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The Summit Police Department is announcing upcoming dates for its 2023 Youth Academy. Two, one-week sessions will be held from July 17 to July 21 and July 24 to July 28 from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily and are open to children ages 11 to 14. Applications will be accepted through April 1, and are available online, at the Summit Police Department in City Hall, and in the main office at Lawton C. Johnson Summit Middle School.

Now in its seventeenth season, the popular program provides area youth with an opportunity to develop an understanding of the role of the police officer in the community. Modeled after actual Police Academy curriculum, recruits undergo physical training, drill and ceremony training, instruction in criminal investigation techniques, and evidence recovery and patrol practices. Cadets visit the Union County Police Academy and attend demonstrations from the Union County Sheriff's K-9 Unit, Union County S.W.A.T. Team and Bomb Squad.

Cadets are provided an official Summit Police Youth Academy uniform to wear during the session. Upon successful completion of the program, cadets participate in a graduation ceremony and receive a certificate of completion, official Summit Police Youth Academy patch, and access to a shared drive with photos taken during their session.

Admission to the program is on a rolling basis with preference given to Summit residents who are first time applicants; former recruits and outof-town applicants may be placed on a waiting list. A limited number of scholarships are available to those experiencing financial hardship. Applicants will be notified of their acceptance to the program on Monday, April 17. Accepted cadets will be instructed to submit the tuition fee of \$125 in the form of a check to the Summit Police Department by Friday, April 21. Any accepted cadets that do not submit payment by April 21 will be moved to the end of the program waiting list.

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SAFETY ISSUES REMAIN A REAL CONCERN

This Letter to the Editor was written before a 10-year-old Summit boy was injured in a crosswalk on his way to school on February 3, 2023. Thankfully he was not critically injured but please let this serve as a reminder that we need to always look out for others, especially when navigating our city streets either in a vehicle, riding a bicycle or on foot.

Dear Neighbors:

More than 22,000 residents and the 17,000 plus people who commute here for work or transit use our city streets each day. As traffic congestion in our region continues to grow, safety issues surrounding speeding remain a real concern for the Summit Police Department.

While it is simple to identify the problem - too many of us drive too fast or cross the street without paying adequate attention to what is happening around us – it is more of a challenge to affect lasting behavioral change in our community.

The Summit Police Department and city Engineering Division have redesigned several essential roadways with a focus on traffic calming and getting drivers to slow down by narrowing lanes, installing all-way stops at key intersections and speed humps. Flashing beacons and more than 50 marked crosswalks in the downtown and hundreds of crosswalks throughout the city allow pedestrians many safer

crossing options. City agencies continue to work together to improve streets and intersections in areas in and adjacent to the downtown and other high traffic areas.

We have also employed increased enforcement by the department's traffic unit and have been stopping and citing motorists for speeding and other offenses. Our community education campaign is ongoing and targeted to times of the year when pedestrian traffic increases - at the beginning of the school year and during the arrival of warmer weather.

Starting this month, you will see more information on vehicle and pedestrian safety being shared from the Summit Police Department and City of Summit. It is our goal to further educate and remind everyone to exercise caution when driving or walking and look out for others. In partnership with the schools, we are sharing safe drop off and pick up practices for families.

We pledge to continue to reimagine how to best improve Summit's existing streets, intersections, and sidewalks to benefit all who use them. It is imperative that all citizens make a similar pledge to make the safety of others a priority.




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


SUMMIT SYMPHONY CONCERT – MARCH 26





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REMEMBERING POLICE CHIEF LONNIE DAVIS

City of Summit

Police Department proudly remembers the contributions and accomplishments of its twelfth police chief, Lonnie Davis, the second African American municipal police chief in Union County history and Summit's first black chief of police.

Lonnie Davis joined the Police Department as a patrol officer in 1955 and rose through the ranks, becoming a Sergeant in 1968, a Lieutenant in 1978 and a Captain in 1986. He remained at that rank for five years, serving as Operations Division Commander, prior to being appointed Chief of Police in 1993. Not only did he have an impressive career, but he was also an exemplary member of the community. A lifelong resident of Summit, leaving only for his four years with the Army's 82nd Airborne, he attended Summit's public schools, was a member of the Wallace Chapel AME Zion

During black history month, the Summit Church, served on the Board of Trustees of the YMCA, was a member of the Rotary Club and former president of the Jaycees. He was also a member of the National Organization of Black Law Executives and a life member of the Police Benevolent Association. He and his wife, Marian Spaulding, raised four sons.

> Although Chief Davis died suddenly of a heart attack at the age of 60 only three months after he was appointed to the agency's top post in 1993, it does not diminish his legacy to the City of Summit and to the Police Department where he served faithfully for 38 years. Those who remember Chief Davis, as well as newspaper articles written about him at the time of his death, reveal a man who was universally admired and greatly respected throughout the City of Summit. Chief Davis will continue to be a source of pride to the department and to the entire Summit community.



