3RD ANNUAL CRANFORD FILM FESTIVAL

Tickets are now on sale for the 3rd annual Cranford Film Festival, which will be held Saturday, April 22 at the Cranford Theater from 6-10 p.m., and virtually from April 23 – May 7. Tickets may be purchased by going to the festival website: cranfordfilmfestival.org.

Festival proceeds support performing arts education enrichment for students grades K-12 in the Cranford Public Schools.

Last year's event drew enormous community interest. Tickets sold out for last year's film festival and there are only 200 remaining seats available for this year's event. There is also a virtual option for those who prefer to purchase tickets and watch the films at home.

In addition to the film festival, Arts Day in Cranford will also be in the afternoon of April 22 in the downtown. Arts Day is a celebration of arts in the public schools and the community and will host performing groups from the high school and private businesses. Arts day will be held outside and is free to all. It will conclude with a Jazz Jam at the clock at 4 p.m. All levels are welcome to play!

Arts Day is a collaboration between Downtown Cranford and Cranford Schools Friends of Performing Arts (CSFOPA), with sponsors Julia Murphy and Citizens Bank.

After Arts Day, you can get a bite to eat downtown and take your purchased festival ticket to the Cranford Theater and join everyone to watch selected local and worldwide films from filmmakers in categories such as fiction, documentary, horror, animation, music video and student films. Several of the films were made by local residents and feature Cranford locations. Festival director Lew Goldstein, who also founded in 2015 the annual Nassau Film Festival (this year May 20-21, 2023 nassaufilmfestival.org) in Princeton, is excited about the quality of local and regional films to be screened this year at the Cranford Theater. The film festival committee is led by co-managers Pam Brewster and Stephanie Ashinoff.

"Our volunteer team has spent hundreds of hours preparing for the upcoming festival. We expect this year to be our best yet, and can't wait to share the line-up of films we've assembled," states Pam Brewster, co-manager of the festival. "It's also been heartwarming to see the growing support for our film festival from the community, filmmakers, and local business sponsors. Importantly, that support has translated into additional funds for the Cranford performing arts programs throughout the district. For example, with our help, a new, state-of-the-art lighting system was recently purchased



for the high school auditorium."

CSFOPA recently granted \$17,000 to Cranford Public Schools for the new lighting system. Cranford Film Festival is the biggest fundraiser annually for CSFOPA, a 501c3 parent group which aims to support the performing arts public schools program. In the past several years, CSFOPA has dedicated tens of thousands of dollars for equipment, field trips and learning experiences. These grants have included buying lighting, camera equipment, classroom chairs, an upgraded stage curtain and valance, laptops, workshops, cello rack, cabinets to organize music, a xylophone, a drumset, and tents for outdoor classrooms.

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: JIM MADDEN RIDES TO END ALZHEIMER'S

The Alzheimer's Association Greater New Jersey Chapter (AAGNJ), the leading volunteerdriven voluntary health organization in Alzheimer's care, support, advocacy and research is spotlighting people who make a difference in the fight to end Alzheimer's and all other dementia. Jim Madden, a former New Providence Councilman and Union County Volunteer of the Year in 2021, is applying his passion for cycling and advocacy to help raise awareness and fund research for the Alzheimer's Association.

Jim has raised nearly \$22,000 on his first two rides in Washington D.C. and Austin, Texas, the 4th highest among all Ride to End Alz fundraisers, and will be participating in his third Ride to End Alz cycling event in the Nation's Capital, which winds through Maryland, Virginia

and Washington D.C on Sunday, May 7. He is create, the more progress we can make in clinical also a member of the Nation's Capital ride event planning committee. The Ride to End Alz is a cycling event for a range of riders, from novice cyclists, to weekend warriors, to avid enthusiasts. Riders select a distance between 10-100 miles that fits their skill level and pushes riders to earn a medal they will cherish. With each mile, participant's fuel cutting-edge research targeted to change the trajectory of Alzheimer's disease.

Jim explains, "I am determined to go the distance for all those affected by Alzheimer's. I am inspired by the strength of the more than 6 million Americans living with this disease, and the over 11 million family members and friends who provide them with care. In New Jersey alone, there are 190,000 living with the disease and 361,000 unpaid caregivers providing critical support. I am riding to honor the memories of friends and family members who have been affected by Alzheimer's and to support those who continue their courageous fight. I am riding this year for Jeanne Mancuso who continues her brave fight against Alzheimer's."

"Jeanne is the wife of my fraternity brother, Mike Mancuso. I mean here we are in our early sixties...we have to do more to help find a cure and therapies for Jeanne and the millions of others battling Alzheimer's and dementia spectrum. Folks such as Jeanne need more good days ahead and the more good days we can

practice and advancements."

