The Summit Volunteer First Aid Squad is pleased to announce its 2023 Leadership team. Mayor Nora Radest visited the Squad's Summit Ave. building to administer the Oath of Office. The Mayor was also joined by City Council President Greg Vartan, who was a Squad volunteer for 12 years.

The Squad's new President is John Buscaino who was Vice President last year and also served as President in 2018. Kerry Whitcher, who has been the Squad's Personnel Lieutenant for several years is the new Vice President. Treasurer Bob Mendes and Secretary Rob McGrath return in their respective roles.

George Shepherd who was Deputy Chief last year is the new Chief and Laura Bevenento, last years' Training Lieutenant is the new Deputy Chief. Mel Harari who served as Records Lieutenant for 10 years has now assumed the role of Training Lieutenant. John Christmann, a former President who also served as Equipment Lieutenant is the new Records Lieutenant and Tory Weeks is the new Equipment Lieutenant.

Squad Trustees include: former President Kevin Caropreso, former President and Chief John Staunton, and returning Trustees Rich Burns, Fred Schwarzmann, Charles Vickers, and Nancy Weeks.

Last year the Squad members answered 2,326 emergency calls, the most in their 60-year history.

NEW JERSEY LOCAL GOVERNMENT WEEK 2023

The City of Summit is participating in New Jersey Local Government week from Sunday, April 16, through Saturday, April 22. NJ Local Government week is a time for municipalities to bring awareness to the role local government plays in achieving the best life for communities.

The city will kick off the week on Monday, April 17, with a tea with Mayor Radest on Facebook live. The tea will last approximately 15 minutes and allow for questions from viewers. The Communications Office will film virtual video tours of locations including Common Council chamber, the Transfer Station, and Community Center. Equipment used by the police and fire departments and public works will also be highlighted in video segments. One video will be shown each day on social media, the city YouTube channel, and the city website, from Monday, April 17, through Saturday, April 22.

To encourage eighth grade students from Lawton C. Johnson Summit Middle School to share their civic pride, the city is initiating a "Mayor for the Day" essay contest. Submissions will answer the question: "If you were given a chance to be mayor of Summit, what would you do?" Responses were asked to focus on specific actions that the student would take to make Summit an even better place to live, work, and visit. The winner of the contest will spend a day with Mayor Radest conducting official business including a ribbon-cutting ceremony for a new business or facility, tours of city buildings, a meeting with staff, and the Tuesday, April 18, Common Council meeting where they will provide a report to council and the community.

"NJ local government week is a time for municipalities to bring awareness to the role local government plays in achieving the best life for communities," explains Mayor Nora Radest. "It is our hope that by the end of the week, citizens will have learned something new about municipal operations and how services benefit our everyday lives."

ENFORCEMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLE AND PEDESTRIAN VIOLATIONS

City of Summit

As part of an ongoing effort to improve pedestrian safety and decrease distracted and careless driving, the Summit Police Department Patrol Bureau and Traffic Bureau are increasing enforcement of motor vehicle and pedestrian violations in the Central Retail Business District and adjacent downtown areas.

During these patrols, warnings and summonses will be issued to motorists and pedestrians whose actions put pedestrians at risk. Enforcement of stops for pedestrian and jaywalking laws will be made on a continuing basis.

The Summit Police Department reminds motorists to stop and remain stopped for a pedestrian in a crossing at a marked crosswalk. At intersections, drivers must give way to pedestrians crossing the road. Pedestrians must wait for a suitable gap in the traffic flow before crossing a road or entering a crosswalk, ensuring that it is safe to do so.

In the State of New Jersey, motorists who fail to yield to pedestrians or who overtake and pass vehicles that are stopped for pedestrians are subject to, upon conviction for a violation of the law, two points and a \$231 fine. They may also receive enhanced penalties that include up to 15 days of community service and will incur insurance surcharges.

Pedestrians are required to obey traffic signals, use crosswalks, and follow pedestrian signals at intersections. At an unsignalized intersection,

they must wait for a suitable gap in traffic flow **TIPS FOR PEDESTRIANS** before crossing a road or entering a crosswalk. Pedestrians do not have the right-of-way unless it is safe to enter a crosswalk. Failure to observe pedestrian laws in the State of New Jersey carries a \$54 fine.