SAGE PREPS FOR CHAMPIONS WEEK DURING MARCH FOR MEALS

City officials and members of community organizations are invited to join SAGE Eldercare during Community Champions Week (March 20-24) as it participates in the 20th annual March for Meals - a month-long, nationwide coming together of local community organizations, businesses, government officials and caring individuals to ensure that homebound and vulnerable older adults are not forgotten.

Past participants have included Summit Mayor, Nora Radest, Police Chiefs from Summit, New Providence, Berkeley Heights, Springfield and Mountainside and local government officials and volunteers.

Established in 1966, SAGE's Meals on Wheels is the oldest continuously run home delivery meal program in New Jersey. In 2022, approximately 100 volunteers delivered more than 28,875 meals to 250 people in Union County (Berkeley Heights, Mountainside, New Providence, Springfield, and Summit), Essex County (Millburn and Short Hills), and Morris County (Chatham and Madison). The average age of the clients SAGE delivers meals to is 83. Of those, 65% say they rarely have visitors other than their 'Meals on Wheels' volunteer.

"The services that we provide older adults in our area are critical; it's not just a warm meal, but also a friendly visit, sometimes the only human contact a person gets the whole day," said Terry Kaniuk, Volunteer Manager for Meals on Wheels. MAKE A SENIOR SMILE COLLECTING FOR SAGE'S MEALS ON WHEELS PARTICIPANTS

AN INTERVIEW WITH SUTTON CARPENTER BY ANN BEARDSLEY

Sutton Carpenter is in his second-year managing Make a Senior Smile, having taken over the reins from his older brother, Rowan, who initiated the project three years ago. They began the effort to make a positive impact on the lives of our senior population who were secluded during the pandemic. Creating special care packages with donated items, Sutton utilizes SAGE's Meals on Wheels network to distribute the packages for Valentine's Day. He spoke with us regarding the project this year.

Q: WHY IS THE PROJECT IMPORTANT TO YOU?

A: When we started Make a Senior Smile, a lot of people were stuck at home because of the pandemic. Now that the pandemic is pretty much over, things have finally gotten back to normal for most of us, but for many seniors, they still aren't able to get out much and might go several days without seeing or talking to anyone other than the person who brings them their Meals on Wheels. That's why we feel it's important to let our seniors know that somebody is thinking of them. Hopefully the care packages that we put together will brighten their day a little and make them feel less lonely.

Q: HOW MUCH TIME DOES THE PROJECT Require in Total?

A: Every time we do a donation drive, it takes a few hours to organize the donated items and wrap them up into care packages. We usually do this for a few days until we have enough bags to load up the trunk and deliver them to SAGE. If the donations keep coming in, then we do it all over until the car is full again, so it can take a while. We also spend time putting out fliers and posts on social media to let people know about the drive. And we try to post lots of photos because people like to see how their donations are being used.

Q: DOES THE COMMUNITY ASSIST YOU AND, IF SO, HOW?

A: Yes, we definitely could not do Make a Senior Smile without the help we get from our community. Friends, neighbors, students, people we know and lots of people we've never met before, all pitch in to help. Last year we also received donations from local organizations like the Summit Lions Club, who donated several big bags of candy, and the employees from Restoration Hardware at the Short Hills Mall, who dropped off some homemade cards. We really can't do this by ourselves, so we're always grateful for any help we get!

scouters who dedicate their time and talents to building and maintaining the scout camps of the Patriot's Path Boy Scout Council in northern New Jersey.

The group includes some tradesmen, but also professionals and volunteers of every background. Most are retired, but some still work full-time, and occasionally people volunteer to help for a day here or there. It is a very friendly group with great camaraderie and a good sense of humor. When one member reached age 100, they designated a parking spot reserved for "all Flintlocks over 100 years old". Two other members are 90 years old, but they will have to wait a while before parking in that spot.

The Flintlocks met for their Fall General Meeting on Thursday, October 20, 2022, at their workshop at Camp Winnebago in Rockaway, NJ. They reviewed the accomplishments of the previous year and discussed future projects the Council needs to have done. Some of the future projects include installing new windows in the dining hall, building a pavilion near the trading post, collecting Toys for Tots; and making craft kits and Pinewood Derby cars for special needs children.

The Patriot's Path Council of the Boy Scouts of America encompasses 5 counties in central and northern New Jersey: Middlesex; Morris, Somerset, Sussex, and Union. The Council website is ppcbsa.org. There are 11,000 scouts who use the camps in this council.

In spite of their name, the Flintlocks have nothing to do with antique firearms, although some of the old guys are considered "antiques". They meet every Thursday at Camp Winnebago, Rockaway, NJ, all year round, and guests are always welcome. They are organized as a 501c3 nonprofit corporation. All of the members are registered with the BSA, take CPR and AED training, and are vaccinated for COVID.

More than half of the Flintlocks have been awarded the prestigious Silver Beaver Award, which is the highest National Award for a volunteer in the Scouting Program. They usually provide approximately 5,000 hours of volunteer

UNION PLACE PARKING TIME LIMIT CHANGE

On January 31st the time limit for all on-street parking spaces on the north side of Union Place in downtown Summit will change from 90 minutes to 30 minutes.
