ST. BARTHOLOMEW CELEBRATES 75 YEARS OF SERVICE COLDWELL BANKER

After many years of not having a place of worship within their own town. Roman Catholic Scotch Plains and Fanwood residents turned to the Archdiocese of Newark hoping for a parish to be established within their hometowns. On July 10, 1946, intense efforts began to establish a Roman Catholic parish in Scotch Plains beginning with a "Letter of Appeal" to the Most Reverend Thomas Joseph Walsh, the Archbishop of the Newark Diocese at that time. Nearly two years later, on June 4, 1948, Archbishop Walsh granted their request and issued a "Letter of Establishment". On June 16, 1948, Reverend John S. Nelligan was appointed as the church's first pastor. About 5 months later, on November 21, the "groundbreaking ceremony" took place, and the rest is history. Local Roman Catholics have had a hometown place of worship for 75 years.

Current pastor, Reverend John J. Paladino was appointed pastor on May 1, 2005. Through his vision and dedication for the past 18 years, St. Bartholomew the Apostle parish continues to expand and spread the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Since 1948, St. Bartholomew's parish has celebrated many religious holidays, sacraments, and events with their parishioners. Religious ceremonies performed to date include11,389 Baptisms, 10,694 First Holy Communions,

10,091 Confirmations, 2,876 weddings and 3,858 funerals and countless masses and other services and sacraments.

The celebrations for this diamond jubilee of the inception of St. Bartholomew Church and 75 years of service to the Scotch Plains-Fanwood community have begun. The festivities kicked off Friday, March 3rd with their "First Friday" Mass. The Mass was celebrated by Bishop Elias Lorenzo, OSB of the Archdiocese of Newark along with Fr. Matthew Gonzalez and Deacon Bob Gurske both of St. Bartholomew's Church. Scotch Plains Mayor Josh Losardo and Township Manager Al Mirabella were in attendance and presented the parish with a proclamation for this milestone. After Mass, over 110 guests attended The Prime Timers luncheon which was organized by parishioner and 75th anniversary committee member Gail Iozzi.

The festivities continued on Sunday, March 5th, with the Knights and Dames prayer service concelebrated by Bishop Lorenzo, Fr. John Paladino, Fr. Matthew Gonzalez and Deacon Bob Gurske. Buonaguro oversees the planning, organizing and direction of all recreational programs, activities and events in Scotch Plains. In addition, through her active involvement in the New Jersey Recreation and Park Association – through which she has won this award - she provides Scotch Plains with the latest industry trends to refine and expand programming. Moreover, Buonaguro is a Certified Park and Recreation Professional through the Association.

"Julie recognizes the crucial role that parks and recreation plays in our community," said Councilman Matt Adams, liaison to the Recreation Commission. "She has been heavily involved in developing our master plan, as we focus on facility needs to accommodate growing demand. All volunteers are invited to celebrate Earth Day 2023 with a clean-up of the Rahway River with Union County Parks and Recreation's Rahway River Park on Saturday, April 22nd (with a rain date of Sunday, April 23rd).

The clean-up will focus on areas upstream and downstream of the dam at Winfield Park, New Jersey in Cranford, Clark, Linden and Rahway. Please come by the parking area adjacent to the waterfall of the Rahway River by the Bloodgood Dam at Winfield Park at 8:45 to register, pick up bags, gloves, bottled water and snacks, and receive safety information. Teams will be encouraged to travel to any part of the river within the park where they would like to perform cleanup activities. We specifically ask all folks to register and to work in small groups for safety purposes. Everyone under 18 must have their parent's signature on the attached Individual Waiver form as well as adult supervision to participate.

Cleaning up a river and park area is a great way to celebrate Earth Day and if you haven't participated in an event like this before, you will find it invigorating, and you will feel good about what you have accomplished...it is also fun and educational...especially for Scouts and young adults as they always find something interesting. Over the 25 years this cleanup has occurred thousands of folks have participated, and pulled some amazing things from the river improving its quality.

The clean-up will generally be between 9 a.m. -12 p.m., but any amount of time or effort that folks can volunteer is appreciated. There is always a large volume of floatable debris to pick up. The team working registration will provide suggestions on areas with large volumes of floatable debris.

All participants should wear jeans, longsleeved shirts, gloves and boots, waders are welcome for folks who like to get a little wet. Each participant should bring a standard 5gallon carry bucket with a handle (put your name on the bottom)...this makes for easy carrying of "stuff" for transfer to the large garbage bags. A mulching rake is also a great asset to have to enable reaching out and pulling debris into shore from the river bank. After the event there is an inventory of the debris removed, and within approximately 24 hours Union County Parks and Recreation removes and disposes of all the trash.
