SERVING THE COMMUNITY FOR 90 YEARS

Fanwood -Scotch Plains College Club

During a recent council meeting of the Township of Scotch Plains, Mayor Joshua Losardo, presented the College Club of F-SP with a resolution which read in part: "The Township Council of the Township of Scotch Plains extend their sincerest congratulations to the College Club Members and we acknowledge and praise the club's 90 years of service to our community".

The first meeting of the College Club of F-SP was held on March 13, 1933 with twelve members in attendance. For the past ninety years the College Club has continued to keep the original objectives of the club to empower young women through education by establishing a scholarship fund through fundraising to provide scholarships for local young women and to be a source of social interaction and fellowship for its members.

In 1936 the club awarded its first scholarship for \$200. The first time the club awarded more than one scholarship was in 1949 when two \$300 scholarships were awarded. This past year, the College Club awarded \$30,500 to twelve young women for the 2022-2023 academic year. To date, the College Club has awarded approximately \$750,000.00 to approximately 574 local young women.

Fundraising for the Scholarship Fund has its inception. One of the early fundraisers was ticket sales for two benefit performances of the Plainfield Players. The tickets sold for forty cents and the club was able to keep ten cents from each ticket sold. The sale of 85 tickets added \$8.50 toward a scholarship! Currently the two major fundraisers of the College Club are the annual Spring Luncheon and the annual sales of the Community Date Calendar. The Spring Luncheon fundraiser has evolved from a fashion show/bridge event that was first held in 1936 and raised \$123.50 for scholarships. The Community Date Calendra was initiated in 1963 and by 1965 the calendar netted a profit of \$775 and became a permanent project of the College Club. Community Outreach projects and interest groups for members to enjoy have been a part of the College Club since its beginning.

The College Club holds monthly meetings that include informative and entertaining programs that are free and open to the public.

SERVICE LEAGUE 50 YEARS OF SERVICE, \$1.5 MILLION IN DONATIONS

The Fanwood-Scotch Plains Service League is celebrating 50 years of service in 2023, marked by a week-long celebration kicking off on Saturday, May 6, at 10 a.m.

That's when Scotch Plains Mayor Joshua Losardo, Fanwood Mayor Colleen Mahr and other local officials will join members of the Service League at the Fanwood-Scotch Plains Service League Thrift Shop, 1741 East Second Street, Scotch Plains. Resolutions will be presented, refreshments will be served and recognition given to the non-profit, all-volunteer Service League for their community contributions during the past 50 years.

From inception in 1973, the League has donated more than \$1.5 million in grants to Union County organizations and in student scholarships, including \$60,000 in donations this year alone. Proceeds come from the operation of the Thrift Shop, a staple in downtown Scotch Plains that offers good quality, reasonably priced merchandise to customers. All goods sold at the store come strictly from very generous donors who provide the shop with new or gently used items that they no longer need or want.

The Saturday ceremony will be followed by events throughout the week, including a raffle basket, small bags of candy as giveaways to store patrons, and a Vera Bradley handbag event starting Tuesday, May 9. All members of the public are invited to attend the Saturday May 6 event and to support the Service League mission to "Help Us Help Others."

Looking ahead, the Service League's goal for the next 50 years is to continue to contribute financially to worthwhile community organizations and to local high school and college students. Allowing it to reach that goal are the dedicated efforts of more than 35 Service League volunteers who selflessly donate their time to keep the shop in continuous operation and to ensure a very successful re-sale rate at the store.

The Thrift Shop provides benefits for donors who have a clean, convenient place to drop off their goods; for shoppers who can take advantage of very modest prices; and for the environment, by giving slightly used merchandise a second chance at a useful life rather than being relegated to landfills. The store offers a wide variety of regularly replenished clothing in sizes from infants to plus-size adults; shoes; all types of accessories from scarves to handbags; jewelry; bric-a-brac; housewares; framed art; collectibles; linens; dolls, toys, games, puzzles, books and DVDs.

Items for donation can be dropped off at the Thrift Shop any time during regular store hours: Tuesday through Friday, 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., and Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

AUTHOR TO SPEAK - MAY 23RD

The Historical Society of Scotch Plains And Fanwood

History and Civil War buffs won't want to miss this month's meeting of the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Historical Society, when local author William McClintock Jr. will present a fascinating educational program on his greatgreat-grandfather, Commodore Reigart Bolivar Lowry, a member of the first graduating class of the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis and a career naval officer who served in the U.S. Navy from 1840-1880.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 23rd, at the Shady Rest Country Club, 820 Jerusalem Rd. (at the corner of Plainfield Avenue) in Scotch Plains.

