm – No Shame' PR Campaign forms a new paradigm (model) that combines Artwork, Music, and Technology, to:

Inspire and empower individual victims of abuse to seek help, and reach a wider, more diverse, highly dynamic, and untapped audience willing to take up this cause in each community, to advocate and work for change, and disrupt the unacceptably silent status quo."

CBSI's main goal is to remove the stigma of shame surrounding toxic behavior in our living spaces, like the way opioid addiction was once unspeakable and is now an open topic. By introducing the subject using the term 'Household Harm' people can more easily and openly discuss the problems and sign up concerned volunteers to deploy workable solutions. Only then can we stop the spread of these very serious, often criminal forms of aggressive behavior, including Coercive Control, Domestic Abuse, Domestic Violence, and Intimate Partner Homicide: taboo subjects shunned by family members, our media, and the public eye.

The CagedBirdsSing.org website points to the sensationalized coverage of Gabby Petito's brutal murder, the televised Johnny Depp vs. Amber Herd celebrity trial, and the grandmother at home, who became the first victim that preceded the shooting rampage at the Uvalde, Texas school. "In these recent cases, the blow-by-blow coverage largely ignored the underlying abuse and the opportunity for knowledgeable experts to educate captivated audiences about the oftendour consequences of tolerating Household Harm." On that point, a recent study shows that 66% of mass shootings are committed by domestic violence perpetrators.

CBSI applauds and promotes the work of UN Women, with their spokesperson, Nicole Kidman, in their efforts to spread the word about "The Shadow Pandemic" and also acknowledges the National Domestic Violence Hotline, and the many other organizations passionately dedicated to making a difference for each of us who are negatively affected.

The Household Harm Outreach Program will train concerned citizens in under-equipped communities. CBSI provides the methodology and support to organize, operate, and provide immediate assistance to victims currently ignored by overwhelmed mental healthcare centers, law enforcement agencies, and slowmoving family courts.

Caged Birds Sing Inc. sums this up: "It is up to us all to cast a 'we-can-do-something-aboutit' light on these dark and dangerous problems, using the 'Household Harm-No Shame' narrative to open discussions and disrupt the status quo that often sweeps this ubiquitous problem under the rug. Let's begin to win The War Against Domestic Abuse."



BOARDS, COMMITTEES, AND COMMISSIONS BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT (ZONING)

Created in accordance with State requirements. This board has the powers granted by Municipal Land Use Law N.J.S.A. 40:55D-1 et seq.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health in partnership with the Middle Brook Regional Health Commission provides for the provision of certain health services to the Borough.

COMMUNITY EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM (CERT)

CERT helps train people to be better prepared to respond to emergency situations in their communities. CERT members can give critical support to first responders, provide immediate assistance to victims, and organize spontaneous volunteers at a disaster site.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION

This Commission exists for the protection, development or use of natural resources located within the Borough. They have the power to conduct research into the use and possible use of the open land areas of the Borough and may coordinate the activities of unofficial bodies organized for similar purposes, and may advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which, in its judgment, it deems necessary for its purposes.

GREEN TEAM ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Green Team was established to promote efforts to ensure Watchung is a sustainable

community. Sustainable policies and practices seek the long-term viability of the borough by saving tax dollars, conserving energy, reducing the community's carbon footprint and natural resource consumption, and providing for the health and safety of residents.

HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

This Committee seeks to preserve and protect the history of the Borough. The Committee maintains the Texier House as a local museum containing all artifacts and material pertaining to the history of the Borough. The Committee conducts programs as necessary to educate citizens on the colorful history of this area and to encourage resident participation

LIBRARY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

This Committee acts as a liaison between the Borough of Watchung and the Somerset County Library Commission and performs such other functions as deemed appropriate for the continuation of a public library within the Borough.

PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board is created in accordance with State requirements and has the powers granted to it by Municipal Land Use Law N.J.S.A. 40:55D-1 et seq.

RECREATION COMMISSION

This Commission is tasked with supervising all public playgrounds and recreation facilities and activities of the Borough, and may cause surveys to be made to be submitted to the Mayor and Council with recommendations for the improvement, maintenance or expansion of recreation facilities in the Borough. The Recreation Commission shall also work with the Environmental Commission, whose responsibilities also include the acquisition of property for open space, environmental or recreational purposes, and the Historical Committee, whose responsibilities also include matters pertaining to historic sites.

TRAFFIC AND BEAUTIFICATION COMMISSION

This Commission is tasked with rendering advice to the Mayor and Council concerning the planting, care and control of shade and ornamental trees, shrubbery and other landscaping upon and in the public streets, highways, public buildings and parks within the Borough. The Commission shall recruit and direct organizational and individual interest in the aesthetic improvement of the Borough.

YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION

The purpose of this Commission is to bring together community representatives in government, education, law enforcement, recreation and interested citizens to serve as a planning and enabling agency for the development and coordination of youth services to at[1]risk students in the Borough of Watchung.