Motorists who park vehicles illegally will also be subject to ticketing. Illegal parking disrupts traffic flow and impedes line-of-sight for both motorists and pedestrians, creating safety issues. **TIPS FOR DRIVERS**

- Put the phone down. Pull over to the side of the road if you have a distraction that cannot wait until you get to your destination.
- Look for pedestrians everywhere. Pedestrians may not be walking where they should be or may be hard to see, especially in poorly lit conditions, including dusk, dawn, night, and inclement weather.
- Always stop for pedestrians in a crosswalk.
- Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk. They may be stopped to allow pedestrians to cross the street.
- · Slow down and look for pedestrians who may be entering a crosswalk.
- When turning at intersections, reduce speed to five miles per hour.
- Follow speed limit; slow down around pedestrians.
- Stay focused and slow down where children may be present, such as in school zones.
- Never drive under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

- Pay attention, put the phone down, and avoid distractions, especially when crossing the street.
- Walk on a sidewalk or path when one is available.
- If no sidewalk or path is available, walk on the shoulder, facing traffic. Stay alert; don't be distracted by electronic devices, including phones, earbuds/headphones, and other devices that take your eyes and ears off the road.
- Be predictable. Cross streets at crosswalks or intersections when possible. This is where drivers expect to see pedestrians.
- If a crosswalk or intersection is not available, locate a well-lit area, wait for a gap in traffic that allows you enough time to cross safely, and continue to watch for traffic as you cross.
- Never assume that a driver sees you. Make eye contact with drivers as they approach.
- Teach children how to safely cross streets and to watch for moving vehicles in driveways when walking on the sidewalk.
- Be visible. Wear bright clothing during the day and wear reflective materials or use a flashlight at night.

IMAGINE RECEIVES GRANT FROM THE SUMMIT FOUNDATION

As Nelson Mandela stated so beautifully, "If you talk to a man in a language he understands, that goes to his head. If you talk to him in his own language, that goes to his heart." This is why Imagine is incredibly grateful to the Summit Foundation for its generous support to help ensure that they are able to offer Spanish speaking services to families who are grieving in a language that's true to their heart.

In Spanish, "duelo" is used to describe grief, and the literal translation of duelo is pain. Imagine wants to support those who are experiencing pain - and other emotions - as they go through their grief journey. Creating a safe space to be able to speak to your grief experience in your native tongue is a powerful experience that Imagine is able to provide. They are helping those who are Spanish speaking to know they are not alone in their feelings and can feel comfortable sharing their experience with one another in their support groups.

In July of 2022, Imagine received a generous grant in the amount of \$20,000 from the Summit Foundation in order to help grow their Spanish speaking programs. Thanks to their support, Imagine was able to continue their efforts to provide support to Spanish speaking families. They began their program year in September of 2022 offering two Spanish speaking adult support groups. One of the groups is held in person at Imagine's Mountainside center, and the other is



offered virtually. Both groups meet every other week to hear one another's stories and give and receive support as they mourn the loss of their person who has died. In order to accomplish this, Imagine employs three bi-lingual staff members who are fluent in Spanish. That means that from the moment a family calls Imagine, they are able to communicate with someone about their loss in their most fluent language. Support calls and orientations are conducted in Spanish, and on a Night of Support, Imagine has a bi-lingual staff member and Spanish Speaking facilitators to lead this adult grief support group.

In addition to Imagine's support groups, Imagine has also been offering parenting education in Spanish and English for the parents and guardians of the children in Imagine's support group program. These workshops were created to support the parents/guardians of Imagine's kids as they navigate the challenges of supporting their children as they grieve. Three programs have been offered since the beginning of Imagine's program year in September, and two additional workshops will be offered this spring. Imagine also offers several community webinars throughout the year and Imagine's Training and Education Director, Veronica Ortiz, LPC, has been offering the same content for a Spanish speaking audience. As a part of their training and education program, Imagine has been able to provide trainings in Spanish to groups where English is their second language, ensuring that language is not a barrier to getting grief support. All of this is possible because of the generous grant provided by the Summit Foundation.