McClintock's presentation, based on his 2021 book, Commodore Reigart Bolivar Lowry, will explore Lowry's storied career, beginning when he joined the Navy at age 14, and including his active role in many key naval operations of the time. Lowry was on a ship off Fort Sumter when the first shots of the Civil War were fired. He fought in the Mexican-American War and accompanied Commodore Matthew C. Perry when he opened Japan to American trade in 1854. Based on family letters and other documents, McClintock's thoroughly researched Connie Klock at (908) 337-7735.

biography goes beyond Lowry's life to examine the Navy in which he served and the politics and corruption that Lowry and his fellow naval officers encountered as they sought to prevent a captain with less seniority from being promoted ahead of them.

A resident of Scotch Plains since 1981, the author earned a bachelor's degree in history from Oberlin College, where he began his research on Commodore Lowry and the Navy. He went on to complete a master's degree in American history from New York University. Mr. McClintock previously served as township mayor and councilman, and is active in the Rotary Club, notably with the Frazee house Restoration Project. Career highlights include serving as an officer at Bankers Trust Company and as Chief Financial Officer at Corporate Annual Reports. In 1993, he formed William McClintock Associates. Commodore Reigart Bolivar Lowry is his first book.

The upcoming meeting is free and all are welcome. Refreshments and fellowship will follow the presentation.

CARRIAGE HOUSE PERFORMANCE SERIES

On May 13th the concert series at Fanwood's Carriage House will continue with Cold Weather Company who will present its combination of vocal harmonies, sweeping instrumental arrangements and emotive lyrics. This Central Jersey trio has repeatedly been named a "band you need to hear" by NJ.com. Sharing the bill will be Shira, a New York-based singersongwriter and ukelele stylist who describes her sound as "fairy-folk."

The powerful voice and equally powerful songs of Danielia Cotton will fill the listening room on June 10. SOS ~ SAVE OUR SEAL! A MESSAGE FROM U.C. HISTORICAL SOCIETY

War is hell. Unfortunately, that powerful expression is just as accurate today in Ukraine, for example, as it was in Elizabethtown in 1780. In both cases, civilians suffered, and are suffering, along with soldiers.

Heroic sculptures and statues of beribboned generals on horseback are noble and inspiring, to be sure. On the other hand, however, there is the World War II Katyn Memorial in Jersey City, showing the horror of war as it depicts the brutal massacre Russians committed on Polish soldiers graphically showing a bound and gagged Polish soldier impaled through his back by a bayonetted rifle. At its base, a Polish woman cradles a starving child, representing the Polish citizens who were deported to Siberia. Are we to take down such monuments because the horror they depict offends us, or should they remain, conveying their timeless message to us: "Never forget, and Never again!"

Yes, war is hell. And it was so in 1780 as local patriots fought for independence against the often cruel and brutal British and Hessian troops.

One of the most infamous events of that struggle was the horrible murder of Mrs. Hannah Caldwell, the wife of the famous Rev. James Caldwell ("the fighting Parson"), on June 7, 1780 in Connecticut Farms, now Union. It seems that ongoing discussions concerning the changing of the County Seal depicting Mrs. Caldwell's murder by a British soldier apparently have finally come to light recently.

This tragic event has been depicted on our County Seal for over 100 years. In 1923, the Union County Historical Society proposed and supported the official adoption of the Seal, which had previously been used unofficially for decades. It was formally ratified by the Board of Freeholders at that time. The Society has been proud of its role in the adoption of the Seal a hundred years ago, and strongly opposes current efforts to change it. Some now object to the Seal's depiction of a violent and senseless act against a woman and mother of nine young children. But it really happened! Are we to ignore it? Those were dangerous times in this area and few were spared from the death, destruction, and suffering that occurred.

Indeed, Hannah Caldwell's death became a rallying cry to the despondent, tired, and outnumbered American troops who were inspired to fight on at the Battle of Springfield, the turning point of the Revolution in the North, just two weeks after her death.

Whether she was inside the house or outside when she was murdered is immaterial to the Seal's message. Showing her outside the house simply makes the event more visible. Similar artistic license is often employed in depicting important events in history. For example, the iconic and dramatic 1851 Emanuel Leutz painting of Washington's 1776 Christmas night crossing of the Delaware near Trenton is inaccurate in every way except one: its heroic portrayal of a courageous and brilliant military operation, which led to an important turning point in the war.

History is not always convenient; it has more than its share of suffering and evil, as the Union County Seal demonstrates. And isn't that in fact the meaning and message of the Seal, that democracy and freedom often demand sacrifice. It is a reminder of the terrible price paid by the brave men and women during those difficult times. Any redesign of our iconic and unique Seal would dishonor and diminish the memory of Hannah Caldwell and so many others who sacrificed all in the long and difficult struggle for independence.

Indeed, after the war, Washington acknowledged that no place had suffered greater deprivation and destruction than Elizabethtown and its environs. Our Seal reminds us of that. Let it be.