In addition to using his legs for pedal power, Jim uses his voice on both the Federal and State level in the fight to end Alzheimer's. He is working to overturn the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) decision that denied the Alzheimer's Association's request to change its policy on FDA-approved treatments for people living with Alzheimer's. Despite unequivocal evidence confirmed by the scientific community, CMS continues to state it is not reasonable and necessary for people living with Alzheimer's to have access to an FDA-approved treatment without barriers. Also, Jim is working to advance bills A-2682 & S-1033, which would establish an Alzheimer's & Dementia Care Longterm Advisory Commission. The legislation was approved by the Senate and Assembly and has been sent to Governor Murphy for final approval.

Jim concludes, "Right now, there is no shortage of ideas in Alzheimer's research = only dollars - which is why I volunteer as a fundraiser and advocate to support the Alzheimer's Association's efforts to discover methods of treatment and prevention."

EAGLE SCOUT KATELYN CANNON WINS STATE-WIDE ESSAY CONTEST

Troop 19 from St. Rose of Lima Church, Short Hills, was unanimously selected as New Jersey's 2022 Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) winner of the Arthur M. & Berdena King Eagle Scout Award for authoring a patriotic themed essay titled "The Legacy of the Revolutionary Frontiersmen".

Katelyn's essay focused on racial tensions of the "Bloody Year" of 1782, where she highlighted the spike in racially motivated slaughters and vengeful attacks of both Native Americans and western Pennsylvania frontiersmen. Katelyn research discovered that she was a revolutionary descendant of Captain John "Miller" Hardin, who served under Colonel William Crawford in the Sandusky Plains as a member of the Westmoreland County Pennsylvania Militia. Colonel Crawford led his unit of approximately 500 men deep into Indian territory; however, he and dozens of his men were ultimately captured. Colonel Crawford was tortured and burned at the stake by American Indians. Fortunately, Captain Hardin was able to return home to his family shortly thereafter.

Katelyn's essay presented a brave argument that "the revolution of frontiersmen, including her ancestor John Hardin, left an important, if not always positive, legacy".

Katelyn, who is also a senior at Millburn High

EARTH DAY RIVER CLEAN-UP - APRIL 22

CRANFORD PORTION OF RIVER CLEAN UP

This year's Cranford River Clean Up will be held on Saturday April 22nd from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., with a rain date of April 23rd. The locations for the clean up will be at Kenilworth Blvd, Riverside Dr, Riverside Dr Footbridge, Hampton Park, Sperry Park, Droescher's Mill, High St Footbridge, Hillside Footbridge (Crane Parkway), and Mohawk Park. The locations will be marked with signs and there will be a sign in sheets for volunteers at all the locations.

The Township is providing garbage bags, tools, and disposable gloves, although volunteers are encouraged to bring their own tools, gloves, and a reusable water bottle if they wish. Volunteers should dress appropriately for walking alongside the wooded and muddy areas along the river and should not enter the river at any time while keeping a recommended distance of at least 8 feet from the river's edge. Children should be supervised by an adult at all times.

All volunteers are invited to celebrate Earth Day 2023 with a clean-up of the Rahway River with Union County Parks and Recreation's Rahway River Park on Saturday, April 22nd (with a rain date of Sunday, April 23rd).

The clean-up will focus on areas upstream and downstream of the dam at Winfield Park, New Jersey in Cranford, Clark, Linden and Rahway. Please come by the parking area adjacent to the waterfall of the Rahway River by the Bloodgood Dam at Winfield Park at 8:45 to register, pick up bags, gloves, bottled water and snacks, and receive safety information. Teams will be encouraged to travel to any part of the river within the park where they would like to perform cleanup activities. We specifically ask all folks to register and to work in small groups for safety purposes. Everyone under 18 must have their parent's signature on the attached Individual Waiver form as well as adult supervision to participate.

Cleaning up a river and park area is a great way to celebrate Earth Day and if you haven't participated in an event like this before, you will find it invigorating, and you will feel good about what you have accomplished...it is also fun and educational...especially for Scouts and young adults as they always find something interesting. Over the 25 years this cleanup has occurred

thousands of folks have participated, and pulled some amazing things from the river improving its quality.

The clean-up will generally be between 9 a.m. -12 p.m., but any amount of time or effort that folks can volunteer is appreciated. There is always a large volume of floatable debris to pick up. The team working registration will provide suggestions on areas with large volumes of floatable debris.

All participants should wear jeans, longsleeved shirts, gloves and boots, waders are welcome for folks who like to get a little wet. Each participant should bring a standard 5gallon carry bucket with a handle (put your name on the bottom)...this makes for easy carrying of "stuff" for transfer to the large garbage bags. A mulching rake is also a great asset to have to enable reaching out and pulling debris into shore from the river bank. After the event there is an inventory of the debris removed, and within approximately 24 hours Union County Parks and Recreation removes and disposes of all the trash.

IMAGINE SEEKS LOVING LISTENERS FOR JUNE TRAINING

You may be familiar with Imagine and know that the non-profit provides free peer support groups for children, youth, young adults and parents/guardians who are grieving. Did you know that the groups are facilitated by an amazing team of volunteer facilitators? Imagine's volunteer facilitators come from all walks of life and no special background is required other than a willingness to listen, a heart inclined to serve, and the ability to be with children and adults in grief without trying to fix, solve or give advice. No prior experience is necessary.