Additionally, Veronica will partner with Imagine's Newark Program Manager, Sonia Nunez, and Senior Newark Program Associate, Angela Vivar, to present a webinar on Grief in the Latinx Community on April 6th from 7-8:30 p.m. Please visit Imagine's website at www.imaginenj.org to register for the free workshop.

Imagine's Executive Director, Lindsay Schambach said this about the programs that Imagine has been able to offer because of the generosity of The Summit Foundation: "Grief is universal. It knows no age, race, economic or language barriers. If you are able to love, you are able to grieve. We are grateful to be able to partner with the Summit Foundation who share our values and beliefs, as we support our Spanish speaking families and work to ensure that no one grieves alone."

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: JIM MADDEN RIDES TO END ALZHEIMER'S

The Alzheimer's Association Greater New Jersey Chapter (AAGNJ), the leading volunteerdriven voluntary health organization in Alzheimer's care, support, advocacy and research is spotlighting people who make a difference in the fight to end Alzheimer's and all other dementia. Jim Madden, a former New Providence Councilman and Union County Volunteer of the Year in 2021, is applying his passion for cycling and advocacy to help raise awareness and fund research for the Alzheimer's Association.

Jim has raised nearly \$22,000 on his first two rides in Washington D.C. and Austin, Texas, the 4th highest among all Ride to End Alz fundraisers, and will be participating in his third Ride to End Alz cycling event in the Nation's Capital, which winds through Maryland, Virginia

and Washington D.C on Sunday, May 7. He is create, the more progress we can make in clinical also a member of the Nation's Capital ride event planning committee. The Ride to End Alz is a cycling event for a range of riders, from novice cyclists, to weekend warriors, to avid enthusiasts. Riders select a distance between 10-100 miles that fits their skill level and pushes riders to earn a medal they will cherish. With each mile, participant's fuel cutting-edge research targeted to change the trajectory of Alzheimer's disease.

Jim explains, "I am determined to go the distance for all those affected by Alzheimer's. I am inspired by the strength of the more than 6 million Americans living with this disease, and the over 11 million family members and friends who provide them with care. In New Jersey alone, there are 190,000 living with the disease and 361,000 unpaid caregivers providing critical support. I am riding to honor the memories of friends and family members who have been affected by Alzheimer's and to support those who continue their courageous fight. I am riding this year for Jeanne Mancuso who continues her brave fight against Alzheimer's."

"Jeanne is the wife of my fraternity brother, Mike Mancuso. I mean here we are in our early sixties...we have to do more to help find a cure and therapies for Jeanne and the millions of others battling Alzheimer's and dementia spectrum. Folks such as Jeanne need more good days ahead and the more good days we can

practice and advancements."

In addition to using his legs for pedal power, Jim uses his voice on both the Federal and State level in the fight to end Alzheimer's. He is working to overturn the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) decision that denied the Alzheimer's Association's request to change its policy on FDA-approved treatments for people living with Alzheimer's. Despite unequivocal evidence confirmed by the scientific community, CMS continues to state it is not reasonable and necessary for people living with Alzheimer's to have access to an FDA-approved treatment without barriers. Also, Jim is working to advance bills A-2682 & S-1033, which would establish an Alzheimer's & Dementia Care Longterm Advisory Commission. The legislation was approved by the Senate and Assembly and has been sent to Governor Murphy for final approval.

Jim concludes, "Right now, there is no shortage of ideas in Alzheimer's research = only dollars - which is why I volunteer as a fundraiser and advocate to support the Alzheimer's Association's efforts to discover methods of treatment and prevention."

It is one of the largest book sales in the area and our major fundraising event. We believe in it! The Book Sale recycles used books, it provides new reading to people at very low cost, and the profits we derive are all used to fund scholarships for deserving local students. DONATIONS

As in the past, Summit College Club's Book Sale will fill the American Legion Post 433 building at 357 Elkwood Avenue (right next to the town library) in New Providence. People with books to donate are asked to bring them to that building on four days only: Friday, April 14, from 1 to 7 p.m., and Saturday through Monday, April 15, 16, and 17, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The sale accepts a variety of media in good condition: books, CDs, DVDs, etc. It does not accept encyclopedias, magazines, manuals, textbooks, or VHS tapes.

Masks are recommended in the hall during donations and the sale.


