

Greenbrook Historical Society

The Dr. John Vermeule House, one of Green Brook's historic links to its early settlers was built as a farmstead. Construction began in 1799 and became occupied by the Vermeule family in 1805. Dr. Vermeule practiced medicine and operated a farm on the original 113 acres of his property. The home is based on a blending of English and Dutch architectural traditions with Georgian and Federal style influences.

Vermeule ownership of the property ended in 1824. Various families bought and sold the property over the years, namely, Vail, Cohen, Voorhies and lastly, Mundy. The farmstead continued to function as a dairy farm into the mid-20th century. The township of Green Brook acquired the house and remaining 2.2 acres of the property in 2008. Necessary preservation renovations have been made to some structural elements, but the house is virtually unchanged from its original construction.

The Dr. John. Vermeule House, located at 223 Rock Avenue, Green Brook will be open for visitors on Saturday, April 15th from 10:00 a.m. – 12 p.m. There you will meet several of its volunteer members to give you a glimpse into 19th - 20th century rural living. There are some interesting outbuildings and farm equipment to see, on the 2-acre property.

STUDENTS PARTICIPATE IN NY/NJ ETHICS BOWL

Green Brook Public Schools

The NY/NJ Middle School Ethics Bowl was held on February 25th, 2023 at Kent Place School in Summit, New Jersey. This academic competition provides an opportunity for teams of students to competitively discuss and analyze ethical issues.Thirteen Schools throughout New Jersey and New York were represented. Green Brook Middle School was one of only of two public schools to attend the event.

Coach John Rockwell of Green Brook Middle School worked with students to practice the critical skills necessary to succeed at the Bowl. There are four main parts of the Ethics Bowl: Presentation; Open Dialogue; Judges Questions; and Final Question.

The teams practiced public speaking and their ability to articulate complex ideas in a clear and concise way. They also developed skills in asking questions to enhance conversation during the Open Dialogue portion of the round. They learned to listeni intently and provide reasoned responses to specific questions.

Students showed their ability to actively listen and build on the ideas of others the Final Question portion of the competition.

The Green Brook Teams more than held their

own against many of the schools winning head to head matches against teams from Far Brook, the Packer School, Delbarton and The Peck School. One team tied in a match against the Stevens Cooperative School, which were the winners of the Ethics Bowl. Overall, students were satisfied with their experience in the Ethics program. One 7th Grade student, Sonia Nikhil commented "My mind has flourished with Ethics. I felt encouraged to think outside the box and look at situations from multiple perspectives other than the one I agree with. Another 7th Grade student, Charlie Ford, reflected, "Before, I was sometimes more awkward and one sided when talking to other people, and Ethics has helped me have better conversations with different kinds of people."

Coach Rockwell indicated that the teams' success at the Ethics Bowl was due to the hard work of his students and the support of their parents, who drove their children to team meetings at 7AM on Friday mornings. He also thanked his Superintendent Dr. James Bigsby and his principal Ms. Alicia Subervi for their encouragement, support, and dedication. He also wanted to thank his Supervisor of Learning and Teaching, Matt Santos, for agreeing to be a judge during scrimmages and at the event.

CLASS OF 2023 PROJECT GRADUATION SEEKS COMMUNITY SUPPORT


The Watchung Hills Regional High School Project Graduation Committee has been busy working on the Class of 2023's Senior year events and graduation night event since the beginning of the school year in September.

"EAGLE'S NEST" PRESERVED IN THE WATCHUNG HILLS

open space purchase of the "Eagle's Nest," one of several major lookouts in the Watchung Hills used by General George Washington during the American Revolution. Consisting of 1.43 acres, the property holds outsized historic importance, and fills in a missing piece in the Somerset County Park Commission's Washington Valley Park.

Also known as Wavne's Brigade Encampment, the" Eagle's Nest" site in Bridgewater Township was owned for several decades by local restauranteur and Navy veteran Herbert Patullo, who showcased it, off-and-on, as a private Revolutionary War museum. The property was accessible via a right-of-way through Washington Valley Park. A lifelong resident of Bound Brook, Mr. Patullo wanted the property to be preserved. Acquiring the land has been a high priority of Somerset County and the purchase was handled through his Estate, following Mr. Patullo's death in 2020.

"On behalf of the Estate of Herbert ("Herb")

Somerset County in February completed the Patullo, we are very pleased that Herb's wishes Borough, wrote about the Eagle's Nest site in his and legacy are fulfilled with the transition of this property to the County of Somerset," said John Bruder, co-executor of the estate. "Herb expressly desired that the property be conveyed to the County so that the property would be maintained as an historic site and not developed. With this transaction, we have now ensured that Herb's wishes for the preservation of this historic piece of property are honored. Herb was himself a treasured piece of Somerset County history, having accomplished many things in his life including leaving Bound Brook High School as a 16-yearold to serve his country, at the US Army Supply Depot during WWII, and later in the US Navy. Herb was a local historian and Revolutionary War history buff. He would be very happy to know that Somerset County shall preserve this property for the benefit of all its residents and use it as a centerpiece for its celebration of the 250th anniversary of this nation's founding."

book Middlebrook: The Revolutionary War Encampment that Saved America (American History Press, 2021). In the book, he describes seven lookout rocks through the Watchung Mountains, including the most famous, Washington Rock in Green Brook. Mayers has dubbed the newly acquired property as "Middlebrook Washington Rock" and believes it was used by Washington more often than any other.

"The Revolutionary War was here. Washington stayed seven months right here," said Mr. Mayers in a video released by Somerset County. "This is a fantastic place, and for 250 years it was forgotten!"

The Eagle's Nest was acquired in February by Somerset County with dedicated Open Space funds for \$680,000 and will be incorporated into the surrounding Washington Valley Park. The County is considering options for possible future uses of the small residential building, barn, and pavilion that remain on the property. Until a plan is developed for the property, the buildings and adjacent fenced area will not be accessible to the public.