Volunteers must be 18 years or older. Spanishspeaking volunteers are needed as well. Volunteers serve as companions and loving listeners for those who are grieving and help create a safe space where participants can share tears and embrace the joys of life.

Here's how some of our current volunteer facilitators have described their experience:

"Being an Imagine volunteer has been the most fulfilling and worthwhile volunteer experience I've ever had. I feel that the model is just what it should be, and I love being a part of it. I think being an imagine volunteer helps me fulfill my desire to be a good person." Aimee-6+ years as Imagine Facilitator

"People outside of Imagine are always supportive when they hear that I volunteer at a grief support center. But I know it can be a little confusing to hear that volunteering at a grief support center is the best night of my week. And

If you'd like to join Imagine's amazing team of volunteer facilitators, there is a training planned for June 2 - 4. Each training is held from 9 a.m. – 5a.m. each day over 3 days at Imagine's Mountainside center. Imagine asks that you plan to attend the entire training. Participants in the training will have an opportunity to learn companioning and facilitation skills while sharing stories with one another and providing each other with support. Many of Imagine's facilitators come away from the training feeling truly connected to one another and describe the

VANDALS CAUGHT IN THE ACT.

The "Pool House Gang" were caught red handed vandalizing a building at Boy Scout Camp Wheeler, in Byram Township, NJ. They are seen here in a "line up" against the wall.

They claim that they were doing repairs and renovations to an old decrepit building at the Boy Scout Camp. But they were seen removing valuable lumber, sinks, toilets, shower heads, and construction materials from the building.

Just kidding. This is a group of dedicated volunteers, including many retired professionals, who volunteer every week all year round at the Boy Scout camps for Patriot's Path Council in northern New Jersey. These guys pictured have come up every Wednesday and Thursday for several months to renovate the Pool House and other buildings. This group includes retired engineers, an electrician, computer experts, small business owners, and corporate executives.

The Pool House building was built in 1971. The roof was still good, but the wooden walls were completely rotted, and the roof was sagging perilously. They needed to prop up the roof and replace the boards one by one. Eventually the building will have two bathrooms, two common showers and 8 individual changing rooms on each of two sides. There is a full sized swimming pool behind the building, so all of the chlorination, pumping mechanisms and electrical service are also located inside the building.

The "Flintlocks BSA, Inc." a 501c3 corporation, is a group of retired scouters who volunteer at the camps every week, all year round, to help the council. They do most of the repairs and maintenance for the three Council camps, but also build new structures, such as cabins, waterfront structures, picnic tables and tent platforms. In 2018 they secured funding and built the STEM Lab at Allamuchy. Second, they make the craft kits for birdhouses, bird feeders, stools, handy boxes, racing sailboats, etc., which are sold through the Scout Shops. Third, Flintlocks volunteer to help run the many Council programs. Three quarters of the Flintlocks have received the Silver Beaver Award, the highest National award a volunteer may receive. CELEBRATING 14TH ANNIVERSARY OF HEART TRANSPLANT

NJ Sharing Network

Chriseline Beaubrun of Plainfield, NJ, is taking time to reflect on the gift of life and the miracle of organ and tissue donation and transplantation as she recently celebrated 14 years since receiving her life-saving heart transplant.

Chriseline is passionate about advocating for NJ Sharing Network, the nonprofit organization responsible for the recovery and placement of donated organs and tissue in the Garden State. She actively shares her story with others to encourage more people to register as organ and tissue donors.

"Today, I feel blessed and lucky. I do not think any gift is greater than the gift of life," said Chriseline. "When I encourage people to register as organ and tissue donors, I explain to them that just one organ and tissue donor can save eight lives and enhance the lives of over 75 others. But the transplant waiting list is long, and we cannot stop working to save lives."

In 2007, Chriseline was 57 years old when she was diagnosed with congestive heart failure. A widowed mother of two, Chriseline had just completed her master's degree in nursing, and she felt that she had the skills to deal with life's challenges. But her biggest challenge hit her like a blow to the stomach when her cardiologist delivered the official diagnosis.

As a nurse, Chriseline had worked hard all her adult life and had taken care of her body. Unfortunately, Chriseline's symptoms worsened despite medications and a defibrillator implanted in her chest. She soon reached a point where she was unable to take a single shallow breath without intense pain.

Chriseline fondly remembers the satisfaction of taking her first deep breath in more than a year and leaving the hospital with a second chance to live life. Throughout the long process of recovery, Chris experienced both successes and setbacks. But her new heart remained strong, as

did the support of her family, friends, and colleagues.

Currently, there are over 100,000 Americans – nearly 4,000 of whom live in New Jersey – waiting for a life-saving transplant, according to United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS). However, the generosity of those in the Garden State is providing hope for the future. In 2022, the number of organ donors (283) and organs transplanted (670) in a single year reached alltime highs This marked the fourth consecutive year NJ Sharing Network has reported new records in the number of organ donors, underscoring the clear trend of increased support for organ donation.
